

With a new recycling service gearing up to start in Break O'Day by the 2017 Christmas holidays, Break O'Day Council in partnership with the Northern Tasmanian Waste Management Group (NTWMG) has launched a sticker competition in the two local schools.

Each school will design one sticker, St Helens the recycling sticker for the yellow lidded bins, and St Marys the waste sticker for the new red lidded bins. We arrived at Dora Point after about 50 minutes, where we enjoyed a break to take in the views across to St Helens Point and the barway.


We then returned on the same route.




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Christmas in July, Eating with Friends.


Then ... whoops ... it's only early August. It's hot in Baltimore, cold in St Marys and when Christmas is actually on us it'll be the other way round. What do you think?



Waste bin sticker competition in local schools brings big rewards continued from front page

The idea of the competition is to start the discussion with the Break O'Day community around what can be recycled as well as to help educate the community around the purpose of the bins. "Involving the school students in this way we hope will create a generation of recycling champions who are not only passionate about recycling but are empowered to help their families use the new service correctly and effectively," Break O'Day Mayor Mick Tucker said. "Because our existing bins, the ones with the yellow lids, will become our recycling bins and residents will receive a new waste bin, with a red lid, we wanted to ensure we had done all we could to make sure the community were across this big change. And who better to make sure this change is happening at a household level than our children." Both St Marys and St Helens Schools have been given an information pack on the competition which includes a template for the sticker design, guidelines and entry form for the competition as well as Council's Recycling FAQ sheet. This information can also be found on Council's website under Popular links, Recycling.

NTWMG education officer Mary Gill will be visiting both schools in the coming month to discuss the competition as well as talk to students about recycling in general. Entries for the competition can be emailed to







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Free Meningococcal W Vaccination Program for Years 10, 11 and 12

The Tasmania Government is funding a free Meningococcal W Vaccine for teenagers aged 15-19 years. The program will commence during Terms Three 2017 and run until 30 April 2018 and will be administered at your school.

The first phase of this program will take place at your school on Thursday 7 September 2017.

The vaccine provides protection against four strains of Meningococcal disease (ACWY) and is given as a single dose.

Meningococcal disease is a rare but

severe bacterial infection that can cause lifelong disability or death and can affect people at any age. Meningococcal bacteria are carried in the nose and throat of some healthy people and are spread through close prolonged contact. The bacteria are more commonly found in teenagers and young adults. Adolescents are at increased risk of Meningococcal disease. Meningococcal W has increased significantly across Australia from 2014 onwards.

In Tasmania, cases have more than tripled in 2016 compared with previous years.

Tasmania has a higher rate of Men-

ingococcal W disease than other states. Meningococcal W is now the most common meningococcal strain in Tasmania.



Mt Elephant and Beyond Book Club review

The Thousand Autumns of Jacob de Zoet by British author, David Mitchell, was our book for the month of July. If you like being transported to another time and place then this might be the book for you. It's a long one and repays more concentrated sessions of reading, rather than short bursts before sleep at night.

The action takes place on a man-made island in the Bay of Nagasaki, beginning in 1799. This is an outpost of the Dutch East India Company, based in Batavia (modern day Jakarta) and the reason it is sited here is that the Japanese are pursuing a policy of isolation from the Western world and contact with the rest of Japan is forbidden to foreigners. Over the previous two hundred years Christianity had been infiltrating the country and this was seen as a threat to Japanese tradition. Trade with Japan is profitable for both sides but there is much suspicion and ill feeling between the Japanese and the Dutch and it seems that corruption is rife on both sides. The story is set at a pivotal point in history as the Dutch East India Company faces bankruptcy and Napoleon is about to take over the Netherlands. None of this is known to these isolated Dutch representatives of the Company. Mitchell, who has lived in Japan, has obviously done a huge amount of research and manages to recreate the uneasy arrangement between the two nations.

