"A Little Bit of Heritage"

During 2012, with the backing of the St Patricks Head & Esk Valley Historical Society Inc, I plan to put the best of my "A Little Bit of Heritage" column, which has appeared in the Valley Voice since 2004, into a book. The purpose of this is not only to be able to look back over the column, but to encourage people outside of Valley Voice readers to read and learn some of the history of this wonderful little part of Tasmania in which we live. The Historical Society feels it is also beneficial to have this collection put together in a professionally bound book that will carry on as a record for future generations.

The history of the Fingal Valley and East Coast has been covered extremely well over the years by a number of historians. Publications like those by Tim McManus, Lindy Scripps, Gary Richardson, Darlene Wright, David Masters and research by the late David Clement have all provided valuable information on our past. However, I feel, "A Little Bit of Heritage" will be somewhat different in as much as it will be a collection of articles covering a wide range of our history in one book.

Seven years of my column in Valley Voice makes up quite a large book, but it is only a fraction of what we have seen in our local paper in its 43 year history. To look back over that history

and see the many snippets of history recorded and by whom they were written is amazing.

One regular contributor to the Valley Voice, from the paper's inception in 1968 until her passing away in 2004, was Mrs Una Camplin of Cornwall. The following is an example of her writings which tells of the building of the second Anglican Church at Cornwall:

"Although the foundations of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Cornwall, were dedicated by Assistant Bishop Barrat on April 12th 1956, it was not until the 12th March, 1960, that the completed church (by then free of debt) was finally consecrated by Bishop Cranswick.

The driving force towards the building of the church was Rev. C. Titley, but it was not completed until the time of the Rev. A Broadfield.

From the beginning the people of Cornwall were behind the building of the new church; this was proven by the many who gave their time and money. We recall such people as Ern Aulich, Wally Haas, Walter Haas, Bill Haas, Ron Camplin and Max Targett who were the main work force. Then there were the electricians and painters and of course Cornwall Coal Company, who donated the iron for the roof. The Altar was donated by the Legge family along with The Reverend Broadfield, who by then had moved to Ulverstone. The Cornwall Mother's Union helped to pay for the carpet.

Inside the Church we are blessed with clean blue walls, while outside the walls are a clean pristine white. Also inside we see altar rails, lectern, prayer desk, pulpit and timber in the vestry all moved from the church at Gray when it was sold a few years back.

Today when many of us attend our services we think back to the day of consecration and we hear the solemn knock given by the Bishop with his staff and we again hear his inspirational sermon based on the text, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life". The little church was packed on that day and the singing of the congregation could be heard all over Cornwall."

Una loved her little church and it was a sad day in the 1980s when the powers to be decided it was no longer viable to maintain. It was sold, dismantled and, I believe, is now part of a house at Scamander.

The Anglican Church and the Salvation Army Hall at Cornwall, like many community structures of our past, are only memories

to just a few now. But thanks to publications such as those mentioned above and local papers like our Valley Voice, along with the people who have taken the time to put pen to paper, the significant role these buildings played in the lives of our ancestors is recorded and will always remain a fundamental part of our heritage.

In support of Todd Dudley's letter 17.11.11, I add that the Fed. Govt. States, "weeds are a huge growing disaster for Australia's economy."

Most people know how difficult it is to keep their garden weed free, if you have noxious weeds present or on your verge, then we should take responsibility and safely remove them.

Council began some years ago to take action, I recall Cllr Jackie Pike assisting me by ridding B.B. of Pampas Grass. Later on when our Landcare Group successfully stopped the progress of Spanish Heath on the Gardens Rd up to Sloop Lagoon, we sought the help of council, who at the time thought us and not the weeds a nuisance. Eventually an East Coast Weed Strategy was formed by DPIWE & Councils... But today the problem seems worse than ever.

One problem is there are not enough young fit people around to do the work.

Most weeds come out of resident's gardens, and until council make home owners aware and employ someone as Todd Dudley suggests, then weeds will completely take over.

Why not employ Todd if he is willing? Only recently I brought to his attention that in Bin. Bay pittosporum is an epidemic.

While plant shops and the Forestry nursery are allowed to sell plants that are problem weeds it will be an uphill battle.

Dear residents,

Following on from my letter in the last edition of the VV I have since had a meeting with Stephen Mulcahy, Sean Barry and Owen Firth from the Commonwealth Bank. At this meeting on the 8th December I presented them with the community's petition and outlined the concerns raised to me. Although the bank reps were very clear on saying to me that the new opening houers weren't negotiable they have consolidated their response with the following points.

