A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas "HMS Endeavour"

One of the most interesting devices used in the early history of Australia was indeed the tall ships, some of which made many visits to our great land, while others made just the one. Many have little significance in history except they carried passengers and cargo, while others made an important mark in our history books by carrying our most famous explorers.

One of those tall ships, named *Bark the Endeavour* by the Royal British Navy in 1768, carried Captain James Cook on his first voyage to find the Great South land.

The *HMS Endeavour*, as she became known, was built at Whitby in North Yorkshire and launched in 1764. She was sturdily built with a broad flat bow, square stern and box like body. Her length was 106 feet (32m) with a beam of 29 feet 3 inches (8.92m). Her original name was *Earl of Pembroke* and her early use was mainly as a coal carrier until the Royal Navy purchased her in 1768 for the sum of £2,840. She was refitted as well as renamed and made ready for a mission of discovery to the Pacific Ocean with the foremost aim to explore the seas for the surmised Terra Australis Incognita (unknown southern land). Part of her mission was also to reach Tahiti by the 3rd June 1769 to observe the transit of Venus across the sun.

A relatively unknown, young lieutenant by the name of James Cook was made Captain and on the 26th August 1768 she departed from Plymouth carrying 94 people and eighteen months of provisions.

Livestock on board included poultry, a milking goat, a number of pigs and two greyhound dogs.

Endeavour sailed down the African coast and across the Atlantic Sea, arriving in Rio de Janeiro on the 13th November 1768. After supplies of fresh food and water were brought on board she headed off towards Cape Horn. Seas around the Cape were treacherous, however, and it took Cook several attempts before he was able to negotiate the **Endeavour** around the southern tip of South America and into the Pacific Ocean.

The expedition finally reached Tahiti in April 1769 and remained there until the 3rd June when the scientists on board were able to observe the spectacular event when the planet Venus passed across the sun.

Replenished again *Endeavour* set off sailing west in July and after exploring a number of South Sea Islands she arrived on the shores of New Zealand in October.

The *Endeavour* spent six months mapping and circumnavigating New Zealand until Cook finally realized it wasn't the Great South Land he was looking for. In March 1770 after going ashore and proclaiming New Zealand for Britain, Cook sailed west again and reached the shore of Australia on the 19th April 1770. *Endeavour* became the first European vessel to make landfall on the east coast of Australia when Cook landed one of the ships longboats on the shores of what we now know as Botany Bay.

Cook continued to charter the east coast of Australia until, on the 11th June 1770, the *Endeavour* stuck a section of the Great Barrier Reef, a section now known appropriately as Endeavour Reef. This caused major problems and it was not until the 5th August 1770 that the ship was refloated, repaired and able to continue her journey.


But the *Endeavour* remained in poor condition after her grounding on the Barrier Reef and by the time she reached Java the ship's carpenter, John Seetterly, advised that she would have to be hauled out of the water to allow major repairs to be undertaken.

After extensive repairs and a complete recaulk the ship was once again in good condition and was able to sail west, beginning her return journey to England. But no sooner had she started out when a terrible sickness hit the crew. Seven crew members died and another forty were too sick to attend their duties. In the following weeks another twenty three died leaving the ship dangerously undermanned.

Finally on the 13th March 1771 the Endeavour reached Cape Town and the remaining sick were taken ashore to recover. On the 15th April all crew members were well again and with the recruitment of ten more able bodied men, she was able to resume the last leg of her homeward voyage. She entered the Port of Dover on the 12th July, completing the greatest voyage of discovery of her time which saw her captain receive a promotion to Admiral and her botanist, Joseph Banks, go on to be one of the world's most famous botanists, as well as receiving a Knighthood.

But the wonderful old ship that had helped achieve all this was virtually forgotten. After spending some time as a naval transport vessel, Endeavour was one of ten vessels sunk in Narragansett Bay as obstructions in an attempt to stop the French ships entering British occupied Newport Harbour on the east coast of America. This was certainly an unfitting end to a grand old lady of the sea who had seen so much of the world in a voyage that was arguably the most significant in the history of Australia.

Her feat was duly recognised in Australia, however, when a replica was built to commemorate the Bicentennial in 1988. In 1994 the replica undertook the famous journey of the original *Endeavour* and is now in the Australian Maritime Museum in Sydney's Darling Harbour.

