A CALL FOR OPTIMISM

There was a man who lived by the side of the road and he sold hot dogs.

He was hard of hearing so he had no radio.

He had trouble with his eyes so he read no newspapers.

But he sold good hot dogs.

He put signs up on the highway telling how good they were - he stood on the side of the road and cried, "Buy a hot dog, mister?" and people bought.

He increased his meat and bun order. He bought a bigger stove to take care of his trade. He finally got his son home from school to help him. But then something happened.

His son said, "Father, Haven't you been listening to the radio? Haven't you been reading the newspapers? There's a big depression on - the European situation is terrible - the domestic situation is worse - everything is going to pot." Whereupon his father though, "Well, my son's been to high school, he reads the newspapers, and he listens to the radio and he ought to know." So the father cut down on his meat and bun orders, took down his advertising signs and no longer bothered to stand out on the highway to sell his hot dogs - and his hot dog sales fell almost overnight.

"You're right son," the father said to the boy, "We certainly are in the middle of a great depression."

Believe it or not, what you think has a very great effect on what actually comes to pass. People who think that this will be a difficult year will, in all probability, not be disappointed in their expectations. However, I am sure that those who commence 1975 with optimism, and a certain belief that they will prosper and continue to go forward, will not be disappointed either.

THE ART OF DRAMA.

Of all the arts Drama should be considered one of the most important, it's value lies in it's ability to communicate with different spectres of our society. We gain a glimpse of ourselves in the reality

of the play. We suffer for a time the torments of the characters or the misfortune of their situation. We experience a life or series of events - vents different from our own, and gain valuable insights and awareness.

The greater the play the stronger the sense of participation and reaction from the audience, the great play writes had the ability of communicating subtle messages and points with a mere gesture, without resorting to an overabundance of words.

With the advent of television and film the play moved into an unlimited environment, allowing more fluid continuity of action, the film more than any other media of communication has allowed writers more freedom to experiment with sight and sound, the necessity of good vocal projection and over emphasised stage gestures has made way for more natural speech and action. However, the film lacks true audience participation and reaction, there is no way for the actor to gauge the depths that his characterization might achieve. The film is made for mass audience appeal, whilst a good stage play will develop and evolve through it's season reaching heights far above a mundane TV performance.

Both live plays and films make valuable contributions to our entertainment, it seems unfortunate however that live drama and musicals are so neglected today. A revival of Drama societies and Musical societies and regular shows would be a great asset and boon to any community.

VISIT TO ST. HELENS BY MR. BILL SNEDDEN

The Parish Hall at St. Helens was packed to capacity to hear the Federal Leader of the Opposition Mr. Bill Snedden last Saturday night.

People from Winnaleah through to Avoca attended and many people were forced to stand outside and others to overflow into the kitchen of the hall, owing to the crowd of supporters.

The visit was the final phase of a two day visit to Northern Tasmania. Following his speech, Mr. Snedden was given a standing ovation as he left the hall to go to the St. Helens aerodrome where a private aircraft took him to Melbourne.

Following Mr. Snedden's departure, the crowd was addressed by Mr. Wing, President of Tasmanian Liberal Party and Mr. Raine, State Secretary. The meeting concluded with supper.

PORTLAND NOTES on the CENTENARY

The establishment of the school and finding of tin in Portland came at the same time in 1874.

The centenary started with a combined church service in the Memorial Hall on Sunday November 17, with Rev. Thomas, Pastor Clarke and Father Arden taking part. The address was given by Mr. Reece. About 500 people attended.

On Wednesday the school had an open day. Parents co-operated with teachers and turned up in period costumes. The book called "Then and Now" is a record in photos of the old mines and old buildings and people as they used to be. Sales of this are getting on towards 1,000.

The Mines Department and B.H.P. combined to show how the mines worked and interesting samples of minerals.

On Friday the Old Time Ball was held at the Memorial Hall and first prize went to Mr. & Mrs. Eiszle of Hobart. A nett profit of more than \$900 was made.

The week ended with a parade down the main street to the school by the school children in Victorian costumes. The Lions Club held a barbecue in the recreation ground which was a great attraction.

The Chairman of the Centenary committee, Mr. Press, is to meet the Parents and Friends Association on December 3 and is expected to inform them of the overall financial amount.

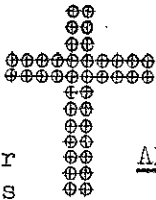

CHURCH NOTICES

Give a warm welcome to any brother who wants to join you, even though his faith is weak. Don't criticize him for having different ideas from yours about what is right and wrong. For instance, don't argue with him about whether or not to eat meat that has been offered to idols. You may believe there is no harm in this, but the faith of others is weaker; they think it is wrong, and will go without any meat at all and eat vegetables rather than eat this kind of meat.

