Officially opened in February this year, the stadium


hosted Tasmania's first regional State League Netball Game, attracting more than 240 spectators, is used by the local community almost every day and continues to attract interest from groups outside of the area.

## Tasmanian councils struggling to deliver quality services while keeping rates down, report finds, by Ted O'Connor

A Local Government Association's State of the Regions report found country councils, especially those with low

ing financially squeezed.

The report also called for the Federal Government to lift the indexation freeze of financial assistance grants and provide extra road funding, in part to cater for more heavy traffic on rural roads.

rate bases and large road networks to maintain, were be-

One of the report's authors, Dr Peter Brain, said poor rural councils faced tough choices.

"Either stopping the increase in rates and cutting services, or driving their constituents to breaking point," he said. "There's only so much the local population can bare, especially in the poorer regions."

He said in north-west Tasmania the average working resident only earns \$30 an hour, meaning they found it harder to absorb rate increases.

"They'll [councils] simply just have to start reducing significantly the quality of their services," Dr Brain said. "So roads don't get repaired, rubbish doesn't get picked up, planning resources get slashed, time taken to get approval just blows out - it's very sad."

West Coast Mayor Phil Vickers wanted rates to remain unchanged next financial year in his council to take the pressure off poorer residents.

"We can't fix everything at once, but we realise our ratepayers are under financial stress given the downturn in the mining industry," he said.

The report also found Tasmanian primary school children in poorer areas were consistently posting lower test scores than their wealthier counterparts. In one example, primary pupils in central Sydney scored 10 to 20% higher on NAPLAN tests than those in north-west Tasmania. Dr Brain said the results showed the socio-economic standing of parents played a big part in their child's educa-

"Relatively poor home environments, where I guess parents are struggling to make ends meet, and the relatively poor educational qualifications of the parents seem to be a very important factor in determining how children perform," he said.

Dr Brain urged governments to closely monitor the results of future NAPLAN tests in correlation with socioeconomic backgrounds.

"[It's] going to be interesting to see if there is some improvement in the poorer areas - in other words, is the testing itself improving performance or alternatively will it stagnate or get worse?" he said. "This is a real test of what really drives the resources distribution in terms of education."





# St Helens Navy Cadets vying for back to back national titles – the first in 35 years.

June 27, 2016

Since 1980, no Navy Cadet unit has won back to back national titles for Most Efficient Training Ship, the pinnacle achievement for a cadet unit.

In order to be eligible for assessment for the national award, units must first be a state winner.

Then, the top three point scorers

from around the nation are selected for assessment for the national title.

St Helens based Navy Cadet Unit, TS Argonaut, were awarded Most Efficient Training Ship in the country in February this year with their award presentation held in St Helens on June 18.

While being presented with the prestigious award by President of the Navy League of Australia, Graham Harris, the proud unit were also informed they had won the 2016 state title for the second year in a row.

"There was a real mix of emotions on hearing the announcement," Leut. ANC Commanding Officer TS Argonaut, Michelle Montgomery said. "They were shocked, crazy delighted, over the moon as well as a bit anxious about having to go through the rigorous assessment all over again."



If the Navy Cadet Unit are successful in being selected for national title assessment and win again, they will be the first Tasmanian Unit to win back to back titles and the first unit in Australia to achieve two consecutive wins in 35 years.

Leut. Montgomery said the success of the unit was

a real team effort that involved substantial support from the St Helens Community.

"We have so much community support from mum's helping with hair, local businesses donating food on the day and just their presence at our ceremonies gives all the cadets a real lift," she said.

"When it comes down to it, it is all about the kids having a safe and secure place which is stable and consistent."


"Seeing how they grow and develop into confident, team players, we know will set them up for

life, and this is what it is all about."

Break O'Day mayor Mick Tucker said he was really impressed by the dedication and efforts of the cadets and wished them all the best in their pursuit of back to back national titles.

"The whole community is really proud of what the Cadets have achieved, I think that is evident by the number of people that show up to their assessments and ceremonies," he said.

