St Marys Tigers were hosts for the final AFL Masters game for the 2012 season. While the result was not what we would have wished for it was still a great day, despite some very cold and inclement weather, and proved that we can put on a successful and entertaining football match. We had a good roll-up of spectators and a special vote of thanks to all the Auskick families that stayed to support our boys.

As is usually the case there are many people to thank and I don't have room here to mention them all individually — you know who you are but once again it was a great example of lots of people helping out to make a community event both successful and memorable. We are planning to have a social game on one Saturday in September followed by our presentation night. Watch out for final details.





The Punts

One part of our history that has had very little recognition and yet played an important part in the development of our country were the punts. In the early days many rivers around Australia and indeed Tasmania were crossed by punts. They were used extensively before bridges were built and again when floods washed bridges away. They carried everything, from people, livestock, goods, carts, carriages and motor cars. Even today a cable powered punt still operates on the Pieman River on Tasmania's West Coast.

Although it has been almost eighty years since a punt operated in our Fingal Valley or East Coast, they were used extensively at



different times in our history. The South Esk River at Fingal, for example, had a number of punts, the latest of which was after the 1929 floods washed the bridge to Mangana and Mathinna away. The punt operated at a site just below the current railway station where the early bridges were situated.

From 1865 until 1936 when the steel framed bridge was opened at Scamander some six bridges had been washed away by floods. This resulted in a numbers of punts being used during the construction of new bridges.

The most famous of these punts was the last and ran across the river from 1929 until 1936. It was the largest of the punts; built and operated by Harry and Henry Cruse, grandfather and great grandfather of Greg Cruse, the manager of St Marys Online Access Centre. Indeed, Greg often proudly displays his photo collection of his grandfathers and their punt sailing backwards and forwards across the river.


There were hundreds of stories connected to the Scamander punts, but one that Greg tells of his great-grandfather, Harry, was when the circus came to the East Coast in 1930. It arrived at St Marys on the train, put on a show at the St Marys Recreation ground; then the horses and elephants pulled the circus wagons down the Pass and headed for St Helens.

Everything went as planned until they reached the Scamander River and asked to be transported across on Harry's punt. But Harry was very much conscious of safety at that time because only months before he had to rescue 11 souls from the depth of the river when the St Helens/St Marys bus plunged off his punt into 9 metres of water.

With this in mind, Harry took one look at the huge elephants and had no hesitation but to refuse their entry onto his punt. Apparently a good argument followed, but Harry was unmoved and the elephants had to be taken to shallower water near the barway and walked through the river.

Harry did transport the rest of the circus gear across the river, however, and it went on to perform at St Helens. After which, it was said, it travelled again by road up the Welborough Pass to Herrick, where it was again loaded onto a train bound for Scottsdale.


When we drive across Scamander River these days on its now state of the art concrete bridge, it's hard to imagine a time



when the only vehicle transport across was by punt. But think of the characters the punt would have had in the 1930s.

Wouldn't it have been a wonderful experience to break up your trip to St Helens with a ride on Cruse's punt? Think of the stories those blokes would have told and the gossip you would have learned from fellow travellers.

Dear Sir/Madam,

The debate between Minister Bryan Green and Will. Hodgman at Brighton on Monday night (30/7) was indeed well attended, fairly moderated by Mayor Tony Foster and also proved quite revealing.

There was however, no good reason offered to justify a further lock-up of forests from public use and as one question from the audience suggested, "on what basis should those that have done all in their power to sabotage markets for Tasmanian timber products both domestically and internationally, be "rewarded" for their actions?"

As anyone in the industry will tell you the major roadblock to a robust industry re-building is the ability to dispose of residue produced during harvesting and saw milling. This was made far more difficult in Southern Tasmania when Gunns in an effort to get conservationists to support a Pulp Mill being built, sold the major wood chip processing facility at Triabunna to a group that clearly had no interest in ever making wood chips.

Another alternative available for disposal of wood residues is using Biomass for the generation of electricity, an accepted and legitimate source of renewable electricity generation in many countries around the world.

In fact as recently as November 2011 a Federal Parliamentary Committee on Forestry chaired by Mr Dick Adams the Labor party member for Lyons, recommended that Biomass produced from native forest harvesting remain on the list of renewable energy generations sources.

Yet quite perversely in the very same week this report and recommendations were released, Mr Adams incredibly supported a regulation introduced to parliament at the behest of the Greens, expressly removing electricity generated from native forest biomass from the list of renewable electricity generation sources. How does that work?

It is clear in both the State and Federal arena Labor is being held to ransom by their minority partners in government The Greens and sadly Tasmanians are suffering as a result.

