

We hope to see them all back next year and we already have a promise that Joe Porter, the Scottish bagpiper extraordinaire will make a return visit to entertain the troops.





FINGAL VALLEY MEALS ON WHEELS

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I would like to welcome you here today to our belated 2012 Annual Meeting. Thank you sincerely for your continued support and interest throughout the year.

At present we have provided approximately 2000 meals to our clients, not all have daily meals, with some, it is the cost. It seems over 2 weeks, it is a considerable amount out of their pensions, with other commitments such as power, water, medication, rates, insurances etc., coming in on a regular basis. With others, they go to eat with friends or groups and even prepare a meal for themselves.

At Scamander we have been supplying frozen meals to three clients. Unfortunately one lady passed away and another is in respite at Medea Park, leaving us with one gentleman to receive his meals.

Frozen meals are delivered to Fingal and Mathinna on Mondays. Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House organises the pick-up and Christine Scott from Mathinna delivers them to the Mathinna client, this arrangement has been very successful.

Meals are prepared in St Marys Community Health Centre's kitchen, so that our recipients receive the same meals as the hospital patients.

It is a pleasure to work with the Health Centre cooks, who cater for individual tastes and provide balanced nutritional meals to recipients with special dietary requirements. Clients report satisfaction with the food delivered.

Blackcurrant cordial is provided monthly as a vitamin C supplement.

Without out volunteers, this service would not be possible. Their time and cheerfulness is appreciated, the brief chats probably do as much for the clients as the meal itself. Many look forward to these visits.

The cook is very impressed with our reliable drivers, who make this service "Hassle free" for the Health Centre staff. Many of our volunteer drivers, having driven for many years, are all getting older. It would be great to get a few

recruits. Let us spread the word around in our community of our need for new drivers, maybe some newcomers would be willing to give a couple of hours to deliver meals if asked personally.

For National Meals on Wheels day in September, Christmas Day and Good Friday, meals with a difference are provided, with added treats to mark these special days. Recipients look forward to these special days.

Our Fingal Valley Group provide cards, calendars and cakes at Christmas, and at Easter, eggs and buns are provided for each recipient. The kitchen staff do also provide extras throughout the year. Recipients are very grateful for these treats.

Emergency drivers are available when needed.

Unfortunately, due to others commitments, we were unable to represent the Fingal Valley Meal on Wheels at the Northern Regional Meeting.

As President of this Group, I would like to thank our Secretary/Coordinator Lundy for her hard work, especially the driver's rosters. Drew, our Treasurer makes a tremendous effort to keep our finances up to date. Without them our MOWs would not function efficiently. Thanks also to Val Spencer, who filled in for Lundy in her absence, and for her willingness to do extra deliveries for absentee drivers, this shows what a great asset she is to our group.

Pens and note pads are given to all volunteers as a thank you gift during the year.

Congratulations to all members, keep up the good work in 2013.

We are looking forward to another busy year, a year that continues to run smoothly and keeps our valued clients feeling an important part of the community.

Letter to Valley Voice re Council.

Dear Editor.

Not being a person to air my grievances and opinions frequently via the media, I write this reluctantly but feel it is time to share my personal thoughts on a wider front.

I have lived in St Marys for over seventy years and for every one of those years have supported, promoted, served, defended, respected and shown pride in the town in which we live, but changes, in many ways, over a period of time, mostly by governance, service restriction and support have brought change also to my beliefs and ideals and I feel it time to express my personal feelings, be they right or wrong, to the public in general and maybe, just maybe, feel better within myself for the effort.

Each day I walk the streets to the newsagency and witness increasingly, the gradual decline in presentation and maintenance of the surrounds and amenities, parks and blocks that are growing wild, oh yes they do get cut sometime, but alas, the rakes and balers never turn up to finish the job, maybe the wheels have fallen off those too, and please don't answer this ordeal with, "it's that time of the year", because that is faced by every one in the private and commercial sector each year and is always handled with extra effort and good management, and oh, by the way, if there are insufficient staff and resources maybe we should not have witnessed the recent reduction to the degree we did.

