This would be fantastic. One wonders what Andy Average would be paying for the ordinary necessities of life if costs and prices continue to escalate in this way.

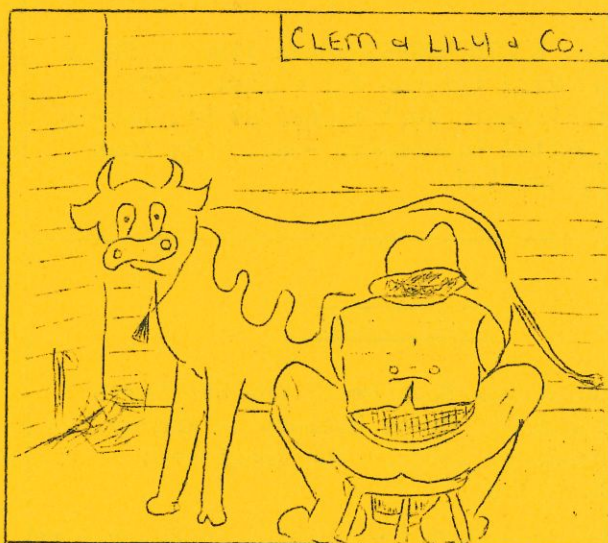

"That all women of whatever age, rank, profession or degree, whether virgins, maids or widows that shall from and after such Act impose upon, seduce, and betray into matrimony, any of His Majesty's subjects, by the scents, paints, cosmetic washes, artificial teeth, false hair, Spanish wool, iron stays, hoops, high-heeled shoes, bolstered hips, shall incur the penalty of the law in force against witchcraft and like misdemeanours and that the

Marriage upon conviction shall stand null and void".

In spite of the penalties at the time against witchcraft the use of cosmetics continued to increase. So far as can be established the Act has never been repealed and is still in force!!!

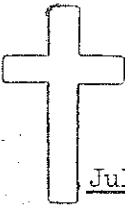

ST. MARYS NEW HOSPITAL WING

Work has started on the erection of a new ward block at St. Marys Hospital. The building will provide for twelve more beds, offices, workshop, storage and general facilities. The completion of the building is expected some time about April, 1974 and will finalise the recommendations made to the Government some years ago.

The building is expected to cost \$260,000 with wiring and electrical services an additional \$28,000. Furniture - equipment is to be supplied by the Health Department.

It is anticipated the main use of the new wards will be for geriatric nursing leaving the existing hospital free for general nursing.

Back to the roster matches and this is the most even and unpredictable round so far with all sides having to win to either retain their positions or keep alive their hopes of making the four.
