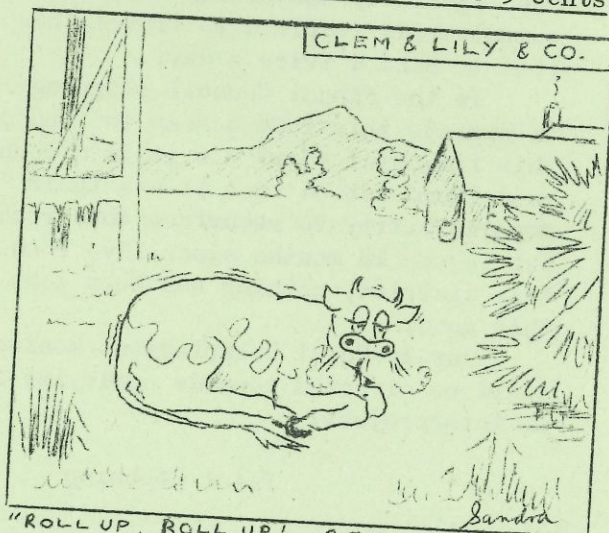
WANTED - SECONDARY INDUSTRY

It is now several weeks since the Labor Party swept to power in Tasmania. In these few weeks the new government has gone about the business of governing energetically. Chief Secretary, Mr. Batt, Agriculture Minister, Mr. Costello, Mr. Lowe in Housing and Mr. Barnard in Public Works have all had their fair share of publicity on what they are doing or intending to do about reassessing Tasmania's not too healthy finances.

Much of this publicity has been directed to the North of the state especially in regard to the Launceston Casino issue and the Bell Bay rail link. The former, of course will have little if any benefit to this district, but the latter in the future should have quite a deal of benefit. It was the Liberal-Centre Party Government which was instrumental in starting this project rolling and fortunately the new Government is treating it with the same respect.

This rail link - as we have pointed out previously - means for the first time this district will be within striking distance of a large port. The exact benefits of this will be evident when woodchips get under way next year. But there are other benefits not quite so obvious. It means simply that the Fingal Valley and East Coast will now be in a position where any local products could be loaded direct on the ships bound for the mainland and overseas at a reasonable cost.

But of course this can only be of real benefit if there is something we have to manufacture and sell. Other than primary products there is really nothing worthwhile. However with this new development it now seems feasible to reconsider the question of secondary industry in these districts. It is hoped the new Government will continue not only to press for expansion of the North but for the East and North East as well.

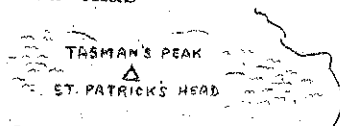

The Naming of St. Patrick's Head

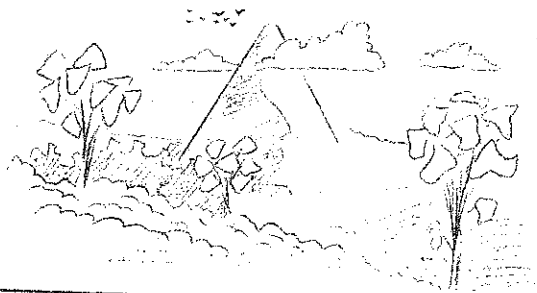
This Mountain was first mentioned by Abel Tasman when he sailed up the East Coast of Tasmania in 1642. It was his last view of the Island as he turned Eastward and later discovered New Zealand and he records it as a high round mountain.

The first Englishman to sight the East Coast of Tasmania were Captain Tobias Furneaux and his men in 1772 after their vessel became separated from Captain Cook's vessel during his second voyage to the South Seas. Furneaux arrived at the Headland in the vicinity of the mountain on St. Patrick's Day 1772 and named it St. Patrick's Head. In 1798 Bass and Flinders sailed round Tasmania, proving it to be an island and Matthew Flinders recognising the mountain as Tasman's "High Round Mountain" named it Tasman's Peak. On his map, the names of the Peak and the headland were recorded thus



It is the latter name which has survived from St. Marys, it is a very distinctive landmark - a symmetrical peak, which looks altogether different from the view from the sea. It is known locally as Paddy's Head.

