They survive by a hand to mouth existence and rely on street cunning and theft to eat and clothe themselves. I personally feel very saddened to think many homeless are ex-veterans whose post war traumatic conditions have led them to survive like this, not to forget the many psychiatric patients who now fall through the cracks and are left to their own devices to wander aimlessly and are often forgotten. This situation has been going on for years.

I plead with the members of the Refugee Welcome Committee to extend their charity and their homes to provide shelter, food and lodgings not only to our international refugees but to give thought to the above mentioned. Since they have in train an organisation that consists of councillors, citizens, and an Eco Lodge operator as their media liaison officer, offers of help to this forgotten group mentioned could be up and running in a matter of days to provide home stays.

Dear Editor

Many Australians must have been astonished as they watched the ABC's "Foreign Correspondent" report on Tuesday 14th October: footage showing crews from the Italian Navy lifting children smilingly from rafts, welcoming refugee families from war-torn Syria and Africa as they helped them from patchy craft to ships dedicated to their rescue. Two hundred would come off one boat, three hundred from another, sometimes more than a thousand refugees picked up in one voyage. On reaching the shore base in Italy, the refugees were given food, shelter, health checks; and, just as surprisingly, after an interview to establish their identity and circumstances, many were released, within 24 hours, into the community where they set off to try to start a new life. They were overwhelmed with relief to escape danger and sometimes certain death, to be treated with respect and compassion. Their "saviours" spoke of the satisfaction of helping people in dire need, of making such a huge difference in the lives of so many...

So why is it that we in Australia, the "Lucky Country", so beautiful, so wealthy, so secure a country: why is it that we are so reluctant to hold out a helping hand to others in need? How have we allowed our natural emotions of love and compassion to be subverted by fear and intolerance? If we take the easy way out and lay the blame on our leaders, then we should have the grace to admit that we elected those leaders into office, they simply do as they suspect we demand, so that we'll put them in again next election. It is we who must take responsibility, we who must demand another response from Australia towards those who seek refuge from us, a different response than the "dog-in-the-manger" case we've mounted thus far.

We owe it to our fellow humans on this globe; we owe it to ourselves, so that we can live with ourselves with some sort of self-respect; we owe it to our children and grand children, who will be forced to live in a fearful war-weary world if we don't come up with genuine solutions. The world's population is forecast to rise from 7 billion to 9 billion by 2050: the problem will get larger, not smaller, as the century stumbles along. Present policies only just keep the lid on a seething pot; if we don't want to live lives of fear, and partake endlessly in institutionalised cruelty, we have to take the risk of thinking much more broadly and compassionately than we do at present.

Sadly, at the end of the "Foreign Correspondent" report, we were told that Italy's remarkable mission might soon be curtailed, partly because of opposition from a part of the community, but largely because Italy is teetering on economic collapse.

Now why don't we try to take over in some way, down here in the "Lucky Country"?...

TasNetworks helping to prevent bushfires

With bushfire season fast approaching, TasNetworks is reminding people that trees growing too close to powerlines are a safety risk, with the potential to cause fires, cut electricity supply and potentially leave wires on the ground.

Bushfire Mitigation Manager, Michael Emmett, said that while our vegetation management program is successful in helping prevent highly dangerous situations, we also rely on public information to assist in identifying vegetation posing a risk.

"Bushfires can cost lives, hurt communities and cause millions of dollars of damage to electrical infrastructure and private property. They also have a severe impact on the reliability of power supply to customers," Mr Emmett said.

"It's everyone's responsibility to be safe around electricity, so it's important that home owners and occupiers ensure trees on their property are well clear of distribution powerlines all year round.


"If customers see trees or vegetation that are too close, or if there's a risk of branches falling on powerlines, please contact TasNetworks on 132 004," Mr Emmett said.





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
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Pesticide monitoring in Tasmanian waterways cancelled

Confirmation of the cessation of any routine pesticide monitoring in any waterways in Tasmania (including all drinking and ground waters) was given by DPIPWE this week (Stuart Bowman). The announcement coincided with substantial funding cuts in the recent State budget.

