

Re: Closure of Online Access Centres in St Marys and Fingal

The staff and Management Committee of the Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House are very concerned about reports that the Online Access Centres in St Marys and Fingal are under threat of closure in December 2015.

There are many in our regional, rural and isolated towns who cannot access the internet any other way except via the Online Centres.

Many others cannot afford the expense of putting the phone line on, or the satellite dish installed to access the internet – particularly if they are renting, or like many in our catchment area, on Centrelink benefits or on low incomes – afford the high costs of connection.

How are these people going to be able to respond to job offers?

How are these people going to increase their opportunities to gain work without the assistance given by local training?

If anything, the Online Access Centres in Fingal and St Marys need an increase in funding to extend the coordinator's hours – not be faced with imminent closure. If the closures go ahead, there will be very limited community access to computers from the coast to Campbell Town for anyone either living in the area, or travelling

This will increase the isolation of all the small towns – it is hard enough now.

One more thing to consider are all the "blackspots" in the Fingal Valley – mobile phones simply do not work in several of the small towns, so there is not the capability of utilising the new Iphones to access the internet.

The Online Access Centres are vital pieces of infrastructure that need to remain in place.

Shutting online access centres would hurt regional communities October 15, 2015

Labor is concerned for the future of up to 21 online access centres that have been put under a cloud by the Liberal Government.

Shadow Education Minister Michelle O'Byrne said reports that centres are being told to fend for themselves or prepare to close their doors are very concerning. "Online Access Centres play a vital role across the state,

helping Tasmanians stay connected with each other and providing valuable day-to-day support," Ms O'Byrne said. "The main issue is that without funding centres won't be able to offer the one on one service they currently do.

"They won't be able to purchase and install the software they need. They won't be able to purchase equipment and replace computers as they become outdated.

"Internet connectivity in regional Tasmania is low and the Government needs to acknowledge that not only do people not have connection to the internet, they often don't have a computer.

"Some people aren't familiar with computers and the Internet and rely on community centres for support and coaching.

"Labor offices are being regularly contacted by people associated with Online Access Centres who are concerned about the future.

"During the Estimates process the Minister seemed surprised that Centres felt threatened, and could not recall his correspondence to stakeholders about their uncertain future. We now know that 21 of Tasmania's 35 LINC centres are 'under review'.

"Minister Jeremy Rockliff needs to come clean with communities about what changes will be made to services at Online Access Centres.

"Labor does not agree with the Government when it says increased connectivity at home has decreased the need for community centres.

"For many people in our community, these centres are their only access to vital online services."

CALLING FOR TOURISM OPERATORS

FEDERAL Lyons MP Eric Hutchinson is calling on those involved in the tourist industry in Lyons to share their future plans with him.

The feedback will be part of an audit of tourism infrastructure in the Lyons electorate that Mr Hutchinson will conduct over the next couple of months. The information will be handed to the appropriate government departments such as the Department of Foreign Affairs, so that the material can be used by federal department officers when talking to potential international and national investors, or making decisions about possible funding. Mr Hutchinson welcomed the appointment of Tasmanian Senator Richard Colbeck as the new Federal Tourism Minister.

"It's an ideal time for Tasmania with the appointment of a new federal tourism minister, to take stock of what is going on in Lyons and start planning for future opportunities," Mr Hutchinson said.

Mr Hutchinson said that Senator Colbeck's appointment was good news for Tasmania at a time when there was huge potential for growth in the sector.

He said that the State's tourism industry had always punched above its weight and it was important to maintain that momentum.

"We have many of the most iconic places for visitors in Lyons like Maria Island, Mt Field National Park, Cradle Mountain and Port Arthur," he said.

Mr Hutchinson is calling on operators in Lyons to contribute to his tourism audit to build a plan for tourism expansion in the state which fits with the Federal Government's Tourism 2020 Strategy aimed at achieving Australia's tourism potential.

"I'm looking for a diverse range of information from roads to rest stops to multi lingual signage to accommodation and food," he said.

He also hopes for local government input to the audit. "We would also be encouraging local government to authorise within state planning guidelines the land in their municipalities that would be suitable for tourism infrastructure," Mr Hutchinson said. "We are looking for an audit of the gaps that exist in the tourism sector that both levels of government might put money into. It might be viewing platforms like the whale watching platforms on the East Coast that received federal funding last month or signage for dangerous corners for visiting motorists up to the major tourism investments proposed across Lyons." Tourism is one of five national investment priorities for the Federal Government with national tourism investment of nearly \$54b in the pipeline. Senator Colbeck said that last year tourism contributed more than \$1b, or 4% of Tasmania's economy, 15,000 direct jobs and 22,400 indirect jobs in Tasmania.

