Fingal Valley service delivery



The delivery of maintenance services in the Fingal Valley has been under review by Council's management team in recent months, as we are well aware of the potential for improvements in the services being delivered and current inefficiencies. Following this review, we will be re-establishing a team whose normal base of operations will be in the Fingal Valley, operating from either the Fingal or St Marys depots, depending on where work is occurring. The focus of this team will be a range of town and road maintenance activities and they will be supported when required by St Helens based teams.

Re-establishing this operational base is reasonably straight forward, as we have sufficient plant and equipment to ensure that they can operate effectively, the challenge is ensuring that we have the support systems in place to ensure that the necessary management, supervision and communication occurs.

Equally, it is important that connection is maintained with the other teams in the Works Department, ensuring that the sense of isolation and disconnection from the organisation as a whole does not occur.

Implementation of this change has commenced with the intention of having the arrangements in place before the busy season commences in a few months.

We have sought expressions of interest from existing Works Department employees who would like to be part of this team. There may be a few teething issues we need to deal with and we ask that Fingal Valley residents provide a little patience as we implement these changes. Works requests must still come through the office to ensure that appropriate monitoring and supervision of activities occurs.

As I have said to councilors, management team and the Works Department – "we have one chance to make this work correctly now and into the future, if it doesn't work effectively then we will go back to the current service delivery model".

Everyone has a role to play in this, including the community.





TransBOD

On the August 16, 2015 TransBOD held a seminar on Bees, Plants and Seeds at Falmouth Community Hall between 11am and 4pm.

We had 37 people attending, with a shared lunch provided partly by members of TransBOD and participants who were asked to bring along a lunch which could be shared and based on the 100 mile theme (sourced from within 100 miles of the venue).

We started with a presentation from Dr Sue Woinarski on bee hive health and management, and after an extensive question and answer session (helped along by the beekeeping audience) we moved onto the next session.

This was conducted by Alison Hugo from the Understorey Network; the work the organisation does in the community to propagate understorey plants, and why these plant are important in our gardens and properties was outlined. Lunch then followed with a lot of networking amongst participants.

After lunch we conducted a question and answer panel session, with the panel made up of five or six attendees who are beekeepers with different degrees of backyard or commercial expertise.

This was very well received by all the gathering, and we had to cut this short as time was tight.

Mark Leech, coming all the way from Margate, then gave a very interesting and informative talk on planting for bees and the type of plants that bees need to survive year around. Mark is the author of many books on this subject, and his talk was enjoyed by all. Another question time was held and the day finished with a final tea break before people headed home at about 4pm.




The following work will be undertaken as a part of the Break O'Day project:

(Continued from front page) Celeste's dad, Mick Miller, passed away from oesophageal cancer in February 2015. Celeste, with her brother Kase Miller and the Southern Football League (SFL), dedicated Round 15 to his memory and used the opportunity to raise awareness of this terrible disease. The day also raised over \$10,000 to support the work of the GI Cancer Institute.

Community support for the event was incredible, with sponsors and supporters jumping on board to make the day a success, especially at the game between the Hobart and the Lindisfarne team-"the Two Blues". As the midfielder/centre-

half forward, Kase was under pressure to come up with some goals.

Kase kicked two goals and his manager from Budget Rent-a-Car donated \$250 for each goal, with Miller family members also donating for each goal. Kase kicked what was described as "the goal of the year" and was awarded with the Prancing Deer Award for the best player on the field. The Two Blues also won the match and were awarded the Miller-Midson trophy, presented by Andy Miller, Mick's brother.

Many of the Lindisfarne players donated their match fees and paid \$20 for each behind they kicked, with generous donations also coming from the Hobart Football Club, Hobart Private Hospital and Lifters Hire. Family friends, Cindy and Greg Barker, donated \$100 as Greg is currently battling cancer. A lawn bowls game was in session next door and when one of the players heard what was happening, he arranged for someone to run over waving a \$10 donation. There were also fantastic contributions from around the grounds at all SFL games.

The Lindisfarne club sold team scarves on the day; they donated all the proceeds to the GI Cancer Institute and raised an amazing \$1,000. Slater and Gordon (lawyers), the official sponsors, came along to the game and were vocal and enthusi-

astic supporters and donated \$100 for each of Lindisfarne's 18 goals!

"Booklets distributed to all 5 games included information on GI cancer, early symptoms and preventative measures and all players proudly wore teal armbands in support of the cause" Celeste explained. "If my Dad had been sitting at a game last year and received the same information, it may have given him the fighting chance he didn't have." Thank you to all supporters and clubs around the SFL who contributed to making this round a success.





The Say, by Cagerattler

One great thing about working in a school environment is seeing kids actually enjoying learning, and this is in no small part coming from the quality and the genuine excitement of observing teachers, teacher aids and management staff who are passionate about their job.

In recent weeks I've taken particular notice and time to witness several of our local teachers really getting involved in finding new avenues to pathways of encouraging our kids to learn.

I have personally been engaged to be involved in a few interesting things. Although this is not unusual it made me think about having a whole school approach to learning.