The hero of the story is young Jacob de Zoet, a clerk of the Company, who is here to make his name and fortune so that he can return to Holland after five years and claim the hand of his beloved Anna. He is tasked with the job of "cleaning up the books" after previous corrupt administrations but he soon discovers that corruption continues with the new administrator. Despite good intentions, and he is a pious Calvinist who has smuggled in a forbidden copy of his Christian Psalter, he falls for a young Japanese woman, a midwife from an educated background who is studying with the Dutch, Dr Marinus. Of course, such a relationship is forbidden



by the Japanese, though a blind eye seems to be turned to the prostitutes of the House of Wistaria who service the Dutch sailors. Before Jacob can tell Orito of his feelings for her she is abducted and removed to the House of Sisters up in the mountains where, it is later revealed, dark and monstrous deeds take place. Meanwhile, back at Dejima, the trading post, Jacob is caught up in events where his intelligence, courage and integrity are put to the test.

Mitchell's driving narrative compels the reader on to find out how all the intrigue will be resolved. The mistrust and lack of respect between the Europeans and the Japanese is vividly presented by the writer and when an English ship enters the harbour and attempts to take over the Dutch outpost yet another element of European misunderstanding is introduced, resulting in a degree of comedy: the English hate the Dutch and the Japanese despise them all!

The writing is powerful, sometimes funny and at times beautiful and evocative. The novel has elements of legend, with the hero's honesty and courage a beacon in a tale of corruption and cruelty. A few illustrations from the era add to the authenticity of the story. Mitchell has created a sense of a world long gone yet his characters are believable individuals, not caricatures, and we can sympathise with the dilemma of Jacob as he experiences the power of European corruption and the inscrutable, ancient Japanese culture. This is a love story, an interesting slice of history and a story of integrity and heroism in the face of corruption. There was unanimous enjoyment of this rollicking good yarn in our group.

Tasmania's former chief magistrate Michael Hill backs reform to end 'ineffective war on drugs'

In the face of a growing number of deaths and cases of HIV linked to drug abuse, the Portuguese government in 2001 tried a new tack to get a handle on the problem - it decriminalised the use and possession of heroin, cocaine, marijuana, LSD and other illicit street drugs. The theory: focusing on treatment and prevention instead of jailing users would decrease the number of deaths and infections.

Five years later, the number of deaths from street drug overdoses dropped from around 400 to 290 annually, and the number of new HIV cases caused by using dirty needles to inject heroin, cocaine and other illegal substances plummeted from nearly 1,400 in 2000 to about 400 in 2006, according to a report released recently by the Cato Institute, a Washington, D.C, libertarian think tank.

"Now instead of being put into prison, addicts are going to treatment centres and they're learning how to control their drug usage or getting off drugs entirely," report author Glenn Greenwald, a former New York State constitutional litigator, said during a press briefing at Cato last week. Under the Portuguese plan, penalties for people caught dealing and trafficking drugs are unchanged; dealers are still jailed and subjected to fines depending on the crime. But people caught using or possessing small amounts - defined as the amount needed for 10 days of personal use - are brought before what's known as a "Dissuasion Commission," an administrative body created by the 2001 law. Each three-person commission includes at least one lawyer or judge and one health care or social services worker. The panel has the option of recommending treatment, a small fine, or no sanction.


Peter Reuter, a criminologist at the University of Maryland, College Park, says he's skeptical decriminalisation was the sole reason drug use slid in Portugal, noting that another factor, especially among teens, was a global decline in marijuana use. By the same token, he notes that critics were wrong in their warnings that decriminalising drugs would make Lisbon a drug mecca.

"Drug decriminalisation did reach its primary goal in Portugal," of reducing the health consequences of drug use, he says, "and did not lead to Lisbon becoming a drug tourist destination."

Walter Kemp, a spokesperson for the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime, says decriminalisation in Portugal "appears to be working." He adds that his office is putting more emphasis on improving health outcomes, such as reducing needle-borne infections, but that it does not explicitly support decriminalisation, "because it smacks of legalisation." Drug legalisation removes all criminal penalties for producing, selling and using drugs; no country has tried it. In contrast, decriminalisation, as practiced in Portugal, eliminates jail time for drug users but maintains criminal penalties for dealers. Spain and Italy have also decriminalised personal use of drugs and Mexico's president has proposed doing the same. A spokesperson for the White House's Office of National Drug Control Policy declined to comment, citing the pending Senate confirmation of the office's new director, former Seattle Police Chief Gil Kerlikowske.

