ST MARYS DISTRICT SCHOOL DOES IT AGAIN!

When you think of St Marys District School you think of mountains, lovely scenery, beautiful school grounds? Well from now on you should also associate the name St Marys District School with the Language Perfect World Championships. This tiny little school on the North East Coast boasts a team of dedicated competitors who have won World accolades two years in a row.

The competition attracts more schools every year with over 15 different countries around the globe competing and an astonishing 172,946,801 questions answered in ten gruelling days.

"This was the longest, hardest ten days I have ever done, and I stayed up until 1am every morning. Everyone was sick of my grumpy mood by the end of the ten days, but it was really, really worth it" said Courtney Middendorp grinning from ear to ear. She was not alone, as all the students were exhausted when parents came to the school at 6.00pm to cheer the team across the finishing 'on-line', and all of them talked about a relaxing quiet weekend.

All the 18 team members set personal goals, and even though 9 of them had never competed before, they met their targets and had to reset their goals halfway through the competition – such is the drive of the team. Leon Latt beat his own record by day 6 and decided to try for 15,000 points. When discussing his 'system' which is nothing more than unshakeable determination, he said he would definitely try to go for 20 or 30 thousand points next year! But he says anyone who does has to have incredible typing skills, coordination and reflexes; he cautions that as the competition gets bigger, students in St Marys will have to work harder than ever before. Thanks for that sage advice Leon.

Melanie Guy, a shy, quiet grade eight from Fingal, famously wrote "I am going to get to 10,000 and no one is going to stop me". She knew what it would take, as she was one of our team last year. She put her head down and went for it. On day eight the whole team cheered her on when she passed the 10,000 mark. Another veteran Lukas McDiarmid learns Japanese; he is the only student doing this notoriously difficult language. Last year he nearly made it to Bronze (1000 points) - this year he stuck at it furiously and on day ten was a tired but happy Gold medallist (3000) with 3120 points and first place for Japanese in Tasmania!

The number of firsts for this team are quite incredible, but remember this is a global competition so the world wide statistics are even more incredible.


Our youngest participant was just 12 months old and our oldest was ...Um, let's say "over 30 yrs". What an interesting and fun group they were.

Break O'Day residents came to the Circus workshop from all around - St Marys, St Helens, Scamander, Beaumaris and Fingal.





Roses from the Heart - Christina Henri in Dublin

Update: 28th May, 2013

Tasmania's Christina Henri has travelled to Ireland with thousands of bonnets stitched and embellished by descendents and volunteers in memory of the 25,566 women and their children sentenced to transportation to Australia.

On 16th May 2013 a presentation event for Roses from the Heart memorial project was held at The Mansion House in Dublin and attended by the Lord Mayor of Dublin, the Australian Ambassador, Tourism Ireland, historians, writers, journalists and people from across Ireland, the Isle of Man, Wales, England, Scotland and Australia. Christina spoke about convict women's lives in Australia and the memorial project, and Tasmania's Chris and Judith Cornish performed their award winning convict dramatization to a very appreciative audience. RTE Nationwide film company were also there filming for a documentary on Christina's Roses from the Heart bonnet project.

Christina is running bonnet workshops and presentation events across Ireland and has been overwhelmed by the interest people of all ages and walks of life have shown in the bonnet project and in the history of female convict transportation to Australia, and Tasmania in particular. One of the workshops attended by High School students was held in an Irish gaol where many of the women and children sentenced to transportation were incarcerated before they embarked on their long voyage to Australia.

Christina will spend another week in Ireland before returning to Tasmania in mid June with many of the bonnets completed during her visit. In August Christina will return to Dublin to oversee the installation of an exhibition at Kilmainham Gaol, where filming of the documentary will continue.

On her return we are hoping if there is enough interest locally Christina may visit our area to tell us about her trip and we could possibly organize a bonnet making workshop. You don't have to be an experienced sewer, many bonnets have been completed by school children, and myself, with very limited sewing skills. Sewing a memorial bonnet for a convict woman or child can be very rewarding and offers the opportunity to learn more about the individual woman or child's story. If anyone is interested in helping to organize or attend a workshop please contact the Valley Voice and leave your details.





