EDITORIAL

THE FUTURE and THE VALLEY VOICE:

In a few weeks time, the Valley Voice will be celebrating its 6th birthday. Born in humble circumstances early in 1968 and arising from a need seen in the community, the circulation soon grew to about 600 copies, finding a level of about 560 copies, where it has remained ever since.

Most of St. Marys residents read our paper and a large percentage of the population of the Valley and East Coast do likewise. More than 80 copies find their way through the post to various parts of Australia. Our readers do not buy the Valley Voice on its literary merit, and this was never our intention, in fact the possibility of a professional take-over, and even change to a newspaper format has been opposed. Local residents buy the paper because it fills a local need; is filled with articles of local interest; is neatly presented and organised by an honorary staff as a community service. In fact some of our readers have stated that they are happy with their paper the way it is, and frankly, the present staff can see no need for any radical changes in the future either.

And yet, as we look beyond our 6th birthday, we are just a little apprehensive. Not that we foresee a decline in circulation - the future seems bright in that direction - but because the Valley Voice, like all organisations, is feeling the effects of spiralling inflation. Costs have rocketed sky-high since our inception, paper and postage being most notable. There has never been a price increase over the years and the 5c charged is barely enough for us to "break-even". We cannot confidently face the future on that basis and we are conscious of the need to budget for replacement equipment and purchase of additional equipment, which would enable us to dress up the paper a little.

We are wondering how our readers react to this situation. Would a price increase be received favourably? We could say that future issues will be 7c or 8c and leave it at that, but, we feel that our thoughts should be brought before you in this way so that you may have the opportunity of expressing yours. Will you write in and tell us what you think?

Clearly, two important ways to delay a price increase, are available to us. Increase the number of advertisers and increase sales. We place these two before our readers that you may help us. Sales will increase in an area from which news, club and organisation reports etc. are forthcoming. For example, at the moment sales are poor in the Bicheno area, but this would soon change as individuals and organisations contributed to the paper. The Mangana area is a glowing example of what we mean.

Whatever the outcome of this may be, it is hoped that two things will be kept in mind. First, this paper is really yours; secondly, it is produced by a small group of enthusiastic workers who love their district as you do, and who are prepared to make personal sacrifices for it.

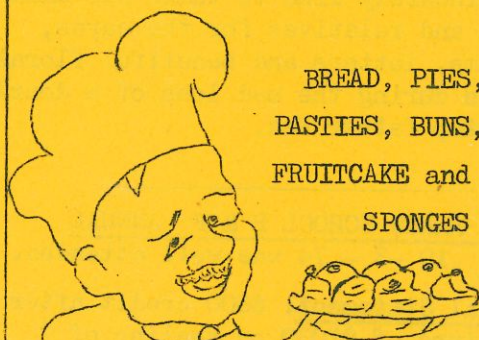
TOUCHE'

GARDEN NOTES

At this time of year its a good idea to look at your garden carefully, and where you could give a natural look and most attractive setting for spring flowering bulbs. The best effect is gained by planting clumps. They look better with open spaces between, but not where there is traffic. Daffodils and jonquils flower beautifully in the grass and can stay for years there, but should always be allowed to keep their foliage until it has died down, this forms the nucleus for next years flowers. This year there are more new varieties of bulbs and bigger ones, this means bigger flowers next spring. Daffodils, and jonquils, may be planted on the coast now. Freesias are lovely planted with daffodils in grass near trees they can be left for years there given well drained soil. Bulbs work under ground making roots for about six weeks before green shoots appear so don't despair; they are not dead. They are allergic to fresh manure, farmyard, stable, or poultry, and complete fertiliser must not come near them.

BE CONSIDERATE:

"Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbour"

God was mindful of the destructive power of the tongue and He gave an entire commandment to its control. That commandment is also directed at our tongues. Everyone who has a tongue has at times mis-used it. We all need to ask God's forgiveness in this matter that we may always be considerate of the good name of others; that we may defend their reputation and speak well of them.

Does our conversation lift men? Does it put them on their feet or does it drag them down? Does our presence and example keep others from gossiping? We, who desperately need the forgiveness of a loving and considerate God, ought to be more considerate concerning others.

Swami Muktananda Paramahansa, a perfected Siddham Yogi and the spiritual head of the Shru Gurudev Ashram in Ganeshpuri, India, is to make a three day stay in St. Helens.

Swami Muktananda, who is affectionately known as "Baba" to thousands throughout the world, is presently visiting capital cities of the Mainland as part of a world lecture tour. The few days in the peace and quiet of the north-east corner of Tasmania will be a welcome interlude in what is normally a busy round of lectures and interviews.

He will be accompanied by Professor Join, Professor Pratibha Trivedi and other Ashramites, and during his stay will conduct the official opening ceremony of the Shru Gurudev Dhyan Yoga Ashram, Tasmania, at 3 oclock on Sunday afternoon March 31st.

Over 100 guests have been invited to the ceremony which will be followed by afternoon tea served in the garden. The guests will also include visitors from the mainland.

Swami Muktananda's Ashram in Ganeshpuri is a very large four-storey building set down in 25 acres of park and farm land - cradled by surrounding mountains - around which has grown up a thriving township catering for the thousands of people from all parts of the world, and all creeds, who visit the Ashram. Its situation is said to resemble the township of St. Helens, and the journey to it from Bombay closely resembles the journey across the Fingal Valley.