The Say Cagerattler

I hate winter with a passion, as most do. When you wake on freezing frosty mornings or face the bitter southerlies each winter time, it gets most down. There's one thing most years that gives you something to watch and be distracted by with the footy, even for us poor misguided Richmond supporters, but this winter we also had the prospect of watching around 10-16 Australian gold medals at the London Olympics.

There's quite a few medals occurring for us but as of the second Sunday as I write this we sit at one gold, twelve silver and seven bronze medals. Only one Gold but you have to put it all in perspective though. This comes from a country with by general terms is a quite small population of 22 million people and coming off the back of huge per capita gold medal hauls from Sydney 2000, Athens 2004 and Beijing 2008 of 16, 17 and 14 gold medals respectively, a total of 47 in all.

Other than that, a total of 13 in Melbourne in 1956 was our best. Another thing I would argue with the detractors of the overall performance so far is this. In most sports the Aussies are very competitive and qualifications are coming in areas we've been struggling in for 'yonks'. There were high hopes of multiple gold in the pool, rowing and cycling. The single gold medal to date was in the swimming, three silvers and two bronze in rowing and no great results just yet in the velodrome but there's a bit to go yet.

On the web the jubilation by the British media on their big successes but also the thumping of the Aussies is very noticeable, as with their recent domination of most sporting encounters.

Another rivalry occurs with the New Zealanders and at the moment they lead us in the gold column on the back of a fantastic effort in the rowing events and well deserved .Good luck to them. However the simple fact is that we have won 12 more medals than the Kiwis overall so far.

In 1976 in Montreal, Australia went gold-less and lost the Men's Hockey final to the Kiwis (their only gold that Olympics) which still niggles apparently. In L.A. 1984, New Zealand won eight gold to our four and almost all of them were in yachting. Overall we have 136 Gold and 450 odd total medals to the Kiwis 39 Gold and 90 or so total. Factor in per capita and it's about right.

Another simple fact too if I may. You have Canada with only one gold so far like us and Spain with none, as yet two powerhouses in sport and not too many minor medals either. I wonder how they feel at present.

As a sports nut it's hard to watch being "bested" more often than we used to, not just in the Olympic events but in cricket (ouch) rugby, golf and other sports, even in rugby league with the Poms, it's much tougher than it used to be. Perhaps in netball and hockey we still rank at the top of the tree.

Having said all that and fully expecting all sorts of "inquiries" regardless on how many (if any) 'golds' come in the second half of the London Olympics, maybe it's the "Olympics we had to have".

Sport and recreation is a huge and important component of a healthy culture and with any luck any "inquiry" will look at encouraging our young people to try new things and strive for new goals and focus a little less on the electronic lounge room sports for the real thing. As they say "What doesn't kill you only makes you stronger". Only positives should come from London, surely. If nothing else we'll develop thicker hides to take the inevitable ribbing from the Poms, especially until Rio 2016. If you dish it out you have to take it. Just the same, let's hope for at least a couple of gold medals in the second week in the old country and let's hope the Tigers win a few more games even if no finals (again) are going to happen and winter's worst is done. Big wishes I know.

By keeping instructions, requests and negative feedback to a minimum, you create less opportunity for conflict and bad feelings. Rules are important, but use them only when it's really important. raisingchildren.net.au

August 13th sees the start of Acquired Brain Injury Week. More public awareness of Acquired Brain Injury (ABI) is essential. The number of people being diagnosed with ABI is increasing in our nation due to such factors as sports injuries, accidents, sickness, infections, substance abuse, environmental hazards in fact anything that causes injury to the brain.

Peter and I care for our 26 year old son, Tim, full time. Tim needs constant supervision and support 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. He has ABI as a result of contracting meningitis at 5 months of age. This resulted in severe skills. cognitive problems (e.g. reduced social communication difficulties, and anger irritability management issues, socially inappropriate behaviour) physical problems (e.g. severe epilepsy and seizures, bad headaches, temperature regulation, bowel and bladder function) mental health problems (e.g. depression, anxiety disorders)

I wish to share with you a few things about Tim. Some may see this as disrespectful to Tim, but I believe by educating the public about ABI, better awareness and understanding will be created - that negative attitudes can be replaced by positive attitudes, misunderstanding replaced with understanding, fear replaced with compassion, disrespect replaced with respect, isolation replaced with inclusion.

So here goes...

Many people in the area know or know of Tim. If you have ever come face to face, or more precisely nose to nose with him, you are unlikely to forget him!

