

Response from 'a TasNetworks spokesperson':

"In order to attach something to TasNetworks infrastructure, the organisation or body wishing to do so, must go through an application process. Through this process TasNetworks assesses the application against a number of criteria including, how the banners will be erected and removed, the additional load (weight) the banners will place on the pole, and whether the applicant has the appropriate public liability insurances in place.

"The criteria, which are based on the Australian Standards for *Overhead Line Design and Construction* manual, have been designed to ensure that any attachments to TasNetworks infrastructure do not impact on the safety or reliability of our assets.

"Unfortunately, the specific banners requested by the St. Marys District Lions Club did not meet the criteria and TasNetworks was unable to approve the request this year.

"We understand that this is disappointing for the community. However, it is important to note that TasNetworks is committed to continual improvement in the area of safety, and that means that we must review and revise our policies and procedures each year, to ensure that our networks remains as safe and reliable as possible."





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HMAS Tobruk: Disappointment as Tasmanian plan for dive wreck scuttled

The Tasmanian Government missed a "golden tourism opportunity" in failing to secure a decommissioned navy ship as a dive wreck, a local dive group has said.

HMAS Tobruk will be sunk off the coast of Queensland, the Federal Government announced on Friday.

It was used extensively during regional peacekeeping, humanitarian operations and border protection. The Break O'Day Council on Tasmania's east coast wanted the ship to be scuttled at Skeleton Bay, near St Helens, a plan that it said would attract thousands of divers each year.

A group in southern Queensland was also vying to have the ship sunk off the coast between Bundaberg and Hervey Bay.


Tasmania is the only state which has not been gifted a former Australian warship to use as a dive wreck. Dive operator Peter Paulson was the project manager of a group that had spent years trying to secure the ship for scuttling off Tasmania's east coast. Mr Paulsen claimed the Tasmanian Government's bid failed because it did not give the Navy sufficient paperwork.

"These ships don't sit on the shelf to pick up when you feel like it," he said.

"They only come around on very, very rare occasions, and this was a golden opportunity missed by this Government. And we gift wrapped this thing for them."

The State Government said it was extremely disappointed its bid had failed.

In a statement, the Government said it was unfair of the Commonwealth to expect Tasmania to pay \$10 million for the Tobruk, given this had not been required of other states.



On this day in December 1810

On 15 December 1810, Governor Lachlan Macquarie introduced the first building code into the colony. The code required that all buildings were to be constructed of timber or brick, covered with a shingle roof, and include a chimney. Governor Macquarie also ordered the construction of roads, bridges, wharves, churches and public buildings. Following an inspection of the sprawling, ramshackle settlement of Hobart Town in Van Diemen's Land, now Tasmania, Macquarie ordered government surveyor John Meehan to survey a regular street layout: this layout still forms the current centre of the city of Hobart.



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


This will be followed by a presentation on how to use a defibrillator and answering any questions you may have.

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10 years ago

As I put pen to paper, or rather finger to keyboard, Thursday evening 10 years ago we the St Marys Volunteer Fire Brigade, under the guidance of Brigade Chief Michael Aulich, along with surrounding Brigades were fighting a fire at Mt Durham (Mt. Nicholas). Some of us had just spent a few days in the Georgetown area helping out, on the way home from there on our last night we were greeted by a car load of hoons throwing beer bottles at us. What they didn't bargain on was the fact that we have radios in the trucks, so one call to Firecom and a few kilometres up the road the boys in blue had them pulled over (we had already been instructed to keep going).

We had a few hectic days on this fire (Mt. Durham), finally finishing up on Saturday the 9th. That behind us we all settled down for a quiet evening ready for a restful day on Sunday.

Sunday 10th December 2006 dawned as a normal summer morning. Yes, we were inundated with smoke from the mainland fires but Mt. Durham was quiet so we could have a restful day. How wrong I was!

In the early afternoon I was servicing my own fire fighting unit, just in case I needed it at some time. Michael and Wendy were about to go for a swim when Mike received a phone call from a resident on Lohreys Road concerned about the smoke; that part wasn't so bad until the caller stated that he could hear a roaring sound, this triggered the alarm

bells. One shout from Mike and I dropped all that I was doing (the fire fighter remained in pieces until the unfolding event was over).

