The Mighty Tigers Roar Again!

It was like stepping back in time; the ground was full of cars, the smell of liniment was in the air and what about the sound of the siren, the car horns and the cheering and clapping of a very appreciative crowd of supporters as the St Marys team, in St Marys colours, ran out onto the St Marys footy ground for the first time in eight long years. It was also great to see the Auskick youngsters line up as a guard of honour as the team ran out.

Yes the mighty Tigers were back and about to enter into an AFL Masters game against a North Central team from Burnie way, in front of the biggest crowd seen at the footy ground for many a long year. After a lot of planning and a fair bit of heartbreak the stage was set for an exciting match and it was truly fitting that the first kick of the game went to local legend Michael "Cookie" Cooke who had put such tremendous effort into getting the team onto the paddock.

While most of the players had long ago retired from competitive football there was no lack of skills or determination and there was a fierce contest for every ball. The Tigers skipped out to a ten point lead at the end of the first quarter but the second quarter was much tighter and there was only eleven points difference at half time. During the third quarter there was a short downpour of freezing sheeting rain but the standard of football did not drop – the North Central boys started to pick up the tempo and actually outscored the Tigers by a point in the quarter to bring the margin back to ten points at three quarter time. Spurred on by a rousing speech from coach "Cookie", the St Marys boys stormed out in the final quarter kicking one goal three points while keeping a desperate North Central team scoreless for the quarter.

Final score - St Marys 7.7 49 defeated a gallant North Central team 4.6 30.

Goal kickers for St Marys: two goals each to Ray Squires and Jason Barr with singles to "Skeet" Webb, Billy Reece and Roger Salter.

Top three players (awarded prizes generously donated by the Schier family in memory of the late "Moscow" Schier): Kent Richie, Jason Barr and Ray Squires.

Mention must also be made of the great performances from "Captain Courageous" Roger Salter, Darcy Williams and "Grug" Cooper. Both "Grug" and Brian Smith received accidental knocks and have the prestigious honour of having "bled for the team".

The second game saw a composite side (made up of a few local youngsters and quite a few players backing up for a second game) outclassed by a very slick and cohesive Launceston team 8.10 58 to 2.6 18.

What a pleasure it was to see the great camaraderie between the players after the game as they sipped on a cold beer and munched on a snag or steak sandwich and how good was it to see the Tigers players in a huddle after the game singing the team song. A great day for the Tigers and a great day for St Marys. Congratulations to all concerned.

For the players - training at St Marys 9.00am this Sunday in preparation for the next game vs Triabunna at Triabunna on 1 August. There will be a bus going down and there will be some room for friends and supporters. More information to follow. (President's report and more photos inside...)


A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas

"Constable Ward"

I'm sure we would all agree that one of the most dangerous, but imperative roles in our community is that of the police. Over the years the Fingal Valley has seen hundreds of police come and go, many of whom have contributed to not only upholding the law, but given valuable input into a range of community organisations.

One of those, whose name appears regularly in the record books and newspapers of the mid nineteenth century, was District Constable William Ward.

William spent the first fifteen years of his adult life in the British 3rd Regiment of Dragoon Guards. In 1831, however, at a relatively early age, he was discharged and given a tiny pension, of which he was totally dissatisfied and immediately immigrated to Van Diemens Land. Along



with his wife Ellen and two children, he arrived in Hobart on board the barque *Rubicon* on the 11th June 1832. Soon after William arrived in Hobart he applied for a position as District Constable, but the Chief Police Magistrate of the time was of the opinion that all ex-soldiers were drunkards and untrustworthy, thus the application was refused. William then moved to Kempton where he became a fencing contractor and had a number of convicts assigned to him.

After working on fencing jobs between Kempton and Oatlands for some ten years he must have convinced the Chief Police Magistrate of his worthiness because he was eventually appointed District Constable and Stock Inspector for the District of Avoca. On the 20th April 1842 he and his wife and children, who now numbered four with another on the way, moved into the police barracks at Fingal.

By the end of William's first year at Fingal he featured in the newspapers when he came across bushrangers attacking a house at Break O'Day Plains. They had tied up the occupants and were ransacking the house when William arrived, but he was outnumbered and one bushranger held a pistol to William's head while his associates finished their job. As the bushrangers were leaving William jumped a fence in pursuit only to be fired upon and was lucky that he only ended up with a hole in his ear where a bullet passed through.

The bushranger strikes in the Fingal Valley continued, making life for the settlers extremely hazardous. This caused a public outcry, calling for more police in the area and after a number of nasty attacks at Avoca, including one on the noted property of "Bona Vista", the Police Magistrate ordered a large party of constables to assist William in scouring the area. The exercise was fruitless however, and several weeks later whilst William was sharing a meal with James Gilligan of "Clifton Lodge", ten kilometres east of Avoca, the homestead was attacked by noted bushrangers Riley Jeffs and John Conway. Jeffs immediately held a pistol to Williams saying: "Ah, you are here are you? We only winged you last time we met, now we will do for you."

With that William rushed at Jeffs and overpowered him. But Jeffs yelled for his partner's help which led to Conway coming to Jeff's aid and shooting William in the shoulder. But alas, the bullet hit a bone and passed through into William's lungs causing him to die a painful death.