As in many cases of ABI, Tim's life is full of contrasts, and these contrasts can occur instantly and without warning, depending largely on the type and degree of seizure activity he is experiencing at the time.

There is a motto concerning people with ABI. "Always expect the unexpected!"

Maybe I'm a biased mother, but I see Tim as an intelligent, bright young man - so what if he can't read and write and has difficulty in communicating! He can watch and appreciate DVDs from Thomas the Tank Engine to Downton Abbey, he can ride a bike, drive the tractor, "help" in the garden, chop wood, mow lawns, do jigsaw puzzles, play with his model train set and make wonderful Leggo creations.

But all this activity and creativity can "disappear" almost instantly. Tim will be in a dazed, trance-like state, unaware of his surroundings, unable to comprehend the simplest conversation, unable to know how to eat his food etc. Then it passes and Tim is back to being Tim.

Tim is sensitive, gentle, kind, caring and loves helping people, but this too can change, often without warning. He can hit, poke, kick or bite anything or anyone in sight, even strangers. Then it passes and Tim is back to being Tim.

Tim is tall, dark and handsome (at least on occasions when he scrubs up well). He dresses smart. He is cool!

On many occasions he has caught the eye of young women. But ... you most likely have seen the contrast - the "Daggy" Tim - the Tim that gets curious stares because he is in public wearing his pyjamas, or clothes worn inside out, or hideously mismatched, or clothes full of holes. (For some reason we are still trying to figure out, Tim loves cutting holes in his trousers -we have a wardrobe full of converted "shorts".)

He can be unshaven and unkempt, with hair in matted mini dread locks. (We get many a condemning glare that questions us as to why as carers we allow Tim to look so "unloved".)

People like Tim can only ever be encouraged, never forced in any way to try to comply to be "normal". They often do not have the capacity or understanding to behave appropriately in a given situation.

Tim can appear to be a normal shopper, then on reaching the check-out, surprise the check-out-chick by holding up his fingers in a gun-like fashion and saying, "stick 'em up".

One day we were parked in our car outside a local shop. Tim looked up and saw 4 police officers inside ordering food. What an opportunity! Instantly, he jumped out of the car, swung open the shop door, dramatically approached the officers and in his typical "shoot 'em fashion" demanded - "Stick 'em up"!

Thankfully there are well educated police officers who can quickly analyse this type of situation and respond appropriately to Tim's needs.

We carry an ABI ID Card for "unusual" occasions.

This card is issued by BIAT (Brain Injury Association of Tasmania) and supported by Tasmania Police. It acknowledges that Tim's social behavioural problems are due to his medical condition.

We are delighted to see many business people and their staff are recognising ABI and are responding wonderfully to the ABI person; understanding the needs and situation. Another area for which we are grateful are towns with laneways and trees, as it is not only dogs but also Tim who sometimes urgently needs to use these "facilities".

<u>A reminder</u>: Acquired Brain Injury can affect anyone of us at any time - our lives can change almost instantly, as in cases of strokes, infections, accidents etc.

While the effects of ABI vary greatly from mild to severe and the duration can vary from temporary to permanent, there will be effects. Life will change!







Historic day for east coast tourism

The tourism industry along Tasmania's east coast is setting itself up for a bright future with the announcement today of the first Board members to head up the new East Coast Regional Tourism Organisation (RTO).

The skills-based board of ten which will be chaired by experienced tourism

professional, David Reed, brings together a broad range of skills in tourism, marketing business and finance from across the region.

Mr Reed said it is an exciting opportunity for the East Coast and I am honoured to be a part of this new organisation.

"A regional tourism organisation covering the state's East Coast offers a strong platform to the region's tourism industry by providing an avenue for collaboration, co-operative marketing and a consolidated voice for the industry.

"It is an opportunity to identify and deliver priorities for the region and set the strategic direction to maximise the tourism

potential for the East Coast." One of the first priorities for the new Board will be to finalise the legal requirements to set up the new East Coast Regional Tourism Organisation. It is expected they will hold their first meeting soon to progress the incorporation of the new organisation. One of their other priorities will be to recruit a Chief Executive Officer to help with the establishment of the new regional tourism organisation, and to engage with the local tourism industry and communities along the East coast.

The new regional tourism board is also expected to meet with council stakeholders in the coming weeks.

Local government are key partners in this new approach to tourism management and representatives from the Break O'Day and Glamorgan Spring Bay Councils will be represented on the Board.






"In addition to improving highway


Students were split into 10 country teams—New Zealand, Brazil, Japan, Great Britain, Russia, China, USA, Kenya, France and Canada.




