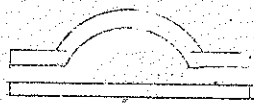

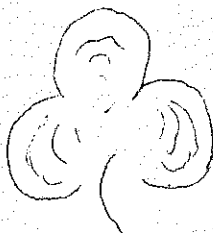
EDITORIAL

Of that tormented land of Ireland, everyone asks the question, "Why?" Well, in the year 1600, Ulster was planted by the British with, to quote the Old Writers, "The Rif Raf" of Scotland England and Wales. Some 40 years later The Battle of the Boyne was lost by the Irish and the immigrants of the North were securely planted. Thus the history of the thing.

Of course, years have added other complications. The main one being that in the early 1920's the planters of the North (The majority, mainly Protestants) voted to stay separated from the South of Ireland. Basically the Irish (The minority, the Roman Catholic) resented their poverty in their own land and their political isolation from their fellow country men of the South.

On the other hand, the Protestants of the North are afraid with good reason, because the Roman Catholic Church in that country is powerful, even in matters of State. For example, they will not allow the Universities to unite and the state religion is Catholicism.

Now does all this sound familiar to the way Australia was conquered? Would you move off your land to give it back to the Aborigines? No. But you have only owned it for 200 odd years at the most. Maybe the English should have killed all the Irish as our ancestors killed the Aborigines. Then there would be no problem. Anyway, think long and hard before judging either way. Because, like most old conflicts, both sides are right.

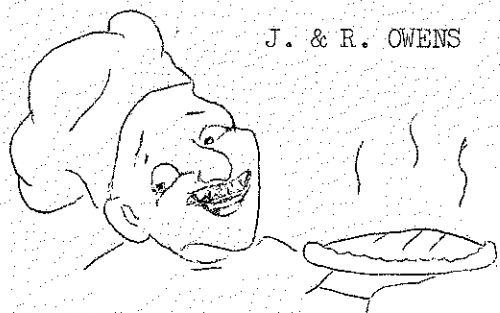

The Funeral Service was held in the Mathinna Presbyterian Church and was the largest seen at Mathinna for some time. The service was conducted by Pastor Graham Clarke of the Methodist Church, St. Marys, assisted by the Rev. T. Evans of Campbelltown. The organist was Miss Madge Hayes of St. Marys.

Many relatives and friends from many parts of the state were present as well as from Victoria. Mrs. Vincent had a family of four: Bessie (Dec'd), Jim, (Dec'd), Amy (Mrs. Jarvis, St. Marys), Hazel, (Mrs. Hall, Fingal) and two adopted children, Faye and Betty.

The funeral arrangements were carried out by Mr. C.W. Royle A.F.D.A. St. Marys.

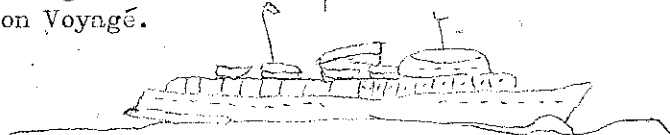

FEARS

Into any child's life can come frightening and unhappy incidents which set up special fears. You, as parents naturally do your best to protect your children from such frightening incidents. But you cannot protect them from all fears. Each child is different, but, in general, each age brings its own characteristic fears, as for example:

- 1½ - 2 yrs: Large noisy trucks and trains nearby. Thunder. Wind. Rain. Dark rooms. Vacuum cleaners. Very large objects. Animals. Moving to a new house or room. Fear of going down the drain. Fear of separation from mother especially at bedtime or if she is going away.
- 2 - 3 yrs: Fear of movement or of having objects moved. Entering a room by a different door. Coloured or wrinkled people. 'BogeyMan'. Change of furniture. New bed. The dark. Burglars. Animals. Parents going out at night.
- 3 - 4 yrs: Loud noises. Fire engine. Wild animals. The dark scary stories on Television. Door bell. Telephone. Starting school. Mother going out or leaving him at school.
- 5 yrs: Not usually a fearful age, but more fear of bodily harm - falling. Fear that mother will not return. Bad people. The dark.
- 6 - 7 yrs: Very fearful. Ugly voice - tones. That someone is hiding under the bed. Ghosts. Fire. Fire. Water. Thunder. Lightning. Sleeping alone. Fear of being lost.

"I am obliged for your order for a TURFMASTER which was posted this A.M. With some country golf clubs we find the greens may not have been constructed exactly like those in major cities, with the result that the soft loam does not go down the full depth of the required hole.
