Greater Esk Tourism Proposes a new Break O'Day National Park

As an outcome of The Tasmanian Forests Intergovernmental Agreement between the Commonwealth of Australia and the State of Tasmania, signed on 7 August 2011, 430,000 hectares of native forests were placed into Informal Reserves. Greater Esk Tourism Inc. has responded with a proposal to create a single National Park by combining the new Informal Reserves with the existing State Reserves that surround St Marys.

The name of the proposed National Park was derived from the Break O'Day River, its catchment and headwaters which constitute at least half of the area of the combined Park which forms a horseshoe shape of the western and southern slopes of the mountains around St Marys.


The proposed Break O' Day National Park covers around 11,664 hectares of public land, including seven existing reserves under the Nature Conservation Act and the Forestry Act. This area contains outstanding biodiversity values and landscapes and is home to a wide range of environmental variation from near-coastal to elevated peaks.

The proposal, which has been submitted to the State and Federal Governments and to the Verification Group led by Professor Jonathan West comprises of three general principles:

- 1. That the Informal Reserves surrounding the town of St Marys, together with existing state and forestry reserves, be permanently protected with the status of a National Park and that this park be called the Break O'Day National Park;
- 2. That the Break O'Day National Park be administered by a Conservation Management Trust (CMT). This would be an incorporated not-for-profit body comprising of community representatives drawn from conservation groups in the area, a Parks and Wildlife Services representative and local business people. The Conservation Management Trust would oversee the management plan and propose regulations relating to the overall management of the Park. The CMT would administer a bank account, budget, hire staff and manage visitors and volunteers. Through this mechanism the local community would be directly involved in the management of the park and the promotion of the area.
- 3 That the initial establishment costs for the Break O'Day National Park be assessed and identified through a process of working in conjunction with the Commonwealth Government's Regional Development Australia. This is a place-based project and comes under Regional Development Australia's plans for economic diversification.

St Davids

In the Eighteenth Century, when our early European settlers arrived in Van Diemens land, religion was a very important part of most people's lives, particularly the aristocracy. Given this fact, it was no surprise that one of the most important community building to be erected in a town was the church.

The first church services to be recorded in Hobart Town were conducted by the Reverend Robert Knopwood, a Church of England minister, who arrived with Lieutenant-Governor David Collins in 1804. They were open air services, held just a short distance from the water's edge on a piece of land adjacent to what we now know as Salamanca. In 1810 Collins died and was buried on the spot commonly used by Knopwood for his services and the land became known as St Davids Park.

Reverend Knopwood, however, was continually lobbying the Government for a more appropriate place of worship and after the death of Collins a temporary timber church was built over his grave. The word temporary was certainly the case, because only months after its construction it was blown over in a southerly gale.

The Reverend was out in the open again, but his continued lobbying saw Lieutenant-Governor Thomas Davey in 1813 gain approval from Governor Lachlan Macquarie, of the New South Wales Government, to build a second St Davids Church in Hobart. But with a Military Barracks and Colonial Hospital taking precedence, it wasn't until February 1817 that the foundation stone for the new church was laid. But not in St Davids Park, rather on the corner of Murray and Macquarie Streets.

The building of the new church was not all beer and skittles, indeed, it wasn't until January 1823 that the new St Davids church was consecrated by the Reverend Samuel Marsden, Senior Chaplin of New South Wales, who visited Hobart under the Commission of the Archbishop of Canterbury. The same year Reverend Knopwood, who had been Hobart Town Chaplin since 1804 and had put all the work into securing the new church, was succeeded by the Reverend William

The second St Davids was never without its problems, it seems. In 1835 the steeple was declared unsafe and taken down. It was replaced the following year by another tower known colloquially by the locals as the Pepper Pot.

On the 21st August 1842, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Queen Victoria, Reverend Francis Nixon was appointed the first Bishop of Van Diemens Land. In the same year Hobart was declared a city and St Davids Church became St Davids Cathedral.

In 1862 more land on the corner of Murray and Macquarie Streets was granted to the Diocese by the Crown and George Bodley, a leading exponent of Gothic Revival in ecclesiastical architecture in England, was appointed to design a third St Davids Church.

Bodley never visited Hobart to view the site but his design was approved and the foundation stone for the current St Davids Church was laid on the 8th January 1868 by Prince Albert the Duke of Edinburgh. On the 3rd of February 1874 a procession took place over the short distance from the old church to the new one. The procession was followed by the consecration of the new church by the second Bishop of Tasmania the Right Reverend Charles Bromby. By September 1874 the old St Davids Cathedral was pulled down.

1892 saw the celebration of the 250th anniversary of the discovery of Van Diemens Land by Abel Tasman and the foundation stone for a new Cathedral tower on St Davids was laid. Work did not commence on the tower, however, until 1929 when an anonymous donation of seven thousand pounds was received. Seven years later in October 1936 the last brick in the tower was laid. After 68 years the original plans drawn up by George Bodley were finally complete.

Today St Davids Cathedral stands as a proud icon in the centre of Hobart and within its grounds is the centre of administration for Anglicanism throughout the State.

