Congratulations to Sister Lorraine Groves 50 years of life, given to the Missionary Sisters of Service.

A mission founded in Tasmania by Father John Corcoran Wallis.

The story of the Missionary Sisters of Service began in 1933 on Bruny Island. A mother asked a young priest, Fr John Wallis, who was visiting her family: "Father, why can't we have sisters to teach our children? Doesn't anyone care about us people in the bush?".

On the 8th July 1944 in Launceston, the first four women came together: Gwen Morse, Monica Carroll, Kath Moore and Joyce O'Brien. Later that year they were joined by Valerie Casey and Agnes Ryan.


This courageous group of women became the foundation of the community of Missionary Sisters of Service.

And several years later a young lady, Lorraine Groves, was called to give her life to God and the people.

Sister Lorraine has now been in the Religious profession for 50 years. It has been 50 years where she has seen many

changes, and has been, as there Motto says, traveling "Into the Highways and Byways". Into many parts of our wide and varied continent, attending to the pastoral needs of people.

Probably the greatest change that some of these girls have had to face is being in charge of a parish,




brought about, because of the shortage of priests.


Travelling to parts unknown



Here's hoping we have another great year ahead.



JUST RUBBISH (Update)

You won't believe this!

After receiving many calls of support, I had a comfortable feeling that, backed by the numbers, the Council will be embarrassed into reviewing this totally unjust and inequitable Tip Charge of \$2 for Ratepayers that do not fall within the collection zones.

On Sunday 5 August, whilst at the tip, we were advised by the 'Tip man' that the rate was going to increase to \$2.50 for our next visit. As you could imagine, I was in total shock. Knowing the 'Tip man' is only doing his job, I didn't talk any further – mainly because I couldn't.

I have confirmed with the BODC that the new rate of \$2.50 is correct.

This is the bit I can't believe – the rate went up on <u>1 July</u> <u>2012!</u> (Apparently reviewed by council)

So, the 'Tip man' has only just been told, a month later.

There was no mention of the increase in either my verbal or written communication with the BODC representative and apart from the transport aspect of the cost comparison, the Tip fee is fundamental to the argument and cost variance, which now extends from \$65 to \$80.50 per year. And that is supposed to be "sharing the burden evenly".

Allow me to be perfectly clear - A ratepayer who lives outside the collection zone and receives \underline{NO} service from the Council is forced to pay an extra \$80.50 per year \underline{over} and \underline{above} that of a Serviced ratepayer.

Not only is the \$2 unjust, the \$2.50 or 25% increase is ridiculous.

The management and handling of this issue by the BODC is, in my opinion, sub-standard and reeks of a superior, I don't care attitude. It is not what we pay for.

It is interesting to note that of all the people who have made contact of support, not one so far, is an elected Councillor. Maybe they all live in a Serviced area and only represent the majority voters.

I know that Council was presented with at least two different parking options (one from myself and the other from my wife) twelve months ago, plus a number of questions re plans presented, and at this point we have not received a response.

As this matter is then going to be voted on by Council, I would ask that all Break O'Day councillor's be present at the public meeting, so a true gauge of the town's feelings for these plans can be appreciated before they cast their vote.

Or is this just going to be another Operational matter?

HOW QUICKLY WE FORGET!

Remember when we lost our 24/7 facilities at the hospital, all the uproar, all the work by our government representatives, Mayor and council, local community groups, local identities etc., to return this facility back to a 24/7 operation (excuse the pun). Remember the sense of achievement, comfort and security when we were told the hospital would return to a 24/7 facility, the community, which seemed to be losing everything, had achieved a momentous win.

Then remember the struggles to keep a local doctor, we had one that wanted to stay but red tape put paid to that, several locums, numerous weekends with the hospital closed, I could only imagine the struggle those running the hospital were faced with.

Luckily now things (from the outside) seem to be running a bit more smoothly, this may have a lot to do with our good fortune of having a doctor who has committed to living in our community and a dedicated staff who go out of their way to care for their patients and make sure this facility continues to function.

This brings me back to my first statement, HOW QUICKLY WE FORGET.

A bout of illness gave me a 4 day stopover at the hospital recently and I can't speak highly enough of the care provided and willingness of all staff to go out of their way to make sure myself and all other patients (beds were full and they were turning people away) were comfortable, might I add this was on a Sunday with 2 nurses and Dr Latte who had been called in

To my dismay after leaving hospital and recovering, I overheard a conversation between some locals whinging about not being able to get into the doctor for a couple of days, when they rang it took 3 times for the receptionist to answer, when they finally got in they had to wait 2 hours after their appointment time to see the doctor. Have you ever thought that when you rang to get your appointment (possibly for a runny nose) that someone else possibly sicker than yourself may have also been looking for an appointment at the same time, or heaven forbid the receptionist was having a break or the staff and doctor were looking after other patients, have you thought that the reason that it took 2 days to get an appointment and you then sat for 2 hours after your appointment time to get in was that the doctor is possibly overworked.

