

It's official: Bendigo Bank agency coming to St Helens

The successful response to the recent community survey coupled with the imminent closure of a major banking agency in St Helens has provided a valuable opportunity to the St Helens and St Marys Community Bank Steering Committee.

The first Bendigo Bank agency will be established at the end of November within the well-known Carlyle building, in downtown St Helens.

Successful and local business identities Tom and Jossie Bassett, have agreed to operate the new Bendigo Bank agency for the short term, in their store.

While the establishment of an initial presence in the Break O'Day municipality is an important achievement, it also marks the approach of the final stages required to open our first Community Bank.

The Bendigo Bank is working closely with the Steering Committee on developing the business plan and prospectus to assist with opening date scheduled for either June / July 2016.

If you have been thinking of opening a new account, transferring an old account or discussing any other personal, commercial or rural banking needs, the opening of the agency will be a fantastic opportunity to do this. Any accounts and/or business established with this agency will be credited to the St Helens and St Marys Community Bank and assist with opening the branch. This does not mean St Marys will miss out.

The initial St Marys presence will be through a weekly visit and an ATM, though Sammi Charles and her efficient team are just a short phone call away.

And we still need to get as many pledges as possible. Remember, these pledges are non-binding, though on realisation, will be converted to shares and make you a shareholder of your very own Community Bank. Pledge forms will be available in the new agency. You may have seen Roger Harlow and Chris Triebe outside Hilly's IGA in St Marys last weekend, or even stopped and chatted while sampling the tasty barbecued sausages.

Over the next month or so, they will be alternating between Hilly's St Helens and St Marys IGAs, so don't be shy, come and say hi.

Break O'Day Council's Community Funding Program 2015-2016

The Community Funding Program provides grants to communities to improve facilities/programs in their township or to improve the overall amenity of their town. All community groups that represent the ratepayers of their community are eligible to apply for funding.

Projects that will be considered for funding but not necessarily restricted to:

- Beautification projects
- Projects to improve or construct recreation facilities
- Projects that will improve the amenity of the township/community

Projects that will not be considered:

- Any projects on privately owned land or which cannot be freely accessed by all community members
- Capital Works projects (ie. Footpaths, kerb and guttering etc.)

Eligibility

- All community groups that represent the ratepayers of their township/area are eligible to apply for funding.
- Only local NOT-FOR-PROFIT community groups will be given consideration for funding assistance.
- Preference will be given to incorporated organisations with proven capacity to administer grants.

A detailed submission must be developed.

Yes Wendy, I did fund it, and I will continue to do so. Many of our first magazines have gone interstate and have been positively welcomed - warts and all.


Book I is now on order for reprint. The great cover photo was taken by Calem Jones.




Plans for proposed St Marys Arts, Culture and Heritage Precinct at St Marys Railway Station

A few years ago the Break O'Day Woodcraft Guild and Men's Shed Inc. members had a meeting with the then Mayor Sarah Schmerl and Chris Hughes to discuss a proposal to develop the old railway precinct.

It was pointed out that the proposed building was within a metre of the disabled ramp, and blocked the vehicle entrance for people with a disability. Furthermore the proposed building would be built over:

- Existing sewer line
- Existing water pipe
- Existing outlet for the small creek that runs parallel to the road

It appears that the shift in location of this proposed building STILL encounters the same problems, plus encroaches on the parking area of the Guild's parking.

The original proposal for this development was in the eastern section of the precinct where there are no such problems, and at the last on site community meeting this was the preferred area.

One can only hope that these issues will be addressed with common sense and stop the waste of ratepayers money on plans that are clearly unrealistic.

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

At our recent Annual General Meeting we reported on a very successful year of activities in 2014-15 involving more than 1700 clinical appointments, we introduced seven new innovative and original programs and continued to provide a broad range of health promotion activities.

The board is grateful to our dedicated staff and volunteers who are committed to their work in providing services to the Break O'Day region.

Finding and retaining talented board members has been a challenge in the past so we were pleased to install our new board at the AGM.



One of Labor's concerns is that there has been a lack of transparency around the Government's intention to transfer these 500 titles. The Minister has stated that it was a policy taken to the 2014 election, but the election policy only says the Liberal Party will "examine" the possible transfer; it does not place a timeframe on that and certainly does not make a firm or clear commitment.

