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## EDITORIAL

She, with many others, is not satisfied with the way the nation is heading with its over-abundance of un-employment, inflation and strikes; with its increasing moral and environment pollution and crimes rate.

It would seem that in a real sense the country is "going to the dogs" politically and spiritually. We have reached the most momentous period in our nation's history only to find that we have no one to lead us in the right path.

They seek understanding first and then the remedy based on the principles of love, sacrifice, justice, honour, integrity, equality and goodwill.

In these matters our fathers seem to have been much wiser than we are. Their principles of personal moral responsibility; the right of private judgement and right of free assembly which together filled them with a fervent passion and unshakable belief in the inward spirituality of the individual. Let us be worthy of them and of the principles for which they stood so that their country, and ours, will never go to the dogs!

He serves his country best

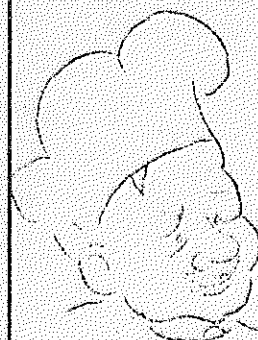
Who lives pure life and doeth righteous deed,

Christian Education

"That which I see not teach thou me," so said the Old Testament's Elihu to Job. Elihu's request was a worthy one and one that did him credit. In other words he is saying if I am lacking in understanding, give me the information I need.

Such a request is timely today. The church has been giving religious instruction for many years. One would think that those who have grown up in Christian communities would be well informed on religious matters but, sad to say, the reverse is true.

Much of the religious education given to children seems to be ineffective. Often the pupils misunderstand. A teacher gave his students a lesson on the Children of Israel in the land of Goshen. He had them repeat that name until he was sure that they were familiar with it, but a week later when he asked "Where did the Israelites live?" he was dismayed when the kids yelled in unison, "In the Atlantic Ocean"

The teachable spirit is commendable. Jesus approved it. He said the attitude of a child was necessary for one to enter the Kingdom. "The more you learn to know and enjoy," says one writer, "the more complete and full will be your delight of living". The two central points of our childrens' faith should be the Bible and Jesus.

"Christian education is not one in which Divinity dictates the curriculum, but one in which it gathers together the threads of the other subjects and gives them unity and purpose, and a meaning for life" said a former Headmaster of Harrow, R.W. Moore.

YOU AND THE LAW

An interesting article appeared in the Examiner a few days ago. It came by way of a statement made by the Minister for Road Safety and it touched on the subject of "drinking drivers" and road deaths.

When I read this article I could see that the Minister had been well informed and that his comments touched the truth of our road fatalities, and I do agree with the Minister when he said "that some urgent steps are now necessary to curb the drunken driver and save a life on our roads."

I have made an effort to curb the drinking driver since I have moved into this police district, so for the information of motorists I pass on to them that if they drink to excess and then drive, sooner than later, that driver will be apprehended.

Over the past four months, police in this Division have apprehended almost one hundred drivers who, when tested, had a blood alcohol content exceeding 0.08 percent. Of this number all have been convicted, who to date have appeared in our Courts and, of course, it goes without saying that the drivers convicted already are now walking; their licences have been cancelled.

It is not intended that there will be any easing off in police supervision towards the drinking driver, in fact I propose to step up even further our attention in this direction with the coming of the holiday period. So if you go out of an evening or at weekends to parties and have too much to drink, then you would be well advised to leave your car parked some where and not drive it unless you can make alternative arrangements to have someone else drive you home, who has not been drinking.

If you value your licence, and you should do especially if you earn your living from holding one, then you would be very wise to realise that to hold a licence to drive a vehicle is now a privilege, not a pleasure. Protect your licence and more-so, protect the ones that you love. Drive but don't drink.

TODD'S HALL

Todd's Hall was built in 1910 for a man called Mr. Todd. Downstairs there is a variety of many things. To start with, the tea-house, which has cane furnishings and seagrass matting. There is a jute curtain hanging between the Hall and the tea-house. The kitchen they made themselves and there is always music playing.

The museum is very interesting to look at. There are many valuable things, such as crockery and old bottles. There are a lot of things that we still use today, only in a more modern condition. There is an old typewriter and a very funny looking dentist's chair which has a wooden back. The old film projectors were strange also. The old post cards were very nice. Some of them had sad little poems on the bottom of them and some had funny pictures. They had some very creepy spiders in bottles and one live one with a cross shape on his back.

The shop has been open about a month. There was a bark painting on the shelf that had been done by Mrs. Royle and Mrs. Semmens. They have bikinis, booties, fur bags and things that were made by Mrs. Muggeridge. They also have things that were made by schoolchildren.

Upstairs they are going to have a cinema and will be able to fit at least a hundred people in it. The little room at the top, just as you go in the door, is the old photography room.

PRESS RELEASE

"The announcement of the switch to "Coal Firing" by Goliath Cement Holdings Limited at Railton is great news for Tasmania, and particularly for the Fingal Valley", said Mr. George Shaw, the Member for Macquarie in the Legislative Council, in Launceston on 1st November, 1974. "Additional employment opportunity is particularly refreshing in today's economy.

"Employment potential in the Fingal area is among the highest in Tasmania, and is not limited to coal mining expansion. Forest industries in the area and mining at Rossarden and Storey's Creek are in need of quality employees.

"However, to realize these opportunities there must be co-operation from all community sectors. State and Local Government particularly must take a lead, for example - "The extreme housing shortage at Fingal must be overcome quickly. A major factor in the closing of one sawmill at Fingal was the unavailability of housing for employees. Yet repeated representation for Government housing has fallen on deaf ears.

"Yesterday I made representation to the Minister for Housing for many more homes to be built at Fingal", said Mr. Shaw. "So far, only two are scheduled for 1974-1975. I will be meeting Mr. Lowe, M.H.A. next Wednesday", he added, "to hear the outcome of those representations.

"The Government should also step up its Esk Highway re-construction programme to enable earlier completion. "the Fingal Council will need to take a serious look at a sewerage scheme for Fingal. Although costly, such a scheme would raise the quality of life, enhance development and ensure greater community stability. I suggest that a cost analysis and feasibility study is urgently required", concluded Mr. Shaw.