Well I can tell you people (and there is more than just a couple of you whingers) that the other option isn't good, as you should remember but have clearly forgotten, we have been there. Next time you need to use the doctor or hospital go to St. Helens or Launceston then you can also whinge about how much fuel you use.

Next time you go to the doctor or hospital and the waiting room is full, all the beds are full and the ambulance is there unloading an accident and emergency case, think about the doctor and staff who are there trying to do their utmost to keep things running on time and smoothly for us all, remember what it was like when we didn't have this opportunity and most of all remember if you are still not satisfied you can go elsewhere. Remember the old saying "no matter how bad you are there is possibly someone worse". Well there usually is and no matter how ill (or important) you think you are, if the doctor and staff think there is someone worse you are just gunna have to wait.

While I'm on my soapbox I am also disappointed at another action I seen for myself taking place at the hospital.

Struggling to find a parking space recently at the hospital I noticed two vehicles parked in the disabled spaces owned by the one family (both displaying permits), when in the waiting room I was annoyed to find both drivers wandering around

the hospital talking to people, then was further angered to find that when they left they only took one vehicle, leaving one in a disabled spot and went to do their shopping together and pick the kids up from school. Having a disabled parent I know the benefits of these spaces and to think there are people in our community who just seem to be using them for their own personal benefit infuriates me.

Anyway that's enough of my whinging, what do you reckon?

We would like to dedicate this service to the memory of Ex Warrant officer Peter Mackie, who served in Vietnam with 1RAR who was unexpectedly lost to us on the 28th May of this year. l would like to pause for moment in his memory.




Peter and the Vietnam Veterans Association of Australia provided moral and financial support to the St Mary's Memorial Association through a period of uncertainty, re our continuing role in this community.

The Australian War Memorial records the Victnam War lasting from the 3rd of August 1962 until the 29th of April 1975.

Fifty thousand Australians were involved in Vietnam. Two thousand three hundred and ninety eight of those sustaining wounds, with five hundred and twenty one losing their lives.

On this day forty years ago, an initial force of one hundred and eight men from D company and attachments, of 6 RAR, encountered and engaged an estimated enemy force of over two and a half thousand at Long Tan.

We believe it is important, that the men and women who have served and those who did not return, from all conflicts, have their sacrifice acknowledged, and they be remembered.



Address given by Isabelle Booth

Good morning, I am Isabelle Booth representing St Mary's District High School. I am here today to talk to you about the battle of Long Tan.

From 1962 to 1971 Australia was involved in the Vietnam War for nine years and six months



due to the confrontation between Malaya and Indonesia and had the potential to continue into Papua New Guinea and the island of Borneo in which Australia had defence responsibilities.

In May 1966 our soldiers found themselves in one of the largest battles fought by the Australians in the Vietnam War. When the Australian force based at Nui Dat confirmed a large amount of Viet Cong closing in on the 16th and 17th August, the base came under fire, however, the defenders were expecting an assault. The following day during their searches they found areas where mortars had been fired and the troop decided to head for a rubber plantation near a village of Long Tan. Less than an hour after arriving they were attacked by mortars, machine guns and small arms fire.

They were stuck in the battle with torrential rains with very low ammunition supplies. A helicopter dropped more ammunition and blankets for the wounded. Australian reinforcements were on the way. Armoured personal fought their way in, just before 7.00pm and the Viet Cong were forced to retreat. Eighteen Australians were killed in the battle of Long Tan and all but one of the dead was from the D company and twenty four soldiers were wounded. Between 1966 and 1971, 15,381 service men served in Vietnam.



Address given by Jared Mason

The battle of Long Tan was fought between the Australian army and the Viet Cong on the 18th August, 1966 during the Vietnam War. Viet Cong committed two thousand troops to battle while Australia had only one hundred and



eight men. The battle was fought in and around a rubber plantation not far from a town called Long Tan.

The Australian task force arrived in South Vietnam between April and June and set up and constructed a base in Nui Dat. On the 16th and 17th the Nui Dat base was being bombarded by Vict Cong mortars and fired at by rifles. The next day a patrol called D-Company, 6RAR searched and got there, they were already under fire again by the Viet Cong but desperate calls for support alarmed the NZ Artillery Battery which helped the Australians to their feet.

The survivors of D-Company and the NZ Artillery Battery copped heavy losses against the Viet Cong. As fighting continued the next day, the Australian reinforcements were being committed to battle which forced the plotting Viet Cong to retreat. Eighteen Australian troops were killed and twenty four Australians wounded and the Viet Cong suffered great losses as well.

St Marys Volunteer Fire Brigade have decided to support the Fill the Boot fundraising campaign.

We will be looking for your support in the next few weeks to raise as much money as we can.

From 4-19 October, thousands of firefighters across Australia will either be running, cycling, walking, swimming, driving or flying from station to station over two weeks. They will pass a fire fighters' boot on at each station, symbolic of the fundraising efforts of thousands of firefighter's efforts to Fill the Boot to support children and families living with a neuromuscular condition.

