#### A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas "The Race that Stops a Nation"

A couple of issues ago I wrote about the St Marys Races and how they have become the biggest event on the St Marys calendar. important event in St Marys is the Lymphoedema Centre luncheon brought about by Australia's biggest race meet the Melbourne Cup, held on the Tuesday in November. This celebrations for the race that stops a nation will be a little more significant because it is the 150th running of this most famous race.

It all started way back in 1861 with rather humble beginnings, but it soon cemented its position as a revered sporting, social and cultural event that has continued to play a vital role in defining Australia's national identity.

The first two mile (3,200 metres) Melbourne Cup

was run on the 7th November 1861 with a field of seventeen horses, all racing for a modest prize of 710 gold sovereigns (£710) and a gold watch. This year's total prize money will be \$6 million plus trophies worth around \$125,000. The first ten past the post will receive prize money, with the winner collecting \$3.3 million, down to tenth who will receive \$115,000.

In order to attract a large crowd to the first Melbourne Cup meet the secretary of the Victorian Racing Club decided to issue members with two ladies tickets, calculating that where the ladies went the men would follow.. The crowd of 4,000, however, was still disappointing and it was put down to the fact that only a couple of days earlier Melbourne received news of the deaths of explorers Burke and Wills.

Still the inaugural Cup was an eventful affair with one horse bolting before the start and three of the starters falling during the race, two of which died. Archer, a 16.3 hands bay stallion from Sydney, who started a rank outsider, won the race from the Victorian champion and favourite Mormon. Archer and the New South Wales punters took a heap of money away from Melbourne that day, fuelling a Melbourne-Sydney rivalry that has become even stronger over the years. But Archer was not to be outdone, he came back to Melbourne the next year and won the Cup for a second time by a record margin of 8 lengths, writing his name in the history books with horses like Carbine (1890), Phar Lap (1930), Peter Pan (1932 - 1934), Rain Lover (1968 - 1969), Think Big (1974 - 1975) and Makybe Diva (2003 - 2004 - 2005).

The Melbourne Cup has seen many milestones over the years, with one of the most memorable being 1985 when it became the first horse race in Australia to offer prize money of \$1 million. The same year the event was attended by Prince Charles and Lady Diana who arrived by boat via the Maribyrnong River. The Cup was won that year by What a Nuisance.

Since the gold watch was awarded as a trophy in 1861 a variety of trophies followed, including model horses and silver bowls. From 1919 a three handled cup has been awarded to the owner and since 1973 the practice has been to award the jockey and trainer with a miniature replica of the cup. As well, the strapper is awarded the Tommy Woodcock trophy, named after the strapper of Phar Lap.

Over the years the value of the trophies has increased dramatically with the present cup worth in access of \$100,000. It is made from 34 pieces of gold, hand beaten for over 200 hours to form its shape and contains 1.65 kg of 18-carat gold. Close inspection of the inside of the cup will reveal small hammer imprints.

Although the Cup field is capped at 24 these days, the largest field ever was in 1890 when 39 horses took part.

Carbine won that race carrying a record weight of 10.5 stone (65.5 kg) and run in the remarkable time of 3.28 minutes. The fastest time for a Melbourne Cup is 3.16 minutes, run by Kingston Rule in 1990.

In 1861 when the first Melbourne Cup was run, St Marys was only 4 years old and the few people who lived here would have had no idea of such a race taking place until they read it in a newspaper weeks later. How different it will be in 2010 when, I'm sure, the Community Hall will be packed to the rafters and the people of St Marys can stop with the rest of the nation and watch the race live, in colour, on a big screen television.

I believe the eyes told the story with looks of "I wish".


Congratulations to our winners who were all selected by the number of votes received.







#### **COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON THURSDAY 11 JUNE 2010**

The following information is provided as a brief of matters that were discussed and decisions that were made at the Council Meeting held on Thursday 10 June 2010 at 5.00pm at the St Helens Council Chamber.

A Notice of Rescission was listed on the agenda as follows and was Lost.

That the Council Decision 05/08.8.12.163 be rescinded to allow an unlimited number of Councillors' "Notices of Motion" for meeting and an unlimited number of Councillors "Questions Without Notice" or "With Notice".

Councillors' "Questions Without Notice" together with the answers are printed in the meeting minutes.

The following Notices of Motion were submitted by Councillors for investigation and full reports to be provided to the July Meeting of Council.

That Council supports and requests an extension of broadband access to all settlements within the Break O'Day region. - CARRIED

That Council investigate the possibility of establishing a collection point(s) to collect donations for victims of the recent storm and floods in St Marys and surrounding areas. - CARRIED

That Council-operated waste transfer stations be open free of charge for the period of fourteen days (14) following the conclusion of a natural-related emergency event causing significant property damage (such as fire, storm, flood or hail) for residents whose properties are affected to enable the more effective and timely disposal of the damaged household and outdoor items, materials and green waste. - LOST

Other items listed for information and decisions by Council were as follows:

Council approves a rate remission for the general rate levied on the properties that are listed as discretionary remissions under the Rating Exemptions and Remissions Policy. - CARRIED

Council not support the funding, through the Lifestyle budget, the amount of \$2,800.00 for the Fingal Valley

Neighbourhood House in order that this organisation can provide a staggered year round project aimed at disadvantaged families/young people to visit and enjoy recreational activities within the Northern Tasmania. - LOST

Council consents as land manager for a Development Application for a shower block to be built on a parcel of land which currently houses the Pyengana Hall, playground equipment, tennis court, wood chopping arena and outbuildings, PID number 6806259. - CARRIED

That Council adopt the draft Lease document in principle and that Council enter into written correspondence with the relevant community/sporting organisations as to the change in the lease format and arrange meetings to discuss the proposed lease document. – CARRIED

That Council enter into a lease arrangement with the St Helens Family History Group for use of the room located in the front of the Portland Hall as a shop front for genealogy. That any costs associated with the installation of telephone/internet access be at the St Helens Family History Group's expense. That a condition of the lease with Council be that when this facility is an evacuation/recovery centre, that the Group does not have access to the leased area for the duration of the emergency and that Council investigate the cost of the installation of a telephone line into Portland Hall. - CARRIED

Fire Abatement Inspection Fee - That Council lobbies the State Government for an amendment to Section 205 of the Local Government Act 1993 which will allow Council to introduce a new Fire Abatement Inspection Fee. That Council writes to the Honourable Bryan Green, MP, Minister for Local Government, requesting an amendment to Section 205 of the Local Government Act 1993 to allow for the introduction of a Fire Abatement Inspection Fee. - CARRIED

<u>Council Workshop - Lower George River Flood Risk Project</u> - Council convene a Workshop session to review findings on future flooding on the George River Floodplain and consider a risk management plan for its assets, services and responsibilities on the floodplain. - CARRJED

Meeting Procedures - Council adopt the Meeting Procedures with amendments as agreed. - CARRIED

Break O'Day Council OBO Crown - St Helens Point Road, Stieglitz - Demolition of Existing and Building of New Toilet Block - CARRIED

Bobbie Harwood and Rod McGiveron will continue on the committee and the other two posts will be confirmed soon.