I walk on footpaths and beside gutters that would not be tolerated in other towns within our municipality, nor, I admit, should be, and am further disappointed when I witness a private citizen on hands and knees in drizzling rain "weeding" the limited flower beds on the uncut nature strip, is it any wonder that my mind races to the recent observation of two utes and several workers tending the elaborate and abundant gardens within the street of another town, but I do not deny that this is how it should be everywhere.

Whilst serving on the previous governing council I objected to the proposed "amalgamation" for the very reason that "bigger is not always better", which is what I believe to be the case in many instrumentalities today, it sadly becomes "empire building", with too much time being taken with efforts to justify and protect positions, leaving not enough for the job at hand.

I both commend and appreciate those on Council who genuinely apply themselves and work for the betterment of the Municipality on the whole, and there are some, their efforts do not go un-noticed.

The ever increasing belief that the Municipality extends no further than "Parkside turnoff" is fast gaining momentum, a situation that should never be allowed to happen and I would urge attempts to prevent.

If I appear critical and cynical by this stance, then maybe it is because, I am, and feel justified in being so, and feeling better because it is "off my chest", giving me more time to think about where I move to next.

After reading the latest November News circular I am somewhat confused as to the direction of the Break O'Day Council

If we look at each individual line item it would seem that there has been little thought put into explaining to the community the reason for all 14 segments.

A full and comprehensive Coastal plan was developed by the Council some few years ago and all the documentation should be in the Council library. Why reinvent the wheel. I would suggest that the plan be located and utilized.

While the Council controls many public areas already throughout the Municipality that are sufficient for the community needs, why develop another plan.

I also wonder what happened to the work the planner was doing regards the St Helens surrounds and land use, there was a considerable amount of time spent on this issue. I can't see what a traffic management strategy will do in St Marys as the Community have made it quite clear what they want with parking, it is about time the Transport Dept. came and spoke to the community regarding their requirements in person.

I thought that the Council had entered into an agreement with Glamorgan Council regarding tourism; I am also under the impression that Northern Tasmanian Development has done a considerable amount of work on tourism so why again reinvent the wheel. Council has recently set up a tourism committee, how much more do we want.

Economic development has been thrashed to death over quite a few years, a clean and tidy town with good conveniences will entice people to stay and spend money in our communities.

The Civic Centre has been aired in Council over quite a few years; the Council has discussed this issue and found that the Council did not have enough funding of its own to proceed with this project.

There is only two major issues with the aerodrome that is seal or not seal the runway, lengthen or not lengthen the runway. There have been many enquiries into the operation of the airport and there has been numerous recommendations, these should be looked at again.

Land use has been an ongoing issue that Council has spent a lot of time on. The planner has been working on this for a few years and there has been numerous meetings involving Councillors and the general public. What has happened to all this work and where are all the reports that were done.

I would have thought that an East Coast marine strategy would be the state Government's job, not a small Council trying to do something well beyond its financial limitations.

The Council over many years has had a safety committee run by a Council officer. I believe this committee has achieved many things, why change what we already have.

The focus I believe should be to enhance what we already have, to improve existing infrastructure and keep the Municipality clean and safe for its community. The state of the grass is a disgrace, the towns are not at their best, this is the management that is required.

We are a small Rural Municipality not a city, we have different issues that others do not have. We have a small rate base and should not live beyond our means.

Council has not got the funds to carry out all of this program, in ten years time what is not done will be out of date and will have to be done again. Why not pick two items out of the list and finish these to a high standard.

I find it hard to believe why the present managerial staff cannot manage the Council affairs without spending thousands of dollars on consultants for every mortal thing that is done.

It has always been my concern that the Councillors are not used to their full capacity; there is a massive amount of local knowledge and expertise that the management must

Welcome Speech by David Watkins

Veteran's, ladies and gentlemen, boys and girls. On behalf of the St Marys Memorial Services Association I wish to welcome you to this Remembrance Day Service.