The relay event will finish in Sydney on 19 October 2012 coinciding with the opening of the World Firefighter's Games. At the finish line, relay firefighters will be welcomed by Jerry Lewis, politicians, media, 15,000 spectators and 10,000 firefighters from all around the world for a massive celebration.

The relay will raise money for research and support services for the 20,000 Australians, mostly children, who have a neuro-muscular condition.

Fill the Boot has been running in the US and Canada for more than 50 years with more than 280,000 firefighters raising funds for muscular dystrophy each year.

International comedian Jerry Lewis started Fill the Boot with firefighters in America as part of his role as National Chairman of MDA for more than 60 years.

As the international patron for MDF Australia, Jerry is responsible for initiating the first Fill The Boot Firefighters relay in association with Fire & Rescue NSW.





Break O'Day Council's Inert Landfills

As part of the restructure of waste management within the Municipality, Council has been reviewing the current operations at both the Scamander and St Helens inert landfill sites.

It has now come to the attention of Council that the licence conditions of the Scamander inert landfill site require a full assessment and as such the landfill site has been closed until further notice.

Therefore all waste material that can be disposed of at the inert landfill will now have to be sent to the St Helens site.

This decision does not affect the transfer station at Scamander.

Council is committed to the strict environmental conditions of this site and is now working closely with the Environmental Protection Authority to ensure that the future landfilling activities at the Scamander site are environmentally and legally compliant.

One day last week I was listening to the radio when the talkback was reflecting on the national unemployment story that recorded Tasmania as the worst of the six states at around 5.7 % or so.

The guest was from Access Economics I think. Our Opposition party depict Tassie in a diabolical situation all the time on the strength of these figures, but it didn't go unnoticed to me that the expert mentioned that in the scheme of things our so called terrible 5.7% compared to so many other places in the world, would be the envy of so many.

It is true that it could be still lower, and that less than five percent would be wonderful, but given our geographical disadvantages, highly competitive markets and the extraordinarily high Australian dollar, we're not doing too badly.

Call me cynical if you like, but sometimes the negativity from opposing political parties is in itself just plain negative for the outcomes. They all do it regardless of who is in power. Talking down the incumbent government is just the done thing. As we talked about these figures later it was also pointed out to me that these numbers can be somewhat misleading in that a lot of 'employed' people may well only be part time so a truly accurate number of full time equivalents may not necessarily be correct. That said and agreed though, it is still likely to be proportionally accurate in other states/countries. The trick may well be to find better ways to drive down unemployment in longer term ways. Market driven economies seem to be the way these days, so if ever a bi-partisan approach was ever enlisted maybe we might get somewhere. A good start might be to not talk down our economy so much.

On another matter I was horrified to hear about a young girl in Pakistan suffering Down's Syndrome who was being vilified, most likely charged and severely punished for blasphemy if you can believe it. She apparently comes from a Christian family and community and was unable to comprehend her actions when using pages of text of Islamic writings to start a fire for cooking. She was reported to be illiterate. Quite apart from having Down's Syndrome issues, she is only 11 years old. According to the story 600 other Christians have moved out in fear of retribution and reprisals if the girl isn't dealt with under strict blasphemy laws.

Where are the Civil Rights people now. I hope if common sense doesn't prevail our Government will send a clear message to the Pakistani regime that this sort of stuff is not acceptable and that ridiculous actions with minors doesn't make their faith anything else but despised and feared when compassion and understanding is considered...Imagine if injustice like that happened here. Perish the thought.

The relationships between connectedness to nature and the psychological health impacts of climate change

Department of Rural Health

A new study investigating the relationship between a person's connectedness to nature and the psychological health impacts of climate change in rural Tasmania is being undertaken as part of a PhD by Christine Materia from University Department of Rural Health at the UTAS.

The study will provide decision makers with information to develop community-based programs to support communities in managing the psychological health impacts of climate change and assist health and allied health practitioners, policy-makers and local government to respond to community anxiety about climate change.

The Flinders Island, Dorset, Break O'Day and Glamorgan Spring Bay Local Government Areas have been selected based on temperature and rainfall reports and maps for Tasmania produced by the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) and the Antarctic Climate and Ecosystems Cooperative Research Centre (ACE-CRC). These reports and maps span thirty years and include comprehensive Tasmanian local government area profiles.

Participation in the study is voluntary and the study has been approved by the Tasmanian Social Science Human Research Ethics Committee (Approval No 12567). There are three components to the study:

- 1. The first will involve answering some questions that we will use to measure your connectedness to nature and relationship with nature
- 2. The second will involve you answering some questions about how you are feeling in the moment and then thinking about climate change and its effect on you and answering a further series of questions.
- 3. The third will involve an interview where you will be invited to share your experiences of climate change and its impact on your health and wellbeing