Council proactive on George River flood risks

A new assessment of flood risks on the George River floodplain at St Helens by Break O'Day Council will help protect community lives, property and prosperity in the municipality.

Releasing the Lower George River Floodplain Risk Management Plan, Break O'Day Council Mayor Sarah Schmerl invited businesses and residents on the floodplain to use the Plan to identify how flood threatens them and take action to reduce the risks.

The Plan is part of BODC's strategy ensuring the community is safe and prepared for natural disasters.

For two days in March 2011 a major flood cut off the Binalong Bay community from the hospital and services in St Helens. It left a trail of damage on inundated farmland, damaged Binalong Bay Road and dragged the local economy down for months. BODC Mayor Sarah Schmerl said a spate of serious floods in the last ten years has shown the floodplain, at the mouth of the George River on Georges Bay, is one of the places where natural hazards hit Break O'Day the hardest.

After a serious flood in 2004 Council started to examine risks from flood and other natural hazards more closely - heeding warnings that climate change would make things worse in the future' Mayor Schmerl said. 'Council will use this new flood risk evaluation for the George River floodplain to manage Council's risks on the floodplain. We have already used mapping by this project of future flood vulnerability in our new Interim Planning Scheme.'

The Lower George River Floodplain Risk Management Plan is available on Council's website.

The Lower George Riverworks Trust formed following the 2004 flood event and is eager to use the Lower George River Floodplain Risk Management Plan to identify priorities for flood mitigation.

Riverworks Trust secretary Mrs Julie Llewellyn said farmers and residents on the floodplain welcome the release of the Plan.

One of the challenges for BODC is road access to Binalong Bay, and the Bay of Fires being cut off by floods. Mr Sven Rand, Climate Change Adaptation Consultant at Pitt and Sherry, led the work on the Floodplain Risk Management Plan for the Council and investigated the option of upgrading Reids Road, which crosses the river upstream of the floodplain. Mr Rand said the climate change projections for rainfall, storms and sea levels suggest that by 2100 Binalong Bay Road might need to be elevated over the floodplain, and still be subject to flood risks, while upgrading alternative routes is also costly.

'There is no rush, but in time the risks to road users and of road closures increases, as does the tens of millions of dollars involved.'

BODC General Manager Des Jennings commented that as with natural disasters across the country in the last ten years, Break O'Day had its lesson with the 2006 bushfire and recent floods.

'We will continue to work with the State Emergency Service and others to improve our emergency planning and preparedness. To be prudent we must also look at reducing the consequences of natural disasters, including getting out of harm's way altogether if need be' Mr Jennings said. 'And we need to keep on top of how climate change might shift the outlook for bushfires, storms or other threats.'

The Lower George River Floodplain Risk Management Plan released this week finalises a series of studies for BODC by Pitt and Sherry, using data from the Tasmanian Climate Futures program. The initiative has been supported by the Australian and Tasmanian Governments' Natural Disaster Mitigation Program and Tasmanian Government Climate Connect funding.

BODC also conducted a Tasmanian Coastal Adaptation Pathways Project in 2012 with Tasmanian Climate Connect support. That project asked the Georges Bay community for its long term investment preferences for managing rising flood and storm risks around the Bay. Strategies it considered included protecting infrastructure and land uses, adjusting to increasing flooding, or retreating to higher ground.



One day last week a group of us were sitting in the staffroom when the subject of building regulations became part of the conversation. Everyone had either a personal story or knew someone who was having issues with trying to put up a structure.

WHY DOES IT HAVE TO BE SO HARD?

The other people's stories at work just backed up what I'd seen and heard myself over the past few years; why, in a state of not much more than half a million, can't we have one clear cut set of regulations? It seems that areas differ if the stories are correct.

You would think that it would be this straight forward...soil/land assessment, engineering assessment including plumbing, electrical, sensible (and I mean sensible) Job safety assessment done, standard fees paid, then approvals given to commence - how hard can that be?

