





Stronger communities money for Lyons May 13, 2015

FEDERAL Lyons MP Eric Hutchinson has welcomed \$150,000 over two years that will flow to his electorate from the Stronger Communities Program confirmed in this week's Budget.

The \$150,000 will be provided to support community projects that deliver social benefits as part of more than \$45m over two years nation-wide. Mr Hutchinson will consult broadly with eligible organisations in Lyons to identify high-priority projects which can be submitted for funding.

"Between \$1000 and \$20,000 each will be made available to reputable, not-for-profit organisations for local projects," Mr Hutchinson said. "Grants will fund significant social benefits and can be delivered anytime within the two year life span of the program."

Mr Hutchinson said he looked forward to seeing new local projects developed to build a stronger community which would benefit the people of Lyons.



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

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LOOK GOOD, FEEL GOOD

The following is a copy of the speech given by Hannah Rubenach at the Medicinal Cannabis Rally in Hobart on May 2nd 2015

There are times in our lives when we must weigh up value with value; to toss up what we have been taught with what we have learnt; to decide what really matters to us.

For many people, the question of medicinal use of cannabis triggers an evaluation of where one's values lie. As a Christian, my fundamental evaluation measure is to ask "What will Jesus do?" Jesus, a renowned healer, demonstrated the greatest degree of compassion possible.

There are suffering people in our community who right now need, and deserve, a great deal of compassion from our government. The compassionate consideration of legalisation of medicinal cannabis could result in these people being able to live a life worth living.

Since taking cold-processed cannabis oil for the past five months my youngest brother Tim has had some of the best moments of quality of life he has ever experienced. Tim is a 28 year old man who acquired brain injury at five months of age, due to a meningitis infection; he developed severe epilepsy as a result. Tim was taking anti-convulsant medications until he was 18, when he developed a serious toxicity to all pharmaceutical anti-convulsants and was advised by GPs and a neuro-specialist to cease all prescribed medications.

In November 2014, prior to starting cannabis oil, Tim was having at least 10 severe tonic clonic seizures and thousands of complex partial seizures each week. Now, when Tim is taking good quality cold-processed cannabis oil blended with coconut oil, he can go as long as 24 days without a tonic clonic seizure, and even longer without complex partial seizures.

However, it is not just a reduction of seizures that has been achieved through cannabis oil; now on some days Tim is able to:

- Walk, without assistance
- Feed himself
- Have better body temperature regulation
- Indicate when he is in pain
- Do jigsaw puzzles, artwork or activities on his IPad to stimulate his brain and keep himself occupied
- Watch a DVD right through and, for the first time in his life, understand the story line as he is no longer having continual complex partial seizures that interrupt his life completely
- Have some control over his challenging behaviours, and at times understand the consequences of his behaviours
- Laugh at something funny
- Appreciate and enjoy life.

These are significant health and wellbeing outcomes. If Tim continues using medicinal cannabis oil, I am confident he will continue to gain considerable improvements and live a life even more worth living.

My family and I are prepared to take the risk to grow and supply cannabis for Tim, however many other vulnerable members of our community are either too afraid to do so or do not have the means to purchase or access medicinal cannabis, unless it is decriminalized. Where is the morality in this debate? Why should it be a debate about legality, when in reality, it is simply about the right to live a fulfilling, healthy and happy life?

When there is conflict between morality and the law, when morality is stifled by the law, I choose morality.

I would rather be guilty of a crime than guilty of conscience.

My brother's condition triggered an evaluation of where my values lie on medicinal cannabis, and now I ask our legislators: what will trigger an evaluation of where YOUR values lie?


RET deal means fewer jobs, less clean energy and more pollution - Greens 8th May 2015

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
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Introducing Open Studio - New to Arts Festival May 7, 2014

On another note, since footy season is going strong, our kiddies' corner features some great knitted AFL team dolls which are too cute for words.





Giggles runs for Mayor against 2 convicted felons...

Politics in Flint, Michigan, got a whole lot dirtier with the announcement that Giggles the pig has put her curly tail into the ring as candidate for mayor against two convicted felons, including one who served nearly 20 years for murder.

"If she wins, they'll have to build her a little fence outside city hall," Giggles' owner and campaign manager, Michael Ewing, told The Huffington Post. "She really enjoys grass and there's a lot of grass out there. I think she could get used to it."

Ewing, a trial attorney, said his candidate has an impressive resume for a 9-month-old and, unlike some of her opponents, has a clean criminal record.

Candidate Wantwaz Davis, who made headlines in 2013 when he was elected to city council, served 19 years in prison after he pleaded guilty to second-degree murder in 1991, according to The Flint Journal.

Eric Mays, also a city councilman running for mayor, reportedly pleaded guilty to felonious assault in 1987. In November 2013, Mays was charged with drunken driving,

possession of marijuana, failure to report an accident, refusing to give fingerprints and no proof of insurance. During his 2014 trial, a jury found Mays guilty only of a single charge -- driving while impaired. Mays was sentenced to 72 days in jail and ordered to pay the city \$10,800 in restitution.

