Television has brought the Olympic Games into our homes and many details have been faithfully and accurately recorded for us. Now that the games are ended, what feelings romain with us?



To a couple of old residents of Mangara about the 1972 flood.

"We were surrounded by water and we had

to shift from our place, we had to shift

from there to the school house. Again,

we were surrounded by water, and Mr. Clancy came on horse back every half hour to see if we were all right, and then he'd go across to Mrs. Soloman. Then it got so deep that he couldn't come across." "Not even the hrose." "How many houses were evacuated?" "There were 33 in Mrs. Duncans place, and I had to go up to the little cottage, up to Mrs. Parker's, and it was running through my place, and I just opened the door and let it go, - couldn' t even sand-bag it. They said I'd have to go because I had three little children. You see, it was from hillside to hillside that flood; it was the guily that broke away, and all trees came down, and the big Man Ferns too, up the top end of the town, not down the bottom where my place was. The street was like a creek with all the big logs in it. And I can remember one incident - One family was going to the . other family with a candle, and old Mr. Bill Oliver had one of the children on his shoulder trying to get into the place, when a big log came and knocked the door open before he got there. You see, it all happened before dark, which was a blessing and of course a lot of the old people panicked you know because they didn't want to leave their homes, and they were all . taken in Charlie Oliver's dray, And we sat up all night, just watching. A lot of the houses were badly damaged, but fortunately nobody was hurt or sick, but not one of them complained."

PRISON FOR THE FINGAL VALLEY???

A smail paragnaph on an inside page of the Examiner last week announced that the Fingal Council was to offer the Valley as a site for a minimal security prison.

Few local residents have been consulted about this and it seems there may be more than a little

opposition to the idea. Our Council, like our Parlia ment, we elect and forget, content that there is someone doing the and dull work of running the place, whom we can blame in adversity. is not at all surprising that our elected representatives should make decisions on our behalf without consulting us because they know from experience that most people are just not interested.

On this prison project they are probably wrong. A lot of poople are interested and will want to know more about it before the Council commits us to a set of involuntary neighbours. A public mesting (or preferably one at St. Marys and another at Fingal) should be called to hear the proposed school and be answered by an officer of the Prisons Department.

In the event of an escape from the prison the Valley would be easy to block from road traffic, but the surrounding bush offers good hiding and difficult detection. many isolated houses without tele phone offer a ready source of support lies and shelter. What do the pensioners living alone in the backblocks think of the prospect?

We must also know what employment, if any, the prison would bring to the district.

Finally what class of prisoner would be housed in the prison, and what guarantee would we have that less desirable prisoners would not be brought in after the prison is established. For instance, it is the custom elsewhere to place sexual offenders at a prison farm because of the rough treatment they receive from other

prisoners in the main prison. We look forward to hearing a public statement at first hand from our Council.