From any reasonable person's reading of the Government's Affordable Housing Strategy and the Affordable Housing Action Plan, it would be safe to assume that the Government's intention was to enable community housing providers to have the opportunity to manage additional properties and use this to further invest in public housing stock. However, we have now learnt that this is not the Government's intention at all. What they actually meant is they intend to give away up to 500 public housing properties. There is no process detailed for how the transfer of these 500 properties will happen, and what safeguards will be put in place to ensure these homes will be maintained as affordable housing. There is no detail about what, if any, modelling exists for how the Government has identified 150 new properties can be built if the transfer of 500 titles occurs. There have been no details provided from this Minister about what, if any, work the Government has done to address the legitimate concerns raised and acknowledged by the Minister herself about the transfer of

There are too many questions that remain unanswered about this rushed process, and the Government should put the transfer on hold until the Tasmanian public has more information.


The Woodcraft Guild pays homage to Remembrance Day

Helping regional Tasmanians into work - November 10, 2015

A new work experience scheme will provide valuable assistance to Tasmanians looking to secure long-term employment. Federal Member for Lyons Eric Hutchinson said the Turnbull Liberal Government's *National Work Experience Programme* is designed to help job seekers gain experience in workplaces.

"National Work Experience is going to give job seekers an opportunity to be placed in a work-like role so they can show-case their skills to a potential employer," Mr Hutchinson said. "It's going to directly benefit young job seekers in particular, as surveys have shown that insufficient understanding of workplaces can prevent them from getting and keeping a job. The programme aims to build confidence and real-life experiences as job seekers will be given the opportunity to learn practical skills."

Mr Hutchinson said employers who go on to offer a young person paid employment after their placement may be eligible to receive a wage subsidy of up to \$6,500 over 12 months.

Eligible job seekers will be able to volunteer to undertake work experience in businesses for up to 25 hours per week for a maximum of four weeks. Importantly, they will continue to receive their income support payment while in an unpaid placement together with a supplement to assist with the costs of participation.

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


Visitors were also entertained by the Medea Park residents performance "DRUMBEAT" and the "Bros in Rhythm" Body Percussion Group from St Marys District School.

Thanks to the Wood Guild for their support in providing a free sausage sizzle.


Building Blocks and the Launch into Learning Families also attended, and children explored games and activities about emotions and identity, and shared a healthy morning tea.

The event promoted tips to help maintain mental wellbeing.

How The Stables Handmade Market was born!

It's all about linking into an existing plan for the St Marys Recreation Ground, drawn up in 2006. This was completed after community consultation, and has gradually been brought to life with full support from Break O'Day Council.

The establishment of the free short stay camping ground (with showers and toilets) has been a major plus for the town of St Marys, bringing many RV and other travelers to visit and stay, and bringing much needed income for local businesses. This has also resulted in St Marys being officially recognised as an RV-friendly town.



More recently, the refurbishment of the sports club has injected new life into the recreational scene, which has the potential to raise the level of community support for the Sports Association and the St Marys Pacing Club.

This year, a discussion was begun by a number of local artists and artisans about setting up a Makers Co-op, with a view to finding premises from which to sell handmade items. This has now morphed into a steering committee of volunteers, under the umbrella of Greater Esk Tourism. The long term plan is for the steering committee to become an independent body (as occurred with the Avoca Museum and Information Centre).

The date of the inaugural Stables Handmade Market (January 2, 2016 - to be confirmed) was suggested to take advantage of the many visitors who come to St Marys for the New Year Races, and the racing committee has also been very supportive of our new venture.

Break O'Day Council has offered to provide funding and work to install a concrete floor for 12 stalls initially, and power, which we hope will be completed in time for our inaugural market.





Churches of the Valley Part 1

Since European settlement Christianity has played an important part in the life of those who lived in the Fingal Valley. As a result we are lucky enough to have a number of important examples of early Australian ecclesiastical architecture. together with several more contemporary examples. Some of the buildings remain in use as worship spaces and others have become private homes. Unfortunately, a number no longer exist.

At this time my particular interest is on the earliest buildings, in particular those which remain in use in the 21st century, and it seems that here in the Fingal Valley Tasmania we have splendid examples of work by important architects, from both a local and national perspective.

This is an ongoing process but every journey begins with a first step, and what better place to begin than at the chronological and geographic beginning.



St Thomas's Anglican Church, Avoca

The first building spotted when entering the valley from the west is St Thomas's Anglican Church at Avoca. Consecrated in 1886, the church has been in use since 1842. It is reputed to have been designed by James Blackburn, the architect also responsible for the beautiful St Georges Church in Battery Point.



