EDITORIAL

ROAD SAFETY - A NEW ATTITUDE NEEDED

Several recent events have done nothing to convince this writer that the problem of death on our roads can be solved. Nothing it seems works. (Barring the seat belt which does not prevent accidents but does prevent injuries)

Breathalysers, speed limits, intensified police activity, improved roads, more stringent penalties for offenders - no matter what is tried, road deaths continue to escalate.

Last month Tasmanian's Minister for Transport, Mr. Batt, tentatively offered his contributions to road safety and was immediately blasted by almost every body connected with the motor industry and motor cars. Two editorial writers in Tasmanian daily papers barely took breath before they set to and rubbished his suggestions. Especially Mr. Batt's suggestion on the possible use of engine governors to control speeding.

Nearly all his critics so completely missed the point, one wonders if it were not deliberate. Such was the childish and puerile opposition to any hint of curtailing the power and speed of our dearly beloved car.

If Mr. Batt had taken the attitude of his colleague Mr. Nixon, the Federal Minister for Transport, he would no doubt have been applauded for his understanding. However to do this Mr. Batt would have had to top what must be the greatest piece of double talk offered by a politician this year. When addressing the Confederation of Australian Motor Sport, Mr. Nixon said he fully sanctioned the 'super car' (i.e. 120 m.p.h. and over) because in the hands of the experienced driver it was probably the safest car on the roads today. However, he then went on to say 'in the hands of the inexperienced it then becomes the car with the worst accident record'. What he didn't say of course was that this applies to any vehicle including a wheel barrow. The difference is a super car hits harder, that's all.

The attitude of Mr. Nixon caused no outburst from interested parties at all and

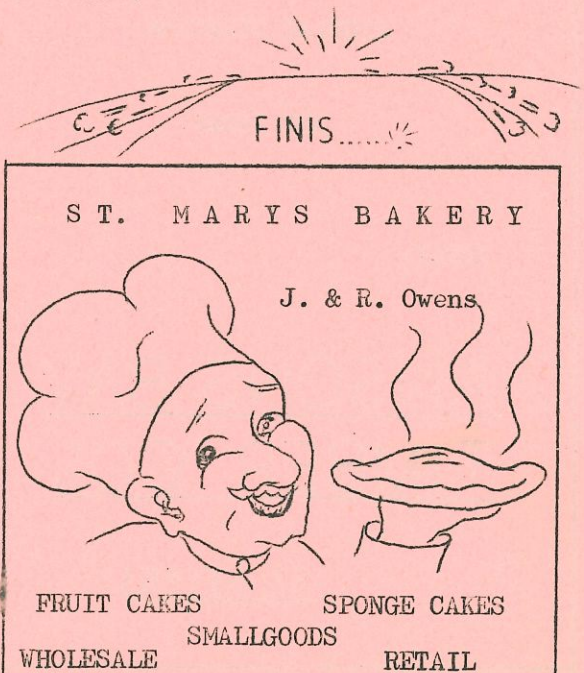

at best it smack'd of appeasement to those who love cars and have votes. An attitude, it seems, held by a great majority of politicians when it comes to pandering to the strength of the car manufacturers and car users alike.

It will be very interesting to see how insistent Mr. Batt remains in the face of such momentous and sometimes hysterical opposition to road sanity. It is not necessarily only new laws needed to solve the problems of road safety. It seems we also need a completely new attitude.

TASMANIAN HYDATIDS ERADICATION COUNCIL

Dr. Trevor Beard, the founder and first secretary of the Tasmanian Hydatids Eradication Council has left Tasmania to take up a new appointment with the A.C.T. Health Services in Canberra.

After 21 years as a doctor in a country practice in the Tasmanian Midlands, Dr. Beard has gone into the field of Health Education and Social and Preventive Medicine.

In 1966 he was awarded a Churchill Fellowship for his part in initiating the hydatid campaign in Tasmania and obtained a degree in Health Education at the University of California.

At a recent meeting of the Tasmanian Hydatids Eradication Council, the chairman conferred Honorary Life Membership of T.H.E.C. on Dr. Beard.

Although T.H.E.C. will miss the drive and enthusiasm of Dr. Beard, he leaves behind him a Council of 28 members representing a wide range of public opinion and dedicated to the complete eradication of the disease.

They include representatives of all the farmer organisations, Meat exporters and retailers, Kennel Control Council, Municipal Association and Government Health and Veterinary Departments, among others.

The Council will continue to work in close liason with the Animal Health Service.

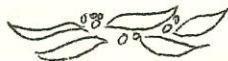