- The new opening hours of 10.30 2.30 will mean that the bank is no longer closed over the lunch break.
- The opening hours needs to be consistent with other rural branches in the same situation. (for consistency of service state wide)
- Staff will be given opportunities at St Helens as they arise and in other branches.
- Recently the bank employed two (2) young women (recent students of SMDHS) on a casual basis who will service branches on the east coast as well as Campbell Town and Scottsdale.
- The bank will be constantly reviewing and monitoring branch activity through their usual business activity and ATM use.
- The bank will be conducting an information session for residents on the services available to them online.
 This will be done before the introduction of the new opening hours.

Although it is disappointing that the bank has made this decision without consulting their customers it is still encouraging to know that the branch itself is secure and not at risk of closure. The three reps said that they will be available to answer questions from concerned residents at the information session which I am sure they will be advertising early in the new year.



St Patrick's Head & Esk Valley Historical Society Inc Walks Re-Invented

On Sunday the 20th of Nov the society, with the assistance of Henry Biggelaar as leader, held a walk to the old mine site of the once very prominent 'Jubilee Coal Mine.

There were only 10 people turned out, but this proved to be quite good as the track, which has been recently re-cleared by some very capable blokes, is not conducive to too many at the one time. The group travelled by car to Lovers Bridge which is just before the old screens site, where President Barry Aulich explained how the mine once worked and how it was discovered, then the group set off, and returned around 1.30 pm when lunch was enjoyed, and some more old photo's were perused.

The Jubilee coal mine was discovered by Mr John Brooks, in the Jubilee year- hence it's name. It was in the Mount Nicholas Range under the South Sister, and was accessed from the St Mary's/Germantown road. In the early times coal was carted by horse and cart by a Mr R Hill, and in 1921 an aerial ropeway was purchased from Sydney at a cost of 10,000 pounds, which would have been a massive amount in those times.

The ropeway, which passed through "Balaclava" and "Rosegarland", to the Jubilee rail siding, (now the wood yard west of St Mary's) carried 70 tons per day, 350 tons per week. It had it's moments; in 1929 one of the trestle supports crashed and put it out of action for a short while.

In 1908 the company operating the mine looked at taking the coal to the once very primitive seaport at Falmouth and shipping it out of there, and also in 1927 it was envisaged to extend the rail line from the Jubilee rail siding at St Mary's to where the screens were built near Lovers Bridge. The grade was ok and the first price quoted was around 10 or 11 thousand pounds, and by the time it looked like it might come to fruition it had blown out to twentyone thousand pounds, and was deemed as not reasonable. Hence, after the ropeway was done away with the coal was transported by "White" Trucks to the rail siding at St Mary's.


The Jubilee Coal mine was never a huge operation; at it's peak it employed about 50 blokes, and I believe that there are about 8 of those still living today, one being Don Smith of St Mary's who is a wealth of knowledge regarding the mine.

Over the times from its start till it closed in 1960, it had a lot of ups and downs like cave-ins and strikes. One strike was caused because the mine manager wheeled a skip of coal.

At one time one and three quarter days were lost, this equated to 12 shillings per man, (about a dollar twenty in today's currency) but in those days money did have a bit of value. Cave-ins were common because of the massive weight of the South Sister sitting immediately above the tunnel.

The mine had several managers over the time, an open-cut mine was established to the west of the original mine and lower down the hill, but this didn't last very long, and like a lot of mine sites it has become a grave yard of relics. But thanks to the enthusiasm of a few locals it has a track so that those fit enough can have a look at what remains, and one can only envisage the work and toil that was put into such an operation.





So this is Christmas

My mother was a wellspring of stories of Christmas, by contrast, my father was a desert, he didn't tell of Christmas. Therefore the following is written using rare snippets of information he gave me and from war records...

"I hate cows", 9 year old James (Jim) Mitchell scowled as the last cow left the milking shed for the evening.

"I like cows", his 10 year old brother, Sydney confided, "it's the milking I hate".

"Milking is easy compared to potato hauling", older brother Sandy informed them. "Syd, you'll have to do it come Christmas Eve when people in St Marys want to buy our potatoes for Christmas dinner." He warned, "All us boys started the potato haul when we were 10."

Why potatoes were grown on a plot of land at Dublin Town and not on the family farm, Daisy Dale, none of the 14 Mitchell children knew. There was ample space on the farm so it could only have been "tradition".

Early on Christmas Eve all able bodied Mitchell males, 10 years old and over, walked for ¾ of an hour up steep hills to Dublin Town. There they dug and bagged potatoes and hauled the sacks on their backs and walked the long weary walk to St Marys. Once all were sold, the exhausted family trudged the hour long walk home.

It was then milking the cows by lantern light, falling into bed and waking up Christmas morning.

"What is Christmas really?" Syd often wondered. It must be more than relatives coming for midday meal, having extra cream on dessert and having to do a little less work than normal.

Instead of being daunted by the quickly approaching "potato haul", Syd was excited. He had two very good reasons to be elated; firstly he would get to go to St Marys for the very first time in his life and secondly he would have a whole orange all to himself. That was tradition—every Christmas the potato haulers were given an orange each. Envious sisters and younger brothers only got to share one orange between them all.