During the process, ticking off on once again pretty uniform standards for slab, footings, roof and structure, then finally an inspection to approve a certificate of occupancy. According to several people locally and from other places this is not necessarily the case and often procedure gets in the way of just getting the job done. In an industry that quite often struggles and relies on strong investment from people just wanting to get their already structurally approved house, business or even a pre-fabricated garage or residence actually built, these hold ups, extra regulations and/or fees are annoying and frustrating.

The bottom line is perhaps to have a State regulatory body, with a set of rules both standard and exceptional that may

or may not apply depending on circumstances/location and a fee structure that is open and clear.

Here's an idea too - why not have a support line or contact number to answer queries within an overall, easily accessible regulatory body. For me it was all summed up a few months ago when talking to a visiting master builder from Hobart. When I asked him what he thought, he said he was disgusted. He said he'd been building since the early 1970s and had never done it so tough. Quite a few of his clients threw in the towel in sheer frustration and as a consequence some of his fellow builders found it hard to survive. Why doesn't anyone listen to the people at the coalface when framing up many of the regulations involved in the building industry? Surely a uniform, clearly defined and openly accessible set of rules statewide would make lots of sense. It's about bloody time isn't it?

Thanks to numerous people who commented on the last article, it was nice to see so many agree. One of our hardworking and respected local community members (salvo's, all sorts of things) Melanie, also made a great point that is fundamental to safer roads which I hadn't touched on directly - using mobile phones and other devices while driving. How right she is, we've all done it, and we all know that any distraction, even mucking around with a radio or CD means you can be off the road or in a head on collision as she pointed out. Perhaps deserves more serious fines for repeat offenders too...

















































Murder, Bushrangers, Poverty and Endurance William Henry Fitzgerald (1826-1909)

In my previous article, I shared the story of Thomas Fitzgerald (1775-1824). William Fitzgerald was Thomas' grandson.

William Fitzgerald was only a few months old when his father Henry drowned. He and his mother and sister then lived with Thomas Fitzgerald's widow Mary (his second wife) for a time in Goulburn Street, Hobart Town.

In 1828, when William was two years old, his mother remarried. By the time William was twelve, he was working as a farm hand and making his own way in life. He began share farming in the Green Ponds area when he was in his early twenties. Possibly because of his father's early death and the resulting financial hardship and family upheaval, William went through life as an illiterate man.

On 1 September 1847, William was a key witness at a murder trial in the Hobart Supreme Court. He was described in the Cornwall Chronicle (8 September) as 'a stout young man, who gave his evidence at great length and with much propriety'. At the time of the murder, he was working as a sawyer at Quoin Tier, about 3 miles from Green Ponds. He lived and worked with the murder victim, George Lowe.

According to the newspaper report, William and George went to Constitution Hill to visit William's mother, Harriet Fitzgerald, nee Downie, on Saturday 28 August. After staying the night, George went back to their hut. William stayed an extra day with his mother and returned home on Monday, arriving soon after daylight. When William arrived at the hut, which had been secured when they left, he found that it had been ransacked. There was no sign of George.

William immediately went to Green Ponds and reported the incident to the police. Several weeks later, William was called to Brighton to identify some stolen property found in a hut belonging to John Tomkins. Charles Benwell, who had been

wanted for cattle-stealing since December the previous year, had often taken shelter there, often in the company of a young man of sixteen named Thomas Wing.

Benwell and Wing had been living in the bush to enable them to steal cattle and evade the police. Their hut, really not much more than a cave, was in an almost inaccessible area, with dense scrub making it very difficult to find.

The two men were finally run to ground, and after a gun shot was fired, they were arrested for cattle-stealing. It was only when the stolen property was identified by William Fitzgerald that Benwell and Wing were questioned further about the disappearance of George Lowe. In the end, it was Wing who led the police to where Lowe's body had been concealed.

The body, which was partially hidden under a pile of stones, was not uncovered until the coroner and 'empasseled' jury were brought to the site, along with William and George Lowe's brother. William and the brother both identified the body as that of George Lowe. It must have been a distressing experience, as Lowe had been dead for some weeks and was badly wounded before he died.