With regard to pesticide monitoring in waterways, Tasmania now reverts to where it was in 2004 prior to the helicopter crash in the upper catchment of the George River, where the highly hazardous insecticide alpha-cypermethrin was being aerial-sprayed onto eucalypt plantations. Shortly after and following a very heavy rainfall, 90% of intertidal oysters, along with other insects and aquatic life, died in Georges Bay.

At that time Tasmania undertook no pesticide monitoring of any waters.

Forestry Tasmania is about to increase its plantation workings and has just applied to the Forest Stewardship Certification (FSC) body for permission (a derogation) to aerially spray alpha-cypermethrin in eucalypt plantations. FSC does not 'normally' allow alpha-cypermethrin to be used as it is a highly hazardous pesticide.

Meanwhile, drinking water in Tasmania undertakes no pesticide monitoring, despite nearly all Tasmanian water catchments being multi-use catchments including agriculture and agroforestry.

Background to Water Quality in Tasmania In July 2004 Dr Marcus Scammell PhD and Dr Alison Bleaney MD submitted a report on behalf of the Tasmanian Seafood Industry Council. The specific findings were:

'The aerial spraying (using helicopters) of plantation timbers appears to be responsible for large-scale losses of commercial oysters, following heavy rainfall events. The normal environmental protection methods do not appear to be in place and no policing of the State's own Forestry Code of Practice appears to be occurring. More disturbingly, the problems associated with oysters also correlate with tumours and mortality in Tasmanian Devils. Further there appears to be a risk to human health as contamination of local drinking water supplies is also possible.' Ref 19

Kraggerud: 6 Postludes from "Equinox" for violin and orchestra



Well, I did not personally attend the Rock and Rodz gig; however, feedback from members who are fond of their cars etc. said it was well worth their while attending.

I would just like to clarify a few issues that have been put forward regarding "Meet the Candidates". All mandatory questions asked on the night were from each candidate's policy statements that were either from their pamphlets, statements made in the Valley Voice or the Electoral Commission website which gave a synopsis of their core values. The questions were devised by a committee and feedback from members of the public. The final vetting of the questions was given to Gerald Aulich, (whom I believe did a stupendous job as chairperson) for his objective approval. The last time the Guild organized "Meet the Candidates" it was put forward that it appeared a little unfair that the intending Mayor and Deputy Mayor were given preference to begin first. Invitations were given out to each candidate well before the date with all the rules of engagement, with our number to contact us if they needed to clarify any of the rules. These rules were reiterated at the beginning of the forum as well.

I hope that this has dispelled some of the incorrect information that has been disseminated. Finally, I think all the candidates performed exceptionally well and wish all of them the best of luck.

The Tasmanian schoolboy who earned the title of Australia's fastest kid last month has broken his own national record.

Last month, Jack Hale smashed the national under 18 record for the 100 metres with a time of 10.44 seconds.

At the Tasmanian independent schools athletics carnival in Hobart on Saturday, the 16-year-old sliced 0.02sec off that time. He also holds the Tasmanian men's open 100 metres record. He was not able to cement his achievement in his favourite event, the long jump, because of a heel injury.

Earlier this month he launched himself into the record books with a leap of 7.66 metres. The jump not only broke the national record for the event, it is also believed to be the best result for a 16-year-old in the world.

Last week I was in the newsagency when a person I really like and respect challenged me as to why I didn't attend the Meet the Candidates night the previous Saturday. I was totally surprised by this, particularly



as it was meant in the context of Cagerattler (given an additional comment made which implied that to me and the other person present).

I have utmost respect for that person who runs a unique business in our town which many enjoy and I believe I have mentioned the business on at least a couple of occasions when touching on other linked matters. However the talents of this person are well known and I apologise if the person thinks I haven't given the wonderful business more of a mention.

