The Say Cagerattler

In the last edition of the Valley Voice, two separate letters appeared but along similar lines. Without knowing all the facts it's perhaps not good to be specific, but what I found interesting to say the least was that one of our residents and one of our most respected former Councillors had deep concerns on some of the very fundamental operations of our local government matters and needed to put pen to paper, such were these matters.

This I respectfully suggest needs to be handled sooner rather than later.

Some time back I raised the issue of nature strip mowing in this column, as to whose responsibility it really is. Landowners obviously don't own a blade of grass past their property boundary and people renting or leasing dwellings etc. certainly don't.

If the suggestions of one of those letters directly dealing with that is correct and Council isn't always mowing such strips of land, then what happens regarding liability in the event of injury, property damage and so on to a landowner taking it upon themselves to maintain the strip or to a passer by when the operation is taking place?

Most of us are only too aware of Duty of Care, approved work practices, manual handling, techniques, PPE equipment and so on. So, in such instances where does liability rest when public

property is maintained by people who have no ownership of that said property?

I can't for a minute think that property owners can take that risk, unless local government authorities have a method in place to protect the landowner. By the same token, no-one wants to see two foot high grass on their nature strips if council resources aren't sufficient to meet the needs of heavy growth times. Once again safety, access and fire hazards and not least snakes, enter the picture. This doesn't include aesthetic issues either.

I think what is of paramount importance on a local government level is that a lot of talking goes on to find common sense solutions when a problem exists and that due courtesy is given by each side. Very often, rightly or wrongly, we have a perception that Local Government gets a bit big for their boots. We have all manner of regulations needing adjudication and budgets don't always stretch for every project but...the very fundamental duties of a council, must include provision of basic services such as street work, mowing, public area maintenance, rubbish removal, animal control and formerly water and sewerage, sadly no longer the case.

I'd like to think that someone from Council will take on concerns held in those letters and in this article and will be able to help allay some of these questions. It would be nice to get a well thought out response...Let's hope so.





Letter to the Editor

I would like to applaud the Cagerattler for bringing this subject into the light, so we can take a hard, unbiased look at what is a gut wrenching and difficult matter that most people don't want to talk about.

But....let's be honest and name it. What you are talking about is PAEDOPHILIA.

It is the systematic sexual abuse and torture of our most vulnerable members of society. Often the effects will be with these poor souls for the rest of their lives. Including psychological problems and mental illness, some becoming perpetrators of this heinous crime themselves, self-harm and promiscuity in girls and violence in boys, drug and alcohol abuse and those who can't live the pain and take their own lives.

Like many people in communities around the world, I have been directly affected by child sexual abuse. Many of us know victims or have victims in our family. Remember, for every victim that comes forward, there are many who never do because they are either too young to articulate what is happening, or have been groomed by their abusers to believe if they tell, there will be dire consequences. Abusers come from all walks of life and more often than not are known to the family, and are portraying themselves as upstanding members of society. We now realise they are not the "dirty old man" type that we used to think of as paedophiles. So the problem is much bigger than we think. We need to educate our children much better than we have in the past.

This is something that DESERVES to be investigated by a Royal Commission, not just religious denominations, but all organisations involved with caring for children. I saw one very brave whistle blower from Newcastle in NSW, Detective Chief Inspector Peter Fox, who heard the quote: "The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing". He asked himself: 'am I one of those people allowing this to continue to flourish because I'm not saying anything?' Even though he had been pressured by his superiors to just drop the case, he spoke up. He is a beacon for those wrestling with their own consciences to come forward and has spurred the Prime Minister into action by announcing the Royal Commission. Let's hope more people come forward into the light.

Many people are complicit and turn a blind eye. These people are just as guilty as the perpetrators and should be exposed, whereever they are. Christianity teaches us those who commit evil will one day meet their maker and be judged, but it is important victims be acknowledged and the law takes its natural course now, here on earth.

I agree with Cagerattler when he says MOST in the Catholic Church are giving, caring people. I think that they need to be acknowledged and supported. These are wonderful people, doing amazing and miraculous things to help others. I was warned today by a good friend that we need to be careful not to make wild accusations. We should be very careful not to turn this into a witch hunt, as this clouds the very important issue of allowing the victims to finally have their stories told and maybe receive some peace and justice.

I disagree with the thinking that the church hierarchy has had little to do with what has occurred in the past and sadly, is still going on. I have seen on Lateline (abc-10.30pm) from the mouth of priests and lawyers associated with the church there have been many serious cover ups. Records of cases have been found, proving calculated misdealing's have occurred by the hierarchy.

Cardinal Pell seems to be living in his own world (as I suspect is the Vatican way). Even Australian bishops are saying Cardinal Pell doesn't speak for them, nor do they wish him to, so something isn't right there.

