## EDITORIAL

### Just Testing!

"During one peak period between October 1961 and December 1962, the United States and Russia jointly exploded 340 megatons of nuclear bombs."

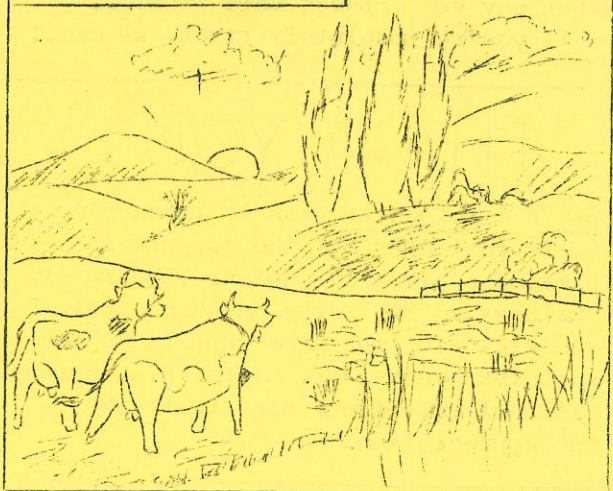

Moderate publicity has been given of late by newspapers and television to French nuclear tests at Mururoa Atoll in the nearby Pacific Ocean. Most Australians would oppose such tests because they are so near to us and so far from France. Two questions arising from this are; firstly, what would most Frenchmen have to say about these tests and, secondly, is the actual location of prime importance?

It must be recognized that France is a great and highly civilized nation which, in the past one hundred years, has three times been invaded and grievously mauled. If a Frenchman were to express fear of this happening again, one would have to sympathize; if he affirmed that the current testing is purely defensive and on a minor scale compared to the colossal testing programmes of other nuclear Powers, his arguments might not seem unreasonable.

A fact beyond any argument, however, is that any thermonuclear war would be a horror, sudden and devastating, beyond any experience of mankind. Even test explosions by rival nations are having serious effects on the atmosphere - the dumping of nuclear wastes can in time obliterate all life in the ocean. French nuclear tests, any tests for that matter, represent man's capability to poison and destroy all life on this planet. These things are not science fiction or T.V. horror movies; they are mixture of fact and possibility in the year 1973. We should all be thinking hard about this and compelling our parliamentary representatives, while there is still time, to


speak up loudly and repeatedly on our behalf.

H E A L T H   N O T E S

THE COMMON COLD. In the younger child the onset of a cold may only be indicated by loss of appetite and a temperature. If the cold is uncomplicated the temperature can rise to 103 deg. - 104 deg F and then subside after 24 to 48 hours. He may or may not have snuffles. "One day fever", in which for 24 hours children have a high temperature, lose their appetite, and may vomit, returning to normal the next day, is attributed to a virus infection of the common cold type. In the older child the onset of a cold is more like the adult illness. Itching at the back of the nose is accompanied by sneezing, watery eyes, a persistent discharge from the nose, and a transient sore throat.  
Treatment: If he has a temperature, put the child to bed in a warm, ventilated room. Aspirin can be given to ease discomfort and reduce temperature. Always follow the dose prescribed by your doctor or the instructions that are given.

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"WHERE I LIVE" - FINGAL

My home town is Fingal. The nearest town is St. Marys which is situated 12 miles from the start of the town but 13 miles from my home. Fingal is not a very big town. It has about 750 people. I have lived there all my life.

The climate is usually moderate, but sometimes it becomes very cold and wet. Launceston is the nearest city from Fingal. The scenery between these two places is quite pleasant. The industries around Fingal are: mining, farming, saw milling, garment factory. In this factory they make dressing gowns for boys and girls, men and women. The dressing-gowns are non-inflammable. The ladies who work there are: Carolyn Johnson, Mrs. Ricky Cowie, Mrs. S. Semmens and Helen Miller. So far they have made over 300 gowns since they started 12 months ago. Places and buildings that belong in history in Fingal are: historical Malahide Estate homestead and outbuildings, Anglican and Catholic churches, Fingal Hotel and the old homestead in front of the new Council Chambers. Most of these are made from sandstone.

The beautiful South Esk River flows through our town and about 5 miles out is a beautiful Pine Plantation. There is a small Primary School part of which is also made of sandstone. Besides the Anglican and Catholic churches, there is a wooden Presbyterian church. There are two milk bars and two general merchandise shops and one butchers shop. Fingal has 3 football teams. The seniors are one of the oldest clubs on the East Coast. There is the Malahide Golf Club which has recently been moved to a different location; and has a beautiful 9 hole course.

Good trout and perch can be caught in the South Esk and Break-O-day rivers and this is quite popular with some tourists. Apart from a few farm jobs, saw mills and coal mines, there are very few jobs for people leaving school. The advantages of living in Fingal are: plenty of good clean air and wide open spaces to play in. Disadvantages are that most young people have to move away for seek employment.

When I grow up I would like to see more industries set up in the valley to use our coal instead of sending it out of the valley. A meatworks factory could be set up in the valley because thousands of head of stock are sent annually to other meatworks. A woodchip plant could be set up in the valley and instead of our logs being sent away, we could send away chips. This would employ more people. We could also have a big co-operative store where farmers and store-keepers could buy and sell their local products. My home is not in the town. We have to travel about a mile to the shops and bus-stop.

The Rise and Fall of Fingal

In the days when my grandfather was a boy, the town was completely different from what it is now. My great grandfather's father owned a Flour Mill which is situated near the Township Creek. After that my great grandfather took it over and my grandfather worked there. He used to cart the wheat from the railway to the mill. The flour miller used the wheat grown locally by the farmers. There were 3 hotels: The Tasmanian, The Talbot Arms and the Prince of Wales. The Prince of Wales was built near Mr. & Mrs. J. Francis. In front of this was the Egan Bros. shop. There were 2 policemen at Fingal - a sergeant and a constable. There was a lawyer, our own bank called the Bank of Australasia where Barber's store is now. There were also 2 doctors (we haven't any now).

A private school was situated near the Recreation Ground. This was run by Miss Lyne. The primary school is still in the same place as before.

A member of Parliament used to live where y mother's father and mother now live. The original Minister's house, called, "The Manse", is where my father's father and mother live. The first original school was behind the Police Station. This is now a private home.

There was also a blacksmith's shop and a store where Mr. & Mrs. R. Wise live. There used to be a racecourse too; and horse-racing used to commence every St. Patrick's day. The bicycle track was near the racecourse. Also in Fingal was an old bicycle and saddle shop where Ransoms shop is. This was run and owned by Billy Manning.

Fred Williams owned the bakery which is still there, but not in progress. One butcher shop was next to Holder Bros. and the other one is still in the same place. There were 3 coalmines called: "The Cat", "The Kitten" and "The Duncan". The Duncan mine is run by the Cornwall Coal Co. but the others were closed down. The old bridge, between Mr. Alex McKenzies and the pump house, was washed away in the worst floods in Tasmanian history, in 1929.