"The amount of time, preparation and commitment this group of young people, their leaders and support group go through to achieve these results is a mammoth undertaking and a reflection of what community spirit is all about."








Tas Beer & BBO has recently been opened in Fingal by the Ro 'n' Slow BBQ team.

The team has been competing in low and slow style BBQ competitions on the mainland and have had good results, namely first prize for their lamb entry in Canberra last December.

Team Captain Rohan Peterson moved to Fingal several years ago - after living in England with his British wife Kirsty - not long after the birth of their first daughter.

Since returning Rohan and Kirsty have had a second daughter and plan to bring their family up on the farm they purchased just outside Fingal. Low and slow style BBQ has taken the mainland by storm, but the movement has yet to find traction in Tasmania.

Up until a few months ago, the Ro 'n' Slow BBQ

team were the only Tasmanian team competing on the competition BBQ circuit. The low and slow bbq style originated from Southern America many years ago, where people who couldn't afford quality cuts of meat took inferior cuts and cooked them over a low heat source for a long period of time (12 hours plus), to get the best out of the meat. At low temperatures the fat content in the meat liquefies, and if done correctly can produce tender, juicy meat.

Cuts like beef brisket are a popular choice for low and slow BBQ'ers, and in competitions there is a specific category where Brisket is the focus.

Tas Beer & BBQ was formed to help fundraise the team's entry to mainland competitions; the average cost per competition has been in the vicinity of \$3,000.







#### Lyme-like disease update

The interim report has been released by the Senate 'community Affairs Reference Committee, on the growing evidence of an emerging tick-borne disease that causes Lyme-like illness for many Australians.

The report was tabled on May 4, 2016 due to the possibility of a federal election being called before the committee's final report date. The committee intends for the inquiry to continue with the 45th Parliament.

- Submissions closed on March 31, 2016 and as a result on May 3 the committee had accepted and published 1,171 submissions
- A small proportion of these submissions were from medical practitioners, medical authorities and state, territory and commonwealth government. While the majority of submissions were from or on behalf of Australians suffering from chronic debilitating symptoms.
- NSW had the largest number of submissions with 344. The combined number from SA, ACT, NT and TAS were 71
- The interim report contains introduction: experiences of patients and access to treatment: diagnostic testing for Lymelike illness: next steps for further investigation: plus appendix
- The committee consisted of eight members four ALP, three LIB and one Greens. The participating members for the inquiry consisted of senators - one Greens, one Independent, one PUP, one LIB and one LAB. There were seven experts (researchers etc) for the secretariat
- It is reassuring to know the committee states that health authorities must act now, for the lives of thousands of Australians are at stake





#### ST. MARY'S. Examiner 8-09-1908

St. Mary's has apparently gone into recess, as nothing of importance has happened of late to move us from the even tenor of our way. A lovely fall of rain has given the farmers and dairy men all the moisture they are in need of for present operations.

Dog-poisoning is again in evidence, several valuable dogs having been poisoned. This matter is one that owners themselves must systematically try to stop, as owing to the cunning of those who do the mischief it is very hard indeed to catch them in the act of laying the poison, and nothing but a good lookout with something in the

watcher's possession, is likely to do much good to cope with this evil.

In common with the greater part of Tasmania, the rainfall for this district during 1906 has been below the average, though the rain of this month has evened things up a little. Up to the time of writing (midday, September 5) the fall for 1908 has been 16 inches, as against 32 inches 57 points during the same period for 1907. The weather for the time of the year has been unusual in two respects-the absence of wind and the continuance of frosts, more frosty weather having been experienced this year than for the past 15 years.





The Peoples Choice was a lot of fun ... watching the expressions on everyone's faces as they sampled the different flavours.




Most Popular Sweet was awarded to Jenny Wells of Stirling Wines for her Apricot Jam, and Most Popular Savoury was



#### Dad's cars...(with the pics this time! Editor)

Inspired by past writings in *Restored Cars* about cars we remember, I got thinking about my Dad's cars which started with a Renault 750 in the late 50s. Dad clocked up about 10,000 miles in the Regie but Uncle Kev reckoned it was only 5000 because he pushed it half the time!