Sydney glanced at James. He had already decided to give Jim half of his orange on Christmas morning, after all he and James always shared everything. He was sure there had never been two brothers who loved and understood each other as they did.

Upon tasting his very own orange, Syd decided that as long as he lived he wanted an orange for Christmas. "So this is what Christmas is", he decided, as the delectable juice ran down his chin...

The years passed. Each Christmas was similar - no presents, no acknowledgment of the birth of Jesus Christ, but there was tradition. Every Christmas night, everyone had a cup of tea and Grandma Walters told people what their future held. She wasn't taken seriously, it was simply family entertainment!

On Christmas Night, 1914, sixteen year old James and 17 year old Sydney wished they didn't have to endure this annual ritual, but it was inevitable.

The family was discussing the war in Europe when Grandma interrupted with, "Hand me your teacup, Sydney." People always instantly obeyed her. She stared intently at the tea leaves. Syd smirked as he waited to hear the trivia, but she turned to Jim, "James, hand me your teacup", she ordered solemnly.

Grandma's face became increasingly grave as she gazed into the cup. No-one had seen her look that way. They held their breath. "Sydie and Jimmy, you will never go more that a mile away from a cow turd," she pronounced. Everyone sighed with relief and some started laughing, but the old lady held up her hand for silence. "If you do, disaster awaits you!" She abruptly arose and silently retired to bed. What a strange end to this Christmas day, everyone thought.

When the two brothers were alone Syd said, "We can prove Grandma wrong. We can go more than a mile away from a cow turd if we want to." "Not until we're of legal age," Jim reminded him. "I'll be 18 in July", Syd replied. "Yes, but I won't be, you wouldn't go without me would you?" Jim asked anxiously. "Never", the loyal brother promised.

And so it came to pass...

On the 3rd August, 1915, James Mitchell became No.4343 and Sydney Mitchell became No. 4344.

The recruitment officer noted that Syd stated he was 18 in July and his brother Jim stated he was 18 in February of the same year. The officer made a comment about never having heard of the birth of "twins" to take 5 months to happen, but the army needed men, no matter how stupid or naive they may be.

Christmas Day 1915 was drawing to a close but neither of the brothers had mentioned "Christmas" or "home". The silence united them more deeply than conversation ever could. They both knew the pain of homesickness.

At twilight, leaning on the ship's railing looking at the endless ocean, Syd broke the silence. "We've proven Grandma Walter's wrong." James nodded, "But wouldn't a cup of tea with her be nice right now?" "Especially if it was accompanied by an orange," Syd agreed. "That would be a perfect Christmas," he grinned. "This time last year who would have thought that we would be half way around the world tonight?' Jim reflected. "it will be good. After we've shot at a few Germans, we'll be free to do as we want - free - free from potatoes and cows," he added. "Free from milking too, we'll probably not even see a German. Remember the recruitment officer told us the war would most likely be over before we get there. Anyway, whatever we do or wherever we go we'll do it together, brother," Syd said, placing an affectionate arm around his brother's shoulders.

The two brothers disembarked at Suez on 11th February 1916. On the 29th March they were deployed to Alexandria. They knew they would be shooting at Germans and be shot at by Germans.

That tour of duty was brief. They disembarked at Marseilles, France on the 4th of April.

Then to Pozieres - hell on earth. To maintain their sanity, the brothers shared beautiful but distant memories of paradise - a place called "Daisy Dale". There in far away Tasmania, sacks of potatoes were as light as a feather, cows were the most lovable creatures on earth and milking was the most pleasurable experience imaginable. Life was so easy - so good, back in the long ago.

July 16th 1916 was Syd's 19th birthday. He didn't even know what date the day was, let alone remember it was his birthday.

Thoughts were only on staying alive - to kill or be killed, to see the dawn of another day - to somehow survive dodging enemy fire - praying the trench would not be bombarded with poisonous gas, or blown to smithereens by machine guns. Time, dates, day, night, meant nothing. All that mattered was that the two brothers remained inseparable in this hell hole.

But there was a date in that July that Sydney would never forget. That date, 25th July 1916. His world shattered. His heart broke. Eighteen year old James died in his arms.

Through the numbness of grief, the depression, the anger, the deep hatred of the enemy, Syd forced himself to fight and live.

Christmas Day1916 had Syd asking himself a lot of "What if's". Guilt now compounded his intense grief. Grandma Walters voice haunted his thoughts. He asked himself, "what if we had taken her advice?" "What if I had not insisted that we could prove Grandma wrong?"

He blamed himself entirely. If it were not for him, he and Jim would have remained on the family farm. Safe, walking the rolling green hills together. Safe, standing listening to the soothing sounds of the stream near the homestead. Safe, relaxing as the wind whispered "peace' in the willow trees.