St Peter's Anglican Church, Fingal



St Joseph's Roman Catholic Church, Fingal

The next stop, Fingal, is home to St Peter's Anglican Church and St Joseph's Roman Catholic Church by Henry Hunter. The "new" Anglican Church, the one in use today, was built over two years between 1867 and 1869 from local stone and contains a number of memorials including some fine stained glass and beautiful timber carving. St Joseph's is also a Hunter building, clearly made of local stone and has been in use since 1880 after a construction pe-

riod which commenced in 1877.

Whilst beautiful in their own right, these two buildings are important examples of gothic revival architecture and demonstrate the influence of Augustus Pugin on the Archdiocese of Hobart, Bishop Willson, and subsequent church design.

A well signposted turnoff in the Main Street of Fingal leads one to the township of Mangana ... Home of "the Cathedral of the Valley", the Roman Catholic Church of The Sacred Heart ... designed by Alexander North from Launceston. Those of you familiar with Launceston may recognise his name as the architect of Holy Trinity Church and his is also the hand which produced the (now demolished) Commercial Travelers Club in Charles Street.

The information above is from The Australian Dictionary of Biographies (for more information on the architects named above search by surname) sourced online, my own copies of Brian Andrews' work on Pugin and Hunter in Creating a Gothic Paradise: Pugin at the Antipodes, and Geoffrey Stephens history of the sesquicentenary of the Anglican Diocese The Anglican Church in Tasmania.



Recently the children from JAM, their families and friends enjoyed a wonderful trip to Launceston to see Colin Buchanan in concert at the Door of Hope.


We all sang and cheered and danced and clapped and jumped and ... some of the JAM children were even invited onto the stage with Colin and his friend (puppet) "Nudge"!








The Mount Elephant and Beyond Book Group Review

The Mount Elephant and Beyond Book Group is one of LINC Tasmania's statewide network of book groups. The group currently has ten members

who come from St Marys, Bicheno, Scamander and Beaumaris. Each month we meet to talk about a title we have selected from a list provided by LINC. Books may be fiction or non-fiction, and range from thrillers to chick-lit, from travelogues to biographies and everything in between.

This month the group read an autobiographical work, *A Mother's Disgrace* by Robert Dessaix. Dessaix was born in Sydney but now lives in Tasmania. His most recent book, a memoir titled *What Days Are For*, has just been short-listed for the Margaret Scott Prize for the best book by a Tasmanian author.



A Mother's Disgrace is primarily about Dessaix's search for identity - through finding his birth mother, researching his family history and coming to terms with his sexuality. It begins with a confronting incident in Cairo, where Dessaix is mugged and the words that flash through his mind are 'What a waste' – he is going to die and doesn't even know who he is.

Dessaix was adopted as a small baby, his unmarried mother being forced to give him up for adoption. His birth in 1944 was, according to the social mores of the times, his mother's disgrace. Dessaix was brought up in a loving and supportive adoptive family, but there remained a 'shaft of silence' running through the centre of his life that represented the absence of his birth mother.

Later on, through a series of coincidences, he meets his birth mother Yvonne, and learns about the circumstances of his birth. Yvonne has no difficulty accepting the fact of Dessaix's homosexuality but she knows it will appear as yet 'another disgrace' in the eyes of her overbearing mother.

Dessaix seems to have had an extraordinary childhood – he was certainly no ordinary boy. He had a love of books and languages, and an imaginative intellect. He invented an imaginary city and a complex language for its inhabitants, complete with regional dialects. At the age of nine he decided to teach himself Russian.

Dessaix's experience as a student in the USSR in the 1960s forms one of the most interesting parts of the book. He makes the most of his opportunities to mix with

the Moscow intelligentsia, but his dealings with the Soviet bureaucracy are sometimes bizarre. Despite being in the country specifically to study contemporary Russian literature, he is informed that this is not acceptable and that he is instead to study Dostoyevsky, Dostoyevsky having been recently rehabilitated by the Soviet authorities.

Dessaix is candid about the major events of his life. The explanation of his obsession with his wife Elizabeth and his devastation when she ends the relationship prompts some enlightening discussion about the nature of love, gender and sexuality.

The book reads like a series of essays rather than a cohesive whole, and ends with a brief essay on the nature of coincidence.

A Mother's Disgrace is sometimes complex but it is also interesting and thought-provoking.

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
Post and rail fencing ...


A fence using two to four (split) rails fitted into mortises in (split) posts with the ends of adjacent rails overlapping in the mortises. Although post-and-rail fences are the most iconic of Australian rural fences, they were expensive and required some skill to build successfully. It is likely that they were less common than the simpler brush fences.




