EDITORIAL

Valley Voice recently received two interesting letters not intended for publication. The first was a letter of encouragement from a reader who holds a high office in the State Parliament. Its content encourages us to "keep the good work going as a worth-while community service".

The other was both encouraging and highly critical and the reason for this editorial is the hope that our readers may have the opportunity to write in and say what they think of the points raised. Our correspondent is critical of the following:STARPROBE:, which he sees as being $12\frac{1}{2}\%$ of our paper wasted and we are advised "to be rid of the nonsense".

PAGE FOUR: (the religious page) for it is "of interest only to a minority of readers and in the 'ratings' it must be low".

MISS PIFFLE: ("the Mangana Social Scene") because "erstwhile travellers and people of interest they are not....let the Examiner report the latest jet-setting trends". NEWS: The lack of local, sporting and Council news is criticized. He is pleased to see that "the sad saga of Lily has vanished".

We have graciously received the critical comments of our friend's letter which we believe were made with the intention of being helpful.

This gives us the opportunity to make some comments on the criticisms above: STARPROBE: is probably nonsense, but if so it is nonsense which many seem to read and out of which they get a lot of fun. "Pegasus" is an enthusiastic and reliable contributor whose articles we never have to "chase up".

PAGE FOUR: We doubt that we can consider dispensing with the church notices. The churches are entitled to have their services advertised and they are consistent with their information. "From the Pulpit" is seen to be related to the Editor's profession, in the eyes of our critic. This is unfair in that this column has existed since the early days of the paper. The articles are chosen to suit all denominations and are generally suitable in providing moral aids for those who are not "religiously inclined. MISS PIFFIE: We suggest that our correspondent take a trip to Mangana and see how enthusiastic our readers are there. The Mangana Social news is of interest to THEM and consequently the Valley Voice sells better there than in most places.

NEWS: Despite repeated requests for local news, many clubs and organisations have failed to send in regular reports and do not seem to realize that this would benefit their group as well as the Valley Voice.

Earlier this year, in response to our request, the Fingal Council advised that it would be necessary for us to attend meetings for news, as is the case with other newspapers. With a small staff of four, each member a busy person, this remains an impossibility.



Dear Sir,

Since 1969 the Fingal A.L.P. Branch have concerned itself with a number of issues which have been of public importance to residents of the Fingal Valley.

In July 1970 the branch made personal representation to the then leader of the Opposition, Mr. E. E. Reece, M.H.A., regarding the growing unemployment in the Fingal Valley caused through men being retrenched from timber mills in the area. Shortly afterwards five more men were employed by the Forestry Commission.

On June 15th 1973, the branch was responsible for the Premier, Hon E. E. Reece M.H.A. visiting Fingal for a meeting. At the meeting the matter of employment of men retrenched from the mining industry in the area was raised. In reply, in a letter forwarded, on June 21st, the Premier said, "That following his attendance at the Branch meeting he had become more aware of the employment problem subsequently 24 men were employed on a casual basis. Following that decision the branch took-up the matter of having the men employed much longer than was fist anticipated and on a weekly basis. This whole question was also referred to the Minister for Primary Industry, during October by the branch.

The branch has also been active since 1969 in bringing to the attention of the relevant Minister housing problems in the Recently, the Minister for Housing, Hon D. Lowe M.H.A., informed the Branch, that two houses are programmed for constructduring I974-I975. A survey will be completed by the end of May to determine whether more homes will be erected during 1974-1975

For a number of years the Branch has actively campaigned for the appointment of a resident medical officer at Fingal. A petition containing 445 signatures has been presented to the Fingal Council urgently requiring the council to take steps to have

a medical officer appointed. The Council have agreed to meet Executive Officers of the Branch to discuss the problems associated with such a proposal.

Other issues taken-up by the branch include the construction of a breadcasting directional aerial to provide a better radio reception in the area; matters concerning education in rural areas; adequate sealing of roads in the Fingal Valley; the safety of children travelling on buses; the development of Ben Lomond, as a tourist attraction, along similar lines to the Dandenong Ranges in Victoria - The Minister for Tourism was written to in June 1972 regarding the economic viability of such a project. Other issues which are considered to be in the best interests of the Fingal Valley have also been taken-up from time to time.

The Fingal A.L.P. Branch is a voluntary organisation that tries to present many aspects of ALP policies etc. to people of the Fingal Valley, it also has a very important role in making the government of the day aware of inadequate facilities etc. in the Much of the foundation work on a area. number of issues have probably gone unnoticed because the branch has never actually tried to receive too much publicity. The branch has usually received its reward by knowing that it has played its part in achieving part of an objective in the Valley. However, since a number of poeple have approached members with the question, "Just what has the Branch done?" The Branch thought it time to set out someof its achievements.

It is difficult to add anything new to the that has been written and stated about last weekend's floods by the news media. Many facts (3 fallacies) have been noted. From Anzac Day to Monday morning (29th), I6 inches (400 mm.) of rain fell in St. Marys; more or less in other areas. In that time approximately I,600 tons of rain fell on every acre and when stated in these terms the mind truly boggles! St. Marys rainfall for April was 23, 40 inches (535 mm.) and the total so far this year to the end of April is 40.83 inches (I,020 mm)

That's a lot of rain in anyone's language and the resultant damage to private and public property was widespread and very distressing. There is cause for thankfulness that there were no significant stock losses and more importantly, no loss of human life. At certain stages of the crisis some individuals took real risks as they waded through deep, swift flowing waters in the darkness in order to render assistance.

The story of the floods is a real-life drama blending the milk of human kindness with the murky destructiveness of flood— waters. Mother nature sometimes coldly slaps man in the face, only to find that he smilingly rises to turn the other cheek and sometimes has that slapped also. Locals were not, an exception in this matter and somehow the recent crisis brought out the best in people.

Some acts of kindness noted were: a gentle

Some acts of kindness noted were: a gentleman walking to Lower German Town to visit one of our senior citizens; Sunday's Meals on Wheels being delivered around St. Marys, some of which were delivered through deep waters in a truck; a citizen pulling a young man off an electrified down pipe, and many more too numerous to include here. As we said; it was a drama in real life and each character involved has a story to tell. The most notable thing concerning the floods was that residents could still laugh and smile in spite of it and the sentiments of many could be summed up in this little verse:—

Don't fume, nor fuss, Nor fret, nor cuss, For bad as 'tis, It might be wuss!

Falmouth rain for three days was 1184 pts., this has really made things wet. Looking across to Scamander road was a large lake with bits of fence here and there.