From the archives: a letter to the Editor dated- 23/12/1887

Fishing in the Scamander River

Sir, Will you kindly insert this grievance of mine, which is as follows:-

For many years I have been in the habit of netting in the salt water at the Scamander River, and catching a few fish, that have helped me to eke out a scanty livelihood. Now suddenly an act is passed to prevent anyone from using nets at that place.

I do not call it a river, as it is merely an arm of the sea where I and my mates wish to fish.

Now, as in my opinion, all the fish that can be caught there in nets would make no perceptible difference in the quality of bream, as they come in from the sea in countless thousands. I consider it a hard case that poor men should be deprived of a living for the sake of a few rich people who come at intervals to fish with a rod and line.







Local writer wins awards

There are many interesting people living in and around the St Mays area. Falmouth author, Amanda Lohrey is one of them. On the 6th September Amanda won two prizes in the Queensland Premier's Awards for her latest book, *Reading Madam Bovary*.

With this book Amanda won the best fiction award and with the same book she also won the Steel Rudd Award for best short stories. In the history of the Queensland Premier's Awards no author has ever won two prizes with the same book. This was a remarkable outcome and what made it more so was only three other Australian authors have every won a major literary prize in Australia for a book of short stories. These were David Malouf, Helen Garner and Tim Winton.

There were two separate panels and a total of eight judges for these awards and the judges' final decision was unanimous in both cases. For the award for best fiction the judges said: "Amanda Lohrey's Reading Madame Bovary is a refined and beautifully crafted work. This collection of stories – the 'best of Lohrey' from the last 15 years – is highly literary and technically brilliant, and also enjoyably readable. At times subtly experimental, but always wise and astute, these stories explore the dilemmas of modern life with sensitivity and passion. This book exemplifies the rich texture of Australian literature and the sophistication of literary talent".

For the short story Award the judges said: "Amanda Lohrey's Reading Madame Bovary confirms the author's ongoing importance as a writer who seeks to understand ethical conflicts and the world of action alongside questions about faith and shared spiritual belonging. The author finds her characters at the brink of small disasters and prods them to unlock the mystery at the heart of the mundane. "Fluctuat nec meritur", one of her protagonists says, "we are tossed by the waves but we do not sink". The collection is marked by interiority, intelligence and the relaxed assurance of a master at work".

Obituary:

On Friday 26th August 2011 Geoffrey Field Dean died of complications arising from an operation. He was 82. Geoff, who will be remembered by many residents of St Marys, suffered from the lifelong addiction of writing and was writing short stories right up until the time he went into hospital for the operation.

In 1968 Geoff and wife Liz and a small group of enthusiasts began the Valley Voice. In those days the Valley Voice was typed up and run off on a hand operated Gestetner machine.

In the 1960s Geoff and Liz farmed the family property, Seaview at Germantown. They began the Valley Voice because both of them thought the community should have a public voice and both of them were interested in writing. Liz died of cancer in 2003. Geoff went on to be a successful short story writer and in 2007 won three national short story awards. He also had some of his work made into a television drama by the ABC.

Geoff was an adventurer who worked at more than fifty different kinds of jobs in his youth. He loved a good joke and had a strong sense of the ridiculous. Here are some comments he placed on his Blog: "You can't be taught to write: its only something you can learn." "A vivid imagination is the cheapest mode of travel." "Look, you have to believe me. I tell lies — about everything — and that's the truth."

We will miss him.

St. Marys Gallery to host Material Girl Exhibition

There are not many opportunities for Tasmanian contemporary female artists to celebrate and promote their work. In recognition of this, Tasmanian Regional Arts offers a major art award and exhibition each year called *Material Girl*. Originally all entries were required to be textile works. However, the criteria are now more relaxed and include art work in any medium.

The theme for 2011 – 'Women Behind the Wheel' - offered much scope for the imagination. The entries reflected this, with works ranging from paintings to sculpture, handmade books to digital art, printmaking to ceramics, and several textile pieces. Of the many entries received, 60 were juried as finalists.

The prizes on offer were substantial, with the major award for Overall Excellence being for \$1,500 (sponsored by Rio Tinto Alcan). There was also a Premier's Choice Award (\$750); two Zonta Awards (each worth \$500), and a People's Choice Award (\$250). The awards announcement and launch were held on Friday 18 March at 6pm at the Burnie Coastal Gallery.


From April, a selection of work by finalists and winners began touring the state. This means that rural as well as urban centres have a chance to host and enjoy the art works on show.

In September/October, St. Marys will be the venue for the 'Women Behind the Wheel' touring exhibition. Break O'Day Regional Arts and *Gone Rustic* Studio and Gallery will host this inspiring and varied selection of art works so that they are accessible to the local community.

Gone Rustic specializes in exhibitions and sales of textile arts, from quilts to mixed media, including quality handmade cards and gifts, in traditional and contemporary styles. Local pieces, including art works by Rita Summers, are also on display and available for sale, as well as collectibles.

The exhibits in the 'Women Behind the Wheel' touring exhibition are for sale also, but must remain on tour until its completion in November. Entry to the exhibition is free.

Since the world's oceans have no boundaries, wind & wave patterns lead to the development of **Gyres/garbage patches**. Our garbage can end up a long way from Australia.






