


The great event that hardly was!

Comet Kohoutek has come and gone, but did you see it? Very few claimed to see it in spite of early rising and endless gazing at the evening sky. Valley Voice has not heard of any person making a positive local sighting and many are left rather disappointed after all the publicity by the press, national magazines and also this paper.

Because we are not astronauts, we will have to be content to wait until 1986 when Halley's comet is expected to return, if we are to see anything as spectacular as Comet Kohoutek was supposed to have been.

In the meantime, there are often other wonders to be seen in the heavens. In late December, last year, a star, a planet and a satellite were to be seen with the naked eye a few degrees apart in the daytime sky. They were the Sun, planet Venus and the Moon. In fact Tenus (the Evening Star) has been so bright lately, that it is clearly seen with the naked eye, in broad daylight, following the Sun across the sky.

HEALTH NOTES

Toys for young children should be chosen with particular care and be appropriate to age.

Three main points should be considered:-

Age of child. Safety of toys. Value for money.

For Infants: soft cuddly toys, small enough to be hugged and carried, easily washed.

Strong, brightly coloured rattles and bright beads to hang on cot.

Small, squeaky rubber toys, musical box, help to identify sounds.

Watch for pieces which may be bitten off and swallowed, sharp points which may poke into a child's eyes.

9 Months - 2 years. Small building blocks, nesting cups, posting box with varying shapes, small cuddly toys, floating toys for bath, push and pull toys, swing. Be sure to inspect for strength and security of wheels, fittings, etc. no sharp points.

2 - 4 years. Stringing large beads, posting box with more advanced shapes, trucks, pedal car, tricycle, dolls and pram, large wooden jigsaws, building blocks, metal mirrors, bucket and spade, blackboard and chalks, musical toys, water toys.

All these teach the feel of things, satisfy curiosity, imagination, strengthen the muscles and co-ordination, but must be strong.

4 - 6 years. Child is now becoming more sociable and learning to share. Creative play - play dough, plasticine, paints, toy shop, telephone. Imitation - doctors & nurses sets, cowboy set, tea sets, dolls house. Adventure - climbing frame, swing, Wendy house, Go-cart.

GARDENING NOTES

GARLIC - THAT DEADLY KILLER.

Details of a cheap multi-purpose insecticide made from GARLIC were given in the A.B.C. Country Hour recently.

The spray, which is said to have spectacular results, was produced by Henry Doubleday Research Association in Britain.

Being organic, it has been welcomed by the many Tasmanians who have converted to organic gardening.

The recipe, given by the director of the Doubleday Association (Dr. Lawrence Hill), is:-

"Chop 3ozs of Garlic bulbs and mix two teaspoons of liquid parafin. Leave them to soak for 48 hours. Add a pint of water and mix well with a quarter ounce of a good oil-based soap as a spreader.

Filter and store the result in a plastic container - not a metal one, because there would be some reaction. This must not be used straight. It should be diluted to a 1 per cent solution."


The Doubleday scientists used it in various concentrations, but found the 1 per cent a good overall figure.

One pint of solution diluted with 99 pints of water covers about 100 square yards. Some pests are much stronger (tougher) than others, and local experimentation might help.

Dr. Hill said the spray was particularly effective against the cockchafer larvae.

Laboratory experiments gave an 83 per cent kill with wireworms, 73 per cent with snails, 92 per cent with aphids, and 98 per cent with codling moth caterpillars and white cabbage butterflies.

A 1 per cent solution kills mosquito larvae, but this is impracticable, because of the large quantity of water that most garden ponds contain.



ST. GABRIELLE'S CHURCH OF ENGLAND, GOULD'S COUNTRY

"Meeting of Trustees held on March 27th 1911. Present: A. Johnstone, J.H. Morgan, J. & W. Johnstone. The minutes of meeting held on 15th January were confirmed. The Treasurer announced that there was a credit balance in the Savings Account of £100.18.3d.

Signed A. Johnstone.
Chairman, 29th April, 1911."

The above minutes were taken from the files in the museum at Gould's Country which tells the story of the creation of a new Church in the Valley.

In 1875 Ludwyk Crowther, a Doctor of Medicine and later a member of the Legislative in Hobart Town travelled on four different occasions into the valley of Gould's Country. In his diary he writes of having tea with 'the Fitzgeralds'; going to a Band of Hope meeting and seeing patients at the Johnstom's. This was on Saturday 11th December 1875.

The Band of Hope meeting was held in the Union Church which was where all denominations worshipped. It was not until 1909 that the Church of England decided to leave the Union Church and build their own church in the township of Gould's Country. Mr. N.W. Loone, in his book on the North East, referred to moves by the different religions from the Union Church as (and I quote) "The Old Union Church is swarming again".

Tenders were let for the new church to R.H. Apted for £133.0.0 on May 17th 1912 to be built on land donated to the Trustees by Alexander Johnstone.

On November 15th 1912 St. Gabrielle's Church was opened and dedicated by Archdeacon Beresford of Launceston who wrote. "The work of the Committee has been onerous but has been generously and willingly given".

A photograph in the Museum shows the congregation outside the church on this momentous occasion. Some of the names of people in the photograph are...Steel, Johnstone, Cooper, Brown, Avery, Holland, Rector Robson, Archdeacon Beresford and Cannon Greenwood, Hodge, Goyne, Wooley, Apted, Palmer, Gleadowand McCauliff. There are sixty four persons in the photograph.

The first wedding at St. Gabrielle's was celebrated by Rector Robson on 25th December 1912 between Cecil Alfred Robinson and Amy Isabel Blacklow.

On November 18th 1973 at 3pm the 61st Anniversary Service was held in the little church at Gould's Country to remember all those who have worked and helped to keep this church alive. After the service, afternoon tea was served at the Traveller's Rest Hotel.
