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

#### EDITORIAL

"The War is Not Over" In a Press Release in Valley Voice on 8th June, 1973 it was stated, "The War is Over". We want to ask "Is war in Vietnam really over?" The war may not be over for another 50 or 60 years according to the experts. The bombing may be over, the Americans and Australians may have departed but what remain are millions of Vietnamese who are faced with the immense task of re-construction, re-habilitation and reconciliation; a people who are faced with a break-down in family structure and a re-building of their culture. This may take a life-time!

And what of the land itself? How can the war be over when the country is scarred with 3 million bomb craters - some 30 feet wide - which fill with water and are breeding places for mosquitos, and have left the once fertile soil a mass of hard-baked clay, where no crops will grow? When will the trees begin to grow again where defoliants have been used?

How can the war be over when children are still being blinded and crippled, with loss of limbs by land mines; while diseases like polio and malaria, which were once almost wiped out, have returned in epidemic proportions? Some of these children, who after being given artifcial limbs and theraputic help commit suicide. How can the war be over when there are many part American - Australian -Vietnamese children running about and while there are 200,000 political prisioners? What can be done? Experts in this field are saying: "Vietnam has too many Westerners and too may advisors": "Vietnam should be permitted to solve its own problems and re-build its self-reliance": "Help should come from outside through international organisations who are prepared to co-operate with the Vietnamese at the local level".



#### FROM THE PULPIT

#### "SELAH"

The word selah occurs 71 times in the Psalms and was written for the benefit of the temple musicians or orchestra. Itto simplest meaning was "a pause", " a rest," "silence,"but sometimes, according to its setting, it represented "a repetition" or a pause while an obeisance was made.

How the musicians managed to get the right interpretation each time, apart from rehearsal instructions, or familiarity with the routine of the services is a matter for conjecture.

Evidently the effectiveness of a selah on the form of worship must have been a matter for careful thought, as it gave the worshippers a necessary opportunity to reflect, if only momentarily, on an inspired truth.

When next you read a psalm, either in private or in public, there is no need for you to repeat the word selah, but to do what it suggests: just pause for a moment. Or if you think you will be misunderstood by pausing just say, " Now isn't that last sentence worth thinking about! ".... SELAH