Eventually, after several adjournments, a verdict of wilful murder was given against both Benwell and Wing. They were committed to trial by the coroner, and taken to Hobart Town.

Wing gave further evidence at the trial which showed that Benwell was the murderer, although Wing had certainly been involved in stealing the items which incriminated both him and Benwell, and in the deprivation of liberty of Lowe. Wing, however, was acquitted, and was admonished to change his lifestyle and the

company he was keeping if he did not want to come to an untimely end. He was released to the care and supervision of his father and friends, who were understood to be responsible people. Wing promised to take the advice given to him.

Four years later, William went to seek his fortune along with many other hopefuls in the Victorian goldfields. In 7 months he had saved a small fortune (a total of 700 pounds), and decided to return home to buy land.

As bushrangers were a very real threat (and especially in the light of his previous experience), William took the precaution of storing his gold in a hollow he had made in his belt. This was just as well, as he had a close encounter with 2 fugitives from the law during his first night. He pretended to be down on his luck, and said he was on the way to the diggings to look for gold, as he had no money and no food. The ruse worked, and they left him alone. Shortly afterwards, 2 troopers came along and questioned him. They were in pursuit of the men, they said, in confirmation of William's description of them.

William bought a property at Constitution Hill, and in 1852 married Harriet Gunyon. Six of their 7 children were born during their time there.

Unfortunately, William and Harriet had financial difficulties in 1861, and a meeting of creditors was called at the Court of Requests, Hobart Town in July. There was also an application for discharge, so it seems possible that the case was brought over a disputed debt.

Whatever the outcome, the family left their home of 17 years to trek across country to an uncharted area called Goulds Country, where there were no facilities and much hardship. A new agricultural settlement was proposed but the area was still completely virgin bush. Harriet's brother James Gunyon accompanied the family, as well as William's nephew John Lee (son of his sister Mary Ann). The only means of travel was by horse, bullock or on foot. Everything had to be carried through dense untrodden scrub, and because there was no fodder, livestock was reduced to a minimum.

The Fitzgerald extended family made their selection about a mile from the Groom River crossing. Their first 'homes' were calico tents, but even these could not be put up until enough space had been cleared for them. After that, bark huts were built, but more substantial split-timber homes would not be erected until enough land was tilled for

food, which was their most pressing need.

It was often difficult to get provisions other than what they could grow or raise themselves. As a result, sometimes the early settlers at surrounding Country and Goulds experienced near famine conditions. It was later recorded that brown bread would be made from the pollard and bran meant for the pigs during

these hard times. Roads were bad, transport scarce and the men were fully occupied clearing land, sowing seed and building shelter for family and livestock. So the women would tramp to market at St. Helens, which was a full day's walk down and another full day's walk back, heavily laden with goods.

As he became more advanced in years, William found farming too physically demanding and opened a butcher's shop in partnership with Richard Apted. This was not successful.

He retained his property at Goulds Country until quite late in his life. He then secured a property on the George River, leaving his son George to occupy the old homestead, which was later ceded to daughter Emma before William moved to Zeehan to live with his son James until his death in 1909.

Ingredients


- □ 2 teaspoons of dry yeast
- ☐ 1 teaspoon sugar
- □ 1/2 teaspoon salt
- ☐ 2 cups plain flour
- ☐ 2 tablespoons olive oil

Method

- 1. Step 1: Combine 3/4 cup warm water, yeast, sugar and salt in a jug. Whisk with a fork to dissolve. Cover with plastic wrap. Set aside in a warm place for 5 minutes or until bubbles appear on the surface.
- 2. Step 2: Add flour into a bowl. Add yeast mixture and oil. Mix to form soft dough. Turn onto a lightly floured surface. Knead for 10 minutes or until elastic. Place in a lightly greased bowl. Cover with plastic wrap. Stand in a warm place for 25 to 30 minutes or until dough has doubled in size.
- 3. Step 3: Use your fist to punch dough down. Knead on a lightly floured surface until smooth.