On the way to Lohreys Road we had the Brigade put on alert to await our findings. On our arrival at Lohreys Road it was quite obvious that we had a major fire on our hands, the Brigade was mobilised and assistance called for from all surrounding Brigades as well as helicopter support and back up from Launceston. A very quick check of all homes in the immediate area with advice to leave now if you were going, otherwise it would be too late to do so. To those choosing to stay and defend, a very quick crash course in what they had to do to ensure their survival. By this time the Brigade had arrived with one unit, the other unit had to respond to Gardner's Creek Road.



In this short period of time, the fire had turned into a raging monster and it was time to get out or face the consequences. The smoke column had extended over the top of the ranges towards St Marys, the burning embers started falling to the ground and within a few minutes the fire had grown into an unstoppable thing of great magnitude. Let's get out now while we can, we can do no more here. Mike jumped in the driver's seat, I was about to get in when I noticed the tray cover on fire. No good to me like that, I had to belt it out with my bare hands then jump in before I missed my ride.

That's the beginning of a monster that escaped from a camp fire and already spotting 4kms away.

As I recount this event, apart from Brigade Chief Mike, I will not be using individual names as to try and do that I run the risk of doing an injustice to people and that would be very unfair.

Each and every Fire Fighter did a magnificent job, with all having their own story to tell. Most do not like talking about it in any depth of detail, because we are fully aware that emotional scars still run deep across all sectors of the community.

This is just the beginning, I will serialise the event as I saw it and hopefully the Valley Voice will find room to include it. Where to now? Well it was a massive task to deploy all units to the most useful positions as well as monitor the fire's progress and try to judge it's rate of spread, which at this point in time seemed to surpass anything that we had experienced before (the 67 Hobart fire rate of spread was greater).

We work under the acronym of RECEO

RESCUE no. 1 priority, so we go straight into rescue mode to check the safety of all EXPOSURES where do we start with these, there are so many of them and so few appliances

CONTAIN it was evident that this would take days or weeks EXTINGUISH a task that would take weeks if not months

OVERHAUL we will deal with this when the time comes

With the fire up and running and peoples' safety being checked on, we could only then swing into property protection, not that we could have done anything earlier because of the terrain, rate of spread along with combined conditions. Conditions on the day when the fire broke out were: Temp. 38c R H 18% (relative humidity) and dropping. It is worth noting that with these temperatures, when the R H drops below 28%, it is extremely difficult to control any fire, so we all knew that we had a battle on our hands.

With the approach of evening and slightly cooler air, the fire still continued its unhindered progress. It would be around 37 hrs before most of us saw our homes, beds or loved ones again; we knew that we were safe,


however I often wonder just what anguish they went through while we were away at the fire front.

With an incident of this magnitude so much has to happen all at once. With so many firies already on the ground and working hard, they have to be fed. This is where the business places and general public came in to play, they were all magnificent with food coming from everywhere, now most of it had to be delivered to the fire ground. I recall setting off around 9pm to deliver meals to the firies at Germantown, however about 1/2km from my destination the fire forced me to retreat, head down St Marys Pass, Upper Scamander road, find the appropriate road to give me access to the firies - they got their meals around 11pm. No grumbles, just gratitude that I had made it in with food for them. The IMT (Incident Management Team) set up at Fingal - more later.

Property Triage commenced - this determines if the structure is defendable or not and how - more later.

I feel this is enough for this episode, next time I will cover additional happenings in those 37 hours plus a few more.



From Generation to Generation - A True Christmas Story by Beverley Rubenach

Part 1: Rivendel (near Swansea) 1861 - 1862

They were now so close to the start of her fulfilment of her dream of one day owning her own herd of cows. A dream that had driven her to leave family and homeland. A wagon awaited, a tall blond-haired young man beckoned for them to climb on board. He was speaking in some language neither girls could understand, so all they could do was hope and pray they were being transported to the right destination. Because Bridget could neither read nor write, she gave a relieved sigh when Elizabeth explained excitedly that the sign on the gateway they had just entered read Rivendel. The young driver, without saying a word, handed the women to the charge of a grumpy old woman. She led them to a small basement room.

"You rise at four o'clock, clean the fireplaces, set and light the fires, fetch wood and water and cook breakfast. Then report to me for orders for your day's work," she barked and slammed the door impatiently.

"Oh my, Bridget, how we be doing all that when it must already be close to dawn and we both so travel weary?"
"Come now friend," Bridget, the optimist encouraged. "Things aren't all bad. That young driver be mighty comely and handsome," then she giggled and added, "Well in the dark he looked pretty good."

