EDITORIAL

PUBLIC - SERVICE?

On Ralph Nader's recent visit to Australia, one of his criticisms was directed towards the secrecy surrounding the Public Service.

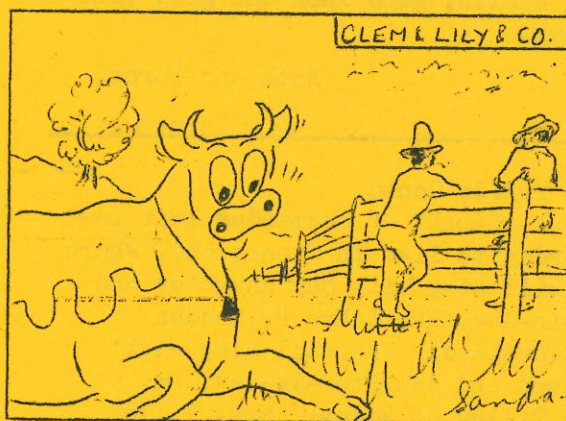
Most people are rather vague as to the exact functions of various branches of the Public Service and speak disparagingly of 'red tape' and over staffed offices where no one seems capable of making a decision without referring to someone in a superior position. These people in turn also must refer to someone else in a more superior position and so on.

It is not just the Public who are vague as to the exact functions performed within the Service, but the people within the actual Service, seen often, even vaguer. It is common practice for the public to receive duplicated letters and requests from within the same department. This is usually termed inefficiency by the people concerned, but in view of Nader's remarks, it could well be the all pervading secrecy that surrounds every action and decision within a department is really at the root of it.

Even ministers of departments are often unaware of what goes on within their department and while conceding that they must have to rely on the so-called experts, the public service expert's power itself is mostly unchallenged. In fact, the public are usually not aware of this power. It has been said that the Public Service run the country and would carry on just the same without any Government at all.

While a minister has access to files and reports, it is hard for a back-bencher to obtain much information at all, unless he is friendly with the Minister. As the Opposition, it is virtually impossible unless there is a public service 'leak'.

When the Ombudsman Bill was defeated in the Upper House, during the Liberal Government reign in this state, one of the main objections by members was that outsiders, e.g., the Ombudsman, would have access to files and reports that the Government was not able to view. No one but the Public Service has access, it seems, Why? Surely all this secrecy is the very antithesis of true democracy and only makes a farce of parliamentary representation of the people



If a member, who represents a section of voters, can not get any information he requires in regard to his voters, how can the voter himself have the faintest idea how the country is governed or what happens to his tax money etc.

It is all very well for parliamentarians to tell us that an ombudsman is unnecessary in a true democratic state, but if in fact Nader is right and democracy is a myth, what then?

Perhaps after all the most important role an ombudsman would play in this state would not be the one we hear most about, i.e., to be 'the ears and voice of public grievances'; he could, in fact, be 'the brake' for a runaway Public Service. In other words, he could be the man to put back the true meaning of the term - Public Service.

Just Yarnin'

This week to Miss Lillian Hall of Cornwall. St. Marys and district at the beginning of the 19th Century.

St. Marys railway station was a much busier place than it is today, all people who had business outside the district travelled by rail which was the only means of transport in days long ago, as well as passenger service there was the freight by rail of approximately 36 seven ton railway wagons each day from the Cornwall and Mt. Nicholas Coal mines.

In St. Marys, "The Square", which was principal shopping centre was the main attraction for farmers and Miners with their families to show off their best horse, well groomed, with jankers and Harness well polished for the occasion, for a brisk trot around The Square. The horses were walked most of the way, until reaching their objective, and then, with a flash of the whip, away they went at full speed.

Near the Police Station was a general store, kept by Mr. Fred Napier, (father of our Mr. Garth Napier), who was a very worthy pioneer of the district. Among his many talents, he was an accomplished organist.

We enjoyed immensely the organ being played by him at the old Cullenswood Church. By the Parish Hall was Mr. Mitchell, Wheelwright and Funeral Director. Where Mr. McGee's garage is, was a blacksmith shop and a few yards further down was another blacksmith, and on the opposite side was another big store, kept by Mr. Todd. Where Mr. Gordon Freeman lives was a saddlers shop, kept by Mr. Schier, where all harness and leather goods were supplied and made. Also in the same area lived a music teacher, with many pupils learning piano playing. I guess there are still some around who profited by her teaching. In those days, we were bitter rivals on the football field "St. Marys and the Miners". There were many hotly contested matches - the women of each side were as keen as their menfolk. One had to be discreet as to which side he was barracking for, or he would get a "whack on the skull" with an umbrella. But now we have improved for the better as we are all the same team.

On every alternate Friday it was pay day for the men of Mt. Nicholas, Cornwall. When the cheques came, they were cashed at St. Marys Commercial Bank. The managers then took them by horse and trap to each mine, only once has there been an attempt of robbery, and that happened to Mr. Ledger, manager of Mt. Nicholas.

