Community decides the fate of the Old Scamander Bridge

June 28, 2017


On June 26 the Department of State Growth and Break O'Day Council held a community forum to discuss the future of the Old Scamander Bridge.

With around 50 people in attendance, Department of State Growth's General Manager of State Roads, Shane Gregory explained to the community the current state of the bridge, the works required and the cost to keep the bridge in place as well as outlining their options for the bridge.

Mr Gregory explained that the Department managed a large road network and spending money to maintain a bridge that isn't a functioning part of that network was not viable, especially given it would cost at least twice as much to maintain the bridge compared with removing it. Keeping the bridge would cost Break O'Day ratepayers \$1 million with all ongoing maintenance costs also transferred to Break O'Day Council and the community who would become the owners of the asset. Once the condition of the bridge and the costs were understood, an overwhelming majority of attendees voted to demolish the bridge and lobby the State Government to undertake works on the foreshore of the

Scamander River.

Green Army comes to an end in Break O'Day

June 5, 2017

On June 28 the latest Break O'Day Green Army participants graduated with a celebratory barbecue. This Green Army team have been working hard removing weeds and planting trees around the municipality and have tackled approximately 350 hectares removing gorse, sea spurge and other noxious weeds.

During the programs two year history, more than 1400 hectares have been treated for weeds with more than 30 participants aged between 17 and 24 taking part in the four programs.

Ten participants participated in two projects and were able to complete a full certificate in Conservation Land Management.



While the Break O'Day Green Army projects have ended due to the Federal Government's decision to stop funding for the program, a Green Army project, 'Protecting beach nesting bird habitat on Tasmania's East Coast', is currently being run by Conservation Volunteers Australia and this will be the last project in the region.

Break O'Day Mayor Mick Tucker said he was sad to see such a successful project for the region come to an end.

"This program has allowed us to make some significant in-roads on controlling weed infestations in our area and it is sad to see this program come to an end," Mayor Tucker said. "Considering the size of our municipality and our standing as one of the most disadvantaged government areas in the state, the loss of the Green Army program represents a loss of opportunity for our youth as well as our environment.

"We will continue to lobby the Federal Government to reinstate this program which has had so much benefit for our community."

Team leader Dan Donaldson said he was always impressed with the work and safety ethic of the teams and was proud of the success of the program in the Break O'Day area.

"The fact that we have numerous participants wanting to continue or re-apply to be a part of this program shows the success and importance of this project to our area," Mr Donaldson said.

The Break O'Day Green Army projects were supported by the Australian Government's Green Army Programme and run by Conservation Volunteers Australia for the project host partnership led by Break O'Day Council with the Parks and Wildlife Service and North East Bioregional Network.

A steering group for this project was nominated at the meeting and preliminary discussions involved recognition of the Old Bridge and previous bridges, the history of the area as well as recreational features. Mr Gregory also advised that works would be undertaken to improve pedestrian safety on the current bridge, regardless of the community's preferred option for the old bridge. "We were really happy with the turnout of residents and the discussions


that took place," Mayor Mick Tucker said.

"We could see that there was a need for the community to understand what it would mean and cost to keep the bridge and we thank those that took the time to come and listen and get all the facts so they could make an informed decision.

"It was also great to see the community unite around the idea of a revitalised foreshore and we, (Council) will continue to work with the community around this project and work hard to see it funded."

"Council would also like to thank Shane Gregory for making the time to come to our community to have this discussion."

The Minister advises that he looks forward to further discussions with Council and the local community regarding possible foreshore developments post removal of the bridge. State Growth and Council are currently working on a fact sheet regarding the bridge which will be made available through the Council website and Facebook page.

Up to \$150,000 will be allocated to projects within Lyons on the advice of a community consultation committee, which will review all expressions of interest





RSPCA Tasmania announces changes designed to ensure strong and viable future

RSPCA Tasmania has announced some important changes to ensure it can continue to provide the best possible animal welfare and advocacy services.

