LOCAL BOYS IN TARGA.

Too many good people passed away in 2010, a few of them not much older than me, so it gets you thinking about what you want to do before the inevitable. On the Sunday before Easter 2010, I visited a friend for the last time, and the last words he spoke were; "if ya got something you want to do mate, do it and don't bugger around!"

I called in to work on the way home one Sunday in July 2010 to sheek emails including some Targa info, which stated that if I applied and paid a deposit to enter the Tour section of Targa Tasmania 2010 before July 31st, (that night!), I could save \$1000! So with 2 hours to decide before the deal expired I sent my credit card no., and thought I'll work out how to fit it into my life later!

The Tour class of Targa was introduced in 2003 with the intentions of attracting a broader range of classic and historical cars back to experience all that Targa has to offer but without the modifications required on the competition cars such as roll cages and racing harnesses etc. The tradeoff being having to drive at a slower pace,

(but still a little faster than normal), and no recording of Targa stage times. Also a fair bit cheaper too!

For the event I chose my '74 Falcon GT which has been in the family since 1975, and has been back on the road since 2002 after a 10 year restoration by me.

I was much relieved when my brother Randal accepted the invitation to co-drive as the task of choosing from a dozen or so great rellies and mates was daunting!

So after more than a few weekends preparing the car, we arrived at the Velodrome on Monday April 4th for documentation and scrutineering, and immediately formed friendships with a dozen fellow Tour entrants.

Lining up for the George Town prologue on Tuesday, I realized that we were the first car off the line for the entire Targa fleet and the first stage of Targa Tasmania 20th anniversary and the honour of being entrant No. 20!

Wednesday had us touring around both sides of the Tamar valley, finding that we struggled too keep up with the tour leader but comfortably in front of the Porsche behind us.

Thursday was a different story with us getting closer to the Tour leader's Suburu as we traveled the familiar roads of the northeast and finally filling the WRX's rear view mirror at Elephant Pass hairpin!

Friday consisted of northern midlands sections ending with a 6 hour repair on a non closing sunroof! Can't go to the west coast next day with a hole in the roof! After a half hour brake line repair on Saturday morning with great help by Nick at the Chudleigh servo, we worked our way through the great Targa stages of the north west hinterland, down the west coast and to a great welcome at Strahan. After having perfect autumn weather for the first 5 days, the rain started at Helyer

Arriving to a huge welcome at Wrest Point on Sunday we were both sad to end 6 fantastic days of driving some of the best roads in the world but relieved that we had brought our much loved childhood

and didn't stop till arriving back at St. Marys on Tuesday night!

In Tasmania we are lucky to have this event as there is much more to it than a bunch of rich boys darting around the countryside in their toys. It was a privilege to have the opportunity to drive great roads a little faster without oncoming traffic, surrounded by great cars and people. Can't be many places in the world where you can do this!





"Poppy's Book"

In the research room of the St Patricks Head & Esk Valley Historical Society Inc., which is currently in the St Marys Online Access Centre, we have a variety of books and documentation relating to the history of Tasmania, with a number dealing specifically with the Fingal Valley. One such book simply called "Poppy's Book", is the record of a life time of memories written in around 1985 by the late Alf Faulkner.

He was born in 1906; the third member of eight children, and although Alf spent most of his adult life living in St Marys, his birth place was his parent's humble dwelling in the small coal mining town of Mt Nicholas. Like most small country towns in those days Mt Nicholas had no medical facilities and the only assistance Alf's mother had at the births was the help of a woman neighbour. doctor, who was hours or sometimes even days away, was only called in an extreme emergency.



Alf's story tells of growing up in Mt Nicholas at a time when there was very little money and children had to make their own fun. He remembers the strong bond he had with his brother Ron and the pranks they played. For pocket money they would collect empty beer bottles, mainly from around the signalmen's camp, take them home and clean them, then sell them for sixpence a dozen to the grocery cart man when he came each week.

The little extra pocket money came in very handy, especially the time when Alf's father was too sick to go to work because of bleeding ulcers. At one time he was off work for several weeks while he went to Launceston to have an operation. There was no sick pay or social security payments in those days, so one can only imagine how hard it would have been for Alf's mother to cope rearing eight children with no money coming in.

Alf left school at fourteen and went to the mine manager and asked for a job. The manager looked at him and said: "Boy, you're not as high as three penneth of coppers". Alf was only a small boy and the manager meant he was no higher than three pennies. But he gave Alf a job, which was the beginning of a 43 year career in the coal mines.

