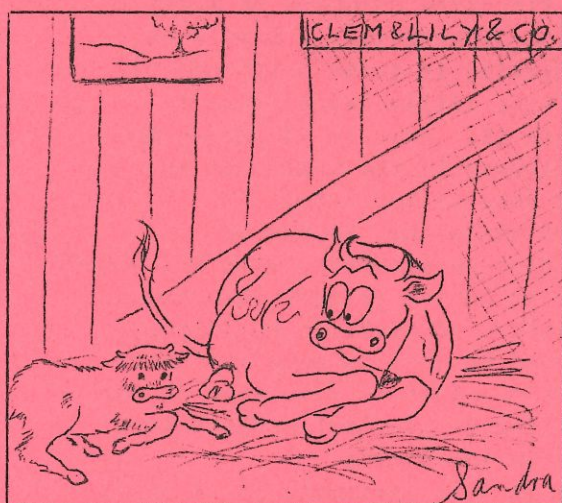
It can be argued that good manners form so small a part of daily living that their absence would scarcely be noticed. Also, present day man is so brilliantly clever that if there is any making to be done, he will do it, and this applies as much to codes of manners as to space-ships.

Furthermore, this is the age of efficiency - of "getting on" and "going places". We are all so frantically busy that to find time to say "please" and "thankyou" is difficult. To say "after you" is more difficult still; who would forego his place in the queue after striving so hard to secure it?

A little thought might, however, convince us that the more we have to do and the less time to do it, the more we collide and grate on other people. Common courtesy might then be as impotrant as lubricating oil in a fast running engine. Not much is needed, but lack of it may cause over-heating and a seize-up.

Let us use the analogy of a horse in this period which follows a Tasmanian victory in the Melbourne Cup. Can a successful and well behaved horse be produced by putting a foal out to range for several years without guidance, example or persuasion? Surely the opposite: the foal would become intractable, wilful and maybe vicious. Our young people, similarly, need the example of their elders in order that good manners may become habitual.

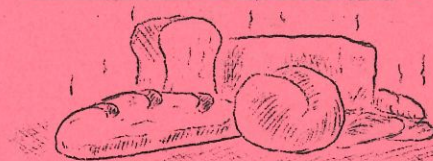

Dear Cornwall on the Hill.

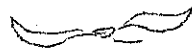
(4) The soldier lads in khaki

Dear Cornwall on the Hill.




ROAD SAFETY

HINTS FOR BABIESNatty Nappies.

No special creams can cure what clean dry napkins and bottoms prevent - nappy rashes.

Have you thought about your nappy washing routine lately?

When you take off a soiled napkin it is simple to turn the faeces into the toilet pan and you can hold the soiled part under the flushing water to get rid of the excess faecal matter.

Rinse and wring the napkin and put it into a covered bucket until the daily napkin wash.

Laboratory tests have shown that this soak water contains a very high bacteria count. In disposing of this water care should be taken to avoid splashing - and please don't pour it down the kitchen sink. There are special products for pre-soaking napkins that your Child Health Sister can tell you about. Use of one of these greatly reduces the bacteria count and makes the job less unpleasant.

When it comes to washing the napkins, ordinary bar soap such as velvet or velvet soap powder is more satisfactory than detergents and soap powders which contain extra chemicals. Baby's skin

may react to some of these washing compounds. However, whatever you use to wash the napkins, rinsing is vitally important. Sometimes three rinses are needed to get the water clear, and clear it must be. If you use a washing machine be sure that the rinsing programme is adequate.

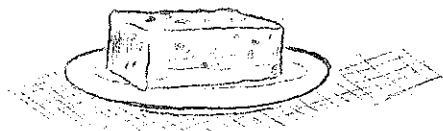
Very hot water for washing and drying in the sun whenever possible make napkins hygienically clean.

RECIPE (Easy)

1 cup chopped dried apricots
1 cup all-bran
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup milk

Soak overnight.

Add 1 cup S.R. flour. Bake in a moderate oven for 45 minutes. A beautiful, moist fruit loaf - prunes or dates may be substituted.