What I won't apologise for is attending a meeting as if I might make comment in the Valley Voice on the candidates. I would never impose my views on anyone in that regard. Local government is a very personal thing, not compulsory (yet) as is State and Federal politics and besides, the day Councillors become politicians will be a very, very sad day for me.

THEY ARE NOT ACTUAL POLITICIANS, thank God, but some candidates running television adverts (thankfully not here just yet) campaign as if they were, really upsets me. I'll say this again too... politicians and political parties in particular should keep their noses totally out of local government; it has to be completely independent, on the face of it at least, of party political agendas. I'll argue with anyone on that.

It would make a lot more sense to have Councillors having a REAL SAY as fellow ratepayers themselves and not being hog-tied by so many autocratic and imposed regulatory requirements from State Government Acts ... straightforward, uniform, sensible rules and regulations only please, that need to be dealt with. It also seems that with the plethora of Council officers going around wielding big sticks in ALL Councils these days ... actual Councillors are essentially more just a rubber stamp at the end of it all.

So to my critic from the other day ... I hope you take that on board and my opinion on who is being voted for at Council level will never ever be evident in this column. Council decisions, however, may at some stage get a mention from a ratepayer's perspective.

To Council though I will make a respectful request given a letter I received a bit over a week ago. As a matter of course can the relevant Council Officer please send out a General Notice with the fire season approaching as to the requirements of vegetation control as land owners, rate-payers and residents. The letter I received didn't give any specifics of what is required to meet regulations so to say it was ambiguous in this regard would be a fair comment. If each household was to receive a general notice along these lines each year, surely this would be a worthwhile exercise and take the guesswork out of this topic.

Can someone at Council please consider this request?



Record Hydro profit shows benefits of carbon price, RET for Tasmania

Hydro Tasmania's record profit announcement today highlights what a fantastic boost the carbon price and



Renewable Energy Target (RET) have been for Tasmania, Australian Greens Leader Christine Milne said.

"Hydro Tasmania has made a record profit thanks to the carbon price and RET, but the Abbott government has deliberately destroyed future profit potential," Senator Milne said. "A profitable Hydro Tasmania has the potential to inject millions into the state budget. Its record \$750m to the Government over the past five years is critical to the state budget and the jobs of teachers, nurses and the public service. Tasmania has already suffered a blow from the carbon price abolition and now Hydro Tasmania is warning that uncertainty about the future of the RET is jeopardising future returns to the state. The financial disaster that the Abbott government has delivered to Tasmania by abolishing the carbon price will hit hard in the 2014-15 financial year and that's why public service jobs are being axed. Renewable energy is one of Tasmania's economic strengths, the Abbott government needs to end the RET uncertainty once and for all by keeping the 41,000gwh to 2020 target if it's serious about being open for business."

Hydro Tasmania has today (October 16th) reported a record profit of \$242m with \$117m being returned directly to Tasmanians as a dividend.

Hydro Tasmania has posted a record \$242m profit but is warning it could be the last year of big profits

The renewable energy generator said the Federal Government's scrapping of the carbon tax would cut into profits. Last year, the state-owned company said it posted its biggest ever pre-tax operating profit but its annual report revealed a before-tax loss of \$250m. But the company stressed the overall result did not amount to a cash loss.

This year, after taking into account asset write-downs and the debt associated with the Tamar Valley Power Station, the business has recorded a \$183m before-tax profit.

The business is forecasting profits will drop below \$20m next year but hopes it can return to pre-carbon tax levels of \$70 to \$100m in five years.

Hydro CEO Steve Davy also revealed the company would have to import more power than it exported this summer for the first time since drought. The business ramped up its generation during the last 12 months to capitalise on the last year of the price on carbon, reducing dam storage levels to 30%.

Meanwhile, the Government has appointed Grant Every-Burns as the new chairman. Mr Every-Burns has been a director for two years.

Hydro's out-going chairman David Crean resigned in July after the Government said it wanted "renewal" at the company.