The future looks bright for the tourism sector in Tasmania with international visitors up 22% in 2014-15 to 198,000 including domestic overnight trips up 10.9% to 2.3 million.

China is Tasmania's biggest international market, up 38% to 28,000 visitors last financial year, ahead of the UK on 25,000 visitors and the US on 24,000.

Swift Parrot's Critically Endangered Listing Demands Urgent Action October 30, 2015

The IUCN's decision to list the Swift parrot as critically endangered should prompt urgent action from the Federal Government.

Greens Senator for Tasmania Nick McKim said the loss of the Swift parrot would be an ecological disaster for Australia. "The Swiftie is trending towards extinction, and the Red List upgrade means the warning bells are sounding loudly, but this is a problem we can fix if we have the political will," Senator McKim said.

"The Tasmanian and Commonwealth Governments need to start treating this issue with the seriousness it deserves, and the first step should be to get the logging industry out of its habitat."

Australian Greens forests spokesperson Senator Janet Rice said there were clear steps the Government could take to help save the Swift parrot.

"The only way to protect Swift parrots and other threatened animals and birds is to protect their habitat," Senator Rice said.

"Regional Forest Agreements have fundamentally failed to protect threatened animals.

"Rolling over Regional Forest Agreements will only push swift parrot closer to brink of extinction.

"The destructive era of RFAs must now come to an end."


Tasmania's Swift parrot in danger of extinction, calls to list the bird as critically endangered

Researchers have found Tasmania's Swift parrot population is declining more rapidly than first thought and the species is "on a trajectory to extinction". The five-year study by a team at the Australian National University found the parrots were heavily preyed upon by sugar gliders and recommended breeding areas be protected from logging.

Researcher Dejan Stojanovic said the research found if nothing changed, the bird's population would decline by as much as 87%.

"This research clearly shows that the conservation status of the Swift parrot is significantly worse than previously supposed, and based on current land management practices, things are not going to get any better," he said. "We've found that current land management practices that reduce the cover of mature forest in the landscape around swift parrot nests makes breeding swift parrots extremely vulnerable to predation by sugar gliders. Irrespective of where Swift parrots nest on mainland Tasmania, the threat of being eaten by sugar gliders is real and is driving the species on an extinction spiral." Scientists estimate the bird could be extinct within 16 years.

Continued from p5 "Based on current data, the best information available says that swift parrots are on trajectory to extinction," Dr Stojanovic said.

Questions about Tasmania's forest management and its impact on the Swift parrot have been raised this week. Conservationists released Right to Information documents showing logging had been approved in parrot breeding areas, against scientific advice. Australian Greens leader Christine Milne said the revelations could damage environmental ap-

provals being sought from the Forest Stewardship Council (FSC).

"The fact that the Government overrode its own scientific advice to allow the coupes to be logged knowing that this species is on the brink of extinction is absolutely the end of Forestry Tasmania's bid for FSC certification," she said.

Dr Eric Woehler from BirdLife Tasmania called for all logging in Swift parrot breeding areas to be suspended.

"Do we really want to see another species go the way of the Tasmanian Tiger?" he said.

"We can't afford to be careless with this species and we could so easily lose the species to extinction."

He said the parrots' listing needed to be strengthened immediately.

"The Federal Government currently recognises the Swift parrot as being endangered, it clearly needs to be up-listed to critically endangered, and a complete reassessment of the management of the species is required," he said.

A nomination has been submitted to the Federal Government for the parrot to be urgently listed as critically endangered.

Forestry Tasmania said it took its responsibilities with protecting endangered species seriously and remained committed to achieving FSC.

Tasmania's Environment Minister, Matthew Groom, said the new population research would be reviewed. In a statement, Mr Groom said his department had worked with Forestry Tasmania to ensure protection of Swift parrot foraging and nesting sites.




Cut a lemon in half, sprinkle with non - iodised salt and scrub over the rust stain. Wipe with a damp cloth. Repeat if necessary.





Belinda Weyer and Vicki Hyland organised a fundraiser for the Leukaemia Foundation recently at the St Marys Historic Hotel.


After a great turn up last year Halloween was put to good use again by collecting \$84 for Leukaemia Foundation.