Chief Executive Officer Peter West said these changes will see some animal welfare services delivered differently, while still ensuring the highest possible standards of care.

"By making these changes, RSPCA Tasmania can continue to make animal welfare and advocacy its highest priority and do so in a financially sustainable manner," Mr West said. "Importantly our Inspectorate Services will continue at the same level, focussing on domestic and companion animals."

Our **Hobart** facility will become an animal health and wellbeing centre catering for new veterinary clinic clients and will aim to increase emergency and urgent care for animals of people in need (like boarding support for victims of domestic violence, hospital or prison stays). The Centre will continue to care for seized Inspectorate animals (including livestock / large animals) and also focus on great animal boarding opportunities.

Devonport Animal Care Centre will reprioritise re-homing to compliment other facilities in the region.

The Centre will continue to care for seized Inspectorate animals (including livestock / large animals), provide important emergency care for animals of people in need (like boarding support for victims of domestic violence, hospital or prison stays) and will be expanding onsite boarding options.

Launceston Animal Care Centre will become our primary centre for re-homing dogs, cats and smaller domestic animals for the state. The Centre will continue to care for small animals seized by the Inspectorate, as well as provide emergency care for animals of people in need (like boarding support for victims of domestic violence, hospital or prison stays). There will also be an upgrade to our facilities for boarding and day care.

All Centres will close to the public on Sundays and public holidays (except for special promotions and for organised ap-

pointments).

Mr West said the move, that will take effect from 1 July 2017, would also see the organisation working more closely with 10 Lives Cat Centre and the Dogs Home of Tasmania. "RSPCA Tasmania will continue to find homes for animals, these changes will now mean in some situations we will be working in close partnership with other specialist animal care organisations to get the best results for that region, this may see some dogs and cats re-homed out of the 10 lives Cat Centre or Dogs Homes of Tasmania," Mr West said.

"Working collaboratively and focussing on the best possible re-homing outcomes is a far more effective approach over the long term in our state," he said.

It is likely there will be staffing changes as we look to implement these new processes with some staff rostered hours possibly being reduced.

RSPCA Tasmania will remain the primary voice of Animal Welfare in Tasmania and will be looking to increase its community engagement and education role across the state.

"This is a necessary reset of our activities to better be what our members and general public want us to be," Mr West said.

RSPCA Tasmania's VISION remains the same – and that is for a Tasmania where all animals are treated with respect and kindness.

Len Miles, President of the St Marys Lions Club accepted the award and spoke of the many people that contributed to the success of this event.



The Valley Voice would also like to compliment all nominees and winners of the various awards presented on the day. As always seems to be the case with events of this nature, St Marys was well represented.





I live locally in St Helens and I am currently a Councilor on the Break O'Day Council. I am honoured to have been selected by Labor as a candidate in Lyons for the next Tasmanian state election.

The Forgotten War

June 2017 marks 115 years since the cessation of hostilities in the Boer War, a conflict largely forgotten, or ignored, in this modern fast paced world but it is worth taking a minute or two to consider the legacy. A row of terraces in Battery Point named for key battles, the story made famous in that important Australian film "Breaker Morant" and the genesis of the Boy Scout and Girl Guide Movements are all direct legacies of the Boer War.

Over 800 young Tasmanian men and women signed up for this very British colonial stoush, including infantrymen, cavalry and nurses. Young men and women who took the "Queen's shilling" and sailed across the oceans, 23,000 in total from all the colonies ... not as Australians (as this war began prior to Federation) but as representatives of their individual states.

Some of them remained in Colonial Regiments and a number who joined post 1901 are recorded as members of The Australian Commonwealth Horse.

The Tasmanian's names are recorded in the memorial wall by the Cenotaph in St Helens, and the list makes sobering reading.