I have no doubt that as a committee, the new Federation has worked hard achieving their goals, but I cannot see how changing the names of the St Marys and Fingal schools would achieve much more than drive a wedge further between our two communities.

I have had a chance, by accident, to talk to someone involved with the Fingal campus, who said that there has been no suggested name change from the committee at their end. Rather, they would like to see the Fingal Primary name stay and below put "Campus of St Marys District High School".

Also suggested was that the St Marys District High School to remain, below printed, "Combined Campus' of St Marys/Fingal Primary Schools + years 11 & 12.

If this is the case, then who is actually driving the focus for a name change?

Also, if we are now, the wider community, to be given a say in this issue, then why were the forms left around the town recently, worded in such a way that left no choice for the original name of the school. It appears that somewhere, there were people who thought this issue was done and dusted. I don't think this action was too well thought out at all.

On the subject of wider community, let's not forget the wide area that our students come from. If the suggestion of the word "Valley" may be included in the name, as mentioned in dispatches, then it hardly represents the Beaumaris to Coles Bay areas.

To change the name of our school, surely suggests that some exception must be taken to the current one. High School is what it is, District is what it represents, St Marys is where it is. Surely no-one takes umbrage at the location.

In all the talk now in the local community, I have not had one single person speak out for a new name. Surely if we are truly going to be given a say and be listened to, then nothing should change.

I, like a few, witnessed the privilege of attending the then "St Marys State School" with, by today's standards, its very basic amenities and I, like many, proudly attended the "modern" new school, "St Marys Area School".

With the requirements for education to High School standards, it became necessary to more widely encompass and expand the area served, hence the addition of the term District to the existing name becoming "St Marys District High School" as it is both proudly and justifiably known today.

Any change, as can be seen to date, was necessitated by significant changes in arising circumstances and were considered "appropriate" at the time to reflect, the services required, the area to be encompassed, and importantly, the institution capable of adequately and efficiently providing those services.

And hence it is fact to this present day.

Time itself, sees and witnesses change, but alone, does not seek or cause change. It must be accompanied by significant cause to do so and be completely more "appropriate" tomorrow than it was yesterday or today.

Therefore, unless I am unaware of any relevant information, which could be the case, I remain unconvinced that the effort or expense, which would subsequently result, would bring with it sufficient benefit and justification for a name change away from the one that appropriately suffices as at present.

In relation to the "Logo", I believe it to be a simplistic and well depicting emblem covering all that is aimed for and without complication.

As to the naming of the serving "Association" representing the communities involved, I leave my opinion open.

There exists a great terminology bearing thought, "If it ain't broke don't fix it".

Wednesday the 18th of August marks the 44th Anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan, which is now also commemorated as Vietnam Veterans Day.

On that day, D Company from 6RAR, comprising 108 Australian and New Zealand troops, with New Zealand artillery in support, an Australian Armoured Personnel Carrier force as a relief force and with the Royal Australian Air Force providing ammunition resupply, faced and defeated a North Vietnamese Regiment, and a Viet Cong battalion which were supported by a North Vietnamese battalion, inflicting approximately 2,500 casualties for the loss of 18 men.

Quite an amazing achievement in anyone's eyes, except the Australian Government of the day. As stated by one of the officers involved, "The Awards (medals) issued by the Australian Government were on the lower side of acceptable".

The unit involved received the US Presidential Unit Citation, which equates to the Medal of Honour, or our Victoria cross for an individual.

The Vietnam war was a very controversial one and unfortunately the soldiers, airmen and seamen, who were only serving their country, approximately half of them being conscripted, were targeted by many people.

I can not place myself in their shoes, for I was fortunate enough not to be shot at in my career, but the words of a fellow RAAF medic, who performed areo medical evacuations (dustoff's for the Veterans) in Vietnam, stick in my mind; "We were doing a hot refuel (refueling with the helicopter engine running, blades turning) we walk away a bit and light up a smoke. Looking back on it we were lucky we did not blow ourselves up, but we felt SAFE because no one was shooting at us".

This comment was made by a man who had been shot down twice in one day and continued to fly, doing his

The inaugural Sustainability Festival is being held over the weekend of



September 4 and 5 by the Break O'Day and Glamorgan-Spring Bay Council's.

Festival activities will include a Trade Fair, films, bus tours and more.

