## PROBLEMS OF THE VALLEY

Our member for Macquarie Mr. G.A. Shaw MLC has reported to the Valley Voice concerning Employment and Industry in the Fingal Valley. He says:-

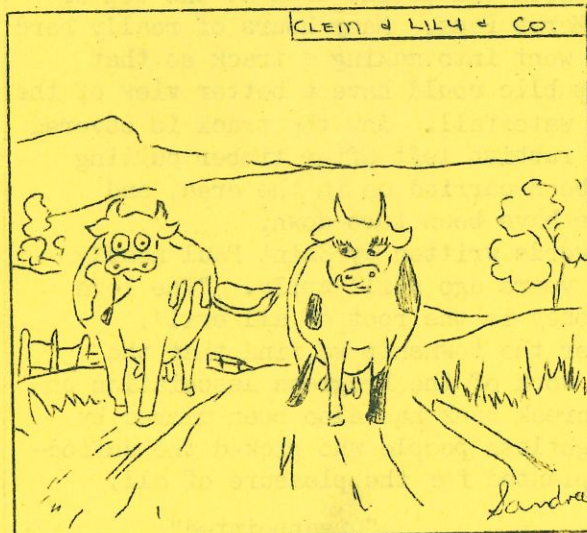
"The real need is to stimulate employment. I cannot envisage any single development which will suddenly effect a transformation; rather do I see possibilities of several things being done which when added together, could make a significant difference.

I have now received a copy of the Report of the Director-General of Tourism, Mr. Butler, who visited Rossarden, Story's Creek, Fingal and Avoca on September 11th. Obviously, such a brief visit has limitations and an opportunity for a more detailed study must be awaited.

Mr. Butler cannot see Story's Creek and Rossarden themselves being sufficient to attract tourists in competition with other parts of Tasmania; however, he does see probable developments based on accommodation at Fingal. An important and often over-looked part of the Tourist Industry is the need to provide tourists with opportunity to purchase genuine Tasmanian articles of particular value and interest. If these could be made in the Valley by a single industry or several cottage-type industries, such artifacts could be distributed and thus made available to the wherever he is in Tasmania. For example - Possum and wallaby skins are all shipped from Tasmania and processed elsewhere. Why? Could they be processed in the Fingal Valley? Could 'Fingal Valley Furs' become something for tourists to look for?

To further explore the possibilities, I am of the opinion that there would be real value in conducting a 'workshop' or 'think-tank', comprising representatives of the Valley, together with such Departmental Heads as Tourism, Industrial Development and Forestry. To promote this, I have had discussion with Mr. Butler, Warden Haas and the Minister for Tourism and have, through Mr. Miller, sought Cabinet approval of such a meeting.

This will be considered by Cabinet on the 25th October. Meanwhile could I ask all those sincerely interested in building up the population and prosperity of the Valley to send any ideas they may have to me, the Council Clerk or Warden Haas?



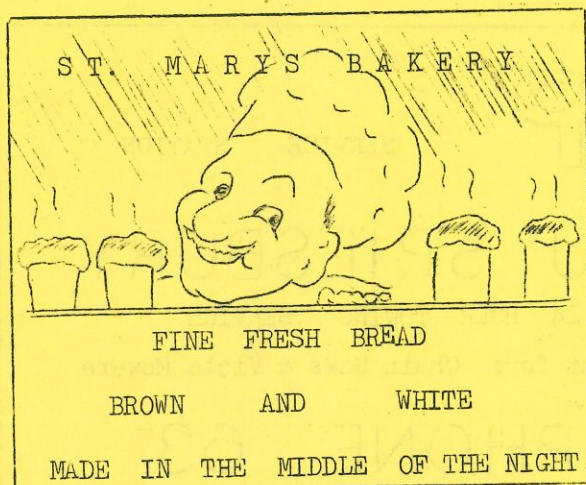

Mr. Batt says, "I have requested the Commissioner for Transport, Mr. Webb, to give early consideration to the installation of lights at this crossing and as soon as his report is to hand, I will write to you again."

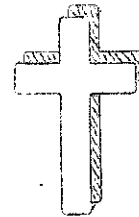

# just yarnin'

by Old Timer.

No cows milked below the Railway Station other than a house cow or two!

What has gone wrong with the dairying industry in this district. Not so many years ago there would be around a 1000 cows milked, taking in German Town, Dublin Town, Irish Town, Gray, Falmouth and Upper Scamander. In the early 1900's we had two Cheese Factories, besides all the little farms around the hills that made their own cheese. The first factory was built by the Tasmanian Cool Storage Company of Launceston. The first manager was a Mr. Fallon. He later left the Company and started one of his own down at Storth Farm at Cullenswood, now owned by Mr. Napier. Mr. McHarg came from Victoria and managed the factory with the help of some of the local boys. One of the last was Arthur Salter.

The farmers carted their own milk in those days with horses and carts. They would bring the milk and take back the day before's whey. This factory was just over the road from the railway station and you can still see part of the cement block that the boiler stood on.

There is still one man living that carted milk to the factory; he is Walter Homan. He enlisted in the 1914 war. The horse he used to cart the milk with was sold to the army and he brought him to my father to have him clipped. He placed a string around him and with white chalk he marked a line so he would be clipped nice and straight. Walter lives in retirement in Launceston.

The factory closed down in 1918 and was pulled down and sold to different ones. There is one house built out of it at Cornwall.

They did not pay the farmer much for the milk those times; fourpence a gallon was the price for the milk. After the factory closed, the farmers went back to making their own cheese and some sent cream to Launceston.

In 1938, Bert Markey built the factory up by the Hospital for Murdock Bros. and he and Mrs. Markey made the cheese for a time and then Mr. Jim House came and was the cheese maker. About 1948 Murdock's sold it. The farmers around the district formed a Company known as The St. Marys Co-op. and for a short time Mrs. John McGee made the cheese and then Horace Davern came and he made the cheese till ill health enforced him to retire. Then Murray Berwick and Bruce Nailor made the cheese with Jeff King, who drove the lorry to collect the milk. The factory closed down in 1970 and so ended the cheese in this district.

For a couple of years the North Eastern Dairy Co. came three times a week to pick up the cream; they came across the Plains and returned the same way. Now they have to make the round trip via St. Helens to get enough.

We are left with six farmers milking in all about 170 cows and two herds at Seymour. Taking in Scamander, Falmouth, all around the hills and as far down the valley as Millbrook, about 45 herds were milked.

## HEALTH NOTES

### SAFE LIFTING FOR THE HOUSEWIFE

Nothing can disable a healthy man or woman as quickly as acute backache. A back injury can bring weeks of pain and cost you hundreds of dollars in medical expenses. It pays to recognise the situations which would cause an injury.

Ask yourself - Is this weight heavier than I am used to lifting? Do I have to assume a peculiar position to pick it up? Will I have to jerk or shove it violently?

### HERE ARE SOME WAYS IN WHICH A BACK INJURY CAN BE PREVENTED

- \* Make it a rule not to lift a weight greater than 25 pounds.
- \* If the load is too heavy, wait and get some help. Make two trips with your laundry basket rather than carry one heavy load.
- \* It is easier to push, pull or "walk" furniture than to lift it.
- \* When lifting, keep your back as straight as you can and bend your knees to reach the object.
- \* It is desirable to have sink, stove and benches at the right height for you, preferably between waist and shoulder level. Prolonged bending will cause fatigue in your back muscles.