Does "God's representative on earth" have knowledge of cover-ups of sexual abuse if his cardinals do??? This also brings into question canon law and the sanctity of the confessional. Should a priest that hears confession from ANYONE who admits to sexual abuse be legally bound to give this information to the authorities?? Should the church be held to the same laws of the land as is everyone else???

I don't think you are realistic if you think a Royal Commission is only going to take a couple of months. Ireland held its own Royal Commission into child sexual abuse just within the catholic school system, it took 9 years.

I have to take issue with Cagerattler on his point: "Religion holding civilization together" On the contrary...history shows us all religions, including Christianity are responsible for some of the worst atrocities throughout history. Dividing, oppressing and murdering people in the name of God

As President of the above Society, I would like to clear up some anomalies that seem to be floating around the community.

Firstly, the Society is still very much alive and active. Just because we are not operating a Museum, does not mean that we have closed shop, we are still doing what we set out to achieve, and that is to collect, photograph and collate the history of the area. Indicated by our name, we are constantly dealing with family history questions, from all parts of the world, some of this is done from our own homes and some from our research room at the St Marys Online Centre, and stored in hard copy and on external hard-drives, plus our computers, both at home and at the centre research room.

Some people have been misled by the fact that the Council bought the Old Railway building, with a story that it was bought for the History Society.

But I can tell you all, this was not true. Prior to council making the purchase there wasn't any consultation with our society. I understand that councillor Johns had meetings, with others; we were never invited.

And as it has been empty for so long, Council obviously didn't have an agenda to back up the purchase either. So it's to say a case of putting the cart before the horse, a great way to get kicked in the head.

Our Society did look at purchasing the building, when it was suggested that the online centre was interested in moving in with us if we bought it. But that proved to be not financially viable, and to run it by the society alone, there are not enough volunteers available, as they are all utilised in other organisations.

It is now evident that Ian Summers is going to operate his museum, out of the Old Railway building; The Society, as we have always told council, will provide a photo display of the railway history around the walls, and some artifacts that we are the custodians of, from our previous involvement.

It will be good to see the establishment up and running again.

This may have been achieved a lot sooner if Council would have taken a bit of advice and obtained the services of Sue Atkinson, a museum consultant who has had untold experience in setting up these types of precincts. Her time would have been free as she was employed by Utas as a museum consultant.

Just a few observations regarding the nature strip debacle that has hit our "regional" towns. It seems the notice distributed by Council about some outlying areas not being cut, extends as far out as Groom St (40 metres off Main Street) and Gray Road at St.Marys. It is a shame that recently on the verges alongside the golf course and school areas, the grass has not been cut. This is where parents pick up their children and have to put up with knee deep grass, of course depending on how far your knees are from the ground. Perhaps a working bee can be organised amongst the mothers of children at the school, to cut the grass once a week to keep it in shape. What do you think ladies?

The changes to cutting programmes seem to be instigated after an extensive determination by "SOMEONE" at Council, after direction from the usual expensive Consultants, that this was the best fix for the problem. I have a simple solution myself, please bear with me.

PROBLEM: At present I believe that our intrepid ex-grass cutting crew Matt & Tracey, are traveling to St.Helens to work, in their own vehicles and time. Passing along the way, a crew from St.Helens, traveling in the opposite direction, to cut the grass here. Driving a Council supplied vehicle and on Council time. The trip up and back, taking at least 1.5 to 2 hours out of the working day, not to mention the expense of fuel and registrations etc.

SOLUTION: Bring back the people who showed pride in their work and their towns. Put Matt & Tracey back on the St.Marys and coastal areas regular cutting programme, they looked after their local area and the machinery they were in charge of. They start at 7:30am here and finish at 5:00pm. No vehicle costs and an extra couple of dependable fully utilised hours of labor each day.







The next section of our story started in Banff and took us to Bonnyville, a small town North of Banff, were we met our next Canadian family. After our time at the Outpost we had to make plans for our next move. We are terrible planners and just like to go with the flow, but it took longer than expected to sort something out. We ended up spending two weeks in Banff. They gave us a good deal at the backpackers and we became very comfortable and relaxed there. In the two weeks, we caught up on our well deserved internet time and sent our love to friends and family and shared our many photos and experiences so far.

Banff has a lot to offer, with many things to see and do but is very much a tourist town. The main street consists of souvenir shops, gift shops then food shops and that just continues the whole way up the street, but we didn't mind. We like being in the towns rather than the cities. We were able to meet the locals as well as the many other Australians. We saw some interesting things whilst in Banff, but our favourite would be the two deer in the main street, not bothered by passing cars or pedestrians. What a photo opportunity. We were glad that is was only deer and not a bear.

While in Banff we also hiked up Sulphur Mountain and caught the gondola back down. The length of the hike was 5.5km one way, the elevation gain:700m with 28 switchbacks, which made the hike reasonable. The hike took us two hours but we would have made it sooner if I wasn't so unfit, I nearly died at every turn, definitely slowed the team down, but it was so worth it. The view was amazing the whole way up and from the top it was surreal. We could see the town of Banff and all the surrounding mountains. It was hot walking up but once at the top the temperature dropped and it was freezing. We were 2,281 metres high and the view was beautiful. The gondola ride down was fun and more my style, that's for sure and that only took eight minutes.

