EDITORIAL

A New Light in our Skies

We are about to be visited by a stranger from outer space. Within a few weeks we, with millions of others, will gaze with wonder at this heavenly visitor which, if it has passed this way before, may have been witnessed by some form of animal life. When it passes this way again in 80 thousand years time it is hard to imagine that man will still be around to view its splendour. So let's have a good look while it is here; we will never have the chance again.

We refer, of course, to the newly discovered comet whose name we cannot pronounce let alone spell. This visitor is a bonofidemember of our solar system, but unlike the planet Earth (which takes one year to orbit the sun) and distant Pluto (248 years), this comet's orbit is so immense that it takes about 80 thousand years! The comet will be the brightest visiting light to appear in our skies, even more spectacular than Halley's comet of 1910 for those who are old enough to remember it. (It takes 76 years to orbit the sun and should be here again in 1986). It is remotely possible that a comet could prove a danger to Earth if it were put on a collision course due to deflection sometimes caused by huge planets like Jupiter and Saturn. The head of the great comet of 1811 was largor than the sun and even a small comet has a diameter larger than Earth's. Frightening? Not really. Nature has provided us with a blanket of atmosphere which helps to ward off such intruders. If a comet did stray into our atmosphere it would probably disintegrate into a spectacular meteor shower. Such would probably be the case if it wandered too close to the sun too. The other remotely possible danger lies in the immense poisonous tail of the comet which, if it came into contact with Earth's atmosphere, would make one a little anxious. There is no evidence that life on our planet has been seriously threatened in this way, although in 1910, Halley's comet tail and Earth's atmosphere did touch, but apparently with no effects.

Some of our readers may say that a comet is nothing to get excited about, but for many the fact remains that there are forces at work in the universe that demand more than man's passing nod. If we want to we





usual indifference, which seems to be the norm. nowadays.

Comparatively few gave any attention to another bright light that shone over Bethlehem's plains nearly two thousand years ago, which pointed to a Greater Light; a Power far greater than puny man. As we ask of this new comet, "Where did it come from? Why is it here? Where is it going?", let us ask ourselves as we face another Christmas and New Year (and not necessarily with a religious connotation — for man should always be asking this) "Where did I come from? Why am I here? Where am I going?"

Sir,

In the November 23rd issue of the 'Valley Voice' Mr. Shaw the departmental centre set—up by the Government to instigate industry in the Fingal Valley which is a good start. He also mentioned my suggestion for a tanning industry in the Valley. I would now like to suggest that if the industry could be situated in the old home "Bona Vista" it would be an added tourist attraction. Rooms need only be restored as they were required, and what a beautiful setting for a simple morning and afternoon teas to be served either in doors or outside when weather permitted.

My other suggestion is rather more ambitious and has to do with that other commodity available in the Valley - wood. It is the establishment of a pulpwood factory. South Africa is exporting rayon pulp to textile factories throughout the world to the annual value of over \$25m., and they also produce pulp wood for board factories for their own use. This entails a constant programme of reafforestationas there is far less natural forest in South Africa than we possess here. As a permanent source of prosperity tree cycles can be completed by large scale replanting.

Bark and tanning extract are being exported from South Africa to the annual value of \$12m from the wattle plantations which they established from Australian seeds many years ago. Ironically they sell tanning to Australia! Why leave it all to others to make use of national assets.

Mr. J.E. Nicholson, 43, has been appointed Forest Manager by Northern Woodchips Pty. Ltd. This was announced today by company general manager G. Harrison.

Mr. Nicholson, who recently moved to Tasmania from Kelbourne, will take up his position on November 26th at the company's Long Reach head office.

In making the announcement Mr. Harrison said that Mr. Nicholson was among the most highly qualified and experienced forest experts in Australia, holding a B.Sc. degree in forestly from the University of California and a M.Sc. in Forestry from the Melbourne University.

He previously had eleven years experience in forest management, logging superivison, reforestation and fire control on 100,000 acres of private California forest. More recently he has spent five years with the C.S.I.R.O. in which he conducted a research programme into the problems of growth stress in Eucalypts leading to the breeding of trees in Australia more suitable for logging purposes.

NEWSLETTER

Since the changing of our membership role to incorporate the persons of the Fingal and Portland Municipalities the existing Share Application form has been found unsuitable for other than Rossarden and Storys Creek areas.

We have since submitted an amended Share Application form to the Registrar and are awaiting approval of this.

Also, because the Tasmanian Credit Union League has recently set up a printing office in Hobart and will do most if not all of the printing of forms for all Credit Unions in Tasmania, forms are being standardised as far as possible and this should result in a big saving in costs.

Ben Lomond have decided to make the changes now.

This has temporarily delayed the follow up of meetings at Fingal and St. Marys but we have not forgotten. We hope to get the Registrars' approval of the amended Share Application form before Christmas, but in any case we will be ready to go ahead with our expansion programme early in the New Year.

The future of the mines at Rossarden and Storys Creek looks much brighter now than it has done for some time. Metal prices have risen lately and are expected to rise again in the New Year. The mines are once again working on a profitable basis and this is expected to continue while ore reserves last, and authority puts this at five or six years for known reserves.

No effort was made to enrol members on these fields in the last year because we could not feel confident of the future. For the one hundred or so that we lost through retrenchments only one or two was enrolled. We are now confident that several of the lost members can be replaced in the New Year and no effort will be spared in this direction.

The Tasmanian Credit Union League has produced a High School Kit for presentation to High Schools throughout Tasmania. This Kit has been sponsored by donation from member Credit Unions and consists of instruction in Credit Union operations and will be incorporated into the High School curriculum, so don't be surprised within the next year or so if your children can tell you more about Credit Unions than you yourself know.

COMETS ABOUT MORE

The comet consists of a solid nucleus, made of lumps of meteorite rock. This may be up to 400 miles across. Surrounding it is the gaseous coma, up to 80 thousand miles in diameter. Our editorial states that the head of a comet ranges from loans are insured for the amount owing. the diameter of Earth and that of the Sun. This is so, but it is pointed out that it is the coma itself that is so massive and not the actual core, although a core up to 400 miles across is pretty staggering. But that tail!!! Up to 200 million miles long, would you believe?

A comet forms a new tail every time it approaches the sun due to the sun's radiation and this tail always points away from the sun. A comet is relatively light and small compared with other bodies in our solar system and is easily deflected \$8,000 and the balance of his loan repaid as it passes large planets like Jupiter and Saturn. Sometimes its path is so distorted that it is caused to fly off into space and never comes near our sun again.

Some comets have been seen to disintegrate. ship increases sufficiently. One comet of 1846 split into two parts as it approached the sun in 1852. The comet then broke up into smaller pieces which were observed during a later orbit as "shooting stars". Scientests have stated that there is a possibility of something similar happening as the new comet, Kohoutek's (named after its discoverer), comes near the sun.

Halley's comet is the most famous of all time and investigation has shown that it has been observed regularly as far back as 240 BC. The first definite recording of a comet was made in 467BC and this is now believed to have been Halley's. Can anyone lend us a good In the meantime....WATCH OUT telescope? FOR COMETS!