He was on a very isolated part of the road amongst huge gum trees and logs, when suddenly a voice from the roadside demanded the money or his life. Mr. Ledger, who was a most determined man had no thought of giving up the bag of money, whipped his horse to a gallop and both he and the horse arrived at the office in a lather of sweat, Mr. Ledger still clinging tightly to the money. In the days of which I am writing, it was a common sight to see teams of bullocks and horse-drawn wagons, hauling heavy loads along the roads, also very noisy tractor engines pulling threshing plants to the farms. I wonder if we have advanced to the benefit of mankind, from the horse and cart day to the fast moving cars, when we hear of the road accidents today, than when life was lived at a more leisurely pace? In conclusion, I wonder what the young people think of the sentiments of the above?

Chop fruit - Mix together - Sprinkle with powdered saccharine if desired.
One serve can be substituted for I portion of fruit or $\frac{1}{2}$ slice of bread.

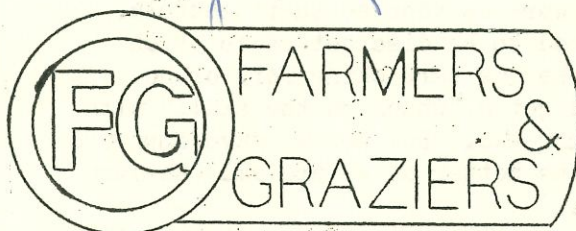

FIGHT FOR TOP POSITIONS

With only two games before the finals, Avoca, Fingal and St. Marys will have a battle royal for the top two places in the four. St. Marys are certainties for one of these positions if they can beat Swansea this week. Avoca will have to beat both Fingal and St. Marys to make sure of getting in while Fingal, who have only one game to play must beat Avoca.

This week's match of the day will be at Fingal, where the Blues meet the confident Avoca side, where the winner will almost be certain at having the double chance in the finals. Fingal are finishing the season well and appear to be over their bit of a slump they had earlier and with all players fit except "Silky" Parker, who broke his arm against St. Helens, should gain the points from Avoca after a hard fought close game. Johnny Smith has returned to the Blues side and his battle with Kevin Youd should be the clash of the day. Lawrence and Sulzberger should also have a keen battle with Avoca's Ransom, Hay and Williams and the winners of the ruck duels will have a big bearing on the game. Singline is continuing his good form at full forward but could find the clock checking Trevor Williams his hardest full-back to score against he has struck this year. Avoca have a match winner in White when he strikes his "Hobbles" but Fingal have the player in Kenyon to check him and limit his opportunities. All in all it should draw a big crowd.

St. Helens travel to Rossarden on Saturday, where it could be another good match, the last time these teams met at the mountain only 1 point separated them and no doubt the "Bay" will be trying to turn the tables this time, but I feel Rossarden will prove too strong with their big men around the ground. St. Helens have gained a good recruit in Jeffray and with Coker, Kruska, Chapple, Barr and Riley all in good form it will not be a walkover and should be another close clash. St. Helens have a lot of good young players such as Dwyer, Franks brothers, Freeman and Semmens and next year, if they all stay together will be final contenders. Rossarden who are in the four for the first time for a few years have improved a lot this year and could still trouble the top teams in the finals although they have been unfortunate this year with injuries and players leaving the state etc. Barry Parish must be commended, however, for lifting the "Redlegs" up the ladder and into the four.

Swansea travel to St. Marys where they will be trying to win their first game of the year, as they have always had a habit of beating the "Tigers" at the end of the year. The "Tigers", however, have become very mean this year and don't like getting beaten and should make sure the wooden spooners go home disappointed. St. Marys rucks who are back at full strength with McCarter, Wardlaw and the evergreen Salter all in good form should prove too strong for the "Bulldogs" Whitton and Lyne. St. Marys rovers in Pendlebury and Williams have both had a great year and also should finish on top of Cusick the only Swansea rover to strike any form this year. As a matter of fact not because I'm "one eyed", but I can't see a winner for Swansea all over the ground as St. Marys have been playing just as well as Swansea has been bad.

The following week the only match of importance to the four will be at Avoca where they meet St. Marys. On the only two encounters these teams have had this year, Avoca have won both times by narrow margins. St. Marys will be flat out to prove that they can beat Avoca, so this also should be a real crowd pleaser to finish the year, before the finals. Both teams appear to be very even from the goal to goal line and the match will hinge on the flanks and wings and once again, the rucks and rovers will play a prominent part in the game. For a winner once again, it's a toss of a coin and it came down St. Marys.

Campbelltown travel to St. Helens for their last game of the year where I feel the home side will be too strong. Campbelltown, who have not fared as well as many thought this year, will, I feel, be a force next year and they have found it a much harder competition than they expected and must improve with their experience. Rossarden should defeat Swansea easily at Rossarden in their last game this year and it must be disappointing for the "Bulldog" supporters not to win a game, however let's hope they recruit better this year and come back next year the side they were a few years ago.