"In the lead up to the weekend Council and NRM North have also acquired two Home Energy Audit Toolkits or HEAT kits for community loan", said Mayor Robert Legge. "If you have ever wondered how much the fridge or a little red standby light is costing you and the climate, now you can find out."

"The HEAT kits include a meter for monitoring energy consumption though power points, an infrared surface-temperature meter and detailed information sheets, including tips on reducing energy consumption in the home", said James McKee, NRM North's Chief Executive Officer.

See Change Sustainability Festival activities are being held across the East Coast region. The Festival focus is on helping the community sort out and deal with the implications of climate change and the challenge it raises for living sustainably.

St Helens will host the Trade Fair on Saturday 4 September. Guided bus tours of houses designed for energy efficiency and sustainability and of veggie gardens will run from St Helens on the same day. The Trade Fair travels to Bicheno on the Sunday.

'In Transition', 'A Sea Change' and other films will be screened in St Marys on Saturday 4, at St Helens on Sunday 5 September and in Swansea on 18 and 19 September.

"There are a few more surprise activities to announce yet too", says Cynthia Maxwell-Smith, Festival Coordinator and Glamorgan-Spring Bay Council Sustainability Officer. The See Change Sustainability Festival is a joint initiative by Break O'Day and Glamorgan-Spring Bay Councils and supported by NRM North and NRM South.



"We had people from several other states and one bloke who's now living in Cambodia came along.


"There has been a lot of people through the place and some have gone on to bigger things."


The species planted were



Break O'Day Council Wish List for Looming Federal Election

As Mayor of Break O'Day Council I would like to advise that requests have been sent to both the Labour and Liberal Parties in an effort to secure financial assistance to undertake any or as many as possible of the following projects identified as important and extremely beneficial to the community and the Municipality.

- 1. Airport Upgrade identified two (2) projects:
- (a) Council is currently seeking funds to undertake a feasibility study to look at:
- The significant benefits to the emerging live seafood market and the local economy;
- The potential benefits for the aquaculture industry;
- The potential for people to fly from Melbourne for the Game Fishing experience;
- An upgraded facility to cater for the market from Sydney –Merrimbula- Flinders Island- St Helens Hobart service;
- The benefit to proposed and existing tourism developments and how it would greatly assist in establishing new markets.
- (b) Council is currently seeking funds to extend our airport by 70 metres and seal. The approximate cost to undertake this process is \$500,000.00. By sealing and extending our current airport, we will be able to cater for a larger plane which would have significant benefits to tourism along the East Coast of Tasmania.
- 2. Binalong Bay Road

Binalong Bay Road - Council has already begun reconstruction works on this road and has committed next financial years RTR allocation of \$453,000.00 to undertake works on the remaining section past Moulting Bay towards Binalong Bay, the bike way will finish at Moulting Bay and to complete this right to Binalong Bay a cost estimate of \$2.5 million applies.

3. Ansons Bay Road – construct and seal Ansons Bay Road - (St Helens to Ansons Bay) construct and seal approx cost \$8 million (North Ansons Road towards Gladstone approx \$6 million).

4. St Marys Pass – Alternative Route – Semmens Road upgrade

Semmens Road is not a Council owned road but is an alternative route used when St Marys Pass is closed due to rock falls (which are becoming quite frequent) or remedial works need to be carried out. Semmens Road is owned and maintained by Forestry Tasmania. Forestry Tasmania have offered the road to Council but unfortunately Council does not have the funds to bring it up to a safe compliant standard. An estimate costing of the project to the stage as mentioned would be approximately \$2M which does not necessarily mean sealing same.

5. Broadband

Council is seeking support for access to the broadband service to be available in all townships within the municipality. A considerable number of people live in townships such as Ansons Bay, Binalong Bay, Beaumaris, Scamander, Falmouth, Four Mile Creek, St Mary's, Fingal, Pyengana, Weldborough, Derby, Mathinna, etc.

Increasingly residents are setting up tourist and other business activities in these communities, for which broadband access is important. In addition resident students in these townships need access to broadband to fulfil their educational programs

Council sees universal broadband access as an important policy component of our Municipality to support sustainable communities.

The projects identified above would be extremely costly to the ratepayers of the Municiaplity if Council was to attempt undertaking any of these without further financial assistance from other tiers of Government.





