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EDITORIAL

EDUCATION: Promise or Menace?

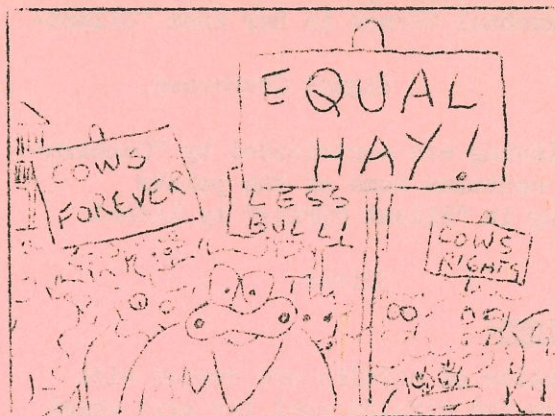
Millions of Australian children have now found their way into our schools for 1974. What will their prospects be? Will the education they are receiving be a promise or a menace?

The success of our children is not a matter of chance - it must be achieved and outside the home influence, teachers are the people to whom we look in confidence. Are our school teachers always aware of their grave responsibility though? Are they competent and adequately equipped to ensure a desirable development of our offspring? Do they realize that what they do and say will largely determine whether our children will grow into delinquents, criminals or most useful members of society. Every child is a potent-delinquent - every child a problem child at some time or other.

Our children must grow up among adults who are largely moved and stirred by the care and attraction of material things. Our commercial civilisation, which tends to measure everything in terms of money, teams up with the drive to acquire, so potent within many people, to provide a foothold and an advanced position in the lives of our children.

The task and responsibility of education is a vital and rather frightening question, and it demands an answer. If the foregoing statements are taken as basically correct and pertinent, then we have a right to ask searching questions as recent correspondents to our Provincial City's newspaper have. Some comments have stemmed from enquiring and enlightened minds, while others have been born in emotional, "out of touch", pseudo-intellectualism.

Our educational system in Tasmania is second to none in the Commonwealth and it seeks to keep abreast of the times - something which the "knockers" of the system, themselves, find difficult to do. Experimentation is necessary; exploration of new avenues is vital. The old statement, "It was good enough for our fathers; it is good enough for our children", bears little truth in this issue and is emotional, rather than enlightening.

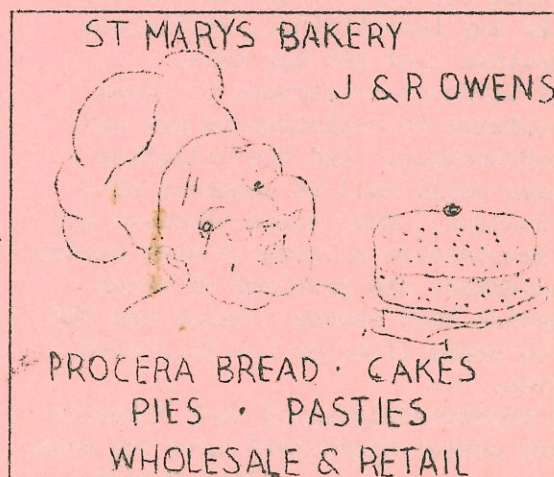


May it suffice to say that, neither the "old" nor the "new", in themselves, will achieve the hopes we have for our children. Our concern should be that, teachers and educators view their vocation as a very high office and give to it all the attention, enthusiasm and dedication that it demands. There is no better way. Without it, the system, whatever we conceive it to be, is doomed to frustration and failure.

Dear Sir,
 After attending meeting at St. Helens concerning Drugs, I thought interesting to point out other toxic substances being utilised by the communities, usually unintentionally, but nevertheless fairly regularly all over Australia.
 I refer to a book by a noted American writer Rachael Carson in her book "Silent-Spring"

The following was contributed by "Concerned" and contains some of the points appearing in "Silent Spring" by Rachel Carson.

SOME POINTS:

DDT: Fields of alfalfa are dusted with DDT, hens fed alfalfa meal lay eggs which contain DDT. Or the hay, fed to cows, transfers the poison to milk and butter.

Dieldrin is five times as toxic as DDT when swallowed, but 40 times as toxic when absorbed through the skin in solution. It strikes quickly and with terrible effect at the nervous system, sending the victims into convulsions.

Aldrin: A quantity the size of an asprin tablet is enough to kill 400 birds.

Endrin is the most toxic of all the chlorinated hydrocarbons. In Venezuela, a year-old child was placed in a house hours after it had been sprayed against cockroaches and after the floors had been washed. By 10 p.m. that night the child was a vegetable, unable to see or hear. Several months in a New York Hospital did not change his condition.

Parathion is one of the most widely used of the organic phosphates. A chemist, trying to learn the dose acutely toxic to humans, swallowed a minute amount equivalent to .00424oz, paralysis followed instantaneously. He could not reach the antidote he had prepared, and died.

Malathion increases the toxicity of some drugs used as muscle relaxants and increases the sleeping time of barbiturates.

Try to find out what chemicals are contained in any insecticides, weedicides or herbicides that you may have.

Rachel Carson's comparison of these lathal elixirs to radiation is apt and thought-Provoking. And the pollution they cause could well be compared with atomic fallout. Ever since chemists began to manufacture substances that nature never invented, the problems of water purification have become complex and the danger to users of water has increased, she writes.

'When inextricably mixed with domestic and other wastes discharged into the same

THE CRASH RESISTANT CAR BUMPER

The virtually no-cost, crash-resistant car bumper has been designed by a group of engineering students at the University of Arizona. Made up from 20 empty beer cans and two boards, it reportedly protects cars against body damage in collisions up to 8 kilometres (5 miles) an hour. The principle, as explained by a faculty advisor, rests on the fact that it takes 90 kilograms (200 pounds) to crush a beer can standing on end. Twenty of these cans between the timber thus absorb the force of a collision.

FUCHSIAS

Late winter is the best time for pruning fuchsias when the frosts are over, as old wood and leaves protect the crowns in winter.

Cut out old canes, dead wood and branches carrying thin wood. Pinch out tips of new shoots when about 4" long. This delays flowering six to eight weeks, but gives more flower clusters.

After pruning, water in some plant food. Pruned cuttings grow easily - 4" tip growth when soft sappiness is lost or mature but younger last seasons wood. 5" long with a few leaves on top for preference. Heeled cuttings will root if left in a glass of water.
