Presentation of Wheelchair to Lawrence

In 2007, local man Lawrence Gilbert was injured in a car accident, resulting with the diagnosis of C5 quadriplegia.

After his release from hospital, Lawrence was moved to a unit in St Helens, where he is cared for 24 hours a day by several carers.

Anne Huett, one of his carers (also a Lions member) saw the short comings of the wheelchair already supplied to Lawrence, and after discussions with his mother Wendy in 2009, a committee was formed to raise funds for a 4WD wheelchair capable of driving over grass and rough terrain. Thus the 'Wheels of Change' was born.

After much hard work and fundraising, the committee raised a total of \$11,000 in just over a year.


The St Marys and St Helens Lions Clubs combined together to approach the Tasmanian

Lions Foundation for a grant of \$5,000 and the Australian Lions Foundation for an additional grant of \$7,500.

Medi-Repair Services from Launceston came to St Marys with a trial chair and after a few alterations specifically to suit Lawrence's needs, the wheelchair was ordered.

Finally, the wheelchair, costing \$21,569.50 was ready and the Official hand-over happened on the 12th August, 2010.

Lions Zone Chairman Merve Chilcott, members from both St Marys and St Helens Clubs plus Lawrence's friends and family were on hand to see the culmination of all the hard work and dedication put in to provide this wonderful piece of machinery.

This specialised wheelchair has provided Lawrence with the ability to get around with confidence without the fear of becoming bogged down in grass or rough going, and has given him better mobility and improved quality of life.

A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas "The Van Diemens Land Gallows"

In Tasmania today we are seeing more and more public outcries against lenient sentences given to people committing serious crimes. In the Ninetieth Century, however, the outcry was quite the opposite when a campaign was launched against capital punishment for crimes other than murder.

At the time of European settlement in Van Diemens Land in 1803, over 200 offences were punishable by hanging in English law. Indeed, a person could be sentenced to death for stealing as little as a handkerchief, cutting down a tree, or even associating with gipsies. About that time it was reputed a seven year old girl was hung in England, and foreign visitors to the country were shocked at the amount of decaying bodies left hanging from giblets wherever they went.

Van Diemens Land law was a follow-on from English law, but in the early years of the settlement there was no court of law in place and serious offenders had to be sent to the Magistrate in Sydney. There they would be sentenced and, in most cases, their punishment carried out in New South Wales.

The first public execution in Van Diemens Land happened at Port Dalrymple (George Town) in early 1806. The unfortunate man was a soldier by the name of Thomas England who, along with fellow

soldier James Keating, had been caught stealing food from the Government stores. They were sent to Sydney for sentencing, then sent back to Van Diemens land for public execution as a lessen to others. England was first to hang and Keating was taken to Hobart where he suffered the same fate a few weeks later.

The majority of public hangings in Van Diemens land took place under the regime of Lieutenant-Governor George Arthur who, after taking over in 1824, immediately established Van Diemens Land as a separate colony from New South Wales with its own court of law. In his period of Government there were some 260 public executions, 103 of which were in the two years 1826-1827. When you consider the total legal hangings in Tasmania were around 540, almost half occurred during Arthur's reign from 1824 to 1836.

Possibly the most controversial of Arthur's hangings was on the 25th February 1825. Two black men with the names of Musquito and Black Jack were hung alongside six white bushrangers at a public hanging that, it was said, almost the whole population of Hobart attended. A year later Jack and Dick, two more Aborigine men, were hung and the aboriginal attacks on settlers immediately escalated, leading to the Black War of the late 1820s and early 1830s.

It is interesting to note that whilst it was reported many black people were murdered by Colonists outside of the law, not one European was ever convicted in Van Diemens Land for the murder of an aborigine.

On the 18th September 1826 another mass public hanging took place at the old Hobart Goal in Macquarie Street. Eight men, all of whom were convicted of stealing, were made an example of by Arthur. Of the eight, the man who created the most interest was a Scottish gentleman named George Farquharson, who was convicted of stealing 400 sheep valued at £200. Farquharson left a wife and four children, the last born after his arrest.


1830 saw the execution of Mary McLauchlan, the first of only two women to be hung in Tasmania. Mary, who had been separated by transportation from her Scottish husband and children, was convicted of murdering her newborn baby and throwing it down the toilet at the Cascade Female factory.

Once Arthur left Van Diemens Land in 1836, death sentences were given less frequently; although if we look at the whole of Australia in the Ninetieth Century the average hangings per year were around eighty. By 1855, however, public hangings were abolished and executions were then only carried out in the confines of goals with selected witnesses.