32 facts you probably didn't know about Tasmania

- 1. Australia's first novel, Quintus Servinton by Henry Savery, was published in Hobart in 1831.
- 2. Hobart's Wrest Point Casino was the first legal casino to be opened in Australia.
- 3. The Tasmanian Motorcycle Club is believed to be the second oldest continuously run motorcycle club in the British Commonwealth. It was formed in 1905 and was the first such club in Australia.
- 4. The world's first Green party formed in Tasmania in 1972. The United Tasmania Group evolved to become the Tasmanian Greens.
- 5. Launceston introduced the first underground sewage system in Australia in 1860. Launceston was only the third city in the world to be serviced by underground sewers.
- 6. Hobart was the first Australian city to introduce parking meters.
- 7. The Tasmanian Tiger was Australia's largest surviving carnivorous marsupial. The last documented Tasmanian Tiger died in captivity in 1936. Considered to be extinct, unsubstantiated sightings persist.
- 8. What we know today as a notepad was invented by Launceston man J. A. Birchall. Until Mr Birchall took a piece of cardboard and glued the ends of the paper together in 1902, pieces of paper simply wafted around offices.
- 9. Hobart is the second-driest capital city in Australia. Hobart receives about half as much rain (per year) as Sydney.
- 10. Hobart was the first Australian capital city to have an electric tramway. A private company started the tramway operations in 1893.
- 11. 1997 saw Tasmania become the first Australian state to formally apologise to the Aboriginal community for past actions connected with the 'stolen generation'.
- 12. The Latin motto on the Coat of Arms of Tasmania is "Ubertas et Fidelitas". It translates as "Fruitfulness and Faithfulness."
- 13. More than 42% of Tasmania is World Heritage Area, national park and marine or forest reserves.
- 14. Beaconsfield in Tasmania's north-east was the first Australian centre to get fluoridated water in 1953.
- 15. The first known exhibition of paintings in Australia was opened in Hobart by artist John Skinner Prout in 1845.
- 16. St David's Park was once the main cemetery in Hobart from 1804 to 1872. After control was transferred to Hobart City Council in 1920, most of the remains were re-interred at Cornelian Bay Cemetery and walls were made using the surviving headstones. It was opened to the public as a park in 1926.
- 17. Tasmania is similar in size to the Republic of Ireland or Sri Lanka.
- 18. Australia's oldest brewery still in operation is the Cascade Brewery in Hobart.
- 19. Ratho Golf Links at Bothwell is believed to be the oldest golf course in Australia. It is also one of the oldest surviving golf courses outside of Scotland.
- 20. Tasmania was the first Australian colony to have a compulsory state education system in 1868. It was administered by local school boards.
- 21. Tasmania's lower house became the first chamber of an Australian parliament to pass a bill to legalise same-sex marriage. It was later voted down in Tasmania's Legislative Council by eight votes to six.
- 22. Tasmania was the last state in Australia to decriminalise homosexuality. Until 1997, the punishment for homosexuality was jail for up to 25 years.
- 23. 300 female convicts decided to moon the Governor of Tasmania during a chapel service in 1832.
- 24. Hobart is home to Australia's oldest Synagogue. The Hobart Synagogue was consecrated in 1845.
- 25. Mount Ossa is the highest mountain in Tasmania. It lies in the heart of Cradle Mountain-Lake St Clair National Park and measures 1,617 metres in height.
- 26. The first secular register of births, deaths and marriages in the British colonies was established in Tasmania in 1838.
- 27. Tasmania was originally named Van Diemen's Land and was settled by the British as a penal colony in 1803. The name was changed to Tasmania when convict transportation stopped in 1853.
- 28. Launceston was the first city in the southern hemisphere to get electric light after the first Tasmanian hydro-electric station was opened at Duck Reach on South Esk River in 1895.
- 29. Hobart's Theatre Royal is Australia's oldest live theatre venue still in operation.
- 30. The Richmond Bridge is Australia's oldest known large stone arch bridge that is still used by traffic today.
- 31. Lomatia tasmanica, commonly known as King's holly or King's lomatia, is a self-cloning shrub discovered in Tasmania's remote south west in 1937. Fossil leaves of the plant found in the south west were dated at 43,600 years old. Given that the species is a clone, it is possibly the oldest living plant in the world.
- 32. The first time ether was used as general anaesthetic for a surgical procedure in Australia was by Launceston doctor W. R. Pugh back in 1847.
- BONUS FACT: Even though he's a Queenslander, Ben Dunk was playing for the Tasmanian Tigers when he scored the first ever double century in Australian domestic one-day cricket. Opening for the Tigers' match against the Queensland Bulls, Dunk eventually scored 229 not out in October 2014.