I used to think before I worked in a school "What a cushy job". I know many out there probably think that now. Let me tell you from seeing it first hand - it ISN'T a cushy job. The outright stress, limited budgets, the pressures to get academic results and the perceptions of "look how many holidays they get" are real and ever present.


In every school, not least of all ours, there are certain students who, no matter what the staff do, will be incredibly hard to deal with. They come from all sorts of home issues and bring attitudes that will test even the most patient staff member, and many of them are canny on just how far they can push their barrow. This is truly stressful and the teachers in particular have to act extremely professionally, under great pressure, to navigate their way through. Then there is a mass of professional development that they must do on an ongoing basis; then there is the results pressures from what many regard as a less than perfect NAPLAN programme. None of this is easy. Then after all this you see teachers absolutely passionate about their job and engaging both community and ancillary staff to find new ways of getting the kids equally engaged in learning. In 20 years of being at our school I can attest that despite the odd issue or the occasional problem, our local school has an enormous lot to be proud of and is constantly bringing through almost exclusively all really well grounded students. Don't sell our teachers short ... they truly do a great job.




enforced. A question has been raised about the Guild not being grant dependent - I would like to clarify our position on this.







Cost of posting a letter from Tasmania set to soar; local jobs to go

Tasmanians will face skyrocketing stamp prices and a postage service that takes up to a week to deliver a letter to its destination, under newly revealed Federal Government plans for Australia Post. The Federal Communications Minister has quietly introduced the reforms which create a two-speed postal system - a regular service operating slower than the current delivery speed, and a premium, more expensive service. Communications, Plumbing and Electrical Union (CEPU) NSW Secretary Jim Metcher said the move will hit Tasmania hard, and called on local Federal MPs to act to protect local jobs and services.

"You'll be able to walk a letter from Hobart to Launceston faster than you'll be able to post it under these new regulations. The cost of posting a letter will also soar. We could see people forced to pay \$1.50 or more, simply to send a letter

down the road. "This is an unsustainable model that will see the eventual downfall of our national post service. Our elected representatives need to stand up for Tasmanians and tell the Federal Communications Minister that they won't let a plan that will rob our region of jobs and services slip quietly through."

A major report into Australia Post released today by the McKell Institute warns that the Government's current approach is not the answer, and recommends a raft of changes - including a full review of Post's Community Service Obligations. "The Federal Government needs to carry out its own review of Australia Post, looking at viable, innovative options for expanding its service offerings, not simply jacking up prices, driving down the service, and slashing jobs. If we go down this path, it will only be a matter of time before local post offices in regional Tasmania are a thing of the past.

"Around 32,500 people are employed by Australia Post nationwide, and 58% of them are in rural and remote areas. Those jobs will be on the chopping block unless the Federal Government admits this plan is flawed and develops a smarter, long -term solution that will protect our postal system and our local jobs," Mr Metcher said.

Eric Hutchinson MP Federal member for Lyons Supporting regional Tasmania August 21, 2015

Break O'Day Council residents are set to benefit from funding under the Federal Government's Financial Assistance Grant programme in 2015-16.

Federal Member for Lyons Eric Hutchinson has announced that Break O'Day will receive \$2.6m this financial year. This includes the early payment of \$1.3m.

"The federal government understands the needs of regional Tasmania and is supporting Break O'Day Council to deliver the services and facilities it needs," Mr Hutchinson said. "As part of the agreement, councils are free to spend the funding according to local priorities, such as infrastructure and roads projects, health and recreation needs and the environment." The Federal Government is providing \$2.3b to local councils across Australia this financial year. This funding is in addition to the \$3.2b Roads to Recovery programme, which is \$1.45b more than Labor provided under the previous government's programme.

Mr Hutchinson said regional Tasmania can also benefit from Round Two of the new \$300m Bridges Renewal Programme which is available exclusively to local government.

"Up to \$100m will be provided for the repair and replacement of local bridges around Australia to deliver better transport links for their communities and industries," he said.

"I am proud to be part of a government that is committed to ensuring local councils and their ratepayers get the funding they need to deliver the infrastructure and services of the 21st century."



Dogs see in rudimentary color vision (termed "dichromatic"). This mean that yes, they can see colours, but not as many as humans can.

The colors a dog perceives best are blue and yellow. Because of this, they see green, yellow and orange as yellow-ish, and violet and blue as blue-ish.

Red unfortunately appears as a dark brownish-grey, which means red dog toys are difficult for them to see.

So, if you've ever thrown a red toy for your dog to fetch and he/she ran right past it, it probably wasn't very visible against the grass. It seems that dog toy companies sell brightly colored toys that appeal to the owner, rather than the dog! Knowing what colors your dog can see will help you choose toys and training equipment that will be the most visible to your dog. Additionally, dogs can recognize an object that is moving almost twice as well as when the same object is still. So, wriggle those toys around, and create some tail-wagging- happiness.

What about cats?

The colors that a cat perceives best are purple, blue, and green.

Red, orange and brown appear to fall outside cats' color perception range, and are most likely seen as dark to mid shades of grey.

Lavender (purple), the sky (blue) and lush grass (green)! Those cats know how to live life to the fullest, don't they?