Following the murder of William. substantial rewards were offered for information on the absconders. As well, the Chief Police Magistrate himself led a large party of constables to thoroughly comb the Fingal Valley. Finally, Jeffs and Conway were captured in a shepherd's hut near the South Esk River on the property of Mr Youl and taken to jail in Launceston. In July 1843 they were sentenced to he hung by the neck until dead and their bodies dissected. Both men died at an 8:00am public hanging, where it was reported almost half the population of Launceston turned out to witness the spectacle.

Despite compensation being paid to a number of property owners by the Colonial Government for damages caused by bushrangers, Ellen Ward received nothing for the loss of her husband. The press took up Ellen's case and Lieutenant-Governor John Franklin gave her a donation of £10. But the press continued to lobby on Ellen's behalf and the Government, now under the leadership of John E. Eardley-Wilmot, was eventually shamed into giving her a pension of £30 per annum.

This was not only just reward for the wife of a dedicated policeman, who lost his life in the course of his duty, but a significant breakthrough for women of the time. Ellen's pension was the first ever given to the wife of a person employed in the public service in Van Diemens Land.

It was with a mix of outrage and incredulity that I read a report in The Examiner (30/6/10) in which the Mayor of the Break O'Day Council Robert Legge and Liberal MHR Rene Hidding called on public health campaigner Dr Alison Bleaney to apologize for her research into water quality on Tasmania's north-east coast.

Apologize to whom? To the community where for many years she has been a highly respected and indeed much loved medical practitioner? Dr. Bleaney's only concern from the outset has been the health of her patients and her professional skills and personal courage are beyond question. Mayor Legge has sought to denigrate the selfless public service of one of our most valued community members. Shame on him.

Meanwhile the recently released report by the George River Water Quality Panel raises more questions than it answers and leaves us in the same position as before.

It is based on limited testing and the science in the area continues to be highly contested by experts on both sides. The issue of the north-east's water quality remains unresolved.


Other staff members are currently working on their Diploma and Certificate 3 level studies, all of which will contribute to our centre meeting the new national quality standard well ahead of

The bush tracks and gravel roads around the area proved ideal for the horses and a highlight for


many was the sun rising over the ocean as the horses made their way down the road beside Taylors Beach.



Archaeological evidence shows us that Aborigines were living in Arnhem Land over 60,000 years ago and had reached southern Australia 20,000 years later.

Scientists tell us that at that time the world was much colder with a great deal more frozen masses, causing sea levels to be some 120 metres below what they are today.

Also around then Tasmania and mainland Australia would have been joined with exposed land allowing a small number of Aborigines, who were a nomadic people, to travel further south into Tasmania.

As the world warmed up and sea levels rose, the low level land would have been covered, cutting off the Aborigines and forcing them to make the Island their home.

There is some argument among historians to the number of Aborigines who actually lived in Tasmania, but the most popular figure, at the time of European occupation in 1803, is between four and five thousand.





COALITION TO EXPAND FRONTLINE COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

Mental health professionals and services in Lyons will get greater support from a major expansion of frontline mental healthcare services under a Coalition Government, the Federal Liberal Candidate for Lyons, Eric Hutchinson, announced last week.

In particular young people experiencing a mental disorder will have greater access to services, Eric Hutchinson said.

The Coalition's Real Action Plan for Better Mental Health will provide \$1.5 billion towards an expansion of frontline mental health services to improve access for people with mental health disorders within Australia.

In 2006, the former Coalition Government made the single biggest investment in mental health by any government in Australian history. \$1.9 billion was committed over a five year period for services for people with mental illness, their families and carers.

The Coalition's **Real Action Plan for Better Mental Health** will build on this by providing \$1.5 billion towards 20 new Early Psychosis Intervention Centres, 60 additional youth *headspace* sites and 800 acute and sub-acute early intervention beds.

headspace is Australia's National Youth Mental Health Foundation. The number of headspace sites will increase from the current 30 to 90.

The new Early Psychosis Intervention Centres will be based on the 'EPPIC' model pioneered in Australia by current Australian of the Year Professor Patrick McGorry. There is currently only one such Centre in Australia, located in metropolitan Melbourne.

The Early Psychosis Intervention Centres and *headspace* sites will be located in metropolitan and regional areas across Australia and mobile services will be provided in each state and territory.

The provision of 800 acute and sub acute beds linked to the Early Psychosis Intervention Centres will take pressure off the nation's public hospitals and emergency departments and provide better care to the patient in the community.

The Federal Candidate for Lyons, Eric Hutchinson, said the new spending in mental health would help take pressure off medical services in Lyons.

"It will also provide more treatment facilities in community settings to the benefit of those experiencing a mental illness."

Eric Hutchinson said the Coalition's commitments would target younger people experiencing mental disorders.

"Mental illness often first manifests itself in teenagers or young adults and early intervention is critical to help these young people cope or recover from mental illness and regain health."

"Labor talked about mental health, but took no action. The Coalition has a strong track record and will deliver necessary services to those experiencing a mental illness," Eric Hutchinson said.

Parents do not want their children to be hurt and have to pay huge hospital bills. They can not afford it.