If this nightmare he was currently experiencing was Christmas, he never wanted to know another.

On 27th February, Sydney was critically wounded in action - a bullet pierced the top of his heart. On 22nd March he was transferred from France to England to undergo intensive treatment. He spent 5 months in hospital.

On 22 August he was declared capable of rejoining the 12th Battalion in France. The unit was deployed to Belgium.

On 8th October of that same year he was again wounded in action. He was taken to a hospital in France. On 26th of November he was discharged to once more rejoin the unit in France.

Christmas 1917 was again spent on the battlefield! "So this is Christmas," he shuddered in dismay. Everywhere - death and destruction, grief and loss, torment and anguish of body, soul and spirit. No-one or nothing could escape the carnage. "Christmas is definitely not for me!" he declared. He vowed never to acknowledge Christmas ever again and not even look upon an orange lest it remind him of Christmas. There was no goodness left in the world, nor could it ever be restored. Hope was extinguished that Christmas.

Time passed. The war continued to rage. On the 19th June, he was hospitalised for an unidentified sickness. Syd was ill in body, soul and spirit. However, he was discharged on 27th August and he rejoined his comrades and his unit and continued fighting in France.

Christmas Day 1918 saw Sydney back in hospital - back in England. He looked at his bandaged foot and shook his head in disbelief and a touch of disgust, for this wasn't a "wounded in action" injury. He lay in his hospital bed recalling events...

It was late at night on the 4th of November and he was on leave in Paris. He hated being on leave without James, but 3 friends had persuaded him to join them for an outing at a cafe in Paris. As they sat at a table talking, a French civilian approached them proudly displaying a German automatic revolver. Of course they all wanted to handle a German gun that wasn't being held by a German.

Before handing the weapon to Syd's friend, Private Duval, the Frenchman removed the magazine, but the revolver discharged. Bullets ripped through the sleeve of a soldier's uniform. A dog whined in pain. Syd remembered saying calmly "I think I've been hit!". His friends removed his boot to reveal a pool of blood. After 5 days in a hospital in Paris, the injury was so bad he ended up back in England. He heard there had been a court of inquiry. The verdict was that all the men were sober and it was a freak accident. Sydney remained hospitalised by this misadventure for 9 months.

The war ended with him still in England. So it was time to go home. Travelling home the ship encountered a massive storm. Despair overcame the men. They believed they had survived all the horrors of war, just to die at sea when home and "peace" were within their grasp. But they all made it home. To Syd, that was back to "Daisy Dale". Syd married a local girl, Muriel. They had 4 sons and a daughter. Their first born was a boy. They named him James! He milked cows and grew potatoes at Daisy Dale. After enduring a divorce and successfully raising his children, he met and married Linda Newman.

Linda loved Christmas. It was the highlight of each year. Her enthusiasm and Christmas stories were infectious. Syd soon learnt and understood that Christmas was about celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace. He loved Christmas. He helped with all Christmas preparations, including selecting the Christmas tree, tying peppermint trees to the verandah posts of Daisy Dale homestead on Christmas Eve. He loved the giving and receiving of presents. When asked what he wanted for Christmas he always replied, "an orange please". Sydney Mitchell was healed, Sydney Mitchell was restored. His twinkling blue eyes and beaming smile testified he knew that Christmas was a time of Joy, Love, Peace and Hope.

It was family reunions each Christmas day he rejoiced in, his sons and daughters (yes I was daughter number 2) all being together having dinner in the large kitchen.

After dinner of Christmas 1967, he stood up and said, "This is our last Christmas together. I won't be here to see

another." His prediction was true, but that Christmas 1967, soaking up the serenity, he turned to his family and said, "Christmas is so good, so very good. Life is good, so very good. Everything has made it all worthwhile."

This is truly Christmas. Beverley Rubenach.



After morning tea we travelled to Low Head Lighthouse and the Pilot Station Museum. A volunteer provided an excellent guided tour of the whole grounds. We understand that the original homes are now fully renovated and are ready for visitors to hire. The original school is at present being updated.

In George town we visited the Bass and Flinders Centre. This was the highlight of the trip. On our arrival the curator of the Centre provided us with a talk on the history of the museum. The centre contains the replica of the Norfolk which was constructed by Bern Cuthbertson and his team of volunteers in Hobart. The hull is of huon pine and the mast and deck is made from celery top pine, "not a screw or a nail was used trunnels or tree nails hold the vessel together". The display also has replicas of a variety of sailing vessels dating from 1815 to 2007.

Lunch was provided by the centre and afterwards we were given a guided tour of the museum.

Should readers visit George town we highly recommend that you take the time to visit the Bass and Flinders Centre which is in Elizabeth Street.