"Bridget, you be comin' all the way from Queen's County Ireland to own ya own dairy herd, not to own a husband." "Can't see any harm in havin' both," Bridget sighed as she flopped onto her bed and fell sound asleep.

The two women believed their indenture would see them doing their former occupation as dairy maids, but to their dismay they were given the lowest of positions - scullery maids.

"Things will soon get better," Bridget would say at the close of each day. And they quickly did for Elizabeth. The gentle, quiet beauty was promoted to lady's maid to the mistress of Rivendel.

Being a little peeved at her friend's success, Bridget sought the company of the young driver who had caught her eye on the night of her arrival. She learnt his name was John Warnder. It was about all she could understand, as he spoke in a language she presumed was Dutch. Despite his scant knowledge of English, and her heavily accented Irish, they managed to communicate for they had one thing in common - their love of animals and their knowledge of how to care for them. Bridget wasn't sure what John's role was on the property but he had a reputation as a healer of both plants and animals. Every spare moment Bridget had she spent with John. They shared knowledge and experience, for Bridget had been a renowned healer, prophet and palm reader in Ireland. Soon people from all over the Swansea area were coming to the pair for time honoured advice and healing.

Bridget's promotion from the drudgery of scullery maid came unexpectedly. Bridget was called urgently to assist John in curing the cows who were 'bloating' on fresh new pasture.

"Move them all to the fields where the docks grow plentiful," she advised. "Let them eat their fill. Plant dock in all the pastures and there will be no more trouble from bloat." She was right. The master of Rivendel came saying "Bridget, as a thank you for saving my herd you are now the chief dairy maid."

In Ireland, under the employ of a harsh, unkind squire, Bridget was in strife if she as much as spilt a drop of milk. Here she had the master's permission to use all the milk and cream she desired. And she did.

The headstrong Bridget's relationship with John worried the cautious Elizabeth. "Take care dear friend," she warned, "that John sure be handsome but he be footloose and fancy free. He never be one to settle down with a woman." Bridget shrugged.

"Bridget, I hope for your sake there be no hanky panky goin' on between you two!" "There be some things I not be a sharing' even with my best friend," Bridget retorted, closing the subject.

Shortly afterwards Bridget woke one morning feeling queasy. "I think I be eating too much cream," Bridget complained to Elizabeth.

"Then you best stop eating any for a week and see if you feel better," Elizabeth advised. Bridget took the advice but she continued to feel ill.

"Bridget, I be thinkin' there be more wrong in your belly than over-indulging in cream." At this statement from her friend Bridget's face turned white and she clutched her stomach. Her friend's frankness has caused her to face the fact that she had tried to deny for weeks - she was with child!

Tearfully, fearfully, she ran to the sanctuary of the stable. Shaking from the realisation of the seriousness of her dilemma, she sobbed a confession to God of her immorality. Instead of the 'hellfire and brimstone' punishment she expected, she felt a great peace. Visions of the nativity scene in the church windows of Queen's County, Ireland, flooded her mind with memories. The Christmas story she had heard ever since she was a child became reality. She had empathy with the young woman in Nazareth, hundreds of years ago. The young unmarried Mary was afraid to tell her betrothed husband Joseph that she was pregnant. Bridget dreaded breaking her news to John. Mary was in danger of being stoned to death for 'adultery'. Bridget was in danger of losing her position and being homeless because of her immorality. Mary's baby,

Jesus, was born in a stable and laid in a manger. Bridget wondered where her child would be born and where she would lay the child if she was rejected and penniless. Wiping her eyes, Bridget stood up and declared "I be knowin' one thing for sure - if I have me a baby girl I be callin' her Mary."

True to character, Bridget faced her dilemma head on and quickly. John was flabbergasted at the unexpected news but he promised to stand by her and the baby.

The very moral but fair master of Rivendel was initially shocked but after a day of thought came to Bridget saying "I'm disappointed but you are a valued worker with two more years of indenture to serve. Therefore, if you and John marry soon you can stay at Rivendel."

Life continued as normal as plans for Bridget and John's wedding commenced. Bridget continued her healing and using her amazing gift of insight and intuition. This gift proved to be a life saver for the master of Rivendel's only son, and resulted in providing an important stepping stone for her future.

This came to pass one morning as Bridget was casually churning cream into butter. She paused as 'the feeling' came upon her. This 'feeling' she recognised as God's prompting. "Something is wrong!" she whispered. Instinctively she ran to the nearby bull paddock.

