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EDITORIAL

MEALS ON WHEELS: Unquestionably, Meals on Wheels is one of the most highly respected and worthwhile services in our community. Approximately 150 meals per week are delivered by a team of voluntary drivers in St. Marys, Cornwall, Fingal and St. Helens.

The recipients are generally appreciative and uncomplaining and would gladly pay more than the mere 25c/30c that is currently charged. The Portland service is a fine example of how a Meals on Wheels service should operate. It runs with flawless efficiency, like a well-oiled machine, with scarcely a mis-beat to mar its performance. It employs a rather unique roster system.

The same can hardly be said for the St. Marys service, although recent roster problems have been almost eliminated in Fingal. The hospital side of the service leaves nothing to be desired and recipients of the meals acknowledge the service with smiling gratitude. So what is wrong? Simply the roster. It just doesn't work like it should - and for good reason. Plainly, there are just not enough drivers. The present drivers are overworked and though generally performing their task with dedicated enthusiasm, some are slowly tiring and becoming a little disgruntled. The committee is aware of this problem and is working to alleviate it. It seeks the co-operation of those who are not now involved and a little understanding from those that are. The whole future of

Meals on Wheels is jeopardized if this situation is allowed to worsen. A campaign to recruit new drivers is to be undertaken, but if you are able to drive, please don't wait to be asked - act now! Matters relating to the roster should be referred to the Roster Secretary, Matron Whitworth.

A happier and more workable situation will exist when no person is rostered more frequently than once every two months. We are far from that at the moment, so will you help to make it a reality.

For its own good, our community cannot be indifferent to this growing threat and should unite in the cause of stamping out this social evil. We urge that residents report to the Police, immediately, any suspicion or knowledge of drug activity. You are assured that our Police will receive such information in the strictest confidence and that you will be protected.

FROM THE PULPIT

The Parable of the Pink Frangipani

Many years ago, one of the missionaries returned to Tonga with a small pink Frangipani plant. The cream-flowered variety had already been introduced but the pink was new and aroused considerable interest, so much so that people would snap off a piece of the brittle branches and take it home to plant. The missionary felt frustrated as well as very annoyed about this and did all he could to prevent its happening but without success. The tree was ill-shapen, retarded and broken and showed little of its true beauty.

The years went by and all across the island the pink Frangipani flourished and as people now had many plants from which to obtain pieces they ceased to trouble the missionary or spoil his tree, so it grew quite large, a mass of fragrant blossom. Though it bore many scars these were largely hidden by new growth but it had multiplied and spread, producing loveliness far and wide.

The Master sends His workers out to scattered places to labour for him. They find many hindrances; thoughtless people seemingly destroy the effectiveness of their efforts; try as he will, the missionary finds his projects snapped off and his various moves muted so that he views with dismay the broken branches of his eager strivings and sometimes wonders whether the effort is worthwhile. But persisting he finds the years slip by and dotted here and there are the evidences of new growth, the blossoming into spiritual loveliness of lives in unexpected places. People have caught from him the truth of the Gospel and the Spirit of the Master and he himself has gained strength through the deprivations he has suffered and the sacrifices he has made and so exhibits the maturity of those who for Christ's sake endure and in doing so scatter the life of the Master in other lives which in turn will also show His beauty.

"NAME OR TRADE"

The St. Marys Pass began in 1844 took nearly four years to complete. Not only did the winding road have to be gouged out of solid rock in many places with very primitive tools, but buildings also had to be erected both at Grassey Bottom at the top, and at Falmouth for the two separate work parties.

The first long hill at the bottom of the Pass is known as Millar's Hill, and two stories are told about the origin of this name.

The first is that bread was baked for the men beside this incline, and presumably the wheat ground there also. An old oven still lies beside the creek in the valley of substantiate this story.

The other more dramatic tale is that the convicts had an over-bearing and cruel overseer by the name of Millar whom they managed to kill in a way that appeared accidental while working on the hill which was later named after him.

It is difficult to prove either story correct after a lapse of 90 years, but perhaps some of our readers can do so, or even tell another better story about Millar's Hill.

MULCHES IN THE GARDEN

The purpose of mulching is to retain an adequate supply of moisture readily available for the roots of young plants, thereby reducing of watering so often.

To provide, as with a stone mulch, a warm and moist root run, when desirable. To protect the soil from the heat of summer or cold of winter. To provide a cool and moist root run for fruit trees and shrubs. To supply readily available plant food. To effect a measure of weed control.

Mulching is most beneficial in late Spring and early Summer and should follow a good rainfall or thorough watering. Prior to spreading the mulch, the soil should be thoroughly weeded and well stirred with rake or fork. If the mulch is of the straw, sawdust or wood planer chips variety, the soil should be sprinkled with a dressing of blood and bone manure (about 3oz per square yard) Local availability will influence the type of material used as a mulch. Such material could be compost, well rotted animal manure, spoiled hay, straw or lucerne, pea straw, lawn cuttings, weeds, (before seed formation) sea weed, pine needles, and industrial wastes such as sawdust, spent tan, and hops.