Australia's response to the declaration of war in Europe in 1914 was to raise the Australian Imperial force. It was a force of 20,000 men made up of battalions from all states.

The belief at this time was that the war would be over by Christmas, but this was not to be. Four German armies were advancing on Paris when the British expeditionary force managed to drive a gap between two of the German armies. The Germans who were out running their supplies retreated to high ground which they generally held until the end of the war. The scale of the loss of life on the western front was unprecedented.

Some attacking units were being wiped out by artillery and machine gun fire before even getting to their own front lines let alone that of their enemies.

Australia sustained 60,000 dead, the equivalent of five infantry divisions. I find it difficult to grasp how large that number is. If these men were able to be seen today as if marching with all their equipment to the front the column would extend from in front of us here at the Cenotaph all the way to the outskirts of Launceston. 125 kilometres away.

If they started marching past us at the end of the one minute's silence, the last man would not march past us until noon, tomorrow. For the young men of this town and surrounds that served in WW1, one in three did not return home. For those that joined at the outbreak of the war, only one out of three survived. For those that enlisted in WW2 one in five would not come back.

Compared to other conflicts in which Australians have served, thankfully our losses in Afghanistan have been light. I would ask you to give your thoughts also to those currently serving and their families on this day.

In recent days there has been announcements on a Royal Commission into the Catholic and other Churches revolving around misconduct and so on. I'm a non practising Catholic these days and notice that senior clergy are supporting the idea of this expensive investigation that could take many months.

My problem with not just the Catholic Church but many other denominations is a much more fundamental one and why I don't go to Mass as often as I once did.

When are these incredibly influential and important institutions going to join the 21st Century and leave so many uncompromising doctrines advocated in far distant times as part of history? I don't believe that in so many instances especially within Canon Law for example that people can operate all that easily within the confines of essentially old fashioned rules in a modern society. I believe, because of that, western countries like ours are finding it more and more difficult to attract young people into the seminaries or even maybe Convents to learn how to teach the word of God. Tasmania is a prime example and has had a shortage of priests for some years now as we on the East Coast know only too well.

There was a time about half a century ago when Vatican Council Two took place and here and there since then some fiddling with the edges, modernisations have happened which is good but...maybe it's time that His Holiness and the Cardinals looked at the whole world in a more holistic way and became even more flexible and encourage wider changes to Catholicism that can engage more people. Unfortunately some see our church as a bunch of well connected hierarchy in Rome with an unbending mindset and being surrounded with immense wealth and treasures. I'm not sure any of that is correct but perception can be very harmful to the cause. The church does wonderful things and is the fabric that has held so many civilizations together over the past couple of millenia since Our Lord left us to carry on His teachings but I'm afraid that the church equally, especially in the past few hundred years has been left behind in some important areas.

Priests and Brothers are the foot soldiers of the clergy and the massively vast majority of these men are incredible, compassionate, skilled and resourceful people that we'd be lost without, but unfortunately a small minority have breached the trust of our young people as we know. To some these acts then snowball to being seen as endemic in the priesthood which is certainly not true and a really sad and frustrating matter when trying to tell non Catholics that fact.

The senior clergy are now being accused of not taking all steps to deal with these acts, once again a difficult matter to comprehend and is hurting the church. I hope that this so called Royal Commission might be a catalyst for change in this country but one day I hope that the Church that I still love will take a much bigger, harder look at itself worldwide and decide to re-enter the 21st Century and other 'old time' denominations will do the same. WE NEED THEM.

Eliminate discrimination in an active way; and



89 FUZZY WUZZY ANGELS AWARDED MEDALS

SEVENTY YEAR ANNIVERSARY OF KOKODA WW2 CAMPAIGN

Thursday 1 November 2012

89 PNG 'Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels' have been officially recognised for their service to Australian soldiers during World War 2 by the Australian Government, to mark the 70 year anniversary of the Kokoda campaign (Kokoda Day, Saturday 3 November 2012).

