IT IS A PLEASURE to drive on the road from Fingal to St. Marys nowadays. Looking back a few years, in fact, it is vastly different from the crazy switch-back which caused so many headaches and con cussion and made the trip rather unpleasant. The old bridge across the Break o' Day was a wonder to behold! People often paused to wonder if it would hold until they got across. Especially when the river was in flood!

When one considers the amount of holiday traffic which migrates to the Coast including caravans, boats, trailers, etc., the road improvement was a boon to the whole population as well as the local community.

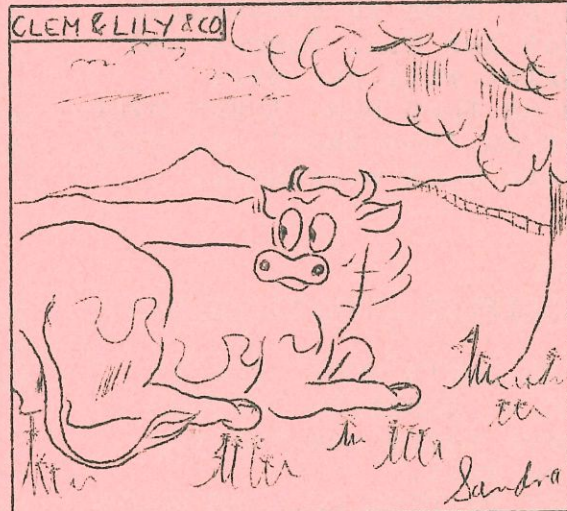
The Minister for Lands and Works, Mr. Barnard, has informed Mr. Andrew Lohrey, M.H.A. that three quarters of a million dollars will be spent on the Conara - St. Marys road over the next eighteen months. The money will be used for widening the road and taking off bad bends. Work has already begun on the sharp bend coming into Fingal from the Avoca direction.

Mr. Lohrey said the road has always been too narrow and winding, making it particularly dangerous in Winter when night fogs pervade the valley. He also added that it was good to see the Government realising the importance of the area.

Another recent development is the long-awaited new bridge at Avoca across the St. Pauls River. This is a major bridge construction, the second for the Fingal Valley over the last three years.

IT IS PLEASING to see all these improvements progressing and to imagine what a difference there will be in another two years when it is all complete. From Conara to St. Marys the traveller will find it an easy, comfortable drive and be able to enjoy the wonderful scenery.

Let us hope that if he intends to travel on the Coast that there will still be an open road down either St. Marys or the Elephant Pass, for alas, should it rain again on our East Coast, the soil

It was lovely to see the farmers bringing in their milk in their horses and carts. Then the blacksmith had a shop just by the bridge on the piece of land opposite the pub. It was a very busy place. My dad used to recall the flour mill at Fingal. Every one who could grow their own wheat and took it down to Fingal to be ground. Nothing was wasted; the pollard for pigs and the flour for bread, most people making their own. There was no frozen food stuffs in those days either. Apples were sliced and strung on strings across windows to dry. One old lady always sat out side to make her jam. She had just the fire she wanted and could stir away without getting in the way of meals. Most people had open fire places and in the big places they had their own ovens.

PRESS STATEMENT

The Tasmanian A.L.P. Rural Committee passed a Resolution at their last bi-monthly meeting as follows:-

"That the Post Office organisation be overhauled by the new Labor Government with a view to restoring service as a keynote to the Post Office. Further, that the \$25 installation fee for telephone be abolished; that telephone rentals be reviewed; that closure of non-official Post Offices be stopped; that stamps be reduced; that one phone book be restored in Tasmania and the Post Office remove distance limitations on installation of phones to isolated country areas, if only for safety and emergency reasons."

Mr. Duthie M.H.R., the secretary of the Tasmanian A.L.P. Rural Committee was asked to take these matters up with the new Postmaster-General, Hon. Lionel Bowen M.P. Mr. Duthie said he was also suggesting to the Minister that we could perhaps reduce the interest rate on Capital Loans to P.M.G. from the Treasury?

The newly-formed St. Helens Game Fishing Club held its first club Rally Day last Sunday. Four boats braved the weather and at 9.45 am the first tuna of the season was boated. 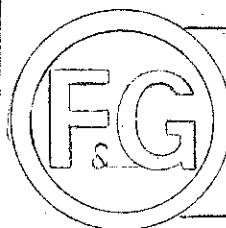

FEDERAL LABOR GOVERNMENT ON THE MOVE

Although it is only a matter of weeks since the Federal Labor Government was sworn in, it has been very busy putting many points of policy into effect.

NEWS ABOUT PENSIONS - All pensions and benefits have been increased and will now be payable anywhere in the World. Old age, Widows and Invalid Pensions have been increased as from December 4th last year and Unemployed and Sickness Benefits increases will date from March 1st this year. Age, Invalid and Widows' Pensions have been raised by \$1.50 a week. This means that they will now receive \$21.50 a week if single and \$37.50 a week if married.

These pensions will be raised every spring and autumn by \$1.50 each time, until they reach 25% of average weekly male earnings. All widows will now receive the same basic pension rate, the same as other pension rates; this means an increase of \$4.25 a week for Class B and C Widows' Pensions.

The Means Test on pensions will be abolished within three years. Unemployment, Sickness and Special Benefits have all been increased to the new standard pension and benefit rate of \$21.50 a week. This means an increase of \$4.50 a week for most people receiving these benefits. They will also now receive \$4.50 for each dependant child over 16 years still in full time education.

Previously this benefit cut out when the child turned 16 even if his education continued years beyond this. People seeking Unemployment, Sickness and Special Benefits, who are under 21 years will now receive the full adult rate. This means that people under 18 will now get \$21.50 instead of \$7.50 and people between 18 and 21 will get \$21.50 instead of \$11.

And finally, pensions will be paid to all people eligible for Old Age, Widows or Invalid Benefits, wherever they choose to live. These will be paid even if the person has not lived in Australia for 20 years.
