





Working together in St Helens

Construction is set to resume this week on the sewerage main upgrades along the Tasman Highway from Jason Street to the Golden Fleece Bridge.

In recent weeks, TasWater has worked closely with Aboriginal Heritage Tasmania to ensure the works do not impact important local historical sites, bringing on Cultural Heritage Management Australia to conduct a survey of the area.

Aboriginal Heritage Tasmania Director, Steve Gall, stated that TasWater undertook Aboriginal heritage due diligence in accordance with the new Guidelines under the Aboriginal Heritage Act 1975. Mr Gall finds it encouraging that TasWater are committed to protecting the Aboriginal cultural values of the

TasWater Project Manager Fraser Nuttall is pleased that measures can be put in place to preserve important heritage sites and the project can successfully continue.

"The upgrade works have proceeded well on the Northern side of the bridge where the mains have been upgraded from the sewage treatment plant to



the Esplanade Sewage Pump Station. The existing pipes are being replaced with larger sized pipes to increase the capacity of the system, ensure it works more efficiently, reducing the risk of sewage spills impacting local oyster farmers and other seafood businesses.

We have been working closely with the Break O'Day Council to ensure this project is completed as safely and quickly as possible. We appreciate the cooperation and patience from the public while we continue this important work."

Temporary traffic arrangements will reduce traffic to a single lane during normal working hours in some areas while the construction resumes. TasWater and its contractors are taking steps to minimise any impacts on local residents.

Child care relief around the corner for Tasmanian families

Over 16,000 families in Tasmania will be better off from the Turnbull Government's child care

Senator Jonathon Duniam said "the new child care package will provide the greatest hours of support to the families who work the longest hours, and the greatest subsidy and financial support to the families who earn the least.

"We know the cost pressures that families face so we've taken action to overhaul a broken system. Families using child care can be reassured that relief is around the corner" said Senator

Minister for Education and Training, Simon Birmingham, said the child care changes are focused on helping the families that need it most.

"Almost one million families will benefit from our additional \$2.5billion investment and comprehensive changes to the subsidy system, our new hourly rate cap to put downward pressure on fee increases and the end of the \$7,613 annual rebate cap. With 1.15 million Australian families set to access child care next year it's important families have the opportunity to plan for the changes. I urge families to visit our child care estimator, plug in their details and see exactly how they're set to benefit" said Minister Birmingham.


The Turnbull Government's child care package includes:

- Increasing Australia's investment in early childhood education and care by \$2.5 billion so that almost one million Australian families benefit
- Introducing a better targeted activity test to ensure taxpayer subsidised child care places are targeted to those who depend on it in order to work, or work more hours.
- Delivering the highest rate of subsidy to those on the lowest income levels and more hours of subsidy to those who work the most. We're increasing the base subsidy from around 72 per cent to 85 per cent for the more than 370,000 families earning around \$65,000 or less a year.
- Low and middle income families will no longer be limited by an annual \$7,613 cap on the amount of subsidised child care they can access - that's more than 85 per cent of families using child care and means families won't run out of subsidy mid-year as happens now.
- A \$1.2 billion Child Care Safety Net will support vulnerable children and families who need extra support.



Hub4Health Walking Group

This is my report on the walk I led on 23/8/17: 15 people arrived at the Shelly Beach turnoff to walk in the sunshine. We first went up to the lookout to take in the view of the Tasman Sea to the east and Wrinklers Beach to the south, and the beautiful panorama of the beaches with the hills beyond. Although the tide was well in, there were shells in plentiful supply on the point.

The walk continued south along the wide sandy beach towards the Wrinklers Bridge. On the way we saw lots of shore birds - juvenile and adult Pacific gulls, silver gulls, oystercatchers and hooded plovers.

We then made our way along the bush track at the north of the lagoon, through the flowering boobyallas which look lovely interspersed with pink heath and other wild flowers just starting to bloom.

There were lots of wrens in the undergrowth and grebes and black swans on the lagoon but the highlight of the day was watching a male musk duck. This duck has interesting displaying behavior, as the lobe under its bill swells up make its head double in size, and it fanned up its tail feathers and kicked water backwards in a spray

All this went on for 5 to 10 minutes or more, and it eventually succeeded in attracting the attention of a female who briefly swam behind it before losing interest and heading off alone.

We walked back along the footpath to enjoy a cuppa, to conclude our pleasant morning. Thanks to those who brought biscuits and helped with preparation and clearing up. Much appreciated! Report by Wendy Saunders

Seven members of the Walking Group met at the end of the road beyond Irish Town, the beginning of the walk up Paddy's Head, a cool southerly was blowing. The track winds up around the tops of the paddocks and from one vantage point the higher parts of Ben Lomond stood out in white, contrasting with the darker sky.