Diamonds crowned world champions on home soil August 16, 2015

The Australian Diamonds have claimed their 11th world title after defeating New Zealand 58-55 in a thrilling final of the Netball World Cup SYDNEY 2015.

In front of a new world record crowd of 16,752 at Allphones Arena, the Diamonds made it a hat-trick of world titles, successfully defending their crown from 2007 and 2011.

A blistering opening quarter set up Australia's victory, and the Diamonds withstood a spirited second half fight back by New Zealand to emulate the feats of the 1991 Australian team in winning the world title on home soil.

Veteran defender Julie Corletto bowed out on a high in her final Test match for Australia, winning her third world title along with goal attack Natalie Medhurst.

It was Australia's highest regulation score in a Netball World Cup match against New Zealand, eclipsing the 53 scored in the triumphant 1991 Final. Australia's accuracy was the difference, as the Silver Ferns had 11 more shots on goal than the Diamonds. Caitlin Bassett finished the match with 47 goals and praised the work done by the players in front of her.

"The drive to the circle was amazing; the girls were bringing the ball down really quickly and Nat did a great job in keeping goal defence busy which kept me in a one-on-one situation which was perfect," Bassett said.

Australian captain Laura Geitz said she was proud of her team for bouncing back from their loss earlier in the tournament to the Silver Ferns.

"Top finish like that in front of our home crowd, to have family here and to play with that particular group of girls, to play with Julie Corletto, it's wonderful to step into the defensive circle with such a wonderful athlete," Geitz said.

Malawi goal shooter Mwayi Kumwenda was named the Player of the Tournament.





A mountain on fire ... from within

On 30 November 1881, the Southern Argus reported on the extraordinary sight of a mountain on fire in the vicinity of the Snug River 21 miles down the river Derwent below Hobart. While bushfires are common throughout Tasmania, and indeed Australia, the flames from this fire appeared to emanate from within the earth itself. "During the night a sudden flood occurred in Snug River, caused by an extensive landslip, and much damage resulted. In the morning, the people determined to investigate the cause of such a sudden body of water coming down the river, as the rains had not been sufficient to explain the outburst. On proceeding to the stream some distance they were startled by the spectacle of a mountain on fire. The flames were bursting out of the ground at irregular intervals, and extended over a length of two miles. The heat was intense, the flames rising high into the "The nearest subterranean opening was half a mile higher up the river than the landslip. A reporter was despatched by the *Mercury* to the scene and he and others attempted to reach the place but it was found impossible to make any headway in the face of the dense mist which prevailed. "Another start will be made tomorrow morning. The glare of the light from the fires can be seen from the city. A curious fact in connection with the matter is that the river was again flooded during the night ... the country around the scene of this outbreak has been prospected for coal, and it is believed that the unusual spectacle is caused not by volcanic action, but by a seam of coal being on fire."

June 24: Township, foreshore and coffee





PROTECTING TASMANIAN JOBS FROM VIGILANTES

A plan to remove a section of the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* will be a significant step towards protecting Tasmanian jobs.

Federal Member for Lyons Eric Hutchinson has applauded the bid to remove the provision that allows radical green activists to engage in vigilante litigation to stop important economic projects.

Section 487 of the *EPBC Act* provides radical activists who have a political interest in a development an ability to use aggressive litigation tactics to disrupt and sabotage important projects.

"Tasmanians have lived through the anti-jobs Green agenda and suffered while Labor stood by and watched," Mr Hutchinson said. "We have seen the economic and social impact of the policies designed to delay and increase risk associated with new investment.

"The fundamental objective of radical Green activism in Australia is to de-industrialise our country and destroy jobs." The legislation to remove Section 487 will be introduced into the Parliament for passage through the House of Representatives later this week.



"I turned to my own bunk and examined it with a kind of appalled fascination. If the mattress stains were anything to go by, a previous user had not so much suffered from incontinence as rejoiced in it. He had evidently included the pillow in his celebrations."

"Black bears rarely attack. But here's the thing. Sometimes they do. All bears are agile, cunning and immensely strong, and they are always hungry. If they want to kill you and eat you, they can, and pretty much whenever they want. That doesn't happen often, but - and here is the absolutely salient point - once would be enough."

"My particular dread - the vivid possibility that left me staring at tree shadows on the bedroom ceiling night after night was having to lie in a small tent, alone in an inky wilderness, listening to a foraging bear outside and wondering what its intentions were. I was especially riveted by an amateur photograph in Herrero's book, taken late at night by a camper with a flash at a campground out West. The photograph caught four black bears as they puzzled over a suspended food bag. The bears were clearly startled but not remotely alarmed by the flash.

It was not the size or demeanour of the bears that troubled me - they looked almost comically non-aggressive, like four guys who had gotten a Frisbee caught up a tree - but their numbers.

Up to that moment it had not occurred to me that bears might prowl in parties. What on earth would I do if four bears came into my camp? Why, I would die, of course. Literally s..t myself lifeless. I would blow my sphincter out my backside like one of those unrolling paper streamers you get at children's parties - I daresay it would even give a merry toot - and bleed to a messy death in my sleeping bag."