The last person to be hung in Tasmanian was in 1946. He was Frederick Thompson, convicted of the murder and rape of an 8 year old girl. Two years later the death penalty was abolished in Tasmania. It took until 1985 before capital punishment was completely abolished in Australia, but the last legal execution was on the 3rd February 1967 at Melbourne's Pentridge Goal when Ronald Ryan was hung for the murder of a prison officer.

Since 1947 Morgan Research has conducted public opinion polls on capital punishment, with the results showing over 50% in favour of the death penalty in the 1990s. This was perhaps due to the Milat backpacker murders and the Bryant Port Arthur massacre.

The latest poll taken in 2009 was quite different, with 64% voting against capital punishment, which would indicate that, although we are concerned about lenient sentences, we are not prepared to go back to the Dark Ages of criminal punishment any time soon.

S Road maintenance underway 31 August 2010

Maintenance of the S Road, or Semmens Road, linking Upper Scamander and St Marys has started.

Forestry Tasmania expects the work to take up to four weeks to complete and has advised users to be aware of heavy machinery that will be on the route over the period.

Works co-ordinator for the Bass District, Conan Rossler, said the maintenance had been scheduled to coincide with optimal conditions for road works.

"Motorists will need to be particularly careful while the work is going on and for a period after until the road has settled gain."

Mr Rossler said the maintenance was being supervised by Ivan Semmens, whose father was mainly responsible for building the road 30 years ago and after whom it was named.

BROADBAND FOR SENIORS



The Commonwealth Government through the Department of Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs has selected NEC Australia Pty

Ltd and its consortium members Adult Learning Australia, the Australian Seniors Computer Clubs Association and the University of the Third Age Online to deliver the Broadband for Seniors initiative nationally.

The Australian Government has committed \$15 million over three years (2009 - 2010 - 2011) to provide free access to the computer, broadband and training to older Australians.

This initiative was created to increase the confidence and skills of older Australians in using computers and the internet. The aim is also to help build their community participation and social inclusion while addressing the issue of older Australians feeling isolated and "left behind" in today's technological age.

Research has shown that many older Australians are disadvantaged if they can't use computers and the internet. Over three years the initiative will create approximately 2,000 kiosks in community

centres across Australia, providing free training and access to online resources.




Neil Capill of St Marys tries out the new Broadband for Seniors computers at the St Marys Online Access Centre.





The Say Cagerattler

By chance the other day the subject of the St Marys Main Street Makeover plan came up again, and it was terrific to be talking to a person who has a lot to do with the original planning of that document and detailed layout. It has been a while since I've seen the plan.

One of the major components of the plan is the perennial sticking point of parallel or angle parking. As far as I'm concerned it's a no brainer as they say. My friend had produced some mock-up's of how our wide, bland and potentially unsafe Main Street could be transformed, but at the time it wasn't given even the time of day at some meetings. That I find is just narrow minded. I cannot believe it wasn't given a lot of consideration at the very least. The main advantages to the plan are very obvious.

- SAFETY: It slows down traffic and gives safe zones to people to cross the road. If done to full extent it would also allow for safe opening and alighting from cars without being in line of moving traffic.
- ASTHETICS: It gives the appearance that the main shopping precinct is a nice pleasant haven to do business and to
- OPPORTUNITY: It will give the various businesses chances to display their wares to a greater extent without impinging on walk space and could allow for natural shading in the years to come.

The main thing for me though is that it will allow for a much safer option in regard to parking. Anyone who believes that angle parking achieves a lot is deluding themselves. Any traffic engineer would tell you that one of the paramount needs for safety is that you minimise the time that oncoming or merging vehicles is out of field of view. Every single one of us know how disconcerting it is if you have to back out onto the street when you can't see because a 4WD, camper Van or delivery truck is on your left which is an ever increasing occurrence.

It's just not the western end of the Main Street that is included in the comprehensive design. The 5-6 business and public facilities east of the town bridge are to benefit too, if the plan was to be fully implemented. No one loses out. I think it's about time the Council revisits the whole thing and not just re-kerbing, footpaths and the like. There's much, much more to be gained for the whole community with the total plan properly instituted, I'm certain.

Perhaps it would be a real eye opener to all if the impression images and plan details were displayed for public perusal and comment in coming months. I'd suggest the overwhelming majority of us locals would like what we see. It's our Main Street so it should be us that has the say in how we want it in coming decades.

We are very quickly gaining a wonderful name all over the place due to our unique and excellent short stay camping at the Recreation Ground and I for one have no doubt that a fully implemented Main Street Makeover will further enhance this priceless reputation. To the opponents: Just get your heads out of the sand so we don't one day have tumbleweeds blowing down the street, rather than visitors.







EC & FV Auskick Presentation Day

We will reschedule a working bee as soon as possible.


All the membership invoices have been forwarded on by now. Please do your best to return the form so that we can accurately comply with the database regulations quite soon. That would be great.