The track entered the forest and soon began to climb steeply up the rocky slope, eventually gaining the ridgetop. Here we left the shady forest and emerged into the warm sunshine with a magnificent view to the north, as far as Mt Strzelecki on Flinders Island and the peaks of Cape Barren Island.

This was a pleasant spot to stop for a snack before we climbed further up the ridge and back into the lazy

Over rocky knobs and through narrow defiles, the way to the summit was a route of least resistance, until it reached the final climb. A fixed ladder allowed us to get up to the higher level and then another steep section followed but, what luck, we had brought a short ladder with

us, and we climbed it with ease.

Then just a short scramble remained before reaching the summit, complete with trig, and the 360 degree view. The cold southerly ensured that we did not remain there for long. We soon retraced our steps to the first lookout and enjoyed

our varied lunch on the warm rocks. In the early afternoon we plunged back into forest and made a quick descent back down to the cars, completing a most worthwhile Saturday walk. Thank you to those who carried

Learning to drive educational video offers more than instruction

Learning to drive can be overwhelming at the best of times, but when you also struggle with literacy, gaining a licence can seem like an impossible task. Two young Break O'Day residents, Megan Stocks and Rose Steel, are part of Break O'Day Council's Get in 2 Gear program, a State Government funded learner driver program that pairs participants with mentors with the aim of helping them gain their driver's licence. Megan and Rose both felt their experience with the program went beyond just getting a licence; they both stated that the program had really helped their selfconfidence. When they were approached to help make an educational

video for the program, they jumped at the chance.

Break O'Day Youth facilitator Simon Holmes secured funding from LINC to produce the educational video and worked with Council's Community Services Project Officer, Erica Lowry to educate and engage the young women with the concept. Megan and Rose displayed professionalism and were not deterred by seeing and hearing themselves on film. They reviewed each scene together and brainstormed oral literacy improvements, prior to the final scenes being produced.

The aim of the project was to improve the oral literacy of the participants and build their self-confidence, as well as producing a video that would help future program mentees and mentors.

Break O'Day Mayor Mick Tucker

said it was great to see Megan and Rose not only helping themselves, but also helping others.

"At Council we have seen how a program like this can change lives; having a licence opens up a whole new world to participants, not just because they are mobile, but because they have gained confidence in themselves and their abilities," Mayor Tucker said.

"We are really proud of the program and what Megan and Rose have achieved; they are a great example to others in our community."

Mt Elephant and Beyond Book Club review

Heart of Darkness by Joseph Conrad was the book we read this past month. It was written in 1899 and stands as a modern classic that has stimulated and inspired discussion and imitation for over a century. Francis Ford Coppola's film Apocalypse Now, released in 1979, uses many of the ideas of this story, transposed to the Vietnam war in the 70's.

Conrad was born in Ukraine, of Polish parents, so English was his third language, thus his extensive writings that include Lord Jim and Nostromo are even more remarkable.

As a young man Conrad spent 20 years as a merchant seaman, becoming a British citizen and travelling in the Far East and Africa, and it wasn't till he was 39 that he gave up the sea and turned to full time writing.

Heart of Darkness is very short, just over 120 pages long, but it is a weighty read. It was inspired by a trip Conrad made as Captain on a French Congo River boat into the heart of Africa. Marlow is the narrator and he tells the story to a group of friends on board a cruising yawl as they wait for the tide to turn at the mouth of the Thames. The sun sets and the tale of Marlow's trip up the Congo begins with Marlow's disembodied voice coming to them out of the deepening gloom of nightfall.

The action takes place at the beginning of the colonisation and exploitation by Britain and Belgium of the Congo and its people. Marlow's task is to travel up the river by boat, after weeks of battling through the jun-

gle on foot, to check on the agent of the company at the last station on the river.

From the very beginning of the journey Marlow has heard rumours and speculation about this man, Kurtz, and by means of frequent references to him we are kept in suspense till the end.


This sounds, perhaps, like an adventure story and in some ways it is. However it is also something much deeper: it is an exploration of the darkness of the human psyche, the line where "civilisation", as we know it, ends and savagery and darkness take over.

Conrad's language brings alive for the reader the lush, threatening and wild jungle that Marlow passes through. Through Marlow's eyes and commentary we see that one of Conrad's concerns is the evils of colonisation where greed, indifference and cruelty meet the unknown, dark and savage otherness of the jungle and the natives who live in it.

There is irony in many of the grotesque comments that he makes about the degradation and monstrosities he witnesses.

