EDITORIAL

BILLY OR GOUGH ?

Public opinion surveys show the McMahon Government will be defeated on December 2nd. The latest survey (conducted by a reputable British firm) indicates a likely seven per cent swing against the Government in Victoria and six percent in New South Wales and Queensland.

Although public opinion surveys are not infallible, they are known to cause moral havoc among the losing side and are often instrumental in deciding how the uncertain shall cast their vote. After all, who ants to back a loser ?

The victory of the New Zealand Labor Government. is seen by many as an indication of a Commonwealth Labor victory. Certainly it has done much to boost the morale of the Labor Opposition and consequently, to undermine the Liberal-Country Party Image.

Most voters are no longer voting for a party but for a leader. McMahon or Whitlam ? Perhaps the only other candidate the voting public seriously consider is the larger than life figure of Bob Hawke.

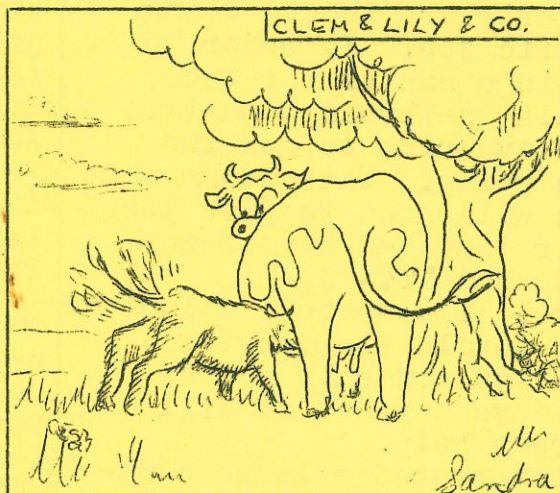
The Liberal Party have picked up no more than one percent support for the 'voters' Budget, brought down last August and now seem to be turning to the D.L.P. for help with an appeal to stop the permissive society.

The former leader of the Labor Party, Mr A. Colwell is coming out strongly on the Liberal side, in favour of law and order, banning pornography and other generalised ills associated with permissiveness.

The Liberal Party, by their appeal to the D.L.P., appear to be resorting to the very faction that caused the split in the Labour Party in 1955 and by so doing, are showing their own uncertainties and division.

It was often said in the past that Arthur Calwell was the cause of the Labor Party having a long reign in Opposition. Whether this was because of his lack of public appeal or Labors apparent infighting is a moot point, but it now seems the Liberals have both there reasons in their own ranks.

Most Australians are pretty apathetic about the Government and seem to have an inbuilt distrust of all politicians.

GOOSEBERRY PUDDING

4 cups gooseberries 3 eggs
 $\frac{1}{2}$ Cup water
 $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups sugar
 $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups breadcrumbs
 Salt to taste
 2 tablespoons castor sugar

Stew gooseberries in water and add sugar according to taste. Add breadcrumbs, yolks of egg and salt. Turn into a pie dish and bake about 25 minutes. Beat egg whites until stiff, adding castor sugar. Pile this on top pudding and return to the oven until set. Serve with custard or cream.

Just Yarnin'

About Cullenswood and Christ Church built on the Cullenswood Estate belonging to the Legge Family. They named the home Cullenswood after the home in Ireland. Going back many generations, Mr R.V.Legge built and maintained the church at his own expense. The estate covered a large slice of the Valley, its boundary extending to Cornwall.

The first Baptism in the church which was erected one hundred and twenty five years ago, was a baby girl named Emma Walker; the first marriage between George Carter and Mary Gardiner in 1851; and the first burial in the old cemetery was Thomas McEvoy in 1852. The founder of the Cullenswood Church died in 1891, and he was succeeded by his son, William Vincent, who was then Colonel and Commandant of all local forces in Tasmania.

Seen through the eyes of a very young boy in the early 1900's, I can still remember him as a very distinguished figure, especially on such historical occasions as the ending of the Boer War, and the celebrations for the Jubilee of Queen Victoria. The Colonel portrayed to the small town of St.Mary that glory which we were so proud of. It was always a thrill to be with my father when he met the Colonel on horse-back in full uniform and exchanged greetings.

He was a very devoted worshipper, and loved the old church, arriving at the service with his wife in a carriage driven by his coachman.

The Colonel was also a keen explorer and frequently went on tours to Ben Lomond. Legges Tor is the highest peak on Ben Lomond.

I knew Mr Robert Legge, grandfather of the present Mr Robert Legge, as a sincere man, with a personality which was admired by all who came into contact with him. He showed his devotion to the people of the valley in the part he played in the building of the St.Marys District Hospital.

The little stone cottage opposite the church, which has now been allowed to slip into decay, was once lived in by a Mr Phillip Becker. He too, was a devoted worshipper in the church and one Sunday frightened us all by having a heart attack during the service.

One of my precious pleasures in life now is the view I have from my home at Cornwall looking down on the Cullenswood Estate - a scene of peace and tranquillity. My apologies to Mr and Mrs R. Legge for taking the liberty of writing about their history, but I knew the Legge family personally

SUNBURN

Sunburn happens mostly to white-skinned people who are too eager to be suntanned and do not know how much they can expose their skin to the rays of the sun.

Everybody's skin is different. It is not true to say that all red-haired fair-skinned people cannot stand sun exposure and that dark-haired, brown-eyed people can.

Little children do not know about their own skins. Their parents need to see that they are not on the beach in the hot part of the day - between 11am and 4pm.

It is then that the ultra-violet rays from the sun burn the skin's inner layer too quickly for the skin to grow thicker and the natural pigment to darken. The result is severe sunburn. White skinned young people are most anxious to get brown. But there is no way of hurrying up the browning. Staying in the hot sun on the beach too long at a time does not mean that you get a better tan. It usually causes bad sunburn, blistering and

peeling. Every year adolescents and children go to hospital with severe sunburn.

A baby or young child should begin with five minutes on the beach, older children and adults 15 minutes, and not in the heat of day. The second day's exposure can be 15 minutes longer and so on. When you find out how much tanning your skin can do, you can sunbask happily and without suffering ill effects.

Remember that ultra-violet rays can bounce off the sand and sea, and that a beach umbrella may shade you but does not give protection against them.

Sunburn can have the same effect as being in a fire or having boiling water poured over the body. It needs the same kind of treatment as accidental burns, for it can cover a very large area of the body and result in first, second or third degree burns. As soon as you can see a member of your family has been very sunburned, apply water as cold as possible until the sting goes.

When a child is badly sunburned over a wide area of the body and feels sick, he should see a doctor as soon as possible.
