"There's the new baby to think of this time"

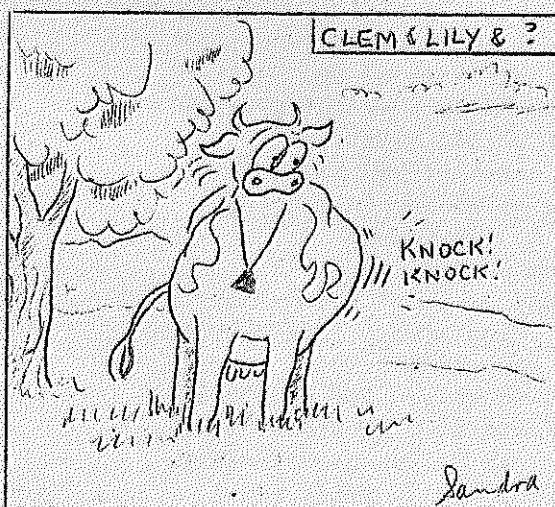
"I wonder how much I should spend on Joe's sister's husband's brother?"

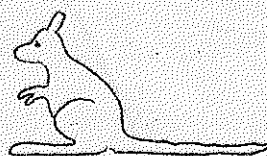

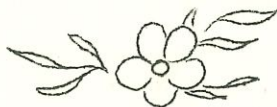

TO CURE NOISES IN THE EAR

Drop in the juice of onions

A CURE FOR MOSQUITOES

HEALTH NOTES

PUT YOURSELF IN YOUR CHILD'S PLACE

If your toddler could talk about his impressions of this strange and dangerous world, life would be much simpler for you. He could ask for help in keeping him safe from danger. Unfortunately, at this stage, he cannot talk but the parent who has the eyes, ears, understanding and the desire to know her child can go a long way to prevent the many disasters of childhood.

So let's put ourselves in his place and listen to what he might say to you.

Mummy, I am now 1yr old and am just finding my feet. But my balance isn't too good and I will fall often. When I do, I will either sit down with a bump or will fall forward. If I sit down I won't come to much harm provided the surface is a flat floor. But if I fall forward that could be another story.

You see, I don't yet know how to break my fall. I will fall flat on my face. I might fall against sharp edges of the refrigerator or stove. I can come to a lot of harm this way. If I miss my face I might hit my head and do even more damage.

So Mum, although I must get plenty of practice at walking there will be times when it is best to be in my playpen, or some place where there is no danger of my falling. Most times these things happen when you are busy getting a meal, or when there are several people moving around in the kitchen.

I am only little - not more than about two feet high, and I can easily get in the way.

OLD PEOPLES' WEEK 1972

Members of the St. Marys Senior Citizens Club have decided they would like the opportunity of attending a combined church service to mark Old Peoples' Week. This has been arranged for Sunday 12th Nov. at 2 p.m. and afterwards at the Presbytery for a afternoon tea, so would ladies please bring a basket.

At the 41st meeting of the Fingal Valley Welfare Committee for Senior Citizens held recently, members were discussing Old Peoples' Week 1972 and what would interest and give pleasure to members of the three clubs in the Fingal Valley. Mrs. Royle, President of St. Marys Club, said she had talked the matter over with some of the club members; those spoken to did not want an organised trip or luncheon or anything of that sort but would like a combined church service. It was decided then that Mrs. Royle would ask her members, at the meeting to be held next day whether or not they all liked the idea. They did. They put in a hat the names Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Church of England, drawn first was Roman Catholic. Father Buckley, together with the other church leaders in the valley, had previously agreed to be available for a combined church service in Old Peoples' Week, in whatever church was chosen. It is understood that Cornwall members who had their own Old Peoples' Week service last year, will join in the combined service at St. Marys this year.

It is hoped that Fingal, who also had its own service last year will participate as well. This is being put to Fingal Club members at their meeting to be held next week. So it could be that a principle will be established by Elderly Citizen Club members themselves for the future that no matter what other activities might be arranged, a combined service - Roman Catholic Presbyterian, Church of England will be held annually to mark Old Peoples' Week; the church in which the service is held will alternate each year in 3 year periods, as will the place in which the event will take place - St. Marys, Fingal, Cornwall. This call for transport and anyone at all who wishes to be driven to church will be called for if they will arrange with Mrs. C. Royle, St. Marys or myself at Falmouth (Tel. 72 5253). It cannot be stressed too strongly the great contribution the not so old and the younger people, in the valley have made to the success of Elderly Citizens Clubs and the happiness of their members by your interest and

ever ready help. It is needless to say how welcome you all will be at the Combined Church Service for Old Peoples' Week. Calling All Those Superstitious People....

A few words to help you cope.

To help face up to all these hazards of daily life - and to tax your memory even further - do not despair. Most of the spells can presumably be broken by spitting, walking backwards a specified number of paces, going round in a circle three times or hitting the palm of the hand with the closed fist. Dropping a towel or a dishcloth means a visitor but to thwart him all you have to do is to step over it backwards. If you spill salt bad luck unless you throw some of the spilt salt over your left shoulder. If someone gives you a pair of scissors you must give them a penny or the friendship will be cut. If you see a pin and pick it up it is sure to bring you lots of luck - if you don't pick it up it means bad luck - if you pick it up and give it to someone else it means you give your luck away unless you lay it on a table for them to pick up.

If an owl hoots during the day it means bad luck but you can break the spell if you burn salt or take one of your shoes off and turn it upside down. If you walk under a ladder it is bad luck unless you walk back under the ladder to nullify the spell.

Catch a falling leaf and avoid a cold the following winter. If you drop your knife and fork whilst eating a meal it is bad luck for you unless you stop eating.

If your hand itches it means bad luck for you unless you rub it on wood. If you drop your glove, bad luck for you unless someone else picks it up for you.

Everyone knows a four leaf clover means good luck but a five leaf clover is bad luck if you don't throw it away or you can give it to someone else who preserve the luck must also give it to someone else and so on ad infinitum. By the way a six leaf clover is plain unlucky.

It is bad luck if a black cat crosses your path but there are several ways you can undo this one - One way is to go home and start out again, another is to take twelve steps backwards. Still another is to turn around and walk backwards past the spot where the cat crossed and count up to none. P.T.O.

BLESSING OF THE FLEETST. HELENS 29.10.72

Fishermen from St. Helens face the new season with some hope that work will commence in the not too distant future to clear the barway at the mouth of St. Georges Bay which has caused so much fear for the safety of crews, the damage of boats and the loss of livelihood for the local fishermen. The government have approved the building of a retaining wall, the cost \$30,000 but so far there is no sign of the work commencing.

This year a fleet of 34 vessels tied up at the wharf and evidence of the effect of the dangerous sandbar was the presence of larger boats, 7 with steel hulls. The Ceremony of the Blessing of the fleet this year had an ecumenical note as the service was conducted by leaders from three churches - Methodist, Church of England and Catholic. The three hundred people taking part lined the wharf and took up vantage points on the boats.

Following the Blessing of the Seas the Reverend Thomas, Rector of St. Helens threw a Floral Cross into the sea and this token was followed by other floral tributes thrown by Pastor Clarke of St. Marys and members of the congregation. The Blessing of the Fishing Fleet then followed.

In his address Father Buckley of St. Marys mentioned the fact that history was being made as the three churches united to conduct this service.

The fleet did not go to sea till Tuesday 31st October but on Sunday members of the congregation boarded the vessels at the end of the service for a trip down St. Georges Bay.