Responsible cat ownership

Responsible cat ownership is a concept that requires some serious discussion. On the 14 April, Break O'Day Council hosted a Cat Forum at St Marys. This was the start of a conversation, with the goal of lowering the feral cat population in this part of the state. To put things in perspective, a female cat has 1-8 kittens per litter, and 2-3 litters per year. During her productive life, this ONE female cat could have more than 100 kittens. A single pair of cats and their kittens can produce as many as 420,000 kittens in just 7 years. Last year at the vet clinic received at least 30 kittens. This year roughly 20 so far, but they keep coming.

There are many perspectives and arguments as to why you should and must desex and microchip your cat at a young age.

The legal perspective

The Cat Management Act 2009 and Cat Management Regulations 2012: desexing is required where the cat is more than six months of age except where a vet certifies that the procedure will interfere with the health and welfare of the cat, or where the cat is owned by a registered breeder. Cat owners must also ensure that any cat in their care, over the age of six months is implanted with a microchip.

The environmental perspective

Feral cats (dumped kittens turn into feral cats!) have serious impacts on native wildlife. They are typically more aggressive than domestic cats, and kill vulnerable fauna.

The Human Health perspective

Toxoplasmosis is a zoonotic disease that is contagious between kittens and also to humans who come in contact with these kittens or their excrements.

My perspective = the welfare perspective

So what happens to the 420,000 kittens that we mentioned earlier on? Dumped kittens contribute to the feral cat population.

Once they turn feral, and start to live in the wild, they are subjected to a number of debilitating and fatal diseases which cause much suffering and can lead to death. Cat flu, when severe, causes upper respiratory tract problems (they cannot breathe from the congestion), can lead to blindness, and is ultimately fatal. It is not out of sight, out of mind. Kittens in boxes on the side of the road apart from being illegal, is NOT ON – it almost always equates to animal cruelty.

Remember, that until August it costs only \$50 to desex a male cat, \$90 to desex a female cat, and \$12 to microchip! Spread the word if you know anyone with cats who are not desexed / microchipped! To book in, ring North East Vet Clinic on 6321 8999 and ask for Karen.


Autumn was also a time for Follyfoot to say goodbye to our pigeons. It wasn't kind to keep them penned up these past

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
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
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Mount Elephant and Beyond Book Group May review

This month the Mount Elephant and Beyond Book Group read Fall Girl by Toni Jordan. This is the second book for the Australian author, whose first novel Addition was long listed for the Miles Franklin Award in 2009.


Fall Girl is 'chick-lit' with a twist. In the first chapter the reader meets Dr Ella Canfield, an evolutionary biologist seeking a grant of \$25,000 from the Metcalfe Trust in order to investigate sightings of the Tasmanian tiger on the Mornington Peninsula in Victoria. She has degrees from prestigious institutions and an impressive resumé. She has to convince only

an aging academic and the young, rich, and of course good-looking, Daniel Metcalfe, and she appears to know her stuff.

So far so good, but ... Ella Canfield doesn't exist. Her real name is Della Gilmore and she is one of a family of con artists who live in a tumbledown mansion complete with hidden passages, false walls and a study in the cellar. The scam is an elaborate set-up designed to part Daniel Metcalfe from his money and after all, he's a multimillionaire and he will hardly miss it. It is Della's idea and she has a lot riding on it, hoping to prove to her family that she is capable of bigger things.

'Ella Canfield's' bid is successful — Metcalfe offers her the \$25,000 but raises the possibility of \$250,000 if he can observe 'Ella' and her team in the field before making a final decision. Della is now obliged to call in several members of her family as supporting cast and the set-up becomes more and more complicated. The expedition to the Mornington Peninsula descends into farce at times particularly when the lovelorn Timothy turns up unexpectedly at the campsite.

Tony Jordan has a scientific background and this shows although it is not intrusive. The reader learns incidentally about Lazarus species for example - animals like the Leadbeater's possum that were rediscovered years after they were thought to be extinct. And although it may be difficult to imagine how the phrase 'ontogeny recapitulates phylogeny' could initiate a romantic interlude, Jordan manages it almost seamlessly.



The activities of the Gilmore family would be familiar to anyone who has watched TV series such as Hustle. Just like the TV characters, the Gilmores seem to inhabit a world of their own and live by a different moral compass. They do nothing that is vicious or violent and claim that their 'marks' are only vulnerable because of greed or because they like to feel benevolent: the secret to having people give you money is to act as though you don't want it. And this may well be true but one can only wonder what the family might have achieved if they had transferred the effort they put into their set-ups into another field of enterprise.

However, the novel takes nothing too seriously. As Toni Jordan says of her work:

I love the idea of making people smile. There aren't enough smiles in the world. This means the writing has to be as good as I can make it, because ugly sentences make me frown. There are bigger issues there if you want to think about them but that's entirely optional.

The cast of characters, the farcical incidents and the ramshackle house are reminiscent of old-fashioned romantic comedies or 'caper' movies. Jordan reveals in an interview that she was indeed inspired by 1950s movies such as 'To Catch A Thief', that were 'witty and sexy, but always classy and intelligent'.