With part of his first pay, Alf brought some tobacco and borrowed a pipe from his father. He went off to work feeling like a fully grown man, puffing a cloud of smoke that he reckoned dwarfed the chimney stack of the mine boiler.

Alf talks about the tough times as a young man, especially when he would think of the deaths of his two sisters, both of whom died when they were only children. Many a day, as the image of their faces came into his mind, the coal he was shovelling would be wet from the tears he shed.

Around 1930 the mine at Mt Nicolas where Alf was working temporarily closed, so he went over to Cornwall and was given a job as a contract miner. His partner was Albert Jones, who like Alf, was only a little over five feet tall. Both men hit it off immediately and although most miners changed partners periodically, Alf and Albert stayed together for 25 years.

For all that time they sweated, toiled and risked their lives together day after day without one cross word. Even though they were two of the smallest men down the pit, their partnership worked so well that for many years they held the record

for the most coal produced in a fortnight by a pair of miners. They shared each other's problems and because Albert was a poor reader he would bring all his letters to work for Alf to read to him. It was a mateship that lasted a life time, in fact, only hours before Albert passed away, Alf visited and prayed with him at his hospital bed.

This article only covers a very small part of Alf's memories. To read his book in full truly brings a lump to one's throat. It is a story of a man who had a categorical faith and love for his church that guided him through a time that was hard, sometimes cruel and sad, but where pure happiness could be found in the simplest things.

There are thousands of stories like this that will never be told, but thanks to Alf putting pen to paper we have a firsthand insight into a time that only a few of us remember and fewer could even imagine.

Last but not least our President and driving force **Reon Johns** whose dream it was to keep old woodworking techniques available for the next generation to learn and appreciate.



DELTBERATIONS

by Charles trollope

There are some very interesting parallels to be found when one examines several of the world's ancient religions. Here is a small sample...

The Egyptian Empire of 25th Century BC had a religious deity called Horus who was worshipped from at least the late Pre - Dynastic through to the Greco - Roman times.

The name Horus was passed down to a number of Pharaohs of Ancient Egypt, and he was depicted as a God with the body of a man and the head of a falcon.

It is written that Horus was the only begotten Son of the God Osiris and the virgin Isis Meri and was born on 25th December with his birth being heralded by a star in the East and attended by three wise men. His birth was announced by angels and witnessed by shepherds. Baptised at the age of 30 by Anup the Baptiser and given the title Krst, the anointed one.

It is recorded that he walked on water, cast out demons, healed the sick, restored the sight to the blind and stilled the sea with his power. He was known to be generally accompanied by twelve followers.

Horus was also given the credit for raising his dead father from the grave. He is reported to have given a sermon on the mount, was crucified with two thieves and buried in a tomb. The records show that he was resurrected after three days which was witnessed by women.

Mythology tells us that Attis of Phrygia in Western Asia (1200 BC) is reported to have been born on 25th December to the virgin Nana, daughter of Cebele, mother of the Gods, and Goddess of fertility.

Nana's father believing her to have been licentious, orders the child to be taken to the river and placed in a wicker basket to die, but is saved by a shepherd who takes him home. He was considered the Savoir of Mankind and was slain for that reason. His body as bread was eaten by worshippers who saw him as both the Divine Father and Son.

He was crucified on a tree, from which his blood ran down to redeem the earth. It is written that he was dead for three days, and was then resurrected on 25th March as the Most High God.

Dionysus of Greece as the story goes, was born on 25th December of a virgin. He became a teacher and was reported to perform miracles. Buried for three days and resurrected. Was worshiped between 1500 to 1100 BC.

His mother was a mortal woman called Semele and his father was Zeus, King of the Gods.

He is more commonly known as Bacchus, the God of wine.

Mithra of Persia 1500 B.C. According to Mithraism, was called the Son of God, the Light and the Truth, was born of a virgin on 25th December, had twelve disciples, was crucified, rose from the dead on the third day, atoned for the sins of mankind and returned to Heaven. There were seven sacraments, baptism and communion with bread and wine.

The Eucharist hosts were signed with a cross, an ancient Pagan symbol which originated in Egypt.

Throughout ancient history, you will find literally dozens of similar stories of copycat religions which are there for anyone who wants to go to the trouble of finding them.