The master's nine year old son was running screaming and stumbling across the field with a very irate bull in hot pursuit. Brave Bridget jumped the fence and ran in between the boy and the bull. She stood her ground. With calm authority she chided the charging animal, "Bull, animal created by God, stop chasing this boy, a child of God!" The startled bull skidded to a stop! The boy ran to the arms of his father who had come running upon hearing the commotion. Bridget reached out her hand to the stationary bull. Ever so quietly and gently she touched his forehead. "Thank you bull, for not harming that boy." Then leaning close she whispered in the animal's ear, "but just between you and me he probably deserved anything you could have dished out." The bull tossed his huge horns and began grazing unperturbed.

But Bridget had something else to settle. The man held out his hand in gratitude but the indentured servant interrupted. "Before ye be a thankin' me sir, allow me to tell what I be a seein' for days!" Glaring at the young heir-to-be she continued. "I be a watchin' this young rascal tease that poor bull."

"Is that true, son?" the man demanded. The boy nodded his confession. "Sir, I be havin' more to say if you please." the master nodded his consent. "Firstly, I be thinkin' that spoilt little scallywag should get to be a feelin' the bull's wrath. I be a wishin' that there bull would stick his sharp horns in the little upstart's britches and toss him sky high." Great indignation showed on each male face, but Bridget continued. "Then I be ashamed at me thoughts. I know that not be God's way. Sir, ya need to be teachin' yer son about godly stewardship. That bull belongs to God the same as you do. God gave mankind dominion over all things he created on this good earth. That dominion, that stewardship, means carin' for, respectin' and lovin' all of Creation." Having said her piece, Bridget walked away leaving this rich, influential man to ponder on the simple truth spoken by an illiterate Irish lass.

After the simple wedding ceremony the master of Rivendel made a public announcement. "Because of fine work ethics and loyal service, because of courage to speak the truth and show compassion to others, I cancel Bridget Fennelly's indenture. She is a free woman, free to travel and work wherever she wishes."

Instantly Bridget knew this meant she would leave Rivendel. This signified an exciting, new, challenging chapter in her life. "Furthermore," the important property owner declared, "my wife heard from Elizabeth that Bridget came half way around the world hoping to fulfil her dream of one day owning a herd of cows. This remarkable young woman recently

saved my son's life and reminded me of essential truths I had almost forgotten. Therefore, in gratitude I publicly bestow on her an unconditional gift - her choice of any animal on this property."

Impulsive Bridget ran and embraced her benefactor. Then, leaving her husband standing in open-mouthed awe, she raced to the paddock with a lone occupant. There she claimed ownership of the prize hereford bull!

Epilogue: Bridget gave birth to her first born on September 29, 1862. John had no say in naming their daughter. "Her name be Mary-Ann," the proud mother declared. "Mary-Ann Catherine, God grant you wisdom and compassion that will bless others from generation to generation."

And God did!

Footnote: After the birth of their second child, Elizabeth, John and Bridget changed their name from Warnder to Walters.

No record of John can be found shortly after their third child, Margaret, was born.

Bridget remained in the Swansea area until her daughters were teenagers. They then moved to the St Marys area. Mary-Ann married William Mitchell. Their son, Sydney, was my father.

They lived at Daisy Dell, Lower Germantown.

Part 2: Daisy Dale Farm, Lower Germantown, December 1957

Glorious December sun filtered through the kitchen curtains, casting tantalising rays onto my school desk. The gentle breeze rustling the willow trees wafted indoors whispering "Come! Enjoy this beautiful day." Sounds of the nearby mountain stream gurgled refreshingly, calling "Come now and play."

I stole a wistful glance at the old clock ticking laboriously on the mantelpiece above the big, black wood stove. Oh bother! Surely not 30 more minutes before Mother would dismiss me from my correspondence school lessons? How heartless! No nine year old should ever be expected to endure being cooped up indoors, trying to concentrate on arithmetic when the delights of nature on Daisy Dale Farm persistently beckoned. Besides, there were only two more days of scholastic drudgery before the freedom of Christmas holidays commenced.

Sulkily, I wished a chance to escape before 3.30 would miraculously occur. The opportunity came unexpectedly! The peace of that summer afternoon was suddenly disrupted by a spine chilling bellow. This was answered by a nearby incredibly ferocious roar. Flinging back the lace curtains, I saw our huge hereford bull thundering towards the boundary fence. Red Roly was responding to the challenge just issued by his tenuous jersey bull neighbour.