Eventually, after attacks by local tribes, he comes upon the ivory trading agent, Kurtz, who is dying. We are led to believe that he has committed atrocities, that he has "gone over" to the "dark side" and has assumed the status of a god like figure in the eyes of the natives who worship him and don't want him to leave.


Marlow takes him on board and in a way comes under his spell. Kurtz had apparently been a man of great promise and ambition but has succumbed to the primitive and dark urges of the jungle.



Today we might say that he went crazy from loneliness but it is more than that. There is evidence at his house in the jungle that he has taken part in hideous rites and killings. He is deluded and dying but still manages to hold forth on good and evil. Eventually Marlow returns to England and visits "The Intended", the fiancée of Kurtz, with his personal papers. He finds himself continuing the myth of the "noble" Kurtz telling her what she wants to hear, that her name was the last thing Kurtz uttered. In reality he had whispered, "The Horror, the Horror!"

And so ends Marlow's chilling tale and we are back on the boat in the Thames with the four friends.

If you are prepared to read carefully you will see that there is a profound struggle to understand the potential darkness at the heart of every person that can take over when the veneer of civilisation is undermined and swept away. This story is also an indictment of the colonial system embodied by the corrupted figure of Kurtz who was "hollow at the core". It is a critique of Imperialism and colonisation and in many ways seems very contemporary in its attitudes.



C'mon, you know you want to. Last chance guys ...



Humans of Launceston ~ ~ Ashley

"On Mondays, I work up at Sandhill Nursing Home. I help set up for bingo and I sell chips and chocolates in the kiosk. I do the dishes and make cappuccinos. I like working with the old people and talking with them. You hear some amazing stories.

Old people grew up without television. Because T.V didn't get invented till 1955 and colour T.V didn't come into Australia till 1975. That's interesting isn't it?

On Fridays I go to Gary Presnell Bodyworks and I do all types of jobs. I clean out the paper shredder, do office work like emptying rubbish bins and do the dishes in the staff room. I'm good at doing dishes. I get along with the men there. They are a nice set of men there and I like them a lot".

"I was born on the 2nd of the 2nd in '95 at 11.a.m at QV. I can remember I was born on a Thursday. I lived in Pioneer Place in Ravenswood and I liked living there but I can't really remember because I was so young when I was a baby. I went to Ravenswood Heights Primary School and I did all different types of sport. Sometimes I got picked on because of my autism but it was pretty good. Most of the kids were really nice".

Michelle (Ashley's Mum) - "Ash won't ever work full time because of his disabilities but his Dad and I are setting him up to be ready to go into the workforce in some capacity down the track.

Ash has epilepsy, autism and hydrocephalous, which is fluid on the brain. He has a few other things wrong too and it's been a hard slog for Ash. He could have sat at home on a pension. We didn't want that. He didn't want that either.

We wanted to push Ash to be independent and be an active member of the community. To achieve milestones for himself and part of that of course is having a job and being part of the workforce with responsibilities and routine.

When I was 12 weeks pregnant with Ash, the doctors picked up on the fluid on his brain. They told Colin and I that Ash would never walk or talk and would be paralysed from the neck down and we had two weeks to abort. We both didn't believe in that stuff so here we are. Look at him. He's wonderful. He amazes medical professionals all the time.

He has an underdeveloped cerebellum, so his balance is a bit off but that's why the dancing is so good for him as it helps him with his balance. He's got a lot of obstacles to get over but he'll get there don't you worry. It's been a long and hard journey for Ash, and Colin and I are both very proud of him.

When he was young we had Ash very involved with early intervention through St Giles who were just fantastic with Ash. But we were hell bent on Ash going to a mainstream school. He spent some time in day care at St

Giles with other children with disabilities and he began to mimic those children, so he was really taking steps backwards so we stopped him going there. He thrived in a mainstream school so it was a good decision by Colin and I". Ash-"I like dancing. My Dad got me into it. He doesn't dance my Dad. Ever. But he takes me to concerts so I can do it. I

go to the casino a lot and I dance up there. They have great musicians up there. I go to a lot of comedy concerts by Col Elliott and Kevin 'Bloody' Wilson.

l love going to concerts. I went to one last night called Peace Train- The Cat Stevens impersonator. I met him after it and he loved me because I told him that I had been listening to a podcast on Spotify of him playing live at the Gympie Muster from a few years ago and he got really excited and talked to me and said nobody listened to that so I'm pretty cool. I couldn't get away from him (laughs).

I love Elvis, Johnny Cash, Roy Orbison, Neil Diamond and Leo Sayer. I saw Russell Morris at an APIA show. Joe Camil-

leri was there too. And Colin Hay from Men at Work. They write some great songs. I met them all. They liked me and I liked them.

My favourite song at the moment is Drift Away. (starts singing Drift Away). I met Barnesy too. He was very nice to me. Look at the photo. That's me there and that's Barnesy. I look not happy but I was.

Mrs Brown Boys. I met her too and all of the Housos cast. I met Ahn Do. He was nice.

I don't even get anxiety anymore. I've come a long way. I have been catching a bus on my own for 12 months now. It's good on the bus. There's always nice people on the bus. The first time Mum let me on the bus on my own, I went into town and spent \$200 on lots of things.

Games, DVD's and C.D's and heaps of just rubbish (laughs)

I came home with so many shopping bags. Mum was like wow. (Laughs) I want Mum to come on the bus. She is coming on Tuesday. This Tuesday and we will go out for lunch.

I'm starting to understand about money now.


You can't waste it. Except on presents.

Sharing is good for you.

Mum and Dad split up a year ago and I am coping better about it now. Mum said it's just a hurdle in life and I see Mum is happy now and Dad is happier too and they both love me a lot and it's ok. I see both of them every day. And I love them too.

I have just come back from a week in Melbourne with Dad. He should watch what he eats. Dad got sick in the guts.

I tried to dance on the ship but it was rocking because of the waves and it was really hard to keep my balance but I did okay. It was funny and made me laugh. I got other people to dance too.


I went to Tafe for two years and did a Transition to Work course. Now I am a part of a place called Epic and they are really, really nice to me and help me a lot.

Trent turned and brought the flashlight and gun back to chest level.


The stick figure was crouched, but its arms now were extended out from the wall.

Katter Calls For \$120m Plebiscite On Whether Crocs Should Be Allowed To Eat North Queenslanders

Kent Reginals | Entertainment Maverick MP Bob Katter has today renewed calls for a \$120m plebiscite into whether crocodiles should be allowed to eat North Queenslanders or not.

Katter stated that he believes it is every Australian's right to have a say in whether or not North Queenslanders were worth keeping around.

"Frankly, this is one of the biggest and most pressing issues of our time. Even bigger than that whole marriage equality thing – this one affects everyone. And these bleeding hearts whitefellas aren't helping. We had a lot less croc attacks when it was just my brother cousins up here keeping the

population low"

"We all know a North Queenslander — they're our co-workers, our league players and some of them are even our friends. And it's high time we all came together and gave them the basic human right of not being devoured by a large croc. But that's for Australia to decide."

Katter's plea for North Queensland equality comes in stark contrast to the Australian Conservatives, who issued their own statement in response to this new call.

"The Australian Conservatives believe, first and foremost, that a meal is between a crocodile and a North Queenslander. Any attempts to change the definition of this is to disrespect the very foundation of Crocodile religionand we will fight for our right to express this view."

"Also, Safer Schools is bad and we'd much prefer to spend \$120m on deciding what to do with Christian bakers who don't want to make gay cakes."




1907 -Side view of the S.S. Kaiwatiri wrecked at Macquarie Heads near Strahan


The steamship "Kawatiri" was an iron vessel of 516 tons gross, and 322 tons net, register, and with engine capacity of 350 nominal horse-power; and at the time of her loss carried a crew of 22 persons. From the evidence, it appears that the vessel, carrying about 40 passengers and some 150 tons of general cargo, left Hobart for Strahan at 12.30pm on August 12; that she called at Margate, where she loaded 106 tons of coal, and left again at 4.40pm the same day, clearing D'Entrecasteaux Channel at 8.30pm that night.

According to the captain's statement, on proceeding to sea the vessel encountered a north-west wind, which increased to a gale off the South-West Cape, which point was rounded at 5am on the 13th. When off Port Davey at 0.30pm on that day the wind veered round to the southwest with squally conditions, and continuing to blow from that quarter all the way up the coast.


The vessel rounded Cape Sorell at 10.35pm on the night of the 13th, and approached the entrance to Macquarie Harbour It appears that at about 11pm, when crossing the bar, the wind having become more westerly (though of about the same velocity), a very heavy cross sea was met with, and that the vessel was struck twice in quick succession on her starboard quarter by huge seas, causing her to broach to and run towards the harbour breakwater, which she struck end-on, afterwards backing off and heading towards the entrance. Every effort appears then to have been made by the captain to send the vessel ahead in the direction of safety; but it is evident that at that stage she was at the mercy of the sea, which drove her on to the sand at a spot known as the "North Spit," where she became a wreck. In the steps thereafter taken by the captain's direction, and under his supervision, for the safety of passengers and crew, it appears that the lives of six passengers were unfortunately lost; but for this the officers of the vessel do not appear to be in any way blameable.


