EDITORIAL

The Inevitability of Change

"Future Shock" is the title of a book written by Alvin Toffler, an American journalist and University lecturer. It is about change and how we adapt to it. It is about those who seem to thrive on change as well as those multitudes who resist it or seek flight from it. It is about our capacity to adapt. It is about the future and the shocks that its arrival brings. Jobs are changed more frequently, homes moved, fashions adopted and discarded, knowledge gained and outdated, ideas created and used up faster and faster.

Totally new concepts in biology and technology reduce us to naive visitors in the world set on an acceleration course towards advances far exceeding anything man is yet psychologically or morally prepared to live with.

Not surprisingly we feel disoriented.

We contract the primary disease of the future - future shock. The symptons are already apparent: they range from anxiety and sensless violence to physical illness, depression and apathy.

Victims often display erratic swings in interest and life-style, followed by an effort to "crawl into their shells" through social, intellectual and emotional withdrawal they feel continually harassed and want desperately to reduce the number of decisions they must make. Unless we are afraid to face facts, or unless we try to ignore facts, then we must reckon with change. There is little we can do to alter it. But how do we handle it?

I doubt whether any previous generation has faced such world shattering changes as ours...atoms...space...revolution in morality, culture, science, technology and theology.

Its strange isn't it, that we are frightened by change in our own time, even though we welcome it about the past...even celebrate it! Once people believed in a three-decker universe, that the earth was flat, that the world was only 6000 years old. Once we accepted slavery, child-labour, the

exploitation of women, the harsh treatment of employees. We have welcomed changed attitudes to these matters; but now change threatens our security. We fear the unfamiliar. Social change has been an essential feature of human history. To face change with courage and intelligence is to discover possibilities for service and usefulness that we never imagined could exist. On the other hand to try and stand still when the world is moving is to court disaster.

"Stop the world - I want to get off" may be a catchy title for a musical, IT IS IMPOSSIBLE FOR US.

Dear Sir,

Tour leading article in "Points to Ponder" in the last issue concerning the wages-prices spiral made interesting reading, and since it came at a time when most of us are studying our taxation sheets, was also very timely. While many of us may drool at the thought of earning \$200,000 or thereabouts by the year 2000, a quick look at the current tax rates would shatter us, and shows the idiccity of the way we are progressing.

At current rates a person earning \$4000 pays approx. one seventh of his earnings in tax; on \$8,000 about a $\frac{1}{4}$ and on \$40,000, more than half. Assuming the table was unaltered, we would all be paying 66.7 cents in the dollar long before the year 2000. Already at the current average wage we pay almost 30% of any wage increase in Taxation. As Industry must put up prices to cover our gross incomes, how can we possibly gain? One may ask the following questions: How do we cope? The low income groups and those families trying to live on one wage are finding it increasingly harder, and have nearly reached the stage where it is impossible. Those who are prosperous live on two or more sources of income or overtime payments, or have gained from earlier investments. Why does the Government allow it? I make no claims to being an economist, but it would appear that while the Governments employ one in four of the workforce, and collect tax from the lot, as well as indirect tax on every commodity used, they are not as likely to be affected by wage spirals as the general community. Witness the current outcry against Government extravagance! What do we do about it? What can we?

HEALTH NOTES

COLD WATER FOR SCALDS: The severity of the skin damage due to scalding may be reduced by rapid immersion in cold water. A boy aged 16 months was sitting in his high chair when he pulled at a pot of tea and spilled it over himself. The father wrapped up the child and brought him to casualty. Tea leaves were found in the child's clothing. The child was admitted with an extensive area of scalded skin. The anterior abdominal skin and both legs had large areas which were weeping or vesiculated. He was treated with intravenous fluids and silver-nitrate paint. He subsequently required two skin-grafts to full thickness burns of the abdomen and right thigh. He was dishcarged well after 6 weeks in hospital.

A girl aged 18 months walked up to the table. pulled down a pot of tea which had been made two minutes before, and drenched herself. The father carried the child to the kitchen, put her in the sink, and turned the cold water on to her. She was fighting and screaming. After soaking the clothing the father noticed that the right arm was still out of the water and cooled the arm as well. When the mother undressed the child she found tea leaves inside the vest and the rest of the clothing. Subsequently there was found to be a small area of vesiculation on the volar aspect of the right forearm. This healed in a week, leaving no scar. There was no visible effect on the rest of the skin of the child. DAMACE MAY BE PREVENTED by rapidly cocling the skin. IT IS IMPOLTANT NOT TO REMOVE THE CLOTHES. The time taken in undressing allows time for the skin to be damaged by the hot fluid. Cold water quickly cools the skin and clothes together.