Local Candidates Urged to Support Coastal Policies

Federal election candidates in coastal electorates are being urged to support a 10-point policy plan aimed at achieving a sustainable future for coastal Australia.



Mayor Robert Legge said local residents would carefully consider how candidates responded to the request when deciding how to vote on Election Day.

"Coastal Councils and their communities are attempting to deal with a complex range of pressures," Mayor Legge said.
"Not only are they trying to deal with rapid growth without adequate resources, they are also the communities most vulnerable to the impact of climate change plus they are at the forefront of Australia's ageing population."

Mayor Legge said these pressures can only be addressed by Federal, State and Local Governments working together to ensure the environmental, social and economic sustainability of coastal Australia.

"86% of all Australians live along the coast yet the major challenges facing the nation's coastal communities have not been properly addressed," Mayor Legge said. "It is time these pressures were taken seriously."

Mayor Legge said the 10-Point Plan for Coastal Australia, developed by the National Sea Change Taskforce, sets out policy initiatives designed to deal with the major pressures facing coastal communities. These include:

A call to adopt the recommendations of the Parliamentary Coastal Inquiry, which was released in October 2009.

A new funding formula to enable coastal Councils to respond to the social and economic needs of rapidly-growing coastal communities.

Collection of accurate data by the Australian Bureau of Statistics on the impact of tourists and other non-residents in coastal areas. This data is not currently taken into account in allocating resources for coastal communities.

Mayor Legge said more than half the 31 Federal electorates currently held with a margin of less than 3% are coastal seats. "There is no doubt the results in these coastal seats will be a key factor in deciding the outcome of the election," Mayor Legge said.

REPORTS that Labor Lyons MP Dick Adams told a gathering in his electorate that the Gillard Government was not interested in "welfare for farmers" have angered the rural community, Liberal Candidate for Lyons, Eric Hutchinson, said today.

Mr Hutchinson called on Mr Adams to clarify whether he made the comment to farmers at Bothwell last week in answer to a question on drought assistance and, if so, what he meant.

"On the face of it, this remark demonstrates the Labor Government's arrogant contempt for the rural community," he said.

"We have in this country a part-time agriculture minister, Tony Burke, who not only knows very little about the challenges facing our primary producers, he does not care much either.

"Now it appears this attitude is rubbing off on Labor backbenchers, including perennial backbencher Dick Adams.

"Mr Adams and Mr Burke need to understand that farmers feed and clothe us, and in times of extreme weather conditions it is not unreasonable that they ask for help.

"Farmers can't control the weather, but the Government can control the support they give to our farmers when times are tough."



REAL ACTION TO PROTECT EAST COAST TASMANIAN FISHING COMMUNITIES

The election of a Coalition Government will ensure the local commercial fishing industry and recreational fishers get a better say in the planning for any future marine parks.

The Coalition has released its Marine Parks Policy which will bring back the balance to the Marine Bioregional Planning process so poorly implemented by the Labor Government.



Greens must explain their plan to lock up Tasmanian farmland

The future of many Lyons farmers is at threat from extremist and fringe Greens who are refusing to detail their policy to stop all native forest logging.

"It is about time the Greens were accountable to Tasmania's farmers about their plan to lock up private farmland," Liberal Candidate for Lyons Eric Hutchison said.

On 14 June 2010 Greens Leader Bob Brown said "its time to end Australian native forest logging" and then launched a national television advertisement as part of the Greens' anti-native forest logging campaign.

"More than 26 per cent of Tasmania's forest area is privately-owned native forest amounting to 885,000 hectares. Most of this is on private farmland," said Mr Hutchison.

"Under Bob Brown's policy of 'no native forest logging' these farmers will have all or part of their farms locked up.

"Bob Brown and the Greens must explain why they are going to take away the rights of Tasmania's hard-working farmers.

"The Greens must be accountable for their economically reckless, anti-farmer policies.

"The Greens will say anything to further their push for inner city votes, but completely destroy the hopes of Tasmanian farmers who only ask for a fair go."

Mr Hutchison also called upon Labor to explain whether or not they have done a deal with the Lyons Greens to swap preferences.

"If a deal has been done – as it has been done throughout Australia – then it proves once again that Labor, like the Greens, do not care about the forestry industry.

"If the Greens get the balance of power in the Senate on the back of Labor preferences they will be furiously demanding the lock-up of Tasmanian farmland."