Challenges such as this occurred spasmodically but neither bull took this too seriously. The outcome consisted of both bulls pacing up and down their respective sides of the fence, a few half hearted snorts then by mutual agreement each returned unscathed to their own harem of cows.

These encounters always made me feel a little anxious but not alarmed, for a stout post and rail fence separated the enemies. Today, however, I sensed something very ominous in the tone and energy of both bulls. They definitely were not displaying the Christmas spirit of peace and goodwill!

Snorting nostrils flared pent up steam. Angry hooves were tearing up the dirt. Even from the distant safety of our farm house Mother and I could feel the anger and determination for dominance radiating from these rival males. Our bull was massive, even by hereford standards, but he had the disadvantage of being dehorned. On the other hand, Mr Wright's jersey was small in stature but proudly possessed a pair of extremely sharp horns.

"I wish your Father was here," Mother's voice trembled. But he wasn't. He was at the opposite end of our farm, fetching our herd of cows home for evening milking.

Now each bull was displaying their strength by using their hard heads as battering rams at the solid, aged fence. They paused only momentarily to issue more blood curdling roars. They were broadcasting their threats to fight to the death to the entire neighbourhood! In order to execute their intent, that protective dividing fence had to come down.

Mother and I could only look on helplessly, as the sickening sound of wood being splintered told us they had succeeded. For a moment both bulls stood looking at the shattered fence. Each no doubt claiming success was due to their own brute strength. With bated breath Mother and I watched from our verandah as the jersey and the hereford realised they were at the point of no return. The days of fence pacing, taunts and 'let's call it quits' were over. Supremacy had to be established now - at this place, at this moment in time.

The horrifying connecting clashes of one hard head with no horns, with one hard head with horns laden the afternoon air with terror. Mother sobbed, "How will we cope with the financial loss if Red Roly is killed?"

"He won't be!" my breathless Father gasped as he raced past us to grab his rifle hanging behind the kitchen door. He grabbed a belt of bullets from the hook and started loading his weapon.

"I heard the fight starting when I was at the waterfall paddock. I came running as quickly as I could," he explained. Strapping his bullet belt around his waist and flinging his rifle over his shoulder, he calmly walked towards the danger zone. Mother and I ran after him, imploring him not to go. His life was worth far more than all the bulls on earth! Father paused, held up his hand gently commanding us to stop pursuing him. Patting his rifle he confidently said, "Don't worry, I'll only use this as a last resort."

Sydney Mitchell was no stranger to danger. He had been seriously wounded three times, fighting in WWI in Belgium and France. The courage, determination and desire to establish peace that he exhibited as a young man was being displayed again now, 40 years later. He was a man who would always meet the challenge of doing what needed doing. Today, 18th December 1957, was no exception - he was needed to stop a bull fight.

The fighting was increasing in intensity. The smell of blood from inflicted wounds floated towards us. It was kill or be killed. Closer and closer, my Father came to the charging, angry beasts. They were so intent on mutilating and destroying each other they were oblivious to the fact their 'saviour' was approaching.

Closer, closer, ever closer then, simultaneously both bulls sensed another presence. They stopped fighting. They stood stock still, eyeing the intruding human. Mother and I, between tears, prayed. Taking advantage of this momentary truce Father walked between the bulls. He reached out his hands. He placed one hand on the forehead of the jersey, and the other hand on the forehead of the hereford. For what seemed like eternity all three were motionless. Any action could mean instant death to my Father! Three of God's creations were frozen, like statues. Then there was movement! Incredibly we watched Mr Wright's bull step backwards over the broken fence. Red Roly responded to his master's touch and turned towards home. The jersey gave a backward glance and a timid bellow, as he limped to his own place. The hereford was too weary and battle-scarred to bother with a courtesy response, he simply followed Father home! There he joined his own harem of cows; they had come home of their own accord for evening milking.

"Whatever did you say and do?" Mother and I inquired as we ran to hug this remarkable man.

"Oh, I just used some of the wisdom passed on to me by my grandmother Bridget Walter, and reinforced by my mother Mary-Ann," he said as he hung the bullet belt and rifle back in place behind the kitchen door. "What was the wisdom?" I asked.