The fire consumed 120 hectares, damaged two houses and destroyed several out-buildings and sheds. Fortunately no one was injured and all pets have been accounted for.



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

The Refugee Welcome Zone Declaration and the Break O'Day Welcome and Support Group - two separate and different initiatives

(1) Refugee Welcome Zones - the Declaration signed by Local Government explained. The Refugee Welcome Zone Declaration recently signed by Mayor Sarah Schmerl on behalf of the Break O'Day Council does not confer any formal obligations or costs on Council. Refugee Welcome Zones are not required to uphold any statutory responsibilities or financial commitments. The signing of the Declaration is a simply a way of demonstrating support for the principles it contains. Any actions or activities undertaken by Refugee Welcome Zones to implement the Declaration are voluntary.

A Refugee Welcome Zone is a Local Government Area which has made a commitment in spirit to welcoming refugees into the community, upholding the human rights of refugees, demonstrating compassion for refugees and enhancing cultural and religious diversity in the community.

This public commitment is also an acknowledgment of the tremendous contributions refugees have made to Australian society in the fields of medicine, science, engineering, sport, education and the arts. By making this Declaration it is hoped that local government will be encouraged in their continuing efforts to support the men, women and children who make the difficult journey to Australia to seek our protection.

The Refugee Welcome Zone initiative began in June 2002 as part of Refugee Week celebrations, when 15 councils and shires in Victoria, New South Wales and South Australia were declared Refugee Welcome Zones. At the time of writing there are 109 Refugee Welcome Zones throughout Australia, seven of them in Tasmania: Break O'Day Council, Clarence City Council, Derwent Valley Council, Hobart City Council, La Trobe Council, Launceston City Council and West Tamar Council. More information can be found on the Refugee Council of Australia website - http://www.refugeecouncil.org.au

(2) The Break O'Day Welcome and Support Group. A number of private individuals and families formed the Break O'Day Welcome and Support Group after the adoption and signing of the Refugee Welcome Zone Declaration by Break O'Day Council. The Welcome group is an entirely separate initiative being undertaken by families in the area who wish to give freely of their time and homes, with no obligations being placed on council at all. The idea is to provide recently settled refugees with a holiday in a welcoming rural location. This gives recently settled refugees an opportunity to experience a country holiday with an Australian family, in their home, and at the expense of the host family.

There is no obligation for anyone to be involved in this group, but everyone is welcome to attend the monthly meetings, talk with the members and ask any questions they may have about the group and how it will operate. There are already families in this area who have hosted refugees from an earlier wave of arrivals into Australia and who found this to be a positive experience.

The group has made contact with Migrant Resource Centres and other home stay programs throughout rural Australia. We are educating ourselves as a group, and the group is aligned with the Rural Australians for Refugees (RAR) movement so that we can use the existing knowledge of communities who have been offering holidays such as this for some time.

Our next meeting will be held at the St Marys Holy Trinity Anglican Church Hall on November 5th at 3pm.

What is a People Pole????

And who do you think should be in our new streetscape on our first 8 Poles?

Pioneered by the Geelong City Council to reinvigorate a tired looking waterfront, and using the exciting and visionary talents of a local artist, 100 timber poles depicting local identities and using historical references were created over several years and put up in groups and along Eastern Beach, Geelong.

These poles are similar to a telegraph pole, but fatter, standing about two meters tall, lightly shaped then painted in strong colours in a semi portrait style and clustered in related historical groupings.

So for instance, in St Marys one such grouping could be to do with mining, another with

forestry, another could relate to our sporting facilities showing a golfer, a bowler and a footballer in older style clothing. Another group could be to do with the convicts who pushed through the Passes. The possibilities are endless, and the Committee is asking for your suggestions ... is there anyone you would especially like to see depicted on a Pole whose history is of particular interest - especially the place closest to your heart.

St Marys "People Pole" project is to be incorporated into the new streetscape plan, and we are presently waiting to hear if several funding applications for the People Poles have been successful. 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

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Book Review

This month the Mount Elephant and Beyond Book Group read *Just Me* by British actress Sheila Hancock. It is the sequel *The Two of Us*, a memoir of her life with her late husband, actor John Thaw.

