## EDITORIAL

### "THANKYOU BABA, BUT NO - COUNT ME OUT"

This was to have been the editorial of the year! The one who changed all that is Swami Muktananda, "Baba", the 65 year old "perfected" Siddha Yogi and spiritual head of the Shree Gurudev Ashram in Ganeshpuri in India, who visited St. Helens last weekend. He was here to bless and open Tasmania's own Shree Gurudev Dyan Yoga Ashram.

This was to have been the Valley Voice news scoop for 1974! So, with all the fervour of a 20th Century Saul of Tarsus, I set out to St. Helens to persecute the enemy. This cheeky little guru (teacher) needed to be put in his place. Who was he to come here and preach another gospel? Why should another "church" be established in the town? Why should he upset the church folks so?

Finally I "hounded" him down as he sat with his devotees looking out over Binalong Bay - a picture as peaceful and colourful as the sea-scape itself. Cameras were busy capturing the many faces and moods of the fidgety guru. I felt shy and awkward until I learned that Baba just loves the clergy and the press. Devotees sat cross-legged while gazing with misty eyes at his radiant countenance and I admit that I, too, found it difficult to take my eyes from him. Suddenly, as if an inaudible voice from heaven had said "Get up!", Baba and his followers left that scene hurriedly and were on their way back to town. Prof. Join from Bombay University, the bright and intelligent interpreter, rode with me, instead of taking the chartered coach. Using fluent English, he told me many things:- "Baba's mission is to awaken the divine consciousness in his followers through "Shaktipat", which is a spiritual process through which he transmits his divine power, either by word, look, touch or thought. Baba doesn't perform any showy miracles; he simply shows others how to find fullness of life. Drugs, tobacco, alcohol and promiscuity are out!" We came to the house of a local Ashramite. Shoes (but for some reason, not the woollen caps) were removed. Suspecting that this may happen, I had taken a bath and checked my socks for holes before

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leaving home! Baba wore red woollen socks, a noticeable contrast to the bare feet of many of his devotees.

I never dreamed that one day I would sit (literally) at the feet of a real live guru. For one who suffers from corpulence, the exercise was not uncomfortable for me and the next half-hour passed quickly. Baba did all the talking, leaving me little opportunity to ask any questions. There was really no need to ask them - he answered everyone. Goodness, he was reading my mind. What strange power does this man have?

No, he had not come to found a new religion or cult - "All men are children of the same God; all religions are one; all paths lead to the same goal".

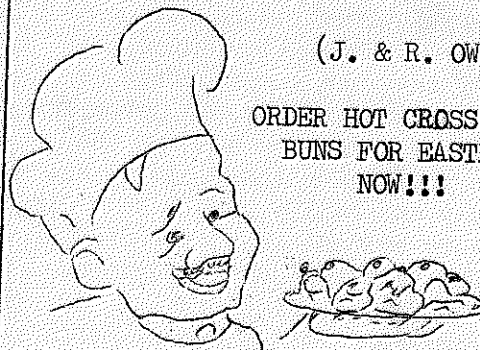
As a party gesture, Baba leaned forward and placed in my hands an orange drink and a biscuit. As previously and with startling suddenness, the guru arose and left. I followed, so deeply moved that I almost left my shoes, confidently believing the words of an orange-saried follower who smiled and kindly said "You have received Baba's blessing - he really loves you". Baba does have a message for the masses and I would not keep any from hearing him. It would be easy for me to follow this man, but for one thing; much of what he teaches has already been taught by the greatest Guru of them all, who founded a religion so universal and flexible as to incorporate much of what Baba says is necessary to achieve "fullness of life".

I shall never forget meeting Baba. I now do not wish to bite the hand that has been so kind. To many, and as far as

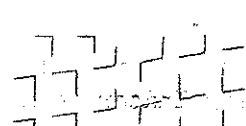

### FORCED LANDING RESCUE

The sleepy little community of Falmouth came to life suddenly on Sunday 24th March, at about 3.30 p.m., when a light aircraft made an un-scheduled and spectacular visit. Most of the locals naturally turned out.

The Cessna 172, with four persons on board, was en-route from Moorabbin to Cambridge on a private flight. The aircraft is believed to have landed at St. Helens and proceeded to the Four Mile Creek area from where the pilot evidently attempted to return to St. Helens, but, because of heavy rain and greatly reduced visibility, elected to land in Pat Wardlaw's paddock.

Marks indicated that the aircraft probably contacted the ground at a high rate of descent, landing uphill, tearing away the nosewheel and coming to rest in about 35

metres, with its nose gouged into the earth and tail high in the air. The foursome left the aircraft a little shaken but thankfully, unhurt. Full marks to Tim McManus for phoning the aircraft's distress to D.C.A. before it actually landed. Despite first-sight impressions, the aircraft was substantially damaged. The type of fracture in the nose-wheel assembly suggests very great side loadings. The engine crankshaft was broken and severe damage was sustained by the engine mounts and propeller. Damage to the airframe appeared to me only a slight dent in the Starboard wing. A quick dip-check of the fuel tanks, (with a golf club found under a gorse bush), revealed that the Cessna was carrying plenty of fuel.

An official investigator from the Department of Transport was on the scene within 24 hours and the wrecked aircraft was road-transported from the site within 48 hours to the Launceston airport where it is now dismantled.

The aircraft should soon be flying again, but only after extensive repairs estimated to be in the vicinity of \$3,500.

### BEWARE OF TRAVEL AGENCIES

In 1973 the principal of Sylvania High School in New South Wales organised a Tasmanian tour for a party of 44 students and two teachers. Six thousand dollars was paid to a travel agency and was consequently stolen by the officials of the agency. Because of generous donations by people of Sylvania to the school the party is going to visit Tasmania and schools are helping with accommodation. On Saturday April 20 the touring group will stay in St. Marys. They will be accommodated at the School with lidos and sleeping bags loaned by students. They will be provided with an evening meal and breakfast. A social will be held that evening in the School Hall.

### HOMES AND FLASHING LIGHTS FOR FINGAL

Mr. George Shaw M.L.C. continues to show real interest and concern for the welfare of the Valley.

In a recent letter to the Minister for Housing, Mr. Lowe, he has requested that "Urgent consideration be given to building departmental homes at Fingal".

Mr. Shaw relates the need for such housing with coal and forestry activities in the district. He has also taken up the issue again of flashing lights for the railway crossing at Fingal, with the Minister for Transport, Mr. Batt.

Mr. Batt advised that the Commissioner for Transport has stated that the installation of signals is not justified at the present time due to the limited train movements and satisfactory visibility for motorists approaching the crossing.
