#### EDITORIAL

### "THERE'S COAL IN THEM THAR' HILLS"

Who cannot be gladdened when we hear reports from here and there that the economic future of the Valley is starting to look good at last? The situation with Aberfoyle at Rossarden continues to improve; extra men have been employed by the Cornwall Coal Company, with exciting possibilities of doubling production and prospects of industrial giants, like Goliath Portland reverting to coal usage; and the good old A.B.C. and P.M.G. at last doing something about our listening comforts, with the imminent installation of a radio aerial to cover the Valley.

If all this is to be a reality then many of the suggestions concerning the future of our district, printed in past issues of the Valley Voice, look a little like something out of kindergarten. This is not to belittle the worthwhile suggestions that have been expressed by some of our correspondents; some are, clearly, very sound and need to be followed up. But our horizons seem to have been too narrow, dictated, no doubt, by so many having lost heart during the economic "low" of the last decade or two. Even now it is doubted that many of us expected, let alone deserved, the good fortunes that seem to be knocking at our door.

Our future seems to be more secure not so much because we have, with our own hands and brains, brought it about but, rather, because of a crisis - the misfortunes of others in lands where the Fingal Valley is not known - an energy crisis. One Man's Vision: A St. Marys businessman, Mr. Bob Rochfort, has demonstrated his faith in the future of this district by launching a new business enterprise (see supplement to last issue of Valley Voice) and stands to lose financially if the venture is not successful. Bob is very enthusiastic about the whole idea and gives no expression to pessimistic thoughts. The district is buzzing with excited comment which would indicate that the public is very much behind Bob and his team and intends to make good use of this much needed service.

### IT MUSTN'T HAPPEN HERE:

The moment that many feared, but hoped

would never be, came with the shock news this week that 345 persons lost their lives in an air disaster unparalleled in aviation history and the first involving a "wide-bodied" "jumbo-type" jetliner. Such loss of life is staggering; approximately one half of the population of St. Marys wiped out in the twinkling of an eye.

These type of aircraft are likely to be introduced by the Australian airlines in the future, and even now stretched versions of the 727, carrying 150 passengers, are being used. It could be argued that this type of jetliner, statistically speaking, is safer than any other, and its contribution to the advent of economy airfares is unquestioned, but the fact remains that when one goes down the loss of human life is shocking.

Our Department of Civil Aviation can be trusted to ensure that the highest possible level of safety is maintained in Australia as they commendably displayed in their recent disciplinary actions over a domestic airline Captain's infringement of rules at Wynyard.

The Paris disaster was bad enough in itself, but even more tragic if air piracy was the underlying cause. The thought of such a thing happening here is sickening. There can be no doubt that air piracy, in its various forms, will come to Australia. We are not immune to these evils, it's just that things come here after they have been experienced elsewhere.

Our attitude, and that of the Australian Government, should be made crystal clear to any "would be" air priates bent on guerrilla tactics here. The penalty should be the most severe that is humanely possible to impose and all should be made quite aware of it. Let us have our larger jets by all means, but none of this air piracy. There can be no room for both in our Australian skies.

#### ANOTHER STEP FORWARD

In a recent letter to the Secretary of the Fingal Branch of the A.L.P. (Mr. John Macrostie) the Deputy Prime Minister (Mr. Lance Barnard) stated as follows:-

"I am pleased to inform you that as a result of our efforts recently the Postmaster Generals Department will soon install a broadcasting directional aexial, generating 1,000 watts, near Fingal. The new directional aerial will mean that 3,500 people in the Fingal Valley will benefit from vastly improved broadcasting reception from the A.B.C. P.M.G. technicians are already planning installation of the aerial which will be completed before the end of this year. A similar broadcasting aerial will be installed at St. Helens before the end of June, 1975. These new installations are examples of our policy to improve broadcasting reception in country areas as much as technically possible."

CUTTINGS: Autumn is a good time to try hour hand at growing shrubs from cuttings, particularly native Aust-

ralians in cold frosty areas. If you have

a glass house or some other shelter it's worth trying. Here are some which are worth GREVILLEAS: There are about 400 varieties, so some should suit your district. Take a cutting with a heel. GREVILLEA LAVANDULACEA: is a little grevillea, proslate, with bright-red flowerstake cuttings about 2" with heels. GROSMARENIFOLIA: is a hardy shrub which grows well near the sea or in dry places. Take cuttings about 3" with heels. PROSTANTHERA: (native mints) lovely shrubs will strike from cuttings taken now. Short side shoots about 3" with heels are best; these are short lived shrubs but strike so easily; replacements are soon made. LEPTOSPERMUM: Tea Trees, are lovely, flowering for long periods and has a fairly long life, take cuttings about 3" with heels eriostemon, correas and some melaleuca boronias can all have cuttings taken in Autumn if you put clean river sand in a pot, damp well and insert the cuttings. Put two bent wires over the top, 2 U's on opposite sides, this makes a frame, then put the pot and frame into a plastic bag and put into a warm shady place; a chimney shelf is handy. The moisture usually stays within the bag if kept warm at the bottom, The cuttings will strike quicker inside a month instead of waiting up to six months, native plants con't like their roots disturbed so use a cover plant or a mulch for weeds.