So here we have a small sampling of four from our ancient past which all share common themes. We have:

All born of a virgin mother with their father being a God. You will note that they were all born on 25th December, and that this occurrence was marked in the case of Horus by a star of the East and three wise men. Two of the four had twelve disciples. The four mentioned here were all crucified, and were reported to have been dead for three days followed by miraculous resurrection.

There are far too many similarities for these historical religious elements to be classed as coincidence! So is there a connection, for there must be one, and it will be discussed in the next issue of this paper.

I know that these people are well and truly in the minority, but just the same I wish they would give things a chance before they get really critical of what might be the case. What ever happened with 'fair go'.

What can be wrong with that?

The people heavily involved with future running of this facility are going to make it as accessible and affordable to all as is humanly possible for these very reasons, so that anyone who wants or needs to have access to a genuine 25 metre safe facility will be able to do so. Predominantly a card system is to be used whereby card holders will be able to access the pool as their funds will allow. Sounds pretty good to me.

It is envisaged that as time progresses various groups might like to be able to use the facility to suit their needs.

In retrospect we have a lot to thank our intrepid and very community minded people for from about two decades ago which has ultimately led to this. These wonderful people had the foresight to see how beneficial a decent pool has been for the area and through their incredible determination we will DEFINITELY NOT have a white elephant. Not by a longshot.


Whilst it might be a little while yet before the facility opens to the public, mainly due to vital infrastructure still to arrive and legal and regulatory requirements needing to be ticked off on, rest assured this facility is to become a terrific addition to our community.

That is paramount and we need to remember that. Do your best to attend one of the planned local services in the Valley.

Thanks to everyone last weekend at the Health Centre and at our fantastic Pharmacy also. I was in a bit of bother there and everyone was overwhelmingly helpful. We are lucky indeed to have them.





Creating Birth - images in cloth





Information collected by the parent opinion survey will be included in the school performance report prepared next year and will be made available to all parents.




WORKING ON EAST COAST

The students were Sam Neighbour, Aaron Webb, Brodie Barnes and this is what they discovered over the 2 days:


- St Helens Marine Rescue Centre

- St Helens District High school Science lab




At the Marine Rescue centre we were given a demonstration with the safety of life jackets and how to maintain them. Also fire extinguishers and how to prolong their life, Peter also showed us Epirps and how to set them off in an emergency situation. The most exciting part of this was letting off the flares and working out which one was which by knowing the marks on the bottom. We also let off 2 rocket parachutes and had to get permission from the local police to do this demo. It was awesome! Greg Snells from Coastal Patrol took the boys on the Rescue boat for a ride around the bay showing them markers and which ones are guides.

We then had a magnificent lunch at the Blue Shed followed by a trip out to Suncoast Fisheries where Crayfish are stored ready for exporting out to Sydney and Melbourne. We were allowed to handle the fish and it was so much fun catching them. The biggest one weighed 3.5kg and it was massive.

Second day we started out at Aqua Oysters along Binalong Bay Rd. The owner Craig Lockwood was so organised for us and had the oysters starting from a pipy size up to one that was 8 years old. We were shown how they go through the baskets individually on the conveyer belt and are washed several times. We didn't realise how much of a process this was. Craig explained that they are shipped to Japan. Thailand, Nepal, China and many other places around the world. It only takes 24hrs to be shipped anywhere in the world if all goes to plan. We then





got to go on one of the oyster punts and were shown how they are set in the water in racks to grow. In each rack they start with 1000 little cysters then halved as they grow. They have hanging racks which are used in rough weather and ones that sit on the ropes. We couldn't thank Craig enough for his time and energy with all the information he gave us and showing the whole operation of the

Josh Breen's dad came in from sea so we went to the wharf and got to go on his boat and looked where they sleep in the cabin, where they eat and how the pots operate for crayfishing. Josh was great explaining how the Crayfishing industry works with 'quoters' and how many pots you are allowed to have.


Lyncraft's Boat Building shed was next on our agenda to see how they are designed on the computer and then cut to size on a new piece of machinery that cuts within 1 millimeter of the exact measurement. We were shown their latest big boat they are finishing off ready to be sent to Strahan for a dive centre and spoke to two boys previously from St Helens High school they now doing an apprenticeship in Sheet Metal Fabrication. It was great to see them enjoying their apprenticeship with the hands on and they said the theory isn't so bad as well.




