## EDITORIAL

#### THE CHRISTMAS SPIRIT.

The birth of Jesus Christ is now recognised by millions. The world really thinks a lot of Jesus, more thon it is prepared to admit, perhaps. Even Hermann Goering, with tears in his eyes, sang "Silent night, Holy night" and recited the Lord's Prayer with eleven other Nazis on trial at Nuremberg, at a Christmas Eve service held in the prison chapel.

Ah yes, how soon we might win the world if only we practised the realism of Christmas all the year

around.





In the early days of settlement in Van Diemans Land the pioneers who made their way eastwards from the Midlands, or who came over the steep track from Falmouth, made their first shelters of split slabs with bark roofs and stone and mud chimneys. When the new settlers gained a little time to attend to their living conditions huts of sawn boards and a few cottages of rough stone or squared blocks became the centre of local life. Towns were laid out near the Valley's two river junctions

at Avoca and Fingal, and by early Victorian times life was settled, roads were improving and mining brought prosperity to Fingal. Most of the buildings were were of wood: the district has a poor supply of clay for bricks or sandstone for building blocks, but two solidly built brick buildings of the period survive on the northern side of the main street, and have been given an "A" classification by the National Trust.

This classification is a recommendation that every effort should be made to preserve the buildings because they are good, simple examples of the best period of Australian architecture. This period began when the new settlers had time and money to spend on something better than makeshift shelters, and before the mid-Victorian boom had spread bad taste and over-decoration across the land. Such buildings at Fingal are particularly valuable because they give character to the main street and because there are no other town buildings of similar quality in a radius of fifty miles.

A few months ago, the Fingal council bought the block on which the old Commercial Bank building stands. Despite an appeal by the National Trust the building is to be destroyed within the next few weeks and the site used for a new block of Council Offices.

Fingal town consists largely of open space and the reason for the destruction of the old building and the siting of the new offices between the main road and the railway is not apparent. Development of the block behind the old bank building as a village green on the Longford model would be in the interests of the people and the building itself could house the public library and perhaps rest rooms for visitors and shoppers from the country. Perhaps this would require too much imagination to be expected from the local rulers.

As we watch the bulldozers crushing the golden-red hand made bricks early in the New Year maybe we can spare a sympathetic thought for the louts who tear out public telephones, ringbark trees, slash bus seats and set matches to the dry bush - they are after all only following the lead of their elective representatives.

#### THE FUNNEL VEB SPIDER

Recently a local child was bitten by a funnel web spider. These spiders do exist in small numbers in this area and we are supplying the following information.

The Tasmanian Funnel Web Spider Atrax venenatus was described in 1927 by Professor V.V. Hickman of the Tasmanian University. It ranks as a species distinct from the Funnel Web spiders of mainland Australia, of which there are possibly half a dozen more. It is however, closely related to the highly venemous Atrax robustus which occurs around Sydney.

The Tasmanian species is fairly common and widely distributed having been found in and around Hobart, Launceston, Ben Lomond, Mt. Hobbs, St. Marys and Coles Bay. It favours a rainforest type of habitat but may also be found along the banks of creeks, in gullies and in cool damp situations where the vegetation provides shade.

It forms a burrow, usually in the soil beside litter, and lines it with a dense sheet of silken web. At the surface the tube like lining is expanded to form a funnel like entrance from which strands radiate to entangle insects and give warning of possible prey. Females are usually confined to their nests but males live a rather nomadic existence and may wander about in search of a made. Because of this habit they may sometimes enter houses.

The spider is generally black, females growing to 25mm. (one inch) in body length, excluding their legs, with the males slightly smaller in their body but much longer in their legs. Its aggressive attitude when disturbed is fearsome and a good indicator of identity. It raises its front two pairs of legs, fangs extended and stands on its back legs, ready to strick. When angered, drops of venom may appear on the tips of the fangs. When at rest the fangs fold beneath the head and lie almost parallel. They have a fine channel which runs from the venom sack to the tip of the fang and thus they act as hypodermic needles in vonveying venom to their victim.

Unlike most spiders, their fangs operate as stabbing weapons, being used with a sharp downwards thrust and not with a pinching action. It is one of our most deadly animals and few snakes have larger or more efficient fangs.

#### TREATMENT OF BITE

If the bite is on a limb, apply a constrictive bandage.
Wash the bitten area.
Apply a cold compress.
Immobilise the limb and keep the casualty at rest.
Reassure the casualty.

Do not delay in obtaining medical aid. Bring the spider for identification if possible.

#### THE CONSTRICTIVE BANDAGE

The ideal constrictive bandage is flat rubber 2 inches wide but suitable materials are—Belt, Strip of cloth, necktie, han kerchief, broad rubber tubing. Unsuitable materials are — Shoelaces, cord, rope, electric light flex. These are unsuitable because they cut into the flesh and may damage major blood vessels.

Application: Apply the bandage between the bite and the heart.

Apply above elbow or knee.

Apply sufficient pressure to obstruct the main artery to the limb.


Complete stoppage is judged by obliteration of the pulse below the bandage.

The limb may swell, become red, blue or pale in colour.

The bandage MUST be released after 1½ hours.

The time of application should be prominently marked on the casualtys forehead.

If practicable keep constricted limb cold and moist.