One of those young men lies in the General Cemetery at St Helens. Having survived the battle, Vincent Lade

died on the troop carrier "Drayton Grange" on the way home. Very, very sad for his family but not a simple

He was amongst a number who escaped injury at the front only to succumb to illness brought about by overcrowding, poor hygiene and insufficient rations on the


Seventeen men had died and 25 had been hospitalised when the vessel docked al Woolloomooloo on August 10,1902. Vincent died just five days from home. The Evening News (Sydney) of August 12 1902 records the names and rank of the ill, interviews with officers on board during the voyage, the death of two soldiers in Port Phillip Quarantine Hospital, and an address by the Governor of New South Wales. The resultant Royal Commission makes sobering reading and begs the question, why disembarkation of the ill at Albany, at which time there were most certainly a number of seriously ill men aboard but none had died, was forbidden by the local authorities. The ill were finally allowed ashore to the quarantine station in Port Phillip Bay, several days steaming from Albany.


The Royal Commission findings cast some serious doubts about the suitability of the "Drayton Grange" as a troop carrier, given she was originally designed to carry frozen meat and her skipper had little understanding of the Queen's Regulations regarding the transporting of servicemen and women... a set of

regulations which is very specific as to victuals, ablution facilities, and exercise requirements as well as the chain of command and provision of medical services.



Reading Fred Valentich's story in the recent VV inspired me to want to share Doris Lohrey's 1969, local, UFO sighting.

Doris was a resident of Dublin Town from the early 1940s until 1988. Doris gave me a copy of her memoirs some years back, below is an excerpt. Susan Lucas, St Marys

AND I have seen a UFO!

On the third Thursday in November, 1969, having collected my youngest son David from Scouts at St. Marys, I was driving home at dusk. A bright light appeared in the trees at the top of Township Hill and as we came to the clearing this object, with flashing lights and a faint hissing noise, flew over our car and headed towards Scamander.

By now I was driving the utility towards Percy Wright's dairy farm. The 'object' had been travelling at terrific speed and in about 5 minutes had disappeared over the horizon - like a great golden ball. We were both mesmerised and when I

could manage to speak I said to David "Did you feel frightened?" He replied, "Yes Mum, I did!"

We had great trouble in convincing Norman about what we had seen. I did not report the sighting but in the newspaper the next morning someone else reported having seen bright lights and something 'unusual' while travelling on the main highway to Launceston at the same time.

There is a sequel to this story.

Sometime later a Canadian friend was visiting us. I happened to mention the incident and showed her the spot near the Old Jubilee coal mine from where we watched it disappear over the horizon.

It so happened that a relative of hers – a physicist from Toronto – made a habit of recording all such sightings. Much later on a subsequent visit to my son Roger and his family in Calgary, Canada, we were able to meet this man who was very interested and recorded my sighting. I felt vindicated that I was not just 'seeing things'! He already had details of someone called "Fred" who had disappeared in Bass Strait in the 1960s.

I have only recently come across a newspaper cutting describing the disappearance of this lost pilot, Frederick Valentich. Historian/researcher Mr Fred Watson in a 13,500 word booklet (1978) discusses the disappearance of Frederick Valentich on a flight from Victoria to King Island, never to be seen again.

There was no wreckage, no body and no oil spill. No explanation exists as to what happened. According to Watson, the pilot had been desperately trying to describe his predicament when his voice was cut off.

Watson also discusses the phenomenon of flares or rockets being observed in the skies over Bass Strait when the vessel 'Orion' disappeared in 1904. There is also the mystery of the disappearance of Captain Stutt in 1922 and the airliner 'Miss

Hobart' in 1934. During the Holyman airline years, two prominent local citizens – a Mr Tudor and Mrs Margaret McIntyre also disappeared without trace.







July 13, 1945 Joseph Benedict Chifley, Australia's fifth wartime Prime Minister, is sworn into office.