Just Me was written after John Thaw's death from oesophageal cancer and follows Sheila as she learns to cope with her grief. At the beginning of the book it is three years since John's death and she feels she should be coping better, not just playing the part of the brave widow but 'pulling herself together' and getting on with it.

When one of her daughters forgets her birthday, Sheila realises that her children have other preoccupations and their own lives to lead. She admits that she is not the archetypal mother nor does she want 'storybook' daughters who will care for an aging mother. She realises that she cannot lean on her family: 'Breaking free of the supposed duties of a mother/daughter relationship, we moved on to something more relaxed and enjoyable.'

Sheila often feels lonely and bereft and applies herself to 'displacement activities', principally work and travel. Her

success on the stage in *The Anniversary* gives her self-respect and confidence but she realises that busyness isn't necessarily the answer. 'Hovering on the edge of my consciousness was another Quaker quote, one I had chosen to ignore: "Attend to what love requires of you which may not be great busyness"'.

While pondering advice to take a holiday, Sheila is presented with an opportunity when the *Daily Mail* asks her to write a travel article. She decides to write about travelling on her own and chooses as her destination Apulia in Italy.

Her experiences – expensive single supplements at hotels and the worst table in restaurants - may strike a chord with anyone, especially a woman, who has travelled on her own. She develops subterfuges to counter curious looks in the restaurant, variously pretending to be waiting for someone or writing amusing notes. She joins a cooking class at her hotel only to find that she is the sole participant but at least it results in her getting better service in the restaurant.

Sheila admits that she is cantankerous, moody and unreliable, and sometimes difficult to be with. She has always been bad at being in a group and is opinionated and argumentative — a group she travels with in Hungary becomes really fed up with her for questioning the tour guide's inaccuracies and trying to make jokes. She decides group tours are not for her and decides to explore on her own:

I need a particular type of mate for travelling. They have to like wandering off down back alleys ... Ready to trudge around looking for cafes that have only locals in, so that we can have an authentic, if sometimes foul meal. They have to emote without inhibition at glorious sights and dismiss as overrated rubbish some of the objects lauded by the cognoscenti.

Just Me also includes an account of her experiences on the television series Who do you think you are and her consequent travels in Hungary and Germany in search of her family history. She is disconcerted by her family's German connections. As a child growing up in Britain during World War II, she came to hate everything Germany stood for. Now she ponders whether she is in fact racist. Then she discovers Berlin and 'This city that I blamed for causing a blight on my childhood had enlightened my old age.'

As Sheila learns to cope, her attitude to the home she shared with John in Saignon in France changes. At first it serves only to remind Sheila of her loss. The house is full of ghosts – of John and all her other friends who have passed away. She feels that she is becoming obsessed with death and that it is time she moved on. And she recognises that it is down to her; "The decision to sink or swim is yours'.

She thinks that house with all its memories can only hold her back and she decides to sell it. But in a letter that she receives in response to her first book, the writer reminds Sheila that there is nothing wrong with weeping and that memories bring joy as well as sadness.

When Sheila goes to France to meet a prospector buyer for the house in Saignon, she finds the house 'bursting with life' as all her children and grandchildren are holidaying there. This and the experience of her travels seem to have changed her perspective and some new neighbours encourage her to think of making the house less rustic and more comfortable. After all how can she leave this house, the house that John loved, the house that is filled with so many happy memories?

Just Me is really about Sheila's journey through the process of bereavement and grief and as such fulfils its promise but in other ways the book is disappointing. The reader is likely to find the stories about her sister Billie, who toured Africa with ENSA as a sixteen-year-old entertaining the troops during World War II, more interesting than Sheila's account of her own life. And the record of her travels in Hungary and Germany is drawn out and becomes mere padding. However, Sheila Hancock writes with occasional flashes of humour and the book is not a challenging read.