"These Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels deserve the Commemorative Medallion which is a symbol of Australia's appreciation for the care, assistance and sacrificial service to Australian soldiers along the Kokoda track and other parts of PNG in 1942. They supported the sick and wounded and carried food and medical supplies amidst the harsh terrain while avoiding enemy fire from the Japanese. They acted above and beyond the call of duty.

"Many Australians, wounded and suffering terrible illnesses, owe their lives to these PNG nationals.

"Together with other Tasmanians I was fortunate enough to meet two Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels on the Kokoda Track in April 2008. Following my return, as a Senator I lobbied the Federal Government for their official recognition and was successful in moving a Senate motion calling on the Government to act.

"I am pleased to learn that 70 years later at least 89 of these Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels have received official recognition with another 23 applications still under consideration by the PNG Government Awards Committee. However, the Government estimated there were 1,200 Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels still living when it agreed to my call for recognition in 2009. It is better late than never. There were an estimated 50,000 thousand PNG nationals who supported Australian soldiers during WW2" he concluded.

The following Motion moved by Senator Barnett in the Senate on 24 June 2008 was supported by Labor, and the Government has now acted to recognise Papua New Guinea's Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels:

That the Senate—

- a- recognises the importance of the Kokoda Track campaign in World War II in stopping the overland Japanese advance to Port Moresby, which would have given the enemy a beachhead into Australia;
- b- acknowledges the courage, endurance, mateship and sacrifice demonstrated by the Australian Defence Force personnel during the Kokoda battles;
- c- pays tribute to the contribution of the Papua New Guinea (PNG) nationals, specifically the Koiari people, affectionately known as 'Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels', in carrying supplies and equipment for Australian soldiers in the Kokoda campaign as well as the carriage of wounded to safety;
- d- notes that the Kokoda battles were fought in PNG from July 1942 on Australian soil;
- e- and in recognition of this contribution, urges the Australian Government to:
 - (i) acknowledge the service of the PNG nationals affectionately known as Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels,
 - (ii) direct the new Defence Awards and Honours Tribunal to promptly determine the most appropriate form of medal or recognition for the remaining Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels or their surviving families,
 - (iii) consider any other appropriate initiatives including making a small ex-gratia payment to each Fuzzy Wuzzy Angel, in recognition of their contribution over and above the call of duty, and

(iv) examine and where appropriate fund initiatives to upgrade the health and education status of the PNG people in the isolated villages along the Kokoda Track.

Break O'Day, Dorset, Flinders, George Town and Northern Midlands Councils have agreed to form a Sub-Regional Alliance.

Four (4) Mayors from five (5) Northern Councils met today to sign the Sub-Regional Alliance Charter, Mayor Carol Cox was unable to attend the signing, the forming of a strategic alliance and partnership approach to benefit through economies of scale, increase the range and quality of services to our communities and to improve the recruitment and retention of staff by providing challenging opportunities to promote a system of continual improvement.

A Charter and an Implementation Plan has been prepared setting out the commitment of the participating Councils in the Alliance from 2012 – 2014.

The Sub-regional Alliance approach has been developed with the following objectives:

- To assist in the facilitation of Local Government reform by:
 - *Promoting and sharing better practice
 - *Improving viability
 - *Building continuous improvement
- To develop a co-operative approach for mutual benefit
- To achieve demonstrable efficiencies and reduce duplication
- To act and begin by facilitating small step improvements to gain momentum
- To promote and share good governance practices
- To promote and share innovation
- To develop the infrastructure to support this initiative
- To develop a framework to monitor performance
- To build mutual trust and understanding

The goals of the Sub-regional Alliance approach include:

- To develop consistent strategies to ensure good governance;
- To develop a project approach to continual improvement;
- To use practical tools for implementation of improved processes;

- To demonstrate tangible benefits of the sub-regional alliance;
- To increase community benefit through lobbying and advocacy;
- To build community owned renewable energy projects; and
- To consider opportunities to provide services outside of the region to generate revenue.







Sports & Social Club News:




