New bridges for St Marys and Upper Scamander

- Four ageing wooden bridges to be replaced with structures able to last a century
- Upgrades avoid the need for load limits, benefiting industries such as livestock, quarrying and logging
- Work on \$665,000 project has commenced Four timber bridges in the St Marys region and at Upper Scamander are being replaced, with structures designed to last over 100 years. Federal Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Darren Chester said the Australian Government is delivering on its election commitment and providing \$45.3 million to land transport infrastructure in Tasmania.

"Providing road upgrades to connect communities and keep the Tasmanian economy moving is a key driver of the Australian Government's record \$75 billion infrastructure investment package," Mr Chester said.

"Investing in these bridge replacements will cut maintenance costs in the future and provide efficiencies to industries such as livestock, quarrying and logging in the area." Tasmanian Liberal Senator Jonathon Duniam said the works would also benefit local residents and tourists. "Upgrading the four bridges will increase load limits, benefiting businesses in the region, while improving safety and access," Senator Duniam said. "The new bridges will be built to last approximately 100 years, which will reduce the ongoing maintenance costs and increase the resilience of this essential infrastructure."

Break O'Day Mayor Mick Tucker said works on the project commenced this month and completion of the upgrades are expected in mid-2018.

"Two of the bridges are located on Harefield Road in St Marys and cross Green Valley Creek and Break O'Day Tributary. Another is on Cloverbanks Road over St Patricks Creek, while the fourth bridge is located on Upper Scamander Road at Upper Scamander," Cr Tucker said. The Australian Government has committed \$300,000 and Break O'Day Council \$365,000 in total to replace the four bridges

Mary Knowles has been recognised with a Medal of the Order as part of the Queen's Birthday Honours List for her service to the Northern Midlands community and local government.

After surviving an abusive relationship, she found community support helped her through.

"I was a bit blown away by the support I got," she said. "I ended up in the little town of Rossarden ... I couldn't have ended up in a better place, the people were so accepting."

It was there that she got involved in volunteering.

She started off as a volunteer ambulance officer, which she has continued since 1989, while also becoming involved in the Distance Education Parent Association, Tasmanian Women in Agriculture and the Family Violence Consultative Group.

In 2010, Mrs Knowles was inducted into the Tasmanian Honour Roll for Women.

"I feel passionate about making sure small communities are recognised. It's one of the main reasons I stood for council."

She has been representing the Northern Midlands district since 2009.

Domestic violence is an issue she wants to raise more awareness of.

"People on the street don't see what's going on behind closed doors," Mrs Knowles said.

She did not think there had been a change in the rate of violence committed, and she is driven to do what she can to offer support.

"I'd like to encourage all councils to do something. Some councils are doing a really good job, but I'd like all councils on board," Mrs Knowles said.

"Health of the community is part of the role of councils, not just rates and rubbish."

She has approached her council to use street signage to show their support for women experiencing domestic violence so they know they can get out and get help.

Even listening could make a difference, she said. Despite her hard work, Mrs Knowles was quite surprised when her letter arrived announcing she would receive a Queen's honour.



By being enthusiastic, she hoped to bring an energy which would encourage more people to donate their time to a cause.

It is not only her local community she helps, Mrs Knowles also travels to parts of Africa every second year to help out in orphanages and poorer communities.

Mary lives at Gipps Creek, 37km drive into the hills behind Avoca, and has been part of the volunteer ambulance service known as the Avoca Angels almost since she moved into the district 20 years ago. She works at Avoca School as an aid, runs the Red Cross group and helps coordinate the community garden.

"We grow vegies and each Thursday, the children cook something from the garden," she said. Mary is a member of the Greater Esk Tourism group set up two years ago to promote the area as a tourist destination. She has helped produce a booklet on the history of Rossarden and Storys Creek which is handed out to visitors taken on bus tours of the area as one of the fund-raisers for the annual Christmas party.


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A case study from the Australian Association of Stud Merino Breeders Monday June 5, 2017

Merinos push producer profits up at Campbell Town

MERINOS consistently return profits of up to \$60 per dry sheep equivalent and \$40/DSE for lambs at Sam Lyne's Riccarton property at Campbell Town, Tasmania.

Sam farms with his father Crosby and brother Angus, running 7300 ewes on the 2600-hectare property, with 3500 of the ewes run as a self-replacing Merino flock and the remainder mated to terminal and composite sires. He said running a self-replacing Merino flock had helped to spread risk with dual income streams from meat and wool.

"Meat breeds are just relying on a strong lamb market," he said. "We sell Merino lambs to a nearby abattoir that opened up a market five years ago with the Middle East, and they like 12-18kg Merino lambs. It allows us to sell our Merino wether lambs earlier and still make decent money. If we were to go down the meat breed road it would be hard to get back into Merinos, whereas Merinos offer that flexibility. If you have the bigger meat breeds, you have less sheep and you have the associated feed requirements which isn't ideal for us in our unreliable climate."

The Lynes run Merinos at 12.5 DSE for winter grazed land, which includes dryland and some irrigated land, producing a profit of about \$500/ha. In comparison irrigated barley at a 7-tonne yield, at \$250/t has a profit of about \$850/ha. While dryland barley at a 5t yield, has a profit of about \$450/ha.

"We have a pretty diverse system, sheep and crops work well together on our property and in a year like we have just had, the high prices for wool and meat make up for the poor cereal prices," Sam said. "Making \$500/ha from sheep is good especially if you consider the low risk involved. Sheep also have an economic benefit in weed control and removing crop residues."

Sam said their Merinos had a more medium-frame, meaning handling was easier. "Merinos aren't as big so they are easier to handle, which is better for the shearers," he said. "There's more long-term sustainability for everyone. The country we have is ideal Merino country, in a dry year we would have to keep the feed up to another breed whereas Merinos don't have the feed requirements that these other breeds need. Then, you also have the wool which is going really well at the moment and lambs are very comparable (in price) at the moment."

In late February, Merino wether lambs, 14 kilograms dressweight, August-drop, sold for \$6.50/kg dw equivalent to \$96 a

"It's a very comparable price to crossbred lambs," he said. "Merinos have the potential to do just as well as first-cross lambs."

Wool prices have already been locked in for a quarter of the Riccarton clip at 1530 cents a kilogram clean for June, and rates were also locked in for July 2018 at 1650c/kg clean. On average, the Lynes produce 45,000kg of greasy wool a year. Wool is marketed through Roberts Limited and sold in Melbourne.

"Our main aim is to produce lots of wool with good strength," Sam said. "We have 19-micron wool and cut 5.5-6kg per head with an average yield of 72 percent, but this can vary depending on the year and what the ewes have been run on." Of the 2600ha property, 460ha can be irrigated, so dual-purpose crops are grown, and are currently being watered for autumn feed. Sam says on the two properties they run, there is a mix of red loam soil, open tussocks and improved pastures.

Lambs are dropped in August, in-line with seasonal feed availability. Rams have been sourced from a well-known stud in New South Wales since 2011, partly to shift to poll genetics but also to improve fertility and improve the early maturity of lambs. Since the switch, lambing percentages have risen from 80pc to 100pc. The Lynes have also scanned for dry, single and multiple pregnancies during the past three years.

Lambs are sold by June, before they cut two teeth. They are weaned and run on stubbles, weighed, then sold onhooks once they fit into required weight categories, either the 12-18kgdw bracket to Tas Quality Meats, or if more than 18kgdw sold to Victoria.


"It depends on what price and seasonal conditions as to where we sell them," Sam said. "If prices are better we can keep until heavier, regardless though we want to get them off by June to free up feed before ewes lamb in August."

Sam said he supported the Australian Association of Stud Merino Breeders' Breed More Merino Ewes Campaign. "I like the flexibility of the Merino," he said. "If you have a fertile ewe that is producing plenty of lambs and quality wool, I find it hard to beat."

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


















Nadine and Friends



HEALTH NOTES - FEAR OF DOGS

What can be done to help a youngster who is afraid of dogs? This happens quite often when a child has been frightened by a dog while very young.

If a child shows fear at sight of a dog, it's quite wrong to try to urge the youngster to become friendly with the 'nice doggie'. The more you do this, the more likely he is to hold back.

Instead, reassure the child by acknowledging to him that it's natural for "small' children to be afraid of 'big' dogs, and let him see of this.


You can interest him indirectly, too, by telling him stories about pet dogs or let him see one of the many 'dogsie' TV shows. Give him a toy dog to play with, or you might even go so far as to but him a puppy and encourage him to help prepare his flood so that he will feel that he is playing a part in his life.

..... Many children fear dogs and quite a number don't lose their fear until they reach school age, or later - particularly if unwise adult handling has made their fears worse. Well-meant 'coaxing' attempts may be harmful and being told to look after the dog' may be too great a responsibility for a nervous child.

Some sort of balance has to be struck so that the child neither ... cowers in fear at sight of a dog, or runs up to every dog he sees to hug or pat it. Usually, though, the child will work it all out quite satisfactorily for himself. Naturally, if it begins to be a 'phobia' with him, then medical help must be sought quickly.














End of an era

- 1 egg


Directions





Part 2

I used to go down to Duck Reach and catch eels. There used to be a huge wooden dam wall down there before they built the Trevallyn Dam wall in the early 50's. Now, what I used to do was, I'd get a long copper needle about a metre long and also a big bloody gob of worms in a bucket, and using a hemp strip cut from a spud bag, I would sew and twist the worms and hemp all the way down the copper needle and just drop it in the water. When the eel would bite the worms, it's teeth would get stuck in the hemp strip and I would just pull it out of the water and cut the buggers throat. Didn't need a hook or a net. It sounds strange, but it was a very effective way of catching them. And I caught hundreds over the years. Big bastards too.

Some of us locals would go and cut wood down near the end of Mt Leslie Road. Wattle and sheoak mainly. All cut by hand. Axes and splitters. 15 or 20 tonnes at a time. We would cart it all up the hill and then sell it to all the local businesses, including the bakehouses for their bake ovens. It would burn really hot, especially wattle. Perfect for their ovens. When I was 85 years old, I walked down to Duck Reach from my house with an old mate of mine. At the end of Mt Leslie Road, all the way down the old gully. It buggered me, but it was great to go back to the place where I spent so much of my younger life. The Gorge and the river are as close to paradise as you'll get.

We rarely bought groceries. Didn't have to. Grew all of our own veges. Lived off rabbits and pigs. I'd salt up the meat and hang it up from a tree and then keep it in an

old safe for cooling.

My vegetables used to win many prizes at the local shows. Parsnips, carrots and pumpkins. At the Longford Show, Evandale Show, St Marys and Launceston. My carrots were a metre long. I used to dig a 3 foot deep trench and fill it with oat husks. Plant the carrots and they would come out absolutely huge. Carrots only stop growing when they hit something. Or I would fill a 44 gallon drum with pea straw and the same thing would happen. The biggest carrots you've ever seen. Some would weigh 2 kilos. And very tasty I might add. My pumpkins were so big they took six blokes to lift them. (laughs). Tasmanian soil you see. It's magic. A bit of farming know how didn't hurt either.

I had a racehorse named E-Reckt. Don't ask me why I

called him that, it's a bit blue, but let's just say he was always in an excited state! (laughs) He won the Deloraine Cup one year. I also had a greyhound named Young Beaver. He did alright too.

Our boys have always been hard workers and good fellas and we have always been a pretty tight unit. We used to go up to the Highland lakes a lot to fish and go shooting. Up near Liawenee. Our boys both married and had their own families. Maurice and Jenny have three boys Daniel, Gavin and Andrew. Ross and Susan have three daughters Rebecca, Pamela and Sarah. Sarah has two little ones Kobi and Rubi. All of them are great kids. So I have six grand kids and two great grand children. I always loved being a dad and as I got older, being a grandfather.

Lola and I had a very happy marriage and she helped everything on the farm tick over nicely. I always looked forward to knocking off and talking about our day. She was always smiling and stuck by me through thick and thin.

Towards the end of 1979, Lola was diagnosed with ovarian cancer. She went down very quickly and as she started to fade, near the end she was paralysed. Could not move a muscle and she was in a lot of pain. When I spoke to her, the poor love would let me know she understood what I was saying by blinking at me. It was a terribly painful time for her. For the whole family. Lola passed away on the 20th of June 1980. So I have now been on my own since then. Lola was the love of my life and I have never had any interest in the romance stuff since she passed. She was the only woman for me and I still miss her terribly.

In the early 70's, I sold the six blocks along the Westbury Road end of my farm and I got 1800 dollars for them and I thought that was alright, considering I had only paid 750 pound (\$1500) for the 33 acre farm when I bought it. Then the real estate fellow Bushby came to me in the late 70's and bought more land off me up to Chris Street.

That was the start of the development of Prospect as a major suburb of Launceston. It was inevitable that Prospect became the suburb it now is.

It's very well set out and well planned. I retired from working the farm in about 1987 I think, maybe a bit earlier.

In 1995, I won the Best Clubman award at the Hagley Football Club for the voluntary work I had done there over the years. I was the official timekeeper for their

footy games for 28 years. I was also a long time treasurer there and I'm also a life member at that club. I was very honoured to get that trophy and it takes pride of place in my cabinet.

My family has a long farming history here in Tasmania and I am very proud of our heritage. The majority of my ancestors are buried in the little graveyard just down the road in Westbury Road, opposite the nursery near St Pats. I was the voluntary maintenance man at the graveyard for 20 years.


Prospect has been my home for 84 years now and I have seen a lot of people come and go and the landscape change a lot.

A little while ago, I was invited to go back to Summerhill Primary School to celebrate their 100th Anniversary and I just loved it. I got my mug in the paper and the littlies were wonderful and I felt very welcome and privileged to be there.

I have now lived in this house on the corner of Mace Street for 65 years. I'll die here too. I have no interest in going into a care home. My two boys Maurice and Ross are my mainstays and they help me out a lot. Ross is here most days, making sure I eat and have my medication. I am not interested in going into a home, selling my bloody house I've worked for all my life for just to pay for it. I'm just fine on my own thank you very much. I understand that some people have to do that, but not for me.

I always believed in working hard, helping people out if they were in strife and always show respect to your neighbours. Prospect is where me and my family have spent our lives and I love the place. Thanks for popping in mate".



"Wait, won't I fall apart? When I came forward the chamber held me together. Isn't this the same?" "It is."


"Well how will I stay together if the past isn't ready for me?"

"Oh, and the Webber, for f---'s sake, these blokes look like real backseat barbecuers."