The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs also declined to comment on the report.

My girls are both great, they really are. I have two beautiful grandchildren and four little great grandchildren. I adored living in my house. Absolutely bloody loved it.



What's my plan for the next ten years? What kind of a question is that? I'll be dead (laughs). I'm not going to make it to 103. But you never know.



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
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




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TasWater – it's a matter of trust. Why won't the State Government come clean? July 25

At a community meeting held at St Marys last Thursday, the Premier and Treasurer were again asked questions about the financial arrangements for the takeover of TasWater and once again avoided making public this information.

Without the public release of financial and economic modelling from the Tasmanian Government, how can we trust them? There is simply no transparency.

"The government says it can make guarantees, but we all know State Governments change regularly and regularly change their minds; how often have we heard them break promises once they get into power and claim things are much worse than they thought they were irrespective of whether that is true or not, "Break O'Day Mayor Mick Tucker said. "Despite numerous requests to the Premier for financial information to enable the Council to be fully informed, the State Government refuses to hand over the information which leads us to wonder if the information exists – how can we trust them when they won't come clean."

"Under the takeover proposal, returns to Councils from the assets they built will reduce to 50 per cent of TasWater's profits after 2025, but the government is hiding the simple fact that stuck with having to service a massive debt, TasWater is unlikely to make any profit at all, meaning Councils will get nothing."

The returns that are currently received enable Councils to fund activities which can be seen as discretionary, for example, addressing flooding in St Marys when the Tasmanian Government has walked away from management of waterways; fixing the fragmented and inefficient service delivery models of the Tasmanian Government for health and youth services and grants to community organisations in our local communities.

The Government continues to maintain there is a water and sewerage crisis and this in itself shows how little they understand about the very organisation they are trying to take over.

"In the face of repeated questioning about the nature of this supposed crisis, the Government has demonstrated a complete lack of understanding of how environmental compliance works, TasWater's actual performance, or how long it even takes to build this infrastructure," said Break O'Day Council Mayor, Mick Tucker. "The Infrastructure Tasmania report released this week does not even contain the basic financial modelling and economic data needed to assess the plan, with no cost benefit analysis, no modelling and no projections of the impact of hundreds of millions of dollars in debt imposed on TasWater, just to meet an arbitrary political deadline. If the government really has the community's best interest at heart, it will work with local government to improve TasWater and provide the information necessary for a fully informed discussion."

TasWater confirms better water for Cornwall and Mathinna



Community meetings were held on July 31 in Cornwall and August 1 in Mathinna, at which residents were informed that the towns will be home to new water treatment plants installed by TasWater.


TasWater's community engagement team is carrying out a series of meetings outlining to the 24 regional towns across the state the plan to remove all Boil Water Alerts and Do not Consume Notices by August next year.


Work in Cornwall will start in a few weeks to build the treatment plant along with a larger capacity water storage tank. Work will also include the cleaning of the water distribution system that will deliver drinking water that meets the Australian Drinking guidelines. Mathinna will see the addition of a new water treatment plant and cleaning of the water distribution system with the existing water storage tanks retained.

TasWater CEO Michael Brewster says he is pleased to be getting on with the job of upgrading water supply systems throughout Tasmania's smaller communities. Fingal and Avoca are already enjoying quality water following the installation of a new treatment plant and pipeline, with Scamander last year having its Boil Water Alert lifted after extensive upgrades to its water treatment plant."

"This work at Comwall and Mathinna will not only provide locals with long term improvement to the water infrastructure but will provide the Fingal Valley and nearby towns town on the east coast the confidence to develop small business and tourism opportunities."

TasWater is investing \$5.3m into these two communities, and this work is part of TasWater's 24 glasses – Regional Towns Water Supply Program that will see all public health alerts lifted by the end of August 2018 as part of our fully funded 10 year plan.

August 10, 1844.: Charles Sturt sets out on his final expedition to search for an inland sea in Australia.

For decades after New South Wales was first settled, the people of Australia believed the rivers in the east emptied into an inland sea as the great majority of waterways flowed away from the coast.