"Simply this, Beverley. That everything on earth is of value for we are all God's creation. God gave people dominion over all other living things but know my daughter, the true meaning of dominion."

"What is it?" I inquired. Placing loving arms around my shoulder he explained.

"Dominion is being a caretaker - God's caretaker, treating everything with respect, dignity and love. That is what brings peace and harmony."

Mother smiled and joined in the hug. "How fitting that all this occurred only a few days before Christmas. It is certainly a timely reminder of the true meaning of Christmas."



He sat down exhausted but happy in his favourite chair and said, "Well now, before I go and milk I think I'll have a cuppa and a big slice of sponge cake." Exciting Times: St Helens Neighbourhood House manager Trish O'Duffy says a new building project will help address a number of needs in the Break O'Day region.

St Helens Neighbourhood House

will begin a bold new social enterprise program in January after receiving a \$250,000 grant from the Department of State Growth's Training and Work Pathways Program.

The program will give a team of six unemployed young people the chance to participate in the construction of two social housing studios from recycled shipping containers, and in the process gain a Certificate II in construction.

During the 18-month project the team will work alongside a project supervisor and another young person from the Break O'Day region, who will be beginning a four-year apprenticeship in carpentry. The project is the latest in a series of THRIVE initiatives started by the Neighbourhood House in 2016, with a school mentorship program and a community garden project already under way. St Helens Neighbourhood House manager Trish O'Duffy said the grant would kick-start the project

and help improve the lives of disadvantaged young people.

As a result of an extensive community consultation undertaken in 2015 by THRIVE, the partnership identified issues such as unemployment and we've worked together to see how we can address those issues," Mrs O'Duffy said.

"We're addressing things across the social determinants of health spectrum, like helping the long-term unemployed, building peoples' skills and personal development."

Mrs O'Duffy said the THRIVE partnership was planning for the enterprise to continue long after the startup period covered by the grant.

"We'd like to think that in 18 months when the grant is expended that we've got a successful social enterprise project where people from around the state will buy locally-converted containers for high quality living accommodation rather than buying from interstate.


"If it's the case that we do make this a viable entity it will increase jobs in our region and that's what we're aiming for."

The six workers will receive wrap-around support during the 18-month period, including access to literacy mentors, health professionals and social workers.



Mt Elephant and Beyond Book Review

The Lightkeeper's Wife by Karen Viggers is a story about family dynamics, disappointments, betrayals and the search for

autonomy. This might sound heavy going and, indeed, at times the novel is slow

Mary, a woman in her 70's and nearing death due to heart disease, decides she must return to Bruny Island where she and her late husband had lived as lighthouse keepers for much of their married life. She plans to revisit scenes of her past life and to die there, and manages to convince her loving granddaughter to take her there from her home in Hobart against the wishes of her children. Her daughter wants her to go into a nursing home to which she, a feisty woman, is much opposed.

Meanwhile her younger and favourite son Tom, is trying to come to terms with life back in Tasmania, after having spent a couple of seasons as a diesel mechanic in Antarctica. He is still suffering, ten years on, from the break-up of his marriage while he was absent in Antarctica but is constantly drawn back by the idea of a return to the beauty and isolation of the place.

And so the story progresses, switching from the first person account of Tom's struggle and vivid memories of Antarctica, giving us an insight into his troubled and confused soul, to the rather strange use of third person viewpoint for Mary's story. This has the effect of making Tom's story become more immediate to the reader than that of the lighthouse keeper's wife!

There are many parallels in the lives of mother and son, and there is a dark secret which most readers will guess early in the story and which has haunted Mary for over forty years.

Although we get a sense of her guilt and demons, it is Tom's story which grabs

our imagination. Her story is all in the past of course, whereas Tom is trying to find his place in the now and this adds an urgency and immediacy. It is his story that seems more real than that of his mother and occupies at least as many if not more of the pages.


It is a pleasure to read accurate descriptions of real and familiar Tasmanian settings and the author's keen powers of observation of the natural world are obvious. The isolation of life on Bruny Island and Antarctica is explored well and makes a nice parallel, bringing the two stories together.

What raises this book above being yet one more family drama is the author's obvious familiarity with and love for the landscape of Bruny Island and Antarctica, and her ability to create a vivid sense of place.

Both settings come alive for the reader through her beautiful word pictures, not least her descriptions of bleak winter windswept beaches. The ending leaves one with a sense of a possible happier path for Tom.