Ben Chifley, born Joseph Benedict Chifley in 1885, had won the Bathurst-based seat of Macquarie in the House of Representatives in 1928, and in 1931 he became Minister for Defence, under Scullin. He lost his seat again shortly afterwards when the Scullin government fell, but regained it in 1940, becoming Treasurer in Curtin's government. After Curtin's death, Deputy Prime Minister Frank Forde temporarily acted as Prime Minister. Chifley defeated Forde when the Federal Parliamentary Labor Party elected Ben Chifley as its new leader, to become the new Prime Minister of Australia. Chifley was sworn into office on 13 July 1945. He effectively implemented necessary post-war economic controls, remaining Prime Minister until his defeat by Robert Menzies and the Liberal Party in 1949. Two years later, Chifley died of a heart attack.





It was pure serendipity, Crystal Moselle says, that she found the Wolfpack. She was walking down First Avenue in Manhattan in the spring of 2010 when a boy, weaving through the crowd, ran past her. Then another one. Then another, and another

"My instincts took over," she says. "I just ran after them."

Running past her through the crowd were the six Angulo brothers: Bhagavan, the oldest; twins Govinda and Narayana; Mukunda, the leader of the pack; Krisna, and Jagadesh.

Having spent almost their entire lives inside a tiny Lower East Side housing project apartment, homeschooled and allowed out only rarely by their father, who had the only key, the Angulo brothers'

main window on the world was cinema: watching films like The Dark Knight Rises, Harry Potter or Reservoir Dogs, then re-enacting them in exquisite detail.

The day they met Moselle was one of their first excursions out of the apartment on their own. Over the next four years, they became the subject of The Wolfpack, Moselle's extraordinary documentary which made its debut at Sundance recently.

Over the summer, she and the brothers hung out. They would go to Tompkins Square Park or Washington Square Park. Moselle brought her camera, and they would "do little interviews with it". From the very beginning, the brothers' openness and creativity fascinated her. "New Yorkers are so jaded," she says.

Eventually, they invited her to their home. The anartment was a time capsule – nothing from the past 15 year.

Eventually, they invited her to their home. The apartment was a time capsule – nothing from the past 15 years appeared to have been thrown away. Children's drawings lined the wall. It was a few days later, at Thanksgiving, when she first saw the family together that she realised there was something deeper to be explored. In the film, the boys' mother, Susanne, a midwestern former hippie, yearns for her children to have the fields and woods with which she grew up. She met their father, Oscar, a Hare Krishna from Peru, on the trail to Machu Picchu. As the brothers tell it, their father wanted his own tribe. Crippled by what Moselle describes as paranoia and philosophically opposed to work, Oscar talks in the film about seeing the outside world as a prison. Yet in rejecting it, he created a prison of his own.

From inside, the Angulo brothers sought escape in movies. They copied out screenplays in longhand, typing them up on an antique typewriter. They crafted exquisitely detailed props, costumes from cereal boxes and yoga mats, and made replica guns so real that the apartment was raided by a Swat team after neighbours reported seeing firearms.

A couple of months before Moselle met them, one of the boys escaped the house wearing a Michael Myers hockey mask. Someone called 911, and he was brought home. Child welfare services visited, but did not find anything amiss. For a couple years, some of the boys had counselling with the Lower East Side family union, a community group that provides support for families.

Apart from that, child welfare services were never involved with the Angulos. Susanne obtained a teaching certificate so they could be home-schooled, and the children were well provided for. They lived in the projects and avoided contact with their neighbours. There were never any complaints, until the incident with the mask. The family simply did not leave their little world.

'One particular year, we never got out at all.' Even Moselle herself would be almost three years into the project before she understood the extent of the family's isolation. The moment is captured on film. The viewer learns it the same way Moselle did: from Mukunda, the third-youngest brother. "Sometimes we'd go out nine times a year. Sometimes once," he says, looking out of the window at the New York evening traffic. "One particular year, we never got out at all."