When Sturt filled in the gaps in knowledge of the network of rivers in NSW, and determined that the Murray River emptied out at the southern coast, he seemed to solve the mystery of the inland rivers. That is, he solved it to the satisfaction of everyone but himself.

Dissatisfied with Eyre's reports of salt lakes and arid desert in central Australia, Sturt determined to settle the question and find out for himself. He was given permission to explore as far north as latitude 28 degrees.

On 10 August 1844, Sturt departed Adelaide with 16 men, 11 horses, 30 bullocks, a boat and carriage, a spring cart and several drays, 200 sheep, two sheep dogs and four


kangaroo dogs.

Rather than heading directly northward, Sturt's party first travelled to the Murray River and up the Darling, in an attempt to avoid the horseshoe lakes which Eyre had reported.

During the arduous journey, Sturt's men suffered terribly from scurvy, heat and lack of water. Remarkably, only one man was lost - James Poole.


Sturt discovered no inland sea; he did, however, find much forbidding countryside and desert, and he added greatly to the understanding of Australia's arid interior.


Today, his name lives on in Sturt's Stony Desert.






Sturt leaving Adelaide in 1844







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It's a sunny afternoon and I'm sitting cross-legged with my eyes closed, introducing myself to my womb Part 2

How do they feel about the rise of the neo-hippy?

"It is a surprise to reach adulthood and suddenly find that growing up in a Buddhist centre carries social cache. I am loath to cash in on it; that feels like the antithesis of everything our childhood instilled in me."

Nell echoes that: "Of course it's good to wear natural fabrics, it is good to eat organic food, but the reason my parents did all those things was because they were worried about the impact on other people."

You could argue that the rise of the neo-hippy is simply a reflection of the narcissistic "me, me, me" world of social media. Old hippies believed in living economically and communally, bulk-buying wholefoods and sharing the childcare; Nell says that if your bag of lentils fits into your hand, then you are definitely not a hippy.

Some neo-hippies are also surprisingly intolerant of other people's lifestyles. My friend Carly experienced this when she moved into a houseshare: "I'm always being made to feel bad for using a razor or enjoying an egg," she says. She was accused of being insensitive for leaving a non-vegan chocolate cake, a gift from her 87-year-old grandmother, out in the kitchen. "I've also been lectured for being in a monogamous relationship, instead of enjoying the benefits of polyamory. "A lot of my family are from Cumbria and make a living building paths and doing farm work. In my eyes, they are the best kind of hippies, even if they don't have the hippy signifiers of my housemates - the posters and the dreads. They share resources with their neighbours and are open-minded and welcoming. For many people, being a hippy has become more a badge of honour than a way of life. And when you're on the wrong end of it, it can feel less like peace and love and more like snobbery,"

Millennials are prone to idealising their parents' generation: whacking retro filters on their iPhone photographs There's a heavy dollop of image-consciousness thrown in there, too. I suspect many neo-hippies wouldn't be seen dead at Womad, where my mother took me and which Nell attended every year - "standing in a field next to your dad, wearing a bumbag and thinking, 'Oh, I've seen enough men from Kazakhstan playing fiddles'". The cultural appropriation aspect grates, too: flaunting a Native American headdress at Burning Man, greeting people with "namaste", calling people and things your "spirit animal".





But perhaps I am falling victim to rose-tinted nostalgia for a hippiedom that never was. Millennials are certainly prone to idealising their parents' generation: listening to their vinyl and whacking retro filters on their iPhone photographs. Perhaps there never was a golden age. The historian Dominic Sandbrook, author of State Of Emergency: The Way We Were: Britain 1970-1974 seems to think not. "The number of people, certainly in Britain, who genuinely dropped out, lived in communes, slaughtered their own birds - full-on hippies, if you like, was pretty small," he tells me. "It was a reasonably middle-class, universityeducated thing to do. This is a massive generalisation, but how many hippies were there in Rotherham in 1970? My guess is, not many. Whereas in Cambridge, Oxford, a lot of people would probably have identified themselves as hippies."