Those who think it is all right to eat such meat must not look down on those who won't. And if you are one of those who won't, don't find fault with those who do. For God has accepted them to be His children. They are God's servants, not yours. They are responsible to Him, not to you. Let Him tell them whether they are right or wrong. And God is able to make them do as they should.

So don't criticize each other any more. Try instead to live in such a way that you will never make your brother stumble by letting him see you doing something he thinks is wrong. Don't do anything that will cause criticism against yourself even though you know that what you do is right. For, after all, the important thing for us as Christians is not what we eat or drink but stirring up goodness and peace and joy from the Holy Spirit. If you let Christ be Lord in these affairs, God will be glad; and so will others. In this way aim for harmony in the church and try to build each other up.

You may know that there is nothing wrong with what you do, even from God's point of view, but keep it to yourself; don't flaunt your faith in front of others who might be hurt by it. In this situation, happy is the man who does not sin by doing what he knows is right.

From press and radio report, the total catch varied from 7000 to 12000 and from the number of starters mentioned, the nett result was 35 fish per head - that takes a bit of swallowing. Next event on the fishing calendar will be conducted by St. Helens Game Fishing Club on Sunday 15th December, weather and barway permitting. There are still some vacant berths on the charter boats and these will be allotted to the first to apply. So far, there have been no reported sightings of tuna. Along the surf beaches, some good catches have been made of blackback and flathead and also bugle fish or elephant shark. One St. Marys angler got six of these shark last weekend. Next contest for Scamander Angling Club members will be on Sunday 29th December at Scamander (bream and surf) from 12 noon to 6 pm.

A GAME THAT ONE SIDE CAN'T LOSE

The following article was written by a local resident Mr. Gordon Salter and appeared in the Examiner on January 12, 1957, and used here with his permission.

PART I

I am one of a milling crowd of 30,000 people going to the bullfight in Madrid on a hot summer Sunday afternoon.

All my previous impressions of Spain - its culture and its hospitable people - are beginning to pale in the light of his new experience.

There is excitement in the air and one can feel it.

I am fortunate for I hold a ticket on the shady side of the stadium (where one pays more) and only eight seats from where General Franco will sit later.

On each side of me American tourists are seated and below is the ring of yellow sand as smooth as a bowling green. There is no activity - yet.

All seats are filled now and it is only seconds before proceedings will begin. It is said that in Spain two things start with absolute punctuality - the bullfight and Mass.

Trumpets and drums sound a salute. Men on horseback appear and salute the President. They are masters of ceremonies, dressed in 17th century style.

A band strikes up and the whole company of "Toreros" and their assistants march across the ring and around it. Their dress is very colourful and I am afraid this is the only part of the whole show I enjoy.

The ring is now cleared.

An attendant on horseback gallops to below where the President sits. The President throws him a key. The attendant gallops to the pens opposite and hands the key to another man dressed as a bull fighter. This man will release the bull at the appropriate moment.

Now enter the Bull .

Charging into the ring is a mighty black bull, long horned and ferocious.

The bull sees men with cloaks in the ring and immediately charges the nearest one.

He attacks so impetuously that he is unable to check his course and he closes his eyes before the moment of impact.

This gives the bullfighter his chance to escape and at the same time display his skill.

These men make several passes at the bull which charges again and again.

All this helps to tire him, of course. These artists use the cape to advantage, and they move with the grace of ballet dancers.

The black bull is getting tired now after repeated charges and the sound of trumpets and drums announce a change of scene.

The men with the capes leave the arena and two men (picadors) arrive on horseback holding long-shafted spears called picas.

The horses ears are blocked with cotton wool and they are blindfolded so as not to see the charging bull.

They have an armour of heavy mattress to protect them from the bull's horns but this is not always effective. A few years ago one bull killed nine horses before he was killed.

But to return to the fight. The bull charges one of the horses and the picador plunges the heavy spear into the bull's neck again and again.

This action takes place right in front of where I am seated (for General Franco's benefit, I presume).

One American girl hides her face in her hands and another is violently ill at the gruesome sight.

Blood is pouring from the bull now leaving crimson patches on the golden sand. Half a dozen deep wounds are inflicted and blood congeals on the bull's shoulders.

The mighty beast is a courageous fighter and he attacks again. This time he gets past the protective covering and gores the horse in the side.

The show must go on and another horse takes his place. Twice more the spear is driven into the bull's shoulders and he is feeling the effects.

Now the unfortunate bull is confronted with men who hold barbed darts. Their object is to drive the metal darts into the bull's back and further weaken him for the "kill".

The courageous bull charges again and the torero with split second timing, thrusts the darts home at the same time stepping to one side. This movement is executed with great skill and one is forced to admire his agility. Six darts are driven into the animal's back.

And now we come to the final phase of the fight and the appearance of the matador using a red cloth to attack the bull.

This matador, a handsome man and very popular with the crowd, happens to be Spain's No. 1 bullfighter, who earns between £20,000 and £30,000 a year.