The Council put a track up the mountain in the early 1920's, wiring the steeper places and we are indebted to Mr. Bill Graham for the work he has put into clearing the track in the past two years. Shortly, the Tourist and Progress Assoc. will be arranging a trip up the mountain and you would be well advised to come along and see the wonderful view of the Coast and Fingal Valley.



HANDICAPPED PERSONS SURVEY.

This initial survey at present being carried out in Tasmania is an attempt to supply a broad over all picture in this area as a first step in determining the adequacy of existing facilities, and to indicate what additional facilities are needed to help these people.

The lack of even an estimate of the number of handicapped persons is a complete bar to any intelligent planning of services. For the purposes of this survey a handicapped person is defined as "any person who possesses a physical, mental or educational problem which is likely to be permanently disabling, interfere with his education or prevent normal employment.

Initially the object is to find those who may require help. A form giving Criteria for Cases is to be supplied to doctors, with consent forms to be signed by the participant or his guardian. In the country areas, patients may be asked to attend a central location of a specified date and Dr. J.E. Farrar will interview them personally.

It is hoped that this will form the basis of a Register of Handicap. It should be emphasized that only a voluntary system of Registration is envisaged.

The Department of Social Services is co-operating by sending an extended version of the Consent Form out to all Invalid Pensioners. This will specifically state that there is no question of interfering with their pension entitlement. It would be helpful if ALL Invalid Pensioners would complete this, whether or not likely to require help.

All the Guides would like to say thank you to their parents, the Local Assoc. and all the people who have supported their fund raising efforts. They had a wonderful time and learnt a lot about the City of Sydney and enjoyed meeting Guides from other States of Australia and getting new ideas.

HUMAN HYDATID INCIDENCE HALVED IN TASMANIA

In the three calendar years 1969-71 the incidence of human hydatid disease (27 cases) dropped to roughly half of that seen in the previous 3 year period 1966-68 (52 cases). These statistics, collected by the Tasmanian Hydatids Eradication Council in a survey on behalf of the Director of Public Health, have recently been released.

The survey reports: Out of 106 patients seen over the six years, 79 were new cases and 27 were previously diagnosed patients re-admitted one or more times for further treatment. There had been a grand total of 130 admissions, over one third of which (51) were re-admissions. In assessing campaign progress it is of course better to exclude re-admissions.

Allowing for population increase, calculations based on the estimated population figure at mid-year in each middle year (1967 and 1970) give an annual incidence per 100,000 population of 4.6 cases in 1966-1968 and 2.3 cases in 1969-71.

One of the most obvious reasons for the decline in cases was the drop in the infection rate in dogs over the same six-year period of 11 per cent to under one percent. Field Officers of the Department of Agriculture had played a vital part as had the Tasmanian Hydatids Eradication Council. However, without the understanding and support of the farming community those efforts could not have been so successful.

Abattoir surveys by the Department of Agriculture are showing a substantial decrease in the infection rates in sheep but a fall in the human incidence of this magnitude was not expected so early. "However it still seems it is extremely important to continue these efforts now that we have got so far. Any relaxation of the campaign at this stage could undo a great deal of the good work which has already been done."

The survey has shown that at least 10 of the 106 patients involved (or 1 in 10) had had positive dogs since the testing programme started (1964), or had come from properties where there were positive

dogs. A great many more admit that when they were children they were in contact with offal-fed dogs.

As against this, there were 6 patients who had lived in towns all their lives and had no knowledge of having had any contact with dogs.

Unfortunately the true incidence in Tasmania has never been ascertained before. Figures published by Dew (1953) gave the Tasmanian incidence as 9.3 cases per 100,000 per annum, and Meldrum (1968) reported an average of 15.1 cases per 100,000 in the 10 years up to 1962, but both these authors collected their cases by writing to surgeons, and their figures included readmissions.