Moselle tells the Guardian what she was thinking in that moment, but she pauses for a long time before answering. "It was a really intense moment for me as well," she says. "It was ... " she stops again. "I realised what a delicate situation this was. It heightened the sadness of it all, I think."

Throughout the film, the boys' father, Oscar, remains a somewhat difficult presence. It was a slow process, Moselle says, getting him on camera. "I just kind of stood back for the first couple of years," she says, "stood with the boys."

"I think Oscar had big plans that never happened for him and his family," she says. "And I think that obviously he – somewhere inside – blames himself. I mean, how can you not? And there are also delusions of grandeur about what was possible."

At one point, we see a flash of Oscar's anger. "My power is influencing everybody," he says, clearly drunk. "Think of that." Then he waves his arm in disgust. "This piece of shit we are living in," he says.

Moselle says that was the only time she saw him like that. "It upset me," she says.

Susanne, not Oscar, accompanied her sons and Moselle to Sundance, where they stayed up until 2am for a question-and-answer session after a screening. "They live and breathe movies, so it's just heightened that for them," Moselle says.

Local Student Confirms That A Bomb Did In Fact Go Off In Her Room - Beetoota Advocate

A Daroo Street Polytechnic design student has shared her harrowing tale of how after being asked if a bomb had gone off in her messy Caldwell Street bedroom, she had to confirm that an explosive device did go off, making her room resemble a Mosul farmers market.

Maggie Wonderlup, 21, confided in *The Advocate* a short moment ago and explained that bombs often go off in her room and that she tries her best to keep her room tidy – especially when her parents visit. "Yes," she said.

"I can confirm that at approximately 8pm last night, an improvised explosive device did go off in my bedroom,'

"Some of my friends and family think it's funny to ask me if a bomb had gone off in my room on the count of it being so messy and all, but the sad reality is that an explosion really did take place."

While Ms Wonderlup and two unnamed friends were in her room last night preparing for a night out,

the actual blast itself did not occur until some time after they'd left. Police and investigators understand that the Perth-native and her pals frequented The Pelican & Lapband Inn on Lewis Avenue before being asked to leave in what Wonderlup is calling a 'misunderstanding'.

"We basically all blacked out after that. My netbank says we went to the Dolphins Club but I don't remember. But yeah the room was a mess when I woke up this morning."





Ultimate Seville Orange Marmalade

Ingredients

1.3kg Seville oranges, 2 lemons, juice only 2.6kg preserving or granulated sugar


Put the whole oranges and lemon juice in a large preserving pan and cover with 2 litres of water - if it does not cover the fruit, use a smaller pan.

If necessary weight the oranges with a heatproof plate to keep them submerged. Bring to the boil, cover and simmer very gently for around 2 hours, or until the peel can be easily pierced with a fork

Warm half the sugar in a very low oven. Pour off the cooking water from the oranges into a jug and tip the oranges into a bowl. Return cooking liquid to the pan. Allow oranges to cool until they are easy to handle, then cut in half. Scoop out all the pips and pith and add to the reserved orange liquid in the pan. Bring to the boil for 6 minutes, then strain this liquid through a sieve into a bowl and press the pulp through with a wooden spoon - it is high in pectin so gives marmalade a good set.

Pour half this liquid into a preserving pan. Cut the peel, with a sharp knife, into fine shreds. Add half the peel to the liquid in the preserving pan with the warm sugar. Stir over a low heat until all the sugar has dissolved, for about 10 minutes, then bring to the boil and bubble rapidly for 15-25 minutes until setting point is reached. Take pan off the heat and skim any scum from the surface. (To dissolve any excess scum, drop a small knob of butter on to the surface, and gently stir.)

Leave the marmalade to stand in the pan for 20 minutes to cool a little and allow the peel to settle; then pot in sterilised jars, seal and label. Repeat for second batch, warming the other half of the sugar first.