The entertaining rear-engined frog gave way to an Austin A90 Westminster, apparently a lovely old jigger with a charming interior. But what he really longed for was a V8 Ford of some sort, which he achieved in the early 60s in the form of a '53 anniversary Customline and later a '58 'star' model Customline. These were great reliable cars, except for a persistent rear main seal leak in the Y block. When he found Mum about the same time, (complete with '53 Prefect!), the Forestry Tasmania wage struggled to run two cars so the Cusso and "Perfect" were traded on an XM Falcon, their first and only new car! This was the first car in my memory and a handsome bugger she was, with white over aqua paint, matching cloth interior and whitewalls of course! This car was actually delivered to our small country town twice by the Launceston Ford dealer as it arrived the first time with the wrong options and upholstery, so Dad told 'em to shove it and bring it back when it was right!

But the lure of a V8 was again much too strong, so the XM was traded on a near new XR Falcon 500 V8 sedan in '68. This car had a big influence on me and fostered my love of V8s to this day! (I have 5 now!). Even though most of my friends' parents had later model cars, our falcon with that sweet 289 always felt a class above. Even as a pre-teen in the late 60s I observed how woefully inadequate anything with a 'grey' motor was. Put 'em in the same box as Landrovers and Volkswagens. Thankfully these three marques have all improved!

However, back to the XR, which was traded on a fully optioned mulberry XB GT sedan in 1975 after Dad turned down a wild plum XY GT for \$5000 a year earlier! Too hard for Mum to drive you see, what with manual steering and gearbox. Dad learned all about slippery diffs in the XB one night on a gravel road, when a jab on the tucker pedal sent the



big bird into a 360, missing two guide posts and two wire fences! Us kids thought it a real hoot and wanted Dad to give it another try!

With fuel prices blasting off in the early 80s Dad bought Mum a 6 cylinder XE Fairmont Ghia ESP, which was a fantastic point to point car with the well sorted dynamics making up for the lack of a V8. After a couple of years with a Honda Prelude, a '91 Honda Legend arrived which they still have, a great car with all the fruit and cast iron reliable for 20 years. Of course there were also work cars, starting with Falcon utes of XL, XR and a rare factory V8 XC followed by a succession of 4WD 'F' series, Bronco and a trifecta of Nissan Patrols. But it was the '81 Aussie assembled Jeep Cherokee that really stood out, born to tow, comfy, smooth Rambler 360 motor and Torqueflite tranny. Great in the bush too, Dad reckoned it would climb anything but a tree leaning this way! Dad scared the crap out of Mum once when he had AMCs finest 4X4 heading up a track so steep that the screen washer fluid was siphoning out the nozzles without being switched on!

There were the trucks and spare work cars too, but that's a story for another day.

Dam 1 - Buttresses



The buttresses were to be 450mm in thickness in the deeper sections and 350mm in the shallower sections. These buttresses were to be founded onto solid rock where possible and this meant that some of them went down to a depth of three metres or more below ground level. Most were founded on solid granite. They were spaced at 1.8 metres in the highest part of the wall and in the lower parts were spaced at 3. 8 metres. The tallest ones measure 14 metres along the base and the shortest ones 2.5 metres. They all slope from both ends

Mt Paris Dam, on the Mt Paris Road, is the only surviving pillar and slab dam in Tasmania. Originally named the Morning Star Dam, it was built across the Cascade River using only shovels and wheelbarrows in 1937, and was connected by an 11km water race with the Mt Paris Mine. The mine closed in 1970 and the dam fell into disuse. In 1985, a hole was blasted into the 16 metre high wall to release the water. In the middle of the

dam, most of the vegetation has now grown back, the only indication it was ever any different is the dam wall which still rises starkly before you in the middle of the bush.


## Collectors offering large sums of money for Disney VHS tapes

You probably still have lots of these tapes lying around, and believe it or not, that's a good thing!



If you have a Beauty and the Beast VHS that includes the song "Human Again," you could get some high bids, too. The song was cut from later editions of the VHS.