He argues that today's neo-hippies are not so different. "Almost from the beginning, being a hippy was about an aesthetic, and it's an aesthetic that's defined by what you're carrying, what you're wearing, the decor of your flat, the food you're cooking. Everyone's got the same hair, everyone's got the same clothes. I think it's too tempting to think, 'Oh, this is a terrible and commercialised relic of what was once a pristine and beautiful thing."

But didn't they want to change the world? I asked my mum's friend Rose, who dropped out of university in 1969 to go on the hippy trail to India. "We were idealistic, so yes. We were anti-materialistic and very much seeking out eastern philosophy and ideas. I had been disappointed by my philosophy course at university - it was all very dry and logicbased. This was an explosion of new ideas: Buddhism, Jungian psychology, RD Laing," she explains. "But we didn't do much. We took too many drugs, listened to lots of amazing music and hung out - people from so many different places: Australians, Europeans from all over, Canadians, Americans, including quite a few US draft dodgers." Would she agree with Sandbrook that it was a relatively privileged group of people? "On the whole, it was middle class young people who had the luxury of dropping out. It was a precursor to the whole gap year thing."

Sandbrook argues that it was an inherently elitist movement. "It was about changing the world through withdrawing from it. That's quite a monastic attitude: the world is corrupt so we will set up our own little world in which we can live organically and ethically and challenge capitalism."



That involved the kind of material sacrifices Nell talked about; but as Sandbrook points out, there was much less money around in the late 1960s and early 1970s. A lot of people had no central heating. Dropping out involved a level of sacrifice lower than it might today.

You could ask: if practising a hippy lifestyle makes people calmer and happier, where's the harm? Many of the younger generation now drawn to it live in stressful urban environments and work in demanding jobs. This was precisely the reason my womb guru Chloe Isidora found shamanism: because she was burned out and unhappy. "It's about people wanting to feel a sense of purpose, like they are doing something with their life," she tells me. "I felt like there was something huge missing. The word hippy doesn't bother me at all. You don't have to be on a spiritual path; you can just have this

yearning for fulfilment — that's what it's really about."
Certainly she's right that you don't have to be a hippy to attend her womb circle. They are a diverse bunch — four white women, four women of colour, all from different walks of life, and all friendly and keen to find a greater connection to their own bodies. Where's the harm? Isidora says she's thrilled it's fashionable again. "It needs to be for people to plug in and say, 'Actually I want to do this, and it's not embarrassing, or I feel weird or the odd one out."

Despite the scars of her hippy upbringing, Nell agrees. "I don't want to sound too cynical," she says. "Womb wisdom is probably really healthy, and to take time to go outside and be in nature is incredibly important. If you need to dress it up, then at least you're doing it. It's so easy for me to be snide because it's kind of old hat to me."

Dropping out completely isn't a popular option in Britain – not just because of our insane rents and crazy working hours,

but because of our climate. "The hippy stronghold was always California," Sandbrook explains. "This will sound so banal, but I think it's true: it's partly a question of the weather. It's very easy to be a hippy and live in a commune if you're living in sparkling sunshine. If you're in north Wales and it's pouring with rain it's a slightly different matter."

Tell me about it.

I think the children of hippies will always struggle to fully embrace the revival, perhaps because so many of us have rebelled in the only way we know how: by becoming desperately conventional. We walk among you, but we are in disguise


"When I think of the children of the hippies I know," says Nell, "they ascribe to all the ethics, they volunteer, they get the train instead of flying short distances, and all that stuff. But they are wearing clean, smart clothes they bought from a shop, getting married before they have a baby, and buying a house — people whose parents believed all property is theft." And conventional though I may be, I confess I enjoyed the womb wisdom circle. I liked Isidora, and when she gave me a

little bundle of sage to purify my house, it brought back fond memories. In a weird kind of way, it felt like coming home. Perhaps my mum's incense burning, and those times she made me do yogic chanting, have paid off. Not that long ago I got so high with my dad that I almost – almost – could see what he sees in the Grateful Dead. And of course, I work for the Guardian. I'm still waiting for my uterus to get back to me, though.

The Deniliquin Ute Muster had always been on Rebecca's wish list, but with the farm and babies, she'd never managed to make it.


Tonight, she decided to reclaim herself.



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