The next day we ventured back to the base of the mountain to take a relaxing dip in the natural hot springs. They were hot and we were constantly in and out of the water, but we loved it. We had our first day of snow in Banff as well, it was only light but still exciting, as it covered the surrounding mountains.

Two weeks later we were heading to our next WWOOFing place. As soon as we left Banff we left the mountains and headed towards much flatter country. It was a long day travelling by bus to Bonnyville. We stopped in Calgary and Edmonton, two of the larger cities in Alberta.

We arrived in Bonnyville and was met by Lillian. Their house was a short drive from the town. On arrival, we met Lillian's husband Richard. They are both lovely people and we really enjoyed our stay with them both.

We had m a n y laughs. With both of them having trouble hearing, and understandoui accent, there were many funny discussions. totally topic.



They have a beautiful 6 bedroom, three storey home, in open fields, completely different from The Outpost. We feel pretty lucky here, its luxury living. We get to stay in the basement and have our own lounge room with a massive TV, and our own bathroom. We share a bedroom with bunk beds, I am surprised we are not sick of each other yet.

It has snowed a few times here already, but the ground is nearly always covered now as it is too cold for it to melt away. We love the snow and can't wait for more. The snow can be very dangerous, it leaves everything very slippery and I have already fallen over. The job load is much lighter than we expected. We only have to feed their three horses twice a day, it's a breeze compared to the 25 we had been feeding, but you don't hear us complaining.

Lillian and Richard have a dog, Michael, and two cats, Lion and Ivy. They keep us entertained and covered in fur. Along with the animals they have a 4wheeler motorbike, buggie, a ski-doo and guns, Richard has up to 30 of them, you could say he was into hunting. Fern and Emma love hearing about the guns, and his many other stories.

While here Fern has mastered the bike, she dinks Emma and I around the fields. Fern has definitely blown all of the cobwebs out, we sure have a lot of fun. We go on long drives with Richard, he has taken us to Cold Lake which is 18 miles by width and length, it felt like looking out to the ocean with no ending. Mike (the dog) made the trip even more interesting with his disturbing smells coming from the unknown.

We have experienced many new things, but my favourite would be driving Richard's big truck into the town of Bonnyville. Driving on the opposite side of the road is definitely an experience and something I will never get use to. We have all mastered new things since being with Lillian and Richard, Fern mastered the bike, I mastered the car and Emma mastered the salad making, Lillian never passed up the opportunity to get Emma to make her salad every night.



It was fun to dress up and experience Halloween.



The WOOFFing program is an amazing opportunity. It amazes us that we can put our trust in complete strangers and gain so much from them. We are off to our next WOOFFing place now, another ranch, this time they have 200 horses, we hope that goes well.

### Tasmanian arts projects to shine in Fremantle in November



Three community arts projects from across Tasmania have been given the opportunity to contribute to the creative program of the National Arts and Health Conference in Fremantle, thanks to the cooperation of arts organisations in Tasmania and Western Australia.

Tasmanian Regional Arts and Disability in the Arts/Disadvantage in the Arts Australia (DADAA) have combined to support a range of films, installations, workshops and exhibitions that showcase the wonderful work of Tasmanian community artists working in the arts and health field.

All three projects represent the recent work of Tasmanian artists and their collaboration with a range of health care practitioners and community members whose involvement has created these three powerful projects.

The Dying to Tell Installation project was developed as part of The Dance Project's southern component, entitled Family. The installation of a series of talking beds tells with sensitivity the stories of people confronting their own mortality, along with those stories of family members and carers working in palliative care.

Access Arts Link from Launceston's Access for Me exhibition comprises a digital display of over 70 works from artists with a range of disabilities. Access for Me is supported through Interweave Arts Inc.

The third project celebrates life and ageing through Penguin-based Creature Tales who will be showing the Carnival of the Here and Now film while showcasing their Billy project - a celebration of the almost forgotten art of the billycart. Creature Tales engages artists to work with senior citizen centres in new and exciting ways, providing a wonderful collaboration between artists and seniors.

Tasmanian Regional Arts Director Paul Jenkins was delighted that both TRA and DADAA were able to collaborate to support these projects to travel to Fremantle.

"Tasmania is home to some truly inspirational community arts projects that revolve around the field of arts and health. These three projects from across Tasmania celebrate the importance of the arts and cultural development sector's contribution to broader health and wellbeing outcomes," Mr Jenkins said.

The fourth annual conference titled The Art of Good Health and Wellbeing is on in Fremantle from 26 -29 November.

"Each of these projects is unique to the communities whose stories have been told. It is through the use of the arts that such powerful messages can be sent with great sensitivity," Mr Jenkins added.