The last part of the program we went to St Helens High School to dissect Albacore Tuna with Howard Jones who was so much fun. He really knows what he is talking about and gave us diagrams to go off once he had finished showing us what to do first. We worked in groups of 3 and learnt how to take out the heart, gills without popping their airbag.

St Marys Community Health Centre Community Survey 2010 Conclusion:

Firstly I would like to thank the participants for their contribution to the survey conducted in October 2010. I would also like to thank those who have assisted in the production, delivery, data collection and analysis of the survey.

The purpose of the St Marys Community Health Centre is to provide quality care and support to the community.

In order to be able to provide this level of service we need to be kept informed of the needs of the community. One of the tools we use to achieve this outcome when assessing the needs of the community, and reviewing the level of satisfaction in the services currently provided, is through the utilisation of a community survey.

The results of the survey have provided us with information that will be employed when planning strategies for the future development of the Community Health Centre.

Based on the outcomes of the survey the following observations and recommendations have been made:

- 1. The community respondents were very clear about the need for a Permanent General Practitioner in the community. With the arrival of Dr Cyril Latt, who has taken up residency in St Marys, the negative issues around inconsistent care will reduce. Dr Libby Reeckman will continue to provide a service, particularly around Women's Health Issues as well as some relief work. Whilst there will still be a need for relief doctors in order to provide a "break" for Dr Latt, there will be an increase in the consistency of care provision as the planning of care will be developed and maintained by Dr Latt.
- 2. Oral Health Care was raised as a concern. Whilst the current school dental service has been an asset, it is time to review the provision of this service. The lack of a service, within the region, for other family members is an ongoing concern. There have been discussions with the Oral Health Team around the possibility of developing a service utilising the current infrastructure at the SMCHC. We will need to keep you all informed as this project progresses.
- 3. From the results of the survey, it would appear that there are some issues around accessibility for those with a disability. It is important for a community to encourage independence and to develop strategies that will support the need for independence. It is recommended that the Break O Day Council re-examines the current standard of lighting provided, the conditions of the pathways and the accessibility of the shops for those with a disability/special need.
- 4. When examining the services accessed outside the Community Health Centre, there were several services listed that could have been accessed through the centre. Is the community aware of the current services provided

by the St Marys Community Health Centre? A recommendation is that we, as a service provider, develop a public relations campaign aimed at informing the community of the variety of services available at our centre, how they are accessed and at what cost.

5. In several sections of the survey the subject of transport was raised. It was noted that 7% of respondents have difficulty accessing transport. There were concerns around cost of transport, accessibility of transport and availability of transport. One of the issues raised, in relation to feeling supported, was lack of public transport at night time and over the weekends. Availability of transport from the Launceston General Hospital to St Marys, particularly after hours, and transport from St Marys to other surrounding communities, particularly on return from hospital, were highlighted as problems.

We will be talking to the Community Transport under HACC services to see what may be available, and also we will approach the Council to see if they have any plans to encourage more transport operators to the area. Callows' Bus Service has increased its services.

- 6. A Mental Health Worker is needed in the community to assist the current available services. The position has been advertised and interviews were conducted through Community Mental Health.
- 7. The **Physiotherapy** position has been unfilled for the past twelve months, despite the position having been advertised twice. We have been working with the Director of Allied Health Services to find a satisfactory solution that will ensure the service is provided to the community.
- 8. In the positive over 60% of respondents access most of their health needs at SMCHC.
- 9. The fact that 52% of respondents belong to clubs or associations may indicate a high community involvement and social connectedness which are indicators of health and wellbeing.
- 10. Satisfaction with health services provided at SMCHC scored an average of 3.85 which indicates an overall level of satisfaction with the services but it does not mean there is not a need for improvement.
- 11. **Specialist services** we would like to entice to the area are: Dietician services, development of ante-natal and post-natal care, palliative care services and the provision for visiting specialists. Areas that are less likely to be developed are in the area of radiology as there is already a provision on the East Coast.

The results provided us with many other pieces of information that will be considered in our planning.

NEW Public Dental Service

for St Marys

Oral Health Services Tasmania will open a new dental clinic with two surgeries at St Marys Community Health Centre to replace the old dental van in the grounds of the St Marys school.

The dental van will close permanently on 13 May 2011 after many years of service to the children of St Marys and surrounding districts.

Planning for the new clinic, which is expected to open later this year, is well advanced.

Services to the local community will be increased with the addition of new adult dental services including dentures. To access these services, adults must hold a healthcare or pension concession card.
