

YOU AND LAW

The boating fatality at Bicheno this week reminds me quite vividly how little the average person bothers with water safety, and as a result there is a lot of heart break and sorrow when one of our loved ones are drowned.

Fishing, surfing, and just plain boating for the joy of it is one of our most pleasant pastimes, and should not be marred by carelessness.

Please wear your life jacket. (One of our drowning victims last year had his life jacket in the boot of his car, if he had just taken a few more minutes to put it on he may have been alive today.).

Don't overcrowd your boat, quite often you will see a boat which should carry no more than three with five or six persons in it, which I am sure you will agree is just foolhardy.

Use common sense, don't set out in a small boat when the weather conditions quite obviously are too rough for it. If you have a speed boat, or a boat capable of speed go steady you really don't need to drive it with the throttle wide open, you'll arrive at your fishing bed just the same, if you go slower, and possibly a lot safer, and if there is an old chap who says that you shouldn't go to a certain spot because of reefs, sand bars etc., please listen to him, he will most certainly know the area better than you, and could possibly be the means of saving your life.

Make sure that your boat is equipped with Life jackets, oars, grappling hook, rope, anchor, and a spare tin of petrol, so you are not stranded at sea with a dead motor, but PLEASE do not attempt to refill you petrol tank at sea, with the motor still going, one man did and as a result two lost their lives when the engine exploded, again just care and plain common sense is needed and you'll have a happy boating holiday and live to have many more. No—one wants to end up as a statistic.

HEALTH NOTES

Are you INTERESTED in yourhealth? Two hundred years ago bread was made from flour obtained by grinding wheat with millstones. Then came roller milling, which by rolling the grain instead of grinding it, made it much easier to sift out the outer covering (bran) and the embryo, the germ of life itself since these are larger particles, it was felt to be an "advance" because the new product was whiter and finer.

Unfortunately these particles contain roughage necessary for digestion plus the creater proportion of mineral salts and vitamins (irons, most of the B complex and vitamin E).

Modern science then came up with chemicals to bleach it whiter still, we now have "pure white" flour which is not an attribute to admire - it is in fact "dead white"!

The following figures from the British Ministry of Food may prove to you the truth behind the aforesaid.

Percentages are of daily requirements.

| | 8oz white bread | 8oz whole- wheat brea |
|----------------|--------------------|--------------------------|
| Iron | 13.33% | 46.67% |
| Vitamin B | 6.67% | 60.00% |
| Riboflavin | 4.44% | 22.22% |
| Nicotinic Acid | 13.33% | 40.00% |

Why then do we persist in using white flour? If parents have an acquired preference for white bread they should not inflict this upon their children.

"Brown" bread fromsome bakers is usually white flour with molasses added for colouring. Insist upon "whole wheat" flour or make your own bread, for your health's sake.

* After receiving this article I went to visit Mr. Owens at the Bakery and saw the wholemeal flour ready for baking, Mr. Owens also uses Soy flour, cracked rye and malt flour in the wholemeal bread which is truly "wholemeal" and very delicious, and good for you too!
