EDITORIAL

YOU AND THE LAW

To enable readers to have a better understanding of what this topic is all about it is first necessary for me to draw to your attention what my reference to the St Marys Police District includes the municipalities of Ross, Campbelltown, Fingal, Portland, and Glanorgan.

Irrespective of what has been said from other sources the fact remains that the St Marys Police District, has, per head of drivers population, an extremely high road fatality rate, equal to any other Police District in the State.

The main causes have been alcohol, and speed, and the most noticeable point arising from our statistics clearly disclose that more accidents occurred in the period between Monday and Friday, than at weekends. I make this point to show that one could reasonably expect that there would be more accidents at weekends, when the volume of traffic on our roads would be at its heaviest, and so drivers would expect to be more accident prone, but this is not the case.

Could it be that our accident rate is high because of the distances involved in travelling? or due to Road conditions? Due to the fatigue of long drivers, which does not effect the heavy volume of traffic in our cities?

Whatever your own personal views on the subject are, I'm afraid that I cannot be of any real assistance as to whether you are right or wrong, but I do know from personal experience that a greater concentration is required from drivers in these areas than from a city driver, because of the distance of travel and the lack of traffic volume.

I have travelled from St. Marys to Campbelltown day and night and at times I have not sighted a fellow motorist on the journey, this I believe attributes heavily to our accident rate, because a driver driving under such conditions gets careless, and loses concentration to such an extent, that he is unable to cope with an emergency when it arises.

So think about our accident rate and then try to do something about it, by making sure you don't become involved, because this is one affair you don't want to get involved in.