There is a satisfactory amount of dramatic tension as the reader begins to wonder exactly what is going on – and it's not just the budding romance between Daniel and Della. The writing is witty and engaging, making Fall Girl light and easy reading.

The Australian Government announced they would contribute \$4m for Danish climate contrarian Bjorn Lomborg to establish a new "consensus centre" at the University of Western Australia.

In the face of deep cuts to the CSIRO and other scientific research organisations, it's an insult to Australia's scientific community.

As the Climate Commission, we were abolished by the Abbott Government in 2013 on the basis that our \$1.5m annual operating costs were too expensive. We relaunched as the Climate Council after thousands of Australians chipped in to the nation's biggest crowd-funding campaign. It seems extraordinary that the Climate Commission, which was composed of Australia's best climate scientists, economists and energy experts, was abolished on the basis of a lack of funding and yet here we are, three years later, and the money has become available to import a politically-motivated think tank to work in the same space. This is why the work of the Climate Council is so important - to counter this continuing ideological attempt at deceiving the Australian public.

Mr Lomborg's views have no credibility in the scientific community. His message hasn't varied at all in the last decade and he still believes we shouldn't take any steps to mitigate climate change. When someone is unwilling to adapt their view on the basis of new science or information, it's usually a sign those views are politically motivated.

We're already flat out responding to misinformation in the media. We just called out *The Australian* for deliberately misinterpreting the science and the Prime Ministers Business Advisor Maurice Newman for getting his facts wrong.

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Happy Palindrome Week: why these dates are special

Madam, I'm Adam. A man, a plan, a canal: Panama.

Palindromes are everywhere — including on the calendar. Every day between May 10 and May 19, as written in five - or six-digit month/day/year format - is a palindrome. This means the numbers read the same forward as backward (5/10/15 - 5/19/15). And Mother's Day was a sevendigit palindrome (5/10/2015), only the eighth such date that has occurred so far this century.

Strings of five-digit palindrome dates aren't actually that rare, according to Aziz Inan, an electrical engineering professor at the University of Portland, who calculates these dates as a hobby. "Whereas five-digit dates occur every year, the next time Mother's Day will be a palindrome date will be 790 years" from now, Inan told Live Science. [The 9 Most Massive Numbers in Existence]

The next such palindrome week will occur in June 2016 (6/10/16-6/19/16), and this pattern of five-digit palindromes will continue until 2020. After that, another type of five-digit palindrome will take its place, with two-digit months and one-digit days (for example, 02/1/20), Inan explained.

Seven- or eight-digit palindrome dates are much more rare - only 38 such dates occur in the 21st century, Inan said. Twenty-six of these dates are seven digits, and 12 are eight digits. As of Sunday (May 10), eight of these dates have already occurred this century, leaving 30 remaining.

"Eight-digit palindrome dates are very rare, and are clustered in the first three or so centuries at the beginning of a [millennium], and then don't show up for 600 to 700 years, until they appear as a cluster in the next millennium," Inan told Live Science in November 2011, the last time such a date occurred (11/02/2011).


The reason for the rarity of these dates is that the day number can only reach 31. For example, the palindrome of a year such as 1401 would give you 1041, which exceeds the number of days in a month (since there is no Oct. 41). So, eight-digit palindrome dates will become rare again after the year 2300 (as there are no 32nd days of the month).

An eight-digit palindrome date that falls on Mother's Day is even more rare, because they have to occur on the second Sunday of May, Inan said.

In honour of this week and a belated Mother's Day, we must all ask ourselves, "Amy, must I jujitsu my ma?"

MEETING OF LIKE MINDS

Over the past few months local resident Michael Smith has been actively assisting Veterinarian Karen Wong (owner of North East Vet Clinic) with practical advice on obedience training to dog owners. Support of dog owners in our communities is a matter that they both believe is imperative. Michael's time is given freely through North East Vet Clinic (donations for petrol welcome) to those who want help and advice. You can find Michael at the Council Dog Park (corner of Eagle and Young Sts) set up with agility equipment, holding socialisation classes or obedience classes on the second, third and fourth Saturdays of each month.

Dogs who do NOT respect their owners/handlers as the "leader of the pack" will be more likely to misbehave or display undesirable behavior whilst out walking. A dog who thinks he is in control of you ... will control the walk. This breakdown to the concept of a mutually rewarding relationship can lead to anxiety, frustration and potentially to aggression issues. Your dog depends on you!

The golden rule to having successful training whilst out walking is to recognize what your dog wants and needs you may both need the walk but your dog also needs to sniff, run and have fun. This is needed by your dog but permitted by you. Once out walking ... if your dog is pulling or straining on the lead - STOP walking. Start off again and as soon as the pressure starts on the lead -STOP. Whilst this may be frustrating for you at times, it quickly teaches a dog that the reward (out for a walk) is removed if he tries to control the walk. On the positive side, whilst the lead remains loose, allow your dog to wander and sniff, even speed up occasionally to a light jog, allow him to stop at a tree and sniff all around the entire base but move on when you have had enough of Continued rewards (sniffing, moving and running a little) gives such positive reinforcement and fun that they learn quickly to maintain a loose lead.
